Summer reading program to begin



MISD to allow school students to leave campus in two-block radius

The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees on Tuesday night stopped short of completely closing campuses at DeShazo and Watson Junior High Schools during lunchtime.

In what Superintendent Bill Moore calls a "compromise", the board voted on a policy which will permit students in grades 3-8 at DeShazo and Watson Junior High Schools, to leave the school grounds during lunchtime. However, students will only be permitted to go within a two-block radius from their school campuses and they can only leave if they have a signed permission slip from their parents.

"We will try this policy and hope it keeps kids from corssing Highway 84 and Highway 214," Moore said. "This policy still gives them flexibility and responsibility during their lunch period."

Moore said though, that if students violate this policy and go further then the two-block radius, they can loose their right to leave campus altogether.

He added, ""If we have a lot of problems with this policy and there are a lot of violations, the board may then decide to close these campuses

altogether."

Moore said that the decision by the board Tuesday night was made in spite of anything that has been said or written by anybody regarding the policy.

"We want to be fair to everyone and we think this was a good compromise. It also addresses our safety concerns."

If student leave campus without permission from their parents, they may be subjected to disciplinary action, Moore said.

Eight Muleshoe Mules have been selected to the All-District 2-3A team, including five to the first team.

County approves insurance plan

County The Bailey Commissioner's Court on Monday voted to renew health insurance coverage for county employees with HealthSmart, a sister company to Ted L. Parker & Associates of Lubbock. The county has approximately 50 employees.

The county had two plan options to chose from. One of the plans would required the county to adopt a Preferred Provider Option (PPO) plan. That plan would save the county about \$30,000 a year. However, there would also be an additional \$500 deductible for the employee if they go into a hospital that is not a PPO facility. The Muleshoe Area Medical Center Hospital is not a PPO facility.

The Commissioners, along with County Judge Marilyn Cox want county employees

Funds to help drinking water quality

Washington, D.C.--U.S. Representative Larry Combest (R-Texas) announced \$1 million of critically-times federal funding to reverse the deteriorating quality of the drinking water supply for nearly onehalf million Panhandle and South Plains residents.

In 1992, Congress authorized the federal government to provide its promised one-third share of funding for the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation to divert some 30,000 tons of salty brine carried yearly into Lake Meredith by the Canadian River dissolving an underground salt formation.

Last year, Combest joined

other Members of Congress in securing a \$1.4 million installment, approximately half of the \$3 million federal share. Combest has stressed the urgent timing of funds to the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Energy and Water Development.

The funding now awaits action by the full Appropriations Committee before it is scheduled for a vote on the House floor.

"We are facing a critical phase in this carefully-balanced package of funding," said Combest. "State and local agencies together are contributing \$6 million, and the fedto be able to use the local hospital, so they voted to waive that particular plan option.

Under the plan the Court did adopt, on Monday, county employees will not have to pay the \$500 deductible in order to use Muleshoe Area Medical Center hospital.

A representative from HealthSmart presented the plans to the court on Monday morning.



Pursuant to Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes, article 1446h, you now have the right to request confidentiality of your Personal personal information. information means an individual's address, telephone number, or social security number.

This act does not prohibit a government-operated utility from disclosing personal information in a customer's account records to:

(1) an official or employee of the state or a political subdivision of the state, or the federal government acting in an official capacity, (County offices, Post Office, Law Enforcement Departments, Attorney General's Office);

(2) an employee of a utility acting in connection with the employee's duties, (SPS, Energas, GTE);

(3) A consumer reporting agency;

(4) a contractor or sub-contractor approved by and providing services to the utility or to the state, a political subdivision of the state, the federal government, or an agency of the state or federal government;

(5) a person for whom the customer has contractually waived confidentiality for personal information; or

(6) another entity that provides water, wastewater, sewer, gas, garbage, electricity, 'or drainage service for compensation.

This act, defined by statute 1446h, pertains only to your personal information which includes your name, address, and social security number. The next water, sewer, and garbage bill that you receive from the City of Muleshoe will have a message that will inform you that if you would like to request confidentiality to contact City Hall. You will be provided a form at City Hall to fill out. Your account will then be designated as an account that has requested confidentiality.





Training on pest management set

Plainview--Training of scouts who survey crops to assess pest infestations in integrated pest management (IPM) programs across the area will be held June 2 at the Ollie Liner Agricultural Center on South U.S. Hwy. 85 (Business 87).

The workshop is open to summer scouts of private consultants and aerial applicators as well as farmers who scout their own fields. It is conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Training begins at 8:30 a.m. and ends at 4:30 p.m.

It has been accredited by the Texas Department of Agriculture for five continuing education units (CEUs) toward recertification requirements for private, commercial, and noncommercial pesticide applicators.

This year's workshop will provide instruction on scouting cotton and grains, identification of plant disease and nutrient deficiency symptoms, use of herbicides and safe handling of pesticides, said Dr. Pat Morrison, Extension Service entomologist at Lubbock.

IPM is a coordinated approach to management decisions based on pest infestation levels and economic thresholds. The goal of IPM is to effectively control weeds, insects and diseases and maximize net profit while creating minimal harm to the crop or environment.

Scouts examine fields in a systematic pattern at regular intervals each week. Producer treatments for pests are based

on economic threat to the crop, presence of beneficial insects, which are enemies of the pests, and proper timing of pesticide applications for maximum returns with the lowest chemical input.

CEU training and instruction, Greg Cronholm, Hale-Swisher pest management agent, Plainview. Principles of IPM and sampling, Tommy Doederlein, Dawson-Lynn pest management agent, Lamesa. Cotton growth and development, Dr. Kater Hake, agronomist and cotton specialist, Lubbock.

Thrips, fleahoppers and aphids, David Kistroun, Crosby-Floyd pest management agent, Crosbyton. Bollworms, loopers and armyworms, Dr. Jim Leser, Extension Entomologist, Lubbock. Beneficials, Andy Williams, Castro-Lamb pest management agent, Dimmitt.

Major diseases and symptoms, Dr. Harold Kaufman, plant pathologist, Lubbock. Plant nutrient deficiency symptoms, Dr. Michael Hickey, soil chemist, Lubbock. yesterday," he explained, "You have my insurance agent."

"We realize that but this is Internal Affairs."

Legal Matters By Dan Morales, Texas Attorney General

To curb the rise in juvenile crime, many cities have considered adopting curfews. However, the constitutionality of these ordinances has been the subject of much debate and litigation.

Critics contend that curfews unfairly discriminate against minors, violating their rights to freedom of movement and association. Critics also express concern that curfews may be enforced in a discriminatory manner by police. Supporters, however, say that in the interests of protecting citizens including minors - juveniles should not be allowed to roam freely at night.

A Dallas curfew enacted in 1991 survived a constitutional challenge by persuading the court that it promotes an important goal (crime prevention) without unduly infringing on the rights of juveniles. Undoubtedly, other communities will be looking closely at the language of the Dallas ordinance.

The Dallas City Council ordinance barred individuals under 17 from public places or establishments from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. on week nights, and

from 12 a.m. to 6 a.m. on weekends. Two weeks after the ordinance was passed, four parents filed suit, claiming that the curfew was unconstitutional. The city of Dallas agreed not to enforce the curfew until the district court made a ruling.

In August 1992, the court ruled that the ordinance was activities are not exempted from coverage under the ordinance.

While the curfew ordinance would restrict some late-night activities of juveniles, when balanced with the compelling interes of preventing juvenile crime, the impositions against the rights of the juvenile and the privacy of the parents were minimal.

The bottom line: the Dallas curfew is constitutional.

If a community decides to pass a curfew ordinance, it is imperative that its police department initiates sound training. A curfew must not be used to restrict the movement of a particular class of juvenile, and it may not target juveniles of a particular neighborhood.






