

Lady Mules win district track title

MHS sends seven to Region 1-3A meet

The Muleshoe Lady Mules won the district championship and seven MHS athletes qualified for regional competition during the annual District 2-3A track and field meet last weekend at Benny Douglas Stadium.

Coach Jacinda Langen's Lady Mules had three individual district champions and scored 144 points to notch the district title. Dimmitt was second with 123, followed by Tulia with 107, Friona with 95, Littlefield with 83 and Floydada with 29.

Shane Schuster and Lauri Puckett were double qualifiers for the Lady Mules. Schuster won the 1600 meters (5:42.77) and finished second in the 3200 (12:49.04), while Puckett won the 100-meter hurdles (16.75) and was second in the 300-meter hurdles (50.66).

LaTonya Payne also won a district title in the shot put (36-6 1/2), while Rebecca Sanchez finished second in the 100 meters (13.43) to qualify.

The Mules of coach Ted Johnson were third in the six-team field, with two district champions and three regional qualifiers overall.

Tulia won the boys' team title with 182 points, followed by Friona with 124.5, Muleshoe with 100, Littlefield with

64, Dimmitt with 58 and Floydada with 29.

The Mules' Daniel Garbarino had a pair of personal bests to qualify for the regional meet in two events. He won the triple jump with a 43-5 1/4 effort and was second in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles in 41.02.

Out for track just two weeks after reestablishing his eligibility, Salome Cisneros won an individual title in the 1600 meters with a personal best of 4:47.20.

The third Mule to qualify for regionals was Jesus Flores, who finished second in the 800 meters in a 2:02.45 clocking, also a personal best.

The regional qualifiers will compete Friday (April 22) in a regional qualifiers' meet in Odessa's Ratliff Stadium. The meet acts as a preliminary to the Region 1-3A meet, scheduled for April 29-30, also at Ratliff Stadium.

While the regional qualifying athletes played important roles in the Lady Mules' success, depth was the key to winning the district championship. The Lady Mules scored in every event, with the exception of the long jump.

Local cable rates not effected by FCC ruling

Muleshoe residents may not be seeing any reductions in their TV cable rates anytime soon. The good news though, is that there may not be any more rate increases in the near future either.

A ruling by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) on March 30 was geared at lowering cable rates in response to complaints filed with the FCC for excessive programming charges. A copy of the ruling was discussed during a Muleshoe City Council meeting on Tuesday.

Under the ruling, many large companies will be forced to lower their rates. However, "small operators" who have less than 15,000 total subscribers do not have to reduce their rates. But their rates are also frozen right now and they may not increase their rates, as of March 31, 1994, until the FCC decides how their rates should be regulated.

In Muleshoe, cable service is provided by Mission Cable, with the regional service office based in Idaloua.

"As far as I know, there will be no rate reductions in cable in Muleshoe," said Johnny Rodriguez, manager of the Mission Cable office in Idalou.

He added, "Most of our areas with more than 1,000 subscribers recently had a rate increase." Muleshoe was among the areas who saw the rate increase this past year.

"If the FCC is talking about per system when they talk about 15,000 subscribers or less, then Muleshoe will not qualify for a rate reduction," Rodriguez said. "But if they are talking about a company as a whole with total subscribers, we service five states."

A copy of the ruling which was circulated Tuesday did not specify if the ruling applies to individual systems or companies.

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Hospital gets input on redistricting voting precincts

Several community members gave their input Monday night concerning the redistricting of board member voting precincts for the Muleshoe Area Medical Center Hospital District.

Present Monday night were members of the Census Planning Committee, members of the hospital district board of directors and administration, as well as several community members.

The hospital is in the process of realigning and redistricting voting districts in order to comply with the Voting Rights Act of 1968. Redistricting is required after each census. The last census was done in 1990 and the district must make adjustments with consideration for population changes and minority groups in each district.

Additional Hispanic district to be considered

According to Virginia Daugherty of Daugherty and Associates of Amarillo, a major factor which will effect the redistricting is the population

increase of the Hispanic minority.

Daugherty and Associates is the legal firm which was hired by the hospital district to provide legal counsel.

Based on the firm's evaluation of the current hospital district, Muleshoe Area Hospital District is 37 percent Hispanic. It is only 1.67 percent black.

While the firm may recommend a plan to the hospital district, a recommendation

must be made based on a consensus with the Census Planning Committee. The Census Planning Committee, in recommending a plan, must be able to prove that the plan has been approved by a consensus of the Hispanic population.

Based on these figures, Daugherty said that two of five plans the firm has come up with are recommended, Plans #4 and #5. Though the firm came up with three other plans, she said that they have identified some problems they could pose.

The Hispanic majority voting district must meet required benchmarks. Benchmarks are the standard the firms uses to determine whether or not a redistricting plan meets the requirements of the Voting Rights Act. The firm does this by looking at boundaries of a redistricting plan that is currently in place and evaluates it to see which district has the most significant minority pro-

posed.

Public hearing on closing school campuses set

The Muleshoe Independent School District is seeking comments from the public concerning the possibility of MISD having closed campuses at De Shazo Elementary School and Watson Junior High.

A public hearing will be held on Monday, April 25 at 7 p.m., as part of the MISD Board of Trustee's regular meeting. However, no action will be taken on this item on Monday.

Students in grades 3rd, 4th and 5th attend De Shazo. Students in grades 6th, 7th and 8th attend Watson.

Currently, school students at De Shazo, Watson Junior High and Muleshoe High

School are permitted to walk off of campus during lunchtime, however they are not allowed to take any vehicles. MISD does not plan to try to close the high school campus.

"There has been some concern raised about the safety of the kids," said Bill Moore, superintendent for Muleshoe Schools.

According to Moore, the schools have received complaints from time to time about students running out in front of cars and there is concern over kids crossing the highway.

Moore said that he has visited with a number of com-

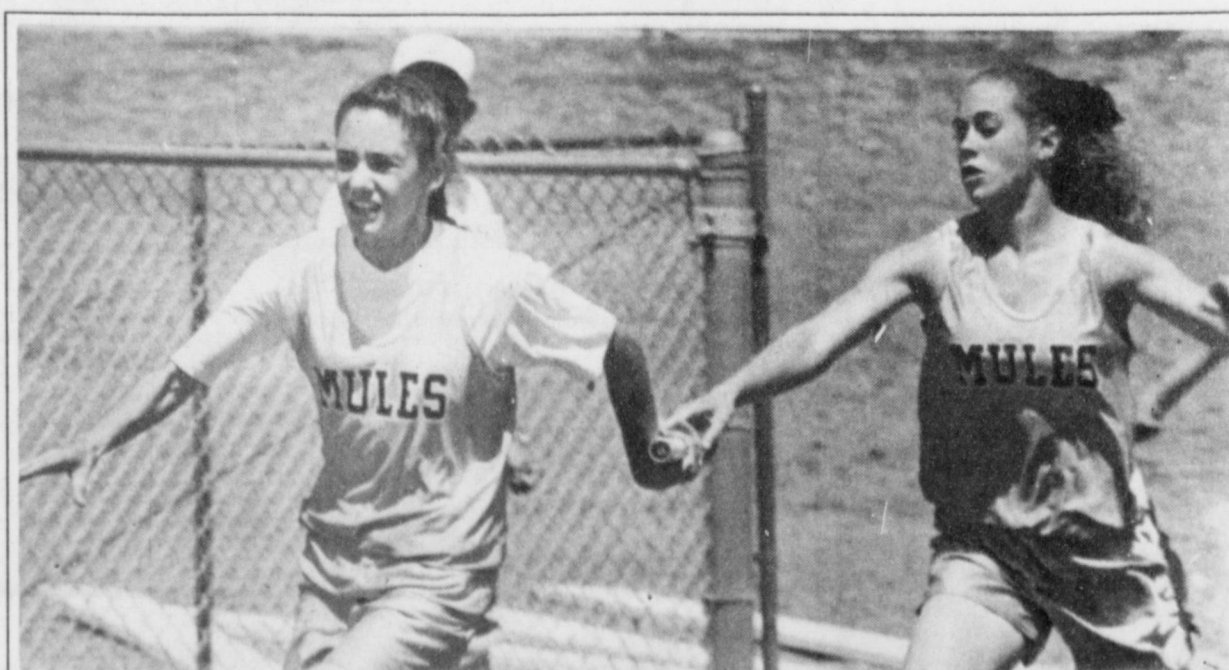
mittees. In the committee meetings, Moore said that there have been concerns expressed by the committee, as well as from parents who serve on them.

"The feedback we have gotten from these committees

Students at these schools have a 35-minute lunch break every day. Under the recommendation that MISD is considering, students will not be able to leave campus unless accompanied by their parents.

"We want to make sure everyone has an opportunity to express an opinion," Moore

Mules shut out Tulia, take 2-3A lead

Andy Perez fired a two-hit shutout and drove in three runs as the Muleshoe Mules took over sole possession of first place in the district with a 5-0 victory over the Tulia Hornets Tuesday at MHS Field.

Muleshoe got all the runs it needed in a two-run first inning, then added three in the second for insurance. Neither team scored the rest of the way in a game marked by good pitching and tight defense on both sides.

"That is probably the best overall game we've played since I've been here," said MHS coach Ted Leps. "We pitched well, hit well and played defense."

Muleshoe got six hits off Tulia starter Jason Culwell.

The win upped the Mules' record to 15-5 overall and 4-0 in District 2-3A. Tulia, which had come into the game unbeaten in district play, fell to 10-10 and 3-1. Muleshoe opened the first

on Jimmy Gauna's single. He stole second, then went to third on a single by Robert Jaime. Perez drove in Gauna with a single and John Embry followed with a single to drive in Jaime.

In the second, Robert Toscano walked, stole second, then scored on Gauna's double. Jaime singled and Perez drove in both runs with a single.

Perez was in trouble just twice during the contest. Jaime's diving, over-the-head catch in centerfield with runners at first and third cooled the first hot spot. After making the only error of the game, Toscano turned a double play to redeem himself and ended the second trouble spot.

The win was in stark contrast to the three previous MHS district wins, all slugfests. Muleshoe had 12 hits in pounding Dimmitt last Saturday, 11-4.

The Mules jumped to a 4-0 lead after two innings.

our rates whenever we want to, it all has to be done by the FCC," Rodriguez said.

According to Mission Cable, customers will be given a 30-day notice if or when there is another increase in rates.

Another change in cable company service will be how they actually service customers.

According to Dave Marr, city manager for the City of Muleshoe, the new ruling says that cable companies now have 24 hours to service a residence. Marr said this may be a longer time frame than people around here are use to.

Marr added, "They (the FCC) still haven't decided on what basis the regulations will be on. They are still in the processing of changing these rules, so nothing is final."

According to Marr, Mission Cable is currently under a 15-year contract to provide cable service to the City of Muleshoe.

In other business Tuesday, the council named Jack Dunham Emergency Preparedness Coordinator for the city. Marr said Dunham is also expected to be named Emergency Preparedness Coordinator for Bailey County too, since it is usually the same person for the city and county.

The council also heard an update from Marr on the city applying to become an Enterprise Community and Empowerment Zone. This is a new federal program which awards

communities grants and federal funds to carry out a plan to stimulate the local economy.

To apply for the grant, the city must come up with a plan which outlines goals and how it will stimulate the economy and impact the future of the area.

Marr received the go-ahead

from the Bailey County Commissioners last week to find out if the county is eligible to join the city in applying for the grant. The deadline to apply for the grant is June 30.

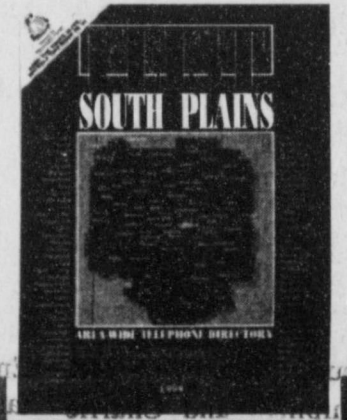
The council has tentatively scheduled a budget workshop for April 28 at 7 p.m. at City Hall.

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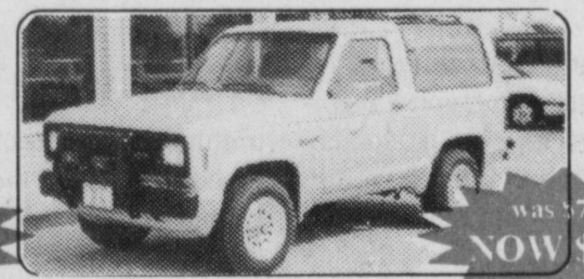
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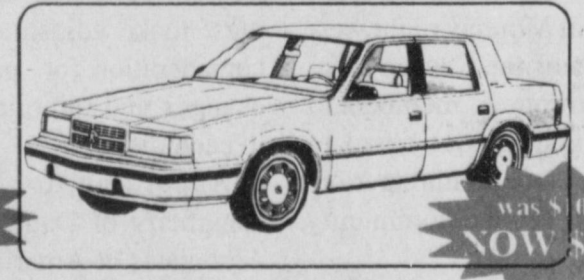
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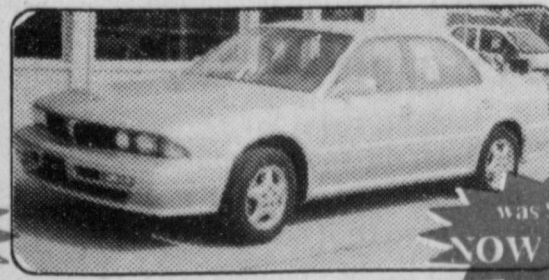
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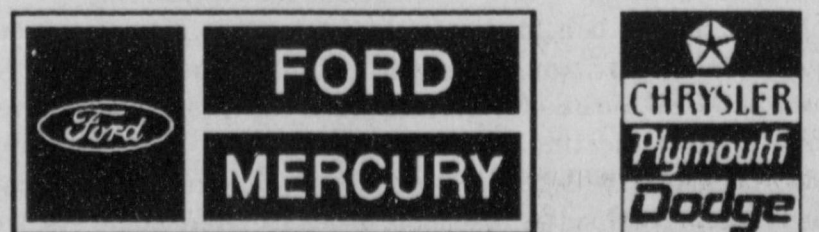


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Muleshoe golfers bound for regionals

The Muleshoe boys golf team won the final leg of the District 2-3A tournament and secured a berth in the regional tournament on its home course last Friday.

MHS shot its best round of the season as a team under coach Leon Hagerman — a 310 at the Muleshoe Country Club — to beat Tulia by 15 shots on the day. Friona was third at 341.

MHS sophomore Cyle Marr fired a five-over par 75 to earn the medalist's title by a single stroke over Lane Dyer of Tulia. Junior Todd Shipman of Muleshoe was third with a 77, while MHS freshmen Darren Box and Kyle Embry finished in a three-way tie fourth at 79.

Tulia won the district title with a 54-hole total of 951, while the Mules shot 990 for second and Friona 1041 for third. Rounding out the district field were Tulia B with 1103, Floydada with 1131 and Friona B with 1205. The first round was played March 12 at Littlefield, with the second round at Tulia on April 9.

The 54-hole medalist was Dyer, who overtook teammate Chris Mahaney in the final round. Dyer had a 54-hole total of 230, followed by Mahaney with 231 and Tulia's Chris Holt with 242. Marr finished fourth overall with 248, with Shipman and Charlie Milner of Friona tying for fifth at 249.

Muleshoe and Tulia advance to the Region 1-3A golf tournament, scheduled for April 25-26 at Ratliff Ranch golf course in Odessa. Sixteen teams will compete in the 36-hole regional tournament. Tulia, Seminole and Brownfield are considered the pre-tourney favorites.

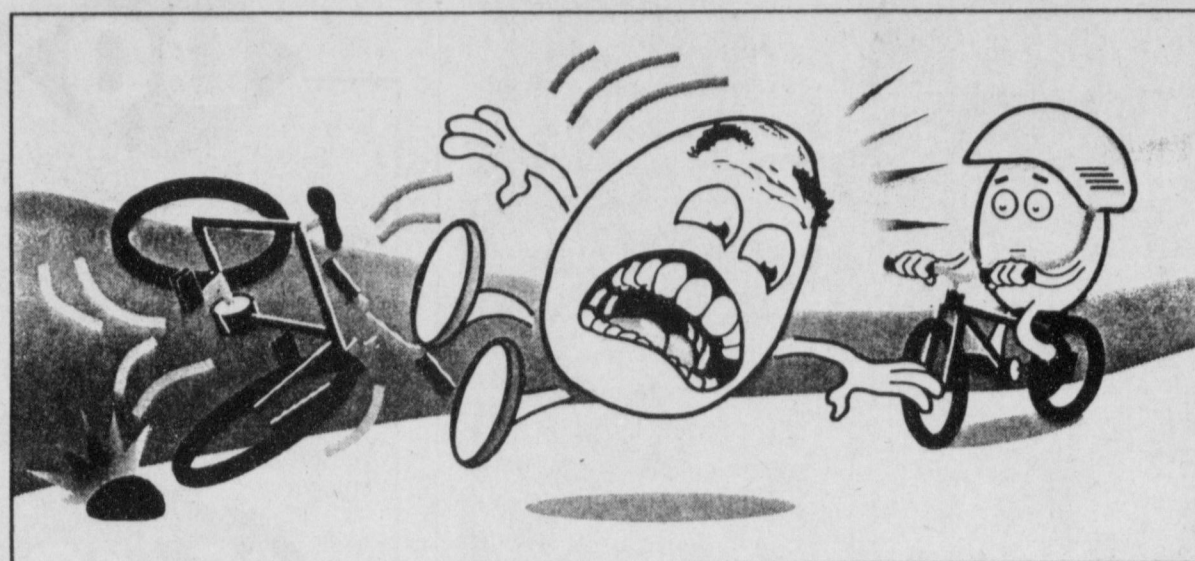

Cattlemen warned to be aware of the fine print

The Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas is warning cattle raisers to pay close attention to the fine print when signing new easement contracts with rural electric cooperatives. Jim Selman, ICA First Vice President, notes that many new contracts contain clauses or sections that could infringe on private property rights.

These new provisions are in response to requests from federal officials who have enlisted the aid of electric coops to gather

archaeological, historical and biological information (particularly relating to endangered species).

Selman encourages his colleagues in the cattle and ranching business to protect themselves by reading proposed easement contracts carefully and cautiously, paying particularly close attention to any language that goes beyond the normal rights associated with electric construction or conveyance.

The Mules travel to Friona Saturday for a 1 p.m. contest, then travel to Floydada next Tuesday for a 5 p.m. battle.





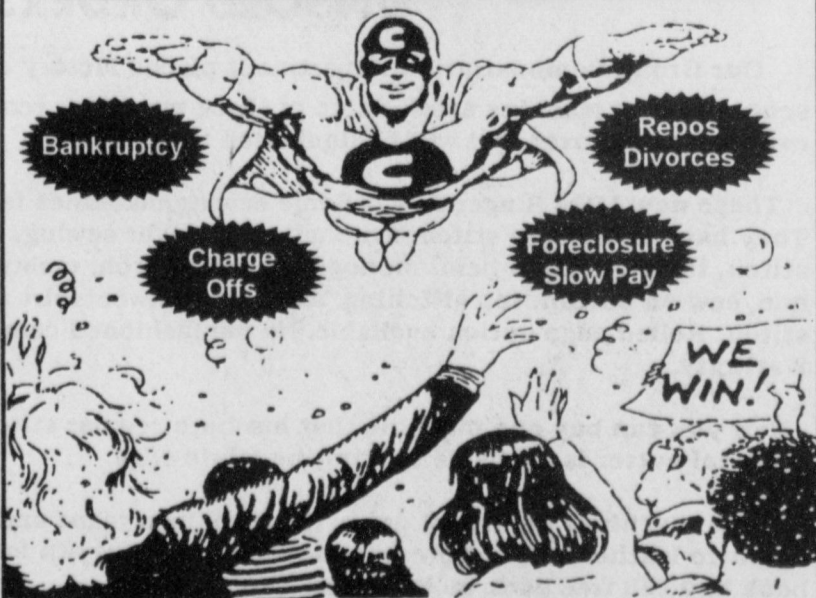
addressing many of the nation's most critical issues, including environmental protection, indigent health care, special assistance for the elderly, job training and public safety.

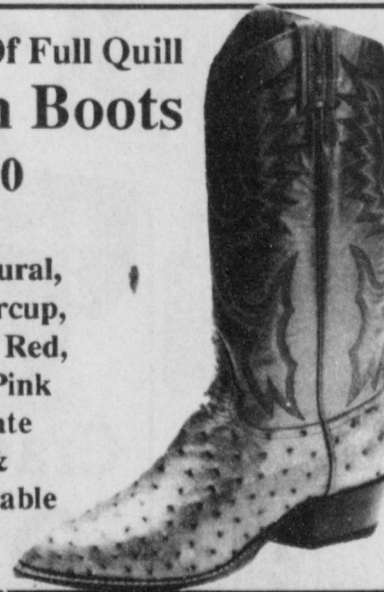

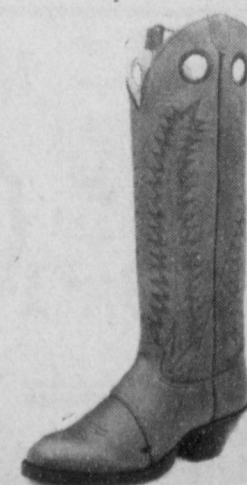

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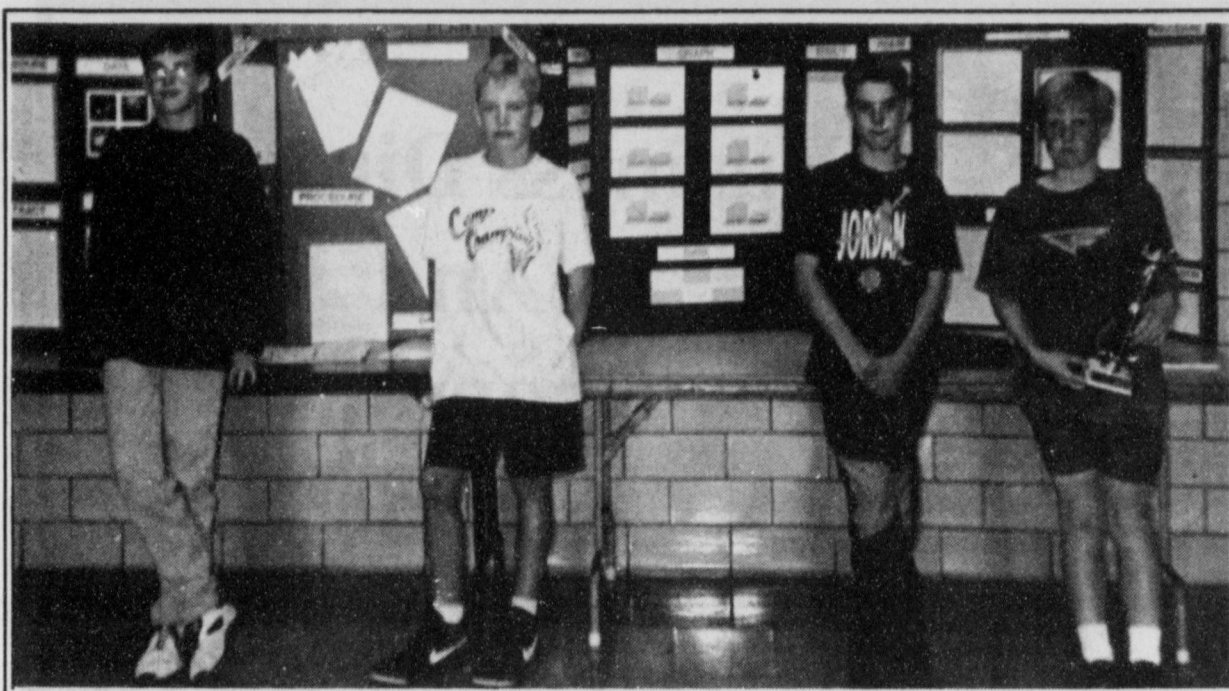

Moore said MISD would like to keep the high school an open campus. Moore said that high school students tend to be more mature and they have not received many complaints about high school students walking off campus during lunch.

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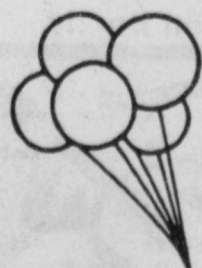
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When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1994 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

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

file. Under the hospital district's current plan, one district has 73.6 percent Hispanic profile.

Daugherty said it is possible to exceed the benchmark in one district or to exceed the one in the majority minority district and create two minority districts, thereby increasing the potential for representation on the hospital board.

Plan #4 would create one minority majority district, however, it exceeds the benchmark of 73.6 percent.

Plan #5 would create two minority majority districts, both of which would have a majority of voting age Hispanic populations. One of these districts would exceed a 65 percent total Hispanic population.

According to Bobby Hill of Daugherty and Associates, if any of the Hispanic majority districts fall below the benchmark, they will have to be able to justify to the Justice Department why.

Juan Chavez, a member of the Census Planning Committee and Muleshoe City Councilman, expressed concern over these plans.

He said, "In an election, only 10 percent (average) of our

people (Hispanics) vote, so what is the purpose of having one district with a large Hispanic population if the voter turnout is low?"

Another citizen, Alberto Daniel said, "We don't want to package all of our people in one district."

Chavez added, "I think we should have two voting districts. Chicanos are somewhat new in the voting arena and I think it will take time for Chicanos to want to seek office. But it is our job to open those doors for them."

Daugherty said, "We have to get as near a perfect population as possible and make sure that the change does not leave any minority group worse off than before."

The evaluation shows that each district should have an average population of 1,411. Following the 1990 census, all of the districts will have to be readjusted based on size of population and minority groups in those districts.

John Scott, another associate with the Daugherty Firm, said that in addition to minority group considerations, there may be other factors the Census Planning Committee needs to look at. An example he gave is concern over ambulance services in certain parts of town, etc.

Board member Darrell Jennings expressed concern in the event that not everyone agrees with the plan and concern over how much it will

cost the hospital district.

For this reason, Daugherty said that it is a big responsibility and that the hospital should make every attempt to get a consensus and do it right the first time.

Some citizens also asked about access to voter registration information. The information can be obtained at the Bailey County Courthouse in the County Clerk's Office.

After the committee makes a recommendation to the hospital board, the board will then adopt a plan and give it to Daugherty and Associates to prepare and submit to the Justice Department.

The Justice Department will either accept the plan by giving it a re-clearance, object to the plan or request more information.

Daugherty recommended to the committee to come up with a plan to agree on as soon as possible, preferably by the end of the month.

According to the hospital district's statutes, the voting precinct are divided into five precincts.

The Census Planning Committee is scheduled to meet again in a joint meeting with the Muleshoe Area Medical Center Hospital District Board of Directors in order to further discuss redistricting.

Maps of the proposed plans remain on display at the hospital for the public to view.
