In a letter from the war department, Mrs. Tom McCutchen was officially notified that her son Lt. J. D. McCutchen had been declared killed in action. Lt. McCutchen had been reported missing in action since August 24, 7944. There were no partciulars in the war department notice, but letters to Mrs. McCutchen from other crew members and friends have told her of the last mission on which her son flew and she has known for sometime that there was very little hope of his still being alive.

He attended the bombardier school at San Angelo and was among one of the first classes to graduate from the school where he was awarded his sommission as second lieutenant on May 13, 1943. 
