Chaplain's Letter to Mr. and Mrs. Parker Rampley

The following is the letter received by Mr. and Mrs. Parker Rampley from Chaplain West who officiated at the last rites held for their son Billy.

Dear Friend; I address you as such because I well know that sorrow binds hearts together regardless of whether we happen to know each other by name and sight.

This letter is written to you personally and to all your family and friends to express my deepest sympathy and most profound sorrow in the death of your loved one, Cornett Rampley.

Of course you have already received notice of his death. I share the shock of it with you. I wish I could have been there when you received the tragic message; however I am so glad I could be here to do what I know you would have wanted me to do and that is to give him a good funeral of honor and great respect which he justly deserved, and now to tell you something of it.

I conducted funeral services for him in a beautiful American Cemetery in North Italy. I cannot now give you the name of the cemetery but you would be quite well pleased with its beauty, quietness, and sacred dignity. A large American flag flies triumphantly and comforting over his grave and over his many comrades as they peacefully sleep there surrounded by small rolling hills with beautiful mountains in the background. A good view of the lovely blue Mediterranean can be seen from the Cemetery. Workmen are there now making it a place of beauty. The white crosses have been put up; grass will be sown in season, and flowers planted.

It may be that after the war I shall be able to visit you and tell you something more of him and his beautiful resting place. I should so much like to visit every family of the men whose funerals I have conducted. My home address is Bacon's Castle, Virginia and I should be so glad for you to write me there. I have no home, however mail will always be sent to me from that address. I shall be so glad to give you then all the information I possibly can.

And now I know that God can be of great comfort to you so I commend you unto Him and assure you that His grace is sufficient. You have my love and prayers. May the good principles for which he died soon be realized

throughout all God's good earth for the best interests of all people everywhere and for all those who live in future generations. Yours with a tear, a prayer, and the glorious light of HOPE, Thomas E. West, Chaplain

JACK STRANGE writes to the editor. "Dear Roy: Well it has been a long time since I wrote you. So thought I would drop you a line.

I have something now I think at least I haven't hear of it happening before anyway. On my 12 jump which was March 1st at night. We were getting ready to load on the plane There came the pilot. Who do you think it was? Well it was Captain G. W. Lee. Yes Roy and he really is a GOOD PILOT. I have heard more compliments on the way he handled the plane than you can imagine. He took more interest in our safety than any other pilot we have ever rode with. He landed everyone on the field. Well it seemed like it was perfect. Before it has seemed like the other pilots didn't care. Well I will say one thing Capt. Lee is the best pilot I have ever rode with and I now you will agree, For I have 15 other men who say the same thing.

Well I guess that is all I have to write. So tell everyone to take it easy. I hope to see them soon."

WILLIAM STODGHILL writes "Hello Roy, I thought I would drop you a line to let you know I'm really enjoying the B. C. N."

Roy Bomar is here now. Roy said he would like for his address to be changed too He said he had been intending to write but since I was writing, to tell you his address had changed and he would like to get it. It's really swell to have someone from your home town with you. I was kinda lost here for a long time until he came. I'm studying for Storekeeper right now so am plenty busy. Tell everyone hello for me."

CPL. ROY MACK WALKER who is in Belgium writes to Bill Tension.

Dear Mr. Tension: This letter from you was a nice surprise and I was glad to hear from you. I will try to write you a few lines but I was never very good at writing letters.

Things are looking very good over here at the present. The Germans pushed us around for awhile in December but I guess that we have everything under control. These "supermen" sure are taking a beating. I hope that things get rougher and believe that it will be over this spring or summer. It may not be very much longer before the Russians are in Berlin. That probably wouldn't be the end of the war but it would lower the morale of the German people.

Alton came to see me when I was in England and stayed from Dec. 2nd to the 5th. He said that he was coming back and spent Christmas but his plane went down on December 16th. We still have hopes of getting some good news about him and the rest of the boys but it has been such a long time. There isn't anything that we can do but hope and pray that he and the rest of the boys with him are still alive. Mother wrote and told me about Billy being killed in action. He was a wonderful friend and the best buddy that a fellow could hope for. It is very bad to hear about these boys that won't be coming home when this war is over. We won't miss them so much over here because we don't expect to see them every day but it is going to be very lonesome at home where we were together nearly everyday. I wrote Mr. and Mrs. Rampley a letter as soon as I heard about Billy, and found that it was a very hard thing to do because I couldn't think of anything to write them and didn't know what to say. This was the first letter of that kind to write and I hope that it is my last. I hope that they will understand what I was trying to say and how I felt about Billy. being gone.

I will locate these boys that you wrote to me about. If I locate any of them I will write and tell you. This is about all the news that I know. Write when you have time and tell me all of the news from home.

Pfc. Richard (Hank) Brown was wounded in the first day's fighting on Iwa Jima, according to a letter received here by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. P. Brown. The Browns have received no word from the War Department, and the word was received in a personal letter from Hank, written aboard a hospital ship. He said that his wounds were not serious, but that he had been ordered out of combat duty for some time.

Hank is in the Fourth Marine Division, which has suffered heavy casualties in their fight for the tiny island of Iwa Jima.

I received some Christmas cards yesterday and as I haven't time to write and thank them, you thank them for remembering me, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Lyon, Jr., Mr. and Mrs. Tom Bomar, Roy Hahn, Mr. and Mrs. T. L. Anderson, and Miss Anna Lee, Uncle Willie and Aunt Rilla, Lillian and Alvie, Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Fisher, Mr. and Mrs. Newman, Mr. and Mrs. Grady Wimberly, Mrs. Eugene Long, Uncle Scott and Aunt Lois. They were sure all nice and I am sure I haven't received them all yet, some was mailed in November. The mail man just came received two long air mails from you. Yes I believe the air mail comes faster. One of your letters had some Briscoe County News items in it. I sure do enjoy reading that little paper, I believe that is the best way to send it, just send the parts I am interested in and by air mail.

What is this about you all not painting the house out on the farm because you wanted to save that for me to do, you are not trying to talk me into working now are you? You bet I will be glad to paint it as long as that old land is under me and not water. I am getting use to this water but I am not crazy about it. I haven't been in swimming yet, it looks too deep for me, will take the dust anytime.

You have sure had a pretty winter. Boy, I sure hope I get home in time for some fried chicken, we have chicken here but not as good as you can fix it, tonight we will have left overs and a few cans of something else, but at that it is lots better than some of the boys have.

Today was Sunday and we had the day off, I went to Church this morning, they had church services aboard a Hospital Ship, so Spain, my buddy and I went. The preacher was good and preached a most interesting sermon. They didn't have any wounded aboard, but we do see lots of Hospital Ships with wounded on them. After the sermon we looked it over and it was quite and interesting ship. My buddy and I had Texas written on our hats, so two boys came over to see us and before we left we had met 4 or 5 boys also from Texas but I didn't know any of them. The hats, we wear are these little base ball caps with the long bills on them, you know just like we use to wear at home on mine. I had West Texas written across the bill so you could read it when the bill is turned up and Spain had

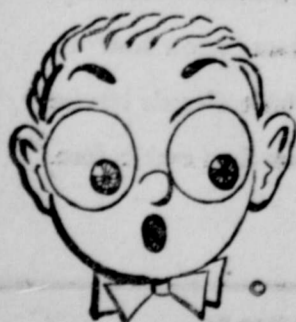

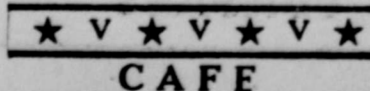
