FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH IS BOOSTING FOR A BUILDING FUND

REQUIREMENTS FOR MEAT IN FROZEN FOOD LOCKERS

Requirements for persons who hold frozen food lockers were outlined today by the Enforcement Division of the District Office of Price Administration. Sam H. Allred, Enforcement Attorney, pointed out that the basis of the locker-inspection program is the requirement that no rationed meat may be transferred or acquired without surrender of ration points.

Under certain conditions, persons are entitled to have point free meat in their lockers. A livestock producer may have slaughtered any animal he produced or raised without giving up points provided:

1. That he either operates a farm at which he resides more than six months of the year, or actually supervised the raising of the animal and was on the premises on which the animal was raised at least one-third of the life of the animal.
2. That the animal was raised by the owner from birth until time of slaughter, or owned and fed 60 days preceding slaughter, or long enough for the weight of the animal to increase 35% of its weight when acquired.
3. That the resulting meat is for the owner's own household and that he does not intend to sell or transfer any of the meat.

If the locker plant does custom slaughtering for his locker patrons he is required to give information to the Local Board of the livestock owner and to the District OPA office showing the weight of the live animal, dressed weight, kind of livestock and facts about the offal. If the locker holder was not entitled to meat point free, then he is required to have a slaughterer's license and to have surrendered points for the meat transferred.

A locker operator is required to grade all meat handled or slaughtered by him, whether it belongs to a locker holder or any other person, before breaking, storing or delivering it.

If the locker holder is a farm slaughterer and is entitled to the meat point free for his own consumption, he is required to grade or have graded all of his meat, but if he kills cattle for sale he must grade it or have it graded before the carcass is broken, delivered or stored. He may grade the meat without applying for permission from the Federal Grading Service.

Investigation Starting—An investigation of frozen food locker plants in the Lubbock District will begin July 16, District OPA Enforcement Attorney Sam H. Allred announced today, following receipt of details of the program from the Regional OPA Office Wednesday.

The two following citations were received Wednesday by Mrs. Cleo Adams, the former Cleo Chitty, concerning her husband, Staff Sergeant William A. Adams, with the 36th Division in Germany:

Subject: Award of Bronze Star To: Staff Sergeant William A. Adams

Citation: William A. Adams, Co. A, 142nd Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in combat on 26th of November, 1944 in France. Sergeant Adams' squad was the leading element in his battalion's attack upon a town. They encountered intense enemy rifle fire as they approached a house on the outskirts. Displaying his squad and directing their assault by fire and movement to within a few yards of the house, he at the same time personally guarded doors and windows which offered an escape route, and captured four of the enemy. Sergeant Adams skillful and courageous leadership materially aided his platoon in clearing an enemy position, enabling the battalion to continue on its mission without delay.

Subject: Award of Silver Star To: William A. Adams

Citation: William A. Adams, for gallantry in action on the 21st of March, 1945 in Germany while advancing on a pillbox in the Siegfried Line, the 2nd Platoon was halted by heavy automatic weapons fire coming from the emplacement Sergeant Adams, the platoon sergeant, observed an abandoned enemy bazooka about 50 yards to his right flank, and crawled to it under the heavy fire. Securing the bazooka and seven rounds of ammunition, he worked his way forward to a small trench near the pillbox. From here he fired all seven rounds at the pillbox, temporarily silencing the enemy fire. Under cover of his fire, the platoon worked its way around to the flank and captured the pillbox, taking its six occupants prisoner. Sgt. Adams courageous and aggressive act materially aided his company in its advance.

William entered the service in January, 1914 and went overseas in July of the same year. He wears four battle stars, Combat Infantryman's Edge, Presidential Citation and the Corix Le Gunn.

James McCain writes to his Mother from Germany

JAMES C. MCCAIN writes his mother from Germany: Hello mother, This, I hope, finds you and the rest well.

I am doing fair now. The weather is not so bad. It cleared up this evening after a 24 hour rain.

I received a letter from Eunice yesterday. She is wild about Elvin coming home. One doesn't think so much about a home coming until one is about to go home. My first Sgt. is leaving for home in three days. Boy, is he wild! He has a wife and two children. They live in Walters Okla. He is a darn good first Sgt. We have always gotten along O. K. I don't believe I ever saw another person as scared when we would be under enemy fire than he. Some would mope and some would break in combat. I guess I was just too onery to care what happened to me.

Well, mom, I have a bit of news which may surprise you as it did me. As of yesterday, 29th of June, 1945, I am a buck Sargent. I was a T-5 for two years and eight months. I am chief of section of the first ammunition section.

I drove for my B. C. for over a year. We were very good friends as for as an officer and an enlisted man can be friends. I am no longer a driver and I probably won't like my new job so well.

I am Sgt. of the guard tonight and tomorrow. We seldom get Sunday off and are very busy most of the time.

My points are not certain yet. I have 82 for sure and possibly 10 more, but I will tell you about them when and if I get them. We have four battle stars and each count five points. One was for the battle of France, one for southern Germany and one for Central Germany and the other one may be as a bit of a surprise to you. It was for the battle of the Bulge. At one time we were in a very ticklish position, but we came out of it O. K.

Well, mom, I will close for now and write another letter. So take care of yourself.

resembles a celebration since the war started. We have done this on the theory that it was a little better not to do than to do. The real reason we have stopped is because it is easier to stop than to keep going.

THERE IS A WAR on. Granted. But the war cannot be blamed for the attitude that we take usually when we say "There's a war on." Usually that means that "I am too darn lazy to attend to what you want." Today, several business houses are closed because of the Tulia celebration. Give us normal times--give us some competition in business and that will be over. There shall come a time again when our business houses shall ask the customer "May I serve you?" instead of "There's a war on."

SATURDAY IS THE last day of the \$1.50 offer. Monday the list will be completely revised and if your date is 7-45 or before, this is the last paper you will receive. The price Monday morning will be \$2.00 a year again. By the way, had you noticed that our subscription price is the same as it was in 1941? Regular price \$2.00; special rate \$1.50?

WELL, IT LOOKS like the OPA is getting ready to check over the locker boxes to see how much black market meat we have in there. If they find one that is any emptier than ours I'd like to see it. Personally, I think they have no legal right to go messing around into those personal locker boxes--

unless of course, they have a search warrant. Courts have held that locker boxes are a continuation of the home. Observing the strict letter of the law however, has never been one of the characteristics of any federal bureau.

ONE OF THE most unfair things that OPA has ever pulled is in the meat rationing. Why a farmer should have point free meat and folks in town not, I can not see. Not that it makes much difference. But a farmer raises foodstuffs as his living. I run a newspaper for mine. We both do it for the money that we can sell our product for. We are both issued ration books. BUT, a farmer can kill a beef and eat it point free, leaving him with a book full of red points. But a fellow in town cannot buy a beef on foot, kill it and eat it without giving up his red points. It should make no difference whether a farmer sells his calf to himself to eat, or whether he sells it to some fellow in town to eat. In both cases

red points should be surrendered or not at all.

I HAD A very interesting experience the other day--watching the rest of the family eat roasting ears while I sat idly by. Mart Potter sent over a mess of corn with instructions to the Mrs. that the corn was for her and Collin and the cobs were for me. Of course that is the way we handled the deal, but Barb wanted me to say something here about how good the corn was. As for me, I was grateful for the cobs. They smelled good, and Collin has a tooth out and every once in a while I found a real grain of corn on mine. Potter is awful tight with his corn (on cob and liquid too) but he has some (on cob) every year. If he'd have lived in Nebraska or Iowa he'd be a millionaire.

stepped out. I mean every time I walked down the street. But now for weeks have no see. 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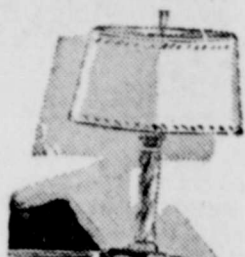

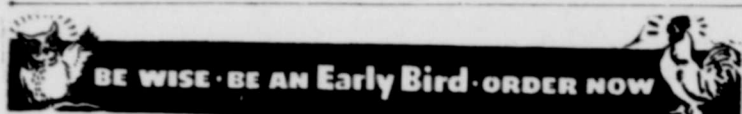

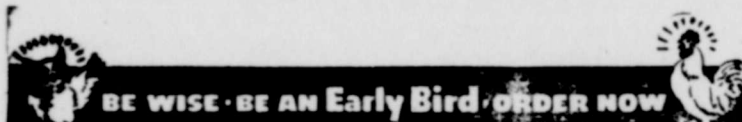

Our Country Needs Still More Used Fats...And We're the Folks to Save them!



IN between the good news about the war these days, careful readers of the paper will see grave words about a serious national shortage that has a direct bearing on military and civilian production schedules.

Our domestic supplies of fats and oils will be approximately one and one-half billion pounds less than last year. Yet thousands of tons of fats are still needed to help make countless essentials for the battle- and home-fronts.

While country people have been doing an even better job of saving fats than the city folks, we must remember that, because of the meat situation, we are in a better position to save. That's why we can't afford to miss a trick.

So, let's save not only the big amounts from frying and roasting, but also meat trimmings, plate scraps, and scrapings. Melt them down once a week and add the liquid fat to the salvage can. Skim soups and gravies. Scrape every pan. Every drop is important.

When your salvage can is full, take it to your butcher, and get 2 red points and up to 4¢ for each pound. If you have any difficulty, call your County Agent or Home Demonstration Agent.
