



Power In The Southwest

me time ago, the Southwestern Power Administration submitted property will henceforward be to Congress a plan for marketing the electric power output of the government-owned hydroelectric projects in the region. That plan fice at the above address. involves spending nearly \$250,000,000 of public money-not counting the cost of flood control dams and their generating stations-for building tax-exempt steam generating plants and transmission lines which largely duplicate the existing facilities of the heavily-taxed electric utilities in the Southwest.

For the time being, that plan is being held in abeyance in Congress. But its proponents are working aggressively to get it approved in full. The American people should realize the enormous, unnecessary waste of public funds involved.

The electric companies of the Southwest have made an offer whose main points are: to purchase the entire hydroelectric output of all existing dams and all other dams built in the future; to build at their field. Utah. The remainder are own expense any additional transmission lines which may become necessary; to give preference to public bodies and to Rural Electric Brooklyn, N. Y. All jumpers are Cooperatives, as Congress may prescribe-and, under public regulation, pass on to the consumer savings which may accrue through the purchase of the power

This plan would give the Southwest full benefits of the government produced power. It would not cost the taxpayers a single penny children's clothing. All inquiries for duplicating facilities. It would create new taxable resources for all units of government, from villages to the national treasury, instead of destroying taxable income and property. It is based solidly on logic, economics and the needs and rights of the consuming public And it would prevent loading a new burden on the backs of the taxpayers at a time when budget reduction is vital to national solvency

Under these circumstances, what possible excuse can be offered for appropriating enormous sums to build unnecessary, duplicate power facilities in the Southwest? Every taxpayer, wherever he may live, has a stake in this
