HEARINGS HELD ON SOIL CONSERVATION

There were two hearings held in Briscoe County on Tuesday, May 29th. The purpose of these hearings was to determine the interest in soil conservation work in the county.

Mr. Howard Goss, field representative of the county but everyone expressed themselves as being in favor of holding an election for the purpose of creating a Standard Soil Conservation District in Briscoe County.

Mr. Goss, field representative of the State Soil Conservation Board, conducted the hearings. There was an afternoon meeting in the Court House at Silverton and a night meeting in the school auditorium at Quitaque.

Work is going on at the Silverton Co-op which will give some 20,000 bushels more storage capacity. A new electrically operated truck dump has been installed by the Co-op and scales have been inspected and the State Seal of Approval given.

The Farmers Grain has installed a larger leg for quicker elevating and is making other repairs and improvements.

Both places expect to be ready to go within a few days.

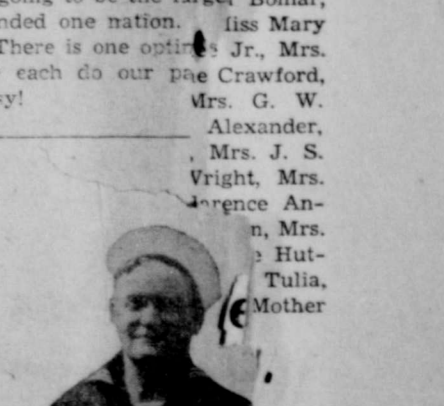

I READ A VERY interesting
article in Readers Digest by Emil
Ludwig on how to handle the
Germans. Ludwig is an American
writer of German birth. He be-
came an American citizen shortly
after World War I, and he did his
writing of that war from the Ger-
man side of the fence—and ap-
parently he knows the German
mind. He goes way back in history
and tells of the Prussian military
system and its growth. He says
that in all other countries, "Free-
dom" is the goal wanted by the
people. But in Germany, they do
not want freedom. Instead, they
thrill at the word, "Obedience".
They do not want to make their
own decisions—and the tougher
their master, the more fanatically
they obey. Hitler was not getting
full cooperation from the German
people until about 1931. At that
time he executed 1400 of his luke
warm followers and then explained
it in a raging speech. He said,
"I call for OBEDIENCE" and inst-
antly the crowd was swept by
hysterical cheers—they had found
their leader and no matter what
the outcome they were anxious
to obey. This will to obey is more
powerful than any teachings and
as far as that goes, was sanctioned
by the colleges of the country 100
percent. In preparing for the war,
Ludwig said, every German knew
what was the goal—war and world
domination. They were anxious
for it and willing to undergo any
sacrifice.

LUDWIG TELLS these things—
history, background, and actual
happenings to bring forth the con-
clusion that "The Germans will
stand no coddling, for to their
nationally warped minds, coddling
is a sign of weakness. There is no
need to show them the "American
way of life" for they no not de-
sire that kind of living. The only
chance, he says, for Germany to
live down her outlaw nature is
for us to rule them with an iron
fist—give them no favors. Treat
them as a vanquished outlaw na-
tion should be treated—and at the
same time, train the young ones
that there is a more honorable
way of living than blind obedience
—and a better death than as
cannon fodder for a power hun-
gry leader. He makes it very plain
that it was not the SS Troops,
not the German army, not the
leaders alone—BUT the whole
German people—and that they

must be dealt with harshly with
one hand, and educationally with
the other.

AUGUST 25 is Election Day.
On that date, four proposed Con-
stitutional Amendments will be
submitted to a vote of the people.
These Amendments are being pub-
lished now in the Briscoe County
News. Study them carefully and
then go vote your wishes.

THERE IS NO poorer sport in

ernment is being run. Gripping is
a favorite American pastime, but
gripping does no good alone. The
thing that gets the job done is the
votes—then that entitles you to
gripe. If you hold your tongue on
election day, then hold it for the
other 364 days too.

I'm not.

I know it will hurt Charlotte if
I don't make it, but if I do go
straight from here then maybe
when I do get home I can stay.
Maybe next year, God will grant
that I can be with you. I must
close now

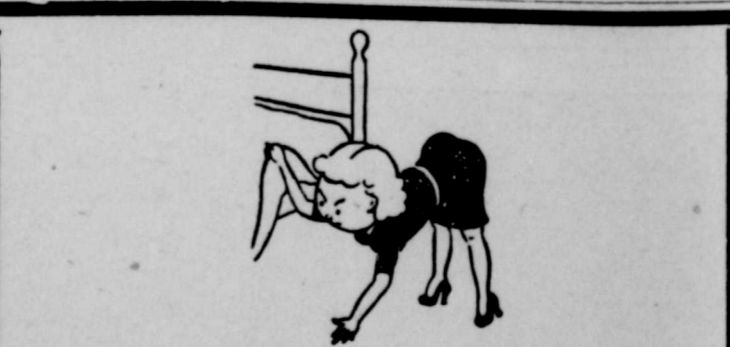

PROPOSING AN amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter; providing that members of the regular Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States shall not be permitted to vote; providing that other members of the armed forces shall be entitled to vote under certain conditions; providing the form of the ballot for voting on said proposed amendment; fixing the time for holding an election; directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamations; and making an appropriation.
