

In addition he usually does all the work. Often, encouraged by the limited help in getting started, he expands his conservation efforts far beyond the basic practices of the program.

Dividends resulting from this public-farmer partnership a r e many and varied, says Mr. Haverty. The farmer has a better farm. Ercsion and depletion are slowed down. The farm will last longer. Continued operation is assured and production is increased.

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#### For The Consumer . . .

It is probable that never in its long history has American re-Tailing given so much thought, and devoted so much hard work, to The problems of the consumer

It is doing this for various reasons, most of them obvious. First of all, protection of the purchasing power of the masses of consumers is vital to its existence. Secondly, retailing is always on the firing line in the debate over inflation. And, thirdly, the American economy is dependent on preserving our unique system of mass production and mass distribution-the system which has given us more goods and better goods, for a smaller part of our earnings, than any other people enjoy.

Retailing's contribution to the fight against inflation has been partly obscured by the fact that prices remain high. This does not that fight has been a failure. In the opinion of those who have studjed the situation, prices would be substantially higher than they are now had retailing done nothing and simply passed the boosts along to the consumer. Instead, by shaving profits, by increasing efficiency, by keeping a tight rein on inventories, and by other economies, retailing has saved the people of America enoromous sums of money.

"Resist further price increases to the limit" is the policy retailing is following now. It may not be successful-most of the basic factors that control the price level are beyond its reach. But, regardless of the future trend, it will work with every weapon in its armory to save the consumer dollar from more depreciation

#### The World's Oil Man . . .

At the last annual meeting of the American Petroleum Institute, one theme dominated most of the discussions. It was: "Oil is the key to worldwide recovery, and the world's oil man is an American."

That doesn't mean that our petroleum industry has succumbed to the vice of self-adulation. But, as the record so abundantly proves, the organization, the money, and the executive and engineering skill needed to provide the world with oil in almost unimaginable quantities are largely coming from this country.

U. S. oil is international business in the best sense of that muchabused term. It is developing the oil resources of a long list of countries. But it isn't exploiting those countries for the sake of earning as much money as quickly as possible. It is bringing some of the best fruits of American civilization to them. The Middle East is a fine example. Here one of the greatest oil reservoirs on earth is in the process of development. And the group of American oil companies which is doing the work has established model towns and agricultaral experimental stations, has built schools and hospitals, and is teaching the peoples of the region skills and crafts which have greatly increased their earning power.

Oil is an instrument of diplomacy, and the industry works close-By with the State Department and the military forces. It has shown the greatest resourcefulnese in meeting one tough problem after another. And it is completely justifying the claim that the world's oil man is an American

#### **Iowa Farmer Permits Herd** Of 27 to Roam in His Field with Cattle

MILFORD, IOWA. - Most Iowa farmers want deer only in their smokehouses hanging on a hook but there's one farmer in Iowa who has put out the welcome mat on his 1,000 acres of land for any deer which care to accept his invitation. His name is John Bush, 72, who

lives 71/2 miles northwest of Milford, where a herd of 27 deer mingles with his Angus cattle. Bush, who admires deer, estimates that it costs less than 10 cents an acre each season to feed a deer. He claims that the animal is not as destructive to crops as a pheasant but is an asset to a farmer since it helps clear buck brush.

Deer are widespread in every lowa county and frequently farmers request Iowa state conservation officials to reduce herds in their com-

Insist Deer Are Pests.

Many farmers insist that deer eat more than their share of corn and soybeans and oftentimes break lences. But Bush, who knew deer even in his native Scotland, staunchly defends them.

'Deer do not take pheasants," he explained. "And what they do eat, they do not shell off as wastefully as pheasants. They on't bother the corn when they can et grass. They don't tramp it down

eat the young plants 'It's hard to say exactly how nuch corn the deer will eat but they don't do 10 cents worth of damage to an acre of corn Further more, deer eat buck brush which sheep and cattle won't touch."

The Bush farm has a fine stand of oak timber which offers excellent shelter to the deer





card, and behind the wheel, you can't drive safely without knowing traffic laws and obeying them, according to W. J. Elliott, Chief of he Texas Highway Patrol.

"It's as simple as that," he said. "You can't be a safe driver unless you are a smart driver-and you are not smart unless you know and obey traffic rules.'

Captain Polk Ivy of the Amarillo District said that accident reports indicated left turns at intersections as one of the common situations which cause trouble because drivers do not know the rules. As part of the nationwide "Know and Obey Traffic Laws' Program in which the Texas Highway Patrol is participating, he listed the following things a driver should remember about right-of-way on left turns.

1. When you are turning left, you must give the right-of-way to a car in the intersection or ap-

croaching closely. 2. When you are approaching the intersection and a car which has been waiting in the intersection to turn left (then starts to make the turn) you must allow it to make the turn in front of you.

3. When you turn left, be sure you are in the correct lane and that you give a signal. 4. Don't insist on your right-ofway at the risk of an accident.
