There will be an election of community committeemen in all communities in Briscoe County December 8, 1945. Delegates from each community in the county will also be elected. These delegates that are elected will attend the county convention.

Voting boxes will be set up for each community and polls will be open from 8 o'clock a. m. to 5 o'clock p. m. Saturday, December 8, 1945. We urge all producers to vote, because it is very important that we have a large participation in the election.

All producers, who have not filed application for dairy production payment for the months of July, August, and September are urged to do so immediately. November 30 is the final date for making application for the above months. Payment for July, August, and September can not be made after November 30.

All conservation practices carried out after August 1, 1945 should be reported as soon as possible. Application for payment cannot be started until performance reports are completed. In no event will farmers receive payment if the practice is not reported by January 15, 1946.

Many of the citizens of Silverton and the surrounding trade territory have indicated an interest in such a project by returning the blank form that was printed in the paper. Others have stated that they were interested; however, they neglected to return the form. This meeting will afford an opportunity for all to enter into the discussion and if it appears that the interest is great enough, steps will be taken to proceed with the organization.

According to co-op specialists, at least five hundred memberships should be sold before a co-op hospital can expect to be successful. This minimum number of memberships have been sold in other towns that are similar in size to Silverton. Hale Center, Lockney and Friona have already received charters. We should not have to admit that these towns have better leaders and more cooperative spirit than we have. We should not allow a good thing to be dropped because we fail to attend a meeting and express our desires. We should not forget that a Co-op Hospital can grow into a large concern and can be a great responsibility and that it should not be started without a great deal of sound thinking. Come out to the meeting Tuesday night and express your point of view.
