The National War Fund is calling on the people of a victorious nation to again give financial aid where it is most needed and welcome. Briscoe County has a quota of \$1,617.00. In order to meet this quota, it will be necessary for each Briscoe County family to give an average of \$2.75 (much less than a Texan's Share).

More than half of the money raised by the National War Fund is used by the United Service Organizations (U. S. O.) The people of Briscoe County have never failed to meet the quota given them during war time and now that the war is over and the boys in the service are looking behind them rather than in front, it is more essential that they receive U. S. O. entertainment than before. Other organizations that are aided by the National War Fund are: United Seamen's Service, War Prisoners' Aid, American Field Service, 16 European Relief Agencies and 2 Relief Agencies in the Pacific Area.

The six months of the coming fall and winter will be one of the

most crucial periods in human history. The victory in the Pacific and the morale problems of occupation, demobilization and convalescence mean a peak load for the U. S. O. Camp Shows with no possible retrenchment until Spring.

Over one hundred people have been asked to solicit donations for Briscoe County. You should be contacted before October 10th and if everyone will give a Texan's Share, Briscoe County will be over the TOP by the second week of the campaign. The County A. A. A. office will operate on a 40-hour week and will be closed on Saturday.

Farmers harvesting alfalfa seed will receive 2½ cents per pound

subsidy payment. Payment will be based on the pounds of seed (clean basis) harvested in 1945 and sold into commercial channels before January 1, 1946. Producers must submit satisfactory proof to the county committee of the number of pounds of seed (clean basis) sold. The producer of alfalfa seed will also receive \$3.50 per acre provided 135 pounds per acre cleaned seed is harvested.

Dairy production payment can now be made for the months of July, August and September. The payment rate are as follows.

Butter fat 15c per lb.
Whole milk 55c per 100 lbs.

There are many outstanding dairy production drafts issued prior to Nov. 1, 1944, and it is likely that they have been temporarily misplaced. These drafts should be cashed promptly.

I wish to remind the farmers again that prior approval must be granted by the County Committee before payment will be made on any practice carried out under the 1946 program. This approval must be obtained before the practice is started.

RAILROAD TRAVEL TIME REDUCED BY BURLINGTON

On Monday, October 1st, the first postwar adjustment reducing railroad time between the Texas Panhandle and Fort Worth and Dallas was made by Burlington Lines.

The Gulf Coast Special's running time will be reduced 45 minutes between Texline and Fort Worth-Dallas. On the new schedule this train will leave Denver and reach Texas daily the same as at the present time, and arrive Fort Worth at 8:50 PM and Dallas 10:10 P. M., 45 minutes earlier than now. Comparable changes will be made at intermediate points, and better connections will be provided with other railroads' trains for all points beyond Fort Worth and Dallas.

Travelers from Lubbock, Plainview and other South Plains cities also will be benefited by this change, as the Burlington Line's eastward between the South Plains and North Texas connects at Childress with the Gulf Coast Special.

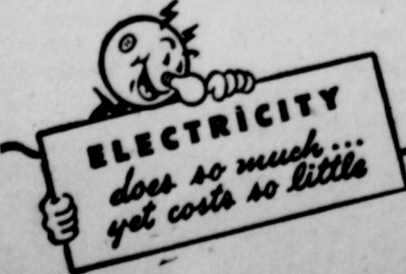

CAPPERS FARMER FEATURES BRISCOE COUNTY MEN

Two Briscoe county farmers J. L. Webb, of Silverton and B. L. Chandler, who lives near Quitaque are featured in stories in the October issue of Capper's Farmer describing their progressive farming methods.

Webb is cited in a story headed "Averting Wheat Pasture Losses." "Cattle on wheat pasture should be given access to dry feed. Those owners who provide it pull through with less trouble," the article in the nationally circulated farm magazine points out. "Bundle feed is kept within reach of J. L. Webb's herds. He builds a combination feeder and windbreak of barbed wire near the wheat field gate, and stacks bundles in it high enough to give protection from cold wind. The long feeder is built somewhat the shape of a thin new moon, so it will provide shelter regardless of wind direction."

Chandler is featured in a story entitled "New-type Pump Jack" which tells how he built a pump jack from an old windmill head. "An old windmill head serves as a pump jack at his farm well," the story says. "Power is supplied by a tiny gasoline engine. A 2-inch pulley on the engine and a 14-inch one on the windmill-wheel shaft gives 50 pump strokes a minute. Three quart of gasoline will pump 900 gallons of water."

VICTORY CLOTHING COLLECTION

Henry J. Kaiser, National Chairman of the United National Clothing

Collection of the past spring, outlined plans for a second national-wide effort to collect clothing that is urgently needed for overseas relief.

This second clothing campaign, which President Truman asked Mr. Kaiser to lead, is to be known as the Victory Clothing Collection. It will begin January 7 in thousands of American communities and will continue through January 31. Its national goal is not to be based on poundage. Instead, the American people are asked to contribute 100,000,000 garments with additional shoes and bedding.

In the earlier collection, the national goal of 150,000,000 pounds of serviceable clothing was more than met. As in that drive, the Victory Clothing Collection will be conducted by the United National Clothing Collection, Inc. and will be united effort in behalf of UNRRA by war relief agencies together with representative groups in the nation's life, including religious and educational groups, women's and fraternal organizations, farm, labor, industrial, veterans' youth and civic groups.

New Stationery at News Office!

SOCIAL SECURITY FORMS TO BE DELAYED.

Frank Scofield, Collector of Internal Revenue for the First District of Texas, stated today that blank forms for use of employers of one or more individuals in filing their Social Security returns for the quarter year period ending September 30, 1945, will probably reach the taxpayers a few days late.

"The delay," Mr. Scofield stated, "occurred in the printing offices and we hope to have these blanks in the hands of the taxpayers within the next five days. The employers may file their returns at any time within the month of October without penalty. It is hoped that the employers of this District will not become impatient as the blank forms will reach them in ample time to file their returns on or before October 31st."

BRISCOE COUNTY FARMS MAY BE PURCHASED THRU F. A. S.

For the first time in the ten year history, the Farm Security Administration will be able to make land purchase loans in Briscoe County under provisions of the Bankhead Jones Tenant Purchase Act. This announcement was made today by Peyton L. Legg, County Supervisor for FSA, with offices at Silverton.

Congress has voted FSA fifty million dollars for its farm ownership program for 1945-1946, as against fifteen million for last fiscal year. One-half this sum has been designated especially for land purchase loans to veterans.

Expansion of the farm ownership program to counties not heretofore included as eligible for such loans is in line with the expressed will of Congress that a veteran may be eligible to apply for such loans in any county in the nation, according to Mr. Legg. Only about one-half the counties in this region comprising New Mexico and the western portion of Texas, have until now been making this type loan.

BRISCOE COUNTY FARMS MAY BE PURCHASED THRU F. A. S.

Veterans will receive the same terms set up for other borrowers, up to forty years for repayments, at three per cent interest. All loans will be retired under the variable payment plan which enables borrowers to make larger payments in good years and smaller payments in bad crop years.

Veterans also will be eligible for regular rural rehabilitation loans which FSA makes to deserving farm families lacking adequate credit elsewhere, for purchase of farm machinery, livestock, feed, seed, fertilizer, minor improvements and other farm operating requirements. This type loan is repayable over a period of five years, at five per cent interest.

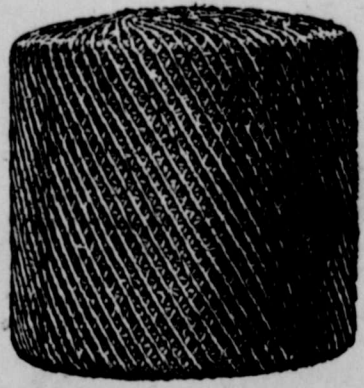

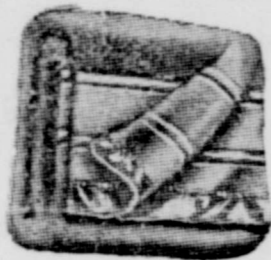
