## Non-Resident Truck Registration Will Be Required In Texas

We have just received the following letter from the Texas Department of Public Safety in Austin, Texas signed by Homer Garrison, Jr., director, and Kent Odum, chief license and weights division which is of interest to truck owners and operators.

"The 51st Legislature recently passed Senate Bill No. 75 authorizing the State Highway Department to issue to a non-resident owner a 60-day temporary registration for any truck, truck-tractor, trailer or semi-trailer to be used in harvesting and marketing of wheat and similar grains produced in this state. The bill provides that such temporary registration may be issued for the movement of such grains from the place of production to market, storage, or rail head. The bill further provides that operators engaged in transporting wheat or other similar grains produced in this state between two or more incorporated cities or towns for hire must secure permits from the Texas Railroad Commission as provided by Texas statutes.

"The temporary registration license is to be issued for 60 days by any County Tax Collector, and the fee will be one-sixth (1-6) of the annual registration fee for the vehicle. No application for Texas title is necessary with this type of registration. In the case of a single vehicle, only one registration is to be issued, but in the case of a truck-tractor, semi-trailer combination, a license is to be issued for each vehicle.

"These licenses are to be issued only to non-residents of Texas, and only when the vehicle is legally registered in the non-resident owner's home state for the current registration year. The license will remain valid only so long as the home state registration is valid; but in no event for more than 60 days from the date of issuance. The license is not renewable after its expiration, and in the event the owner operates the vehicle in Texas after expiration of the permit, it will then be necessary that such vehicle be registered under regular Texas license plates for the remainder of the registration year and application made for Texas title. No such vehicle may be registered with farm license.

"All non-resident vehicles used in harvesting or marketing of wheat or other similar grains in this state will not be allowed to operate without this temporary registration. Maximum gross weight allowed in this state is 48,000 pounds with a maximum load limit of not to exceed 18,000 pounds on any axle. Operators of these vehicles holding a valid commercial operator's license from their home state will not be required to secure a Texas commercial operator's license."

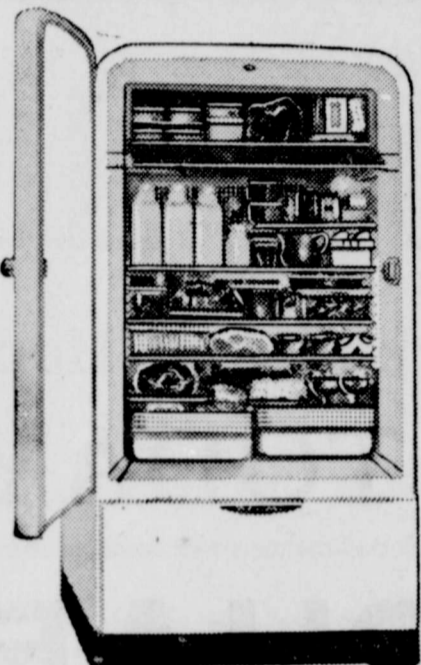

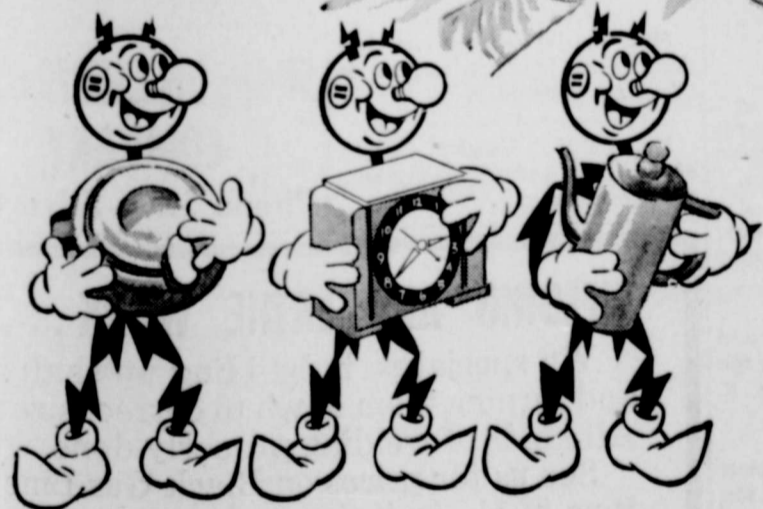

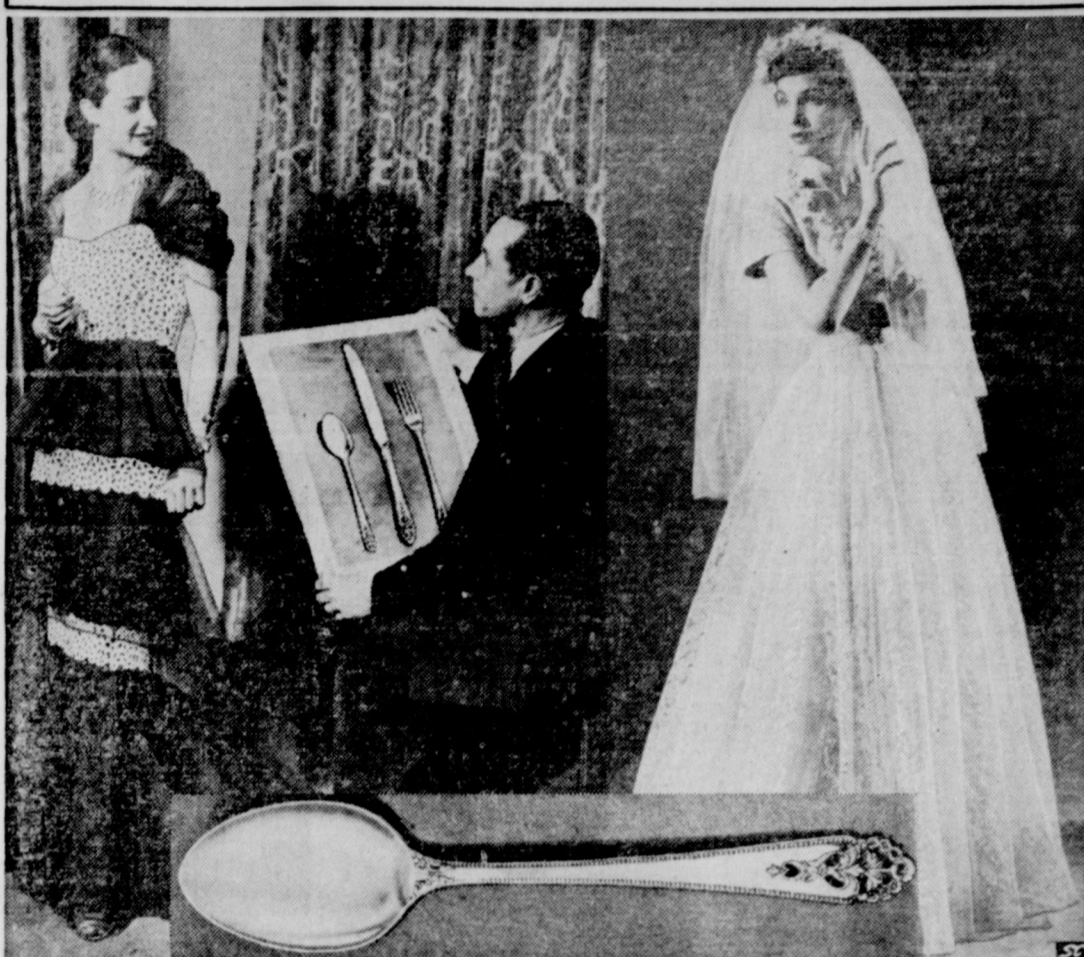

### American Silver Spoon Inspires Paris Fashions

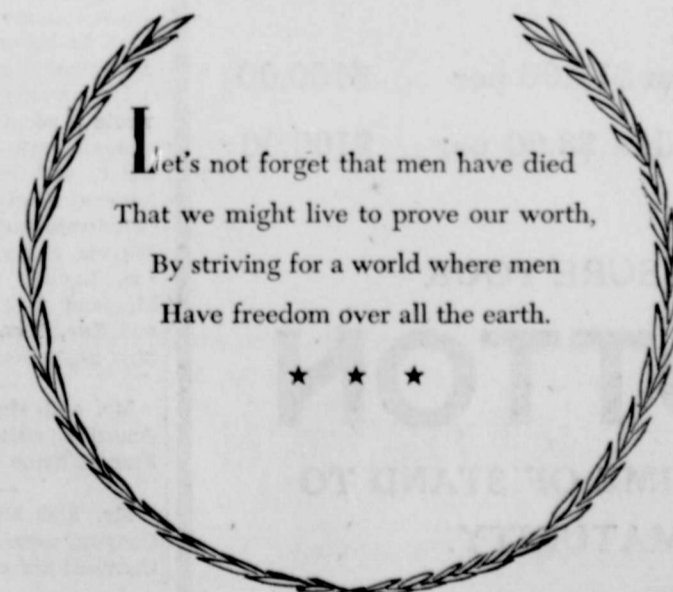

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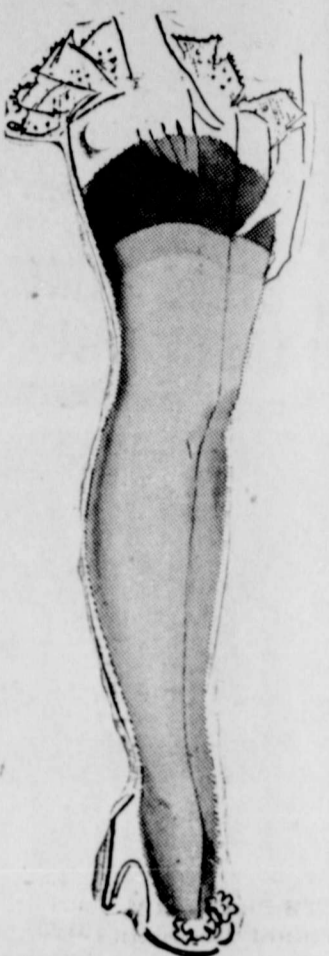

### Suicide Helper Gets Freedom

NEW YORK—A grand jury failed to indict an unemployed, 60-year-old immigrant on a charge of helping his best friend kill himself to escape the constant pain of cancer.

Frederick Berwich, an unemployed dishwasher, was indicted, however, on a charge of violating the law against illegal possession of firearms. He was arraigned in general sessions court.

Berwich had been held on a charge of "aiding and abetting" the suicide of Joseph Ziakowski, 65, who had been his boyhood friend in Russia. Police said he confessed giving Ziakowski the suicide gun.

### U. S. Now in Position To Drop Atomic Bomb Anywhere in Europe

LONDON.—The first American superfortress group with the know-how for atomic bombing arrived in England and the United States is in position to drop an atom bomb anywhere on short notice.

Air force officers revealed that the famous 509th "atom bomb" group flew to this front-line Atlantic pact base for training with its specially equipped, specially trained crews.

Included in the 509th's highly trained personnel were at least two veterans of the history-making missions that dropped atom bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, one an air force source said.

The disclosure of the 509th's arrival increased speculation among foreign military observers here as to how quickly and how effectively the United States third air division, based in England, could swing into atomic action.

It was learned the group's 30 planes did not come equipped with the special racks needed for carrying atom bombs. But an air force official said "it would take only 5 1/2 hours to install the racks once the planes are here."

Some foreign military observers believed the air force also had the makings of atom bombs in England. But others thought it most likely the bombs were kept in the United States.

The group's B-29's, with a bombing radius of more than 2,000 miles, could reach any target in Europe from their base here.

The planes, like the other superfortresses based here, were equipped with the latest radar equipment enabling them to strike even through a complete cloud cover.

The three squadrons of the 509th will be maintained at 90 per cent operational strength in England. That means nine of the 10 planes in each squadron will be kept ready to go into action, real or simulated, at all times.

### Cabdriver, Wife Agree On Use of Tub, Machine

NEW YORK.—James McCluskey, a 65-year-old cabdriver, reached an agreement with his wife, Olga, in Flushing court on the use of the family washtub and sewing machine.

She will do her washing on Mondays. He will do his on Tuesdays. He will let her use the sewing machine if she quits changing the stitch control.

This jurisdictional dispute was ironed out with the aid of Magistrate Charles F. Murphy, who called a round-table discussion.

McCluskey told the court that a year ago, after 29 years of wedded life, he decided to do his own washing, ironing, cooking, and sewing.

"I don't like the way my wife does the clothes and I don't like her cooking, either," he explained.

He said he staked out a separate compartment for himself in the family refrigerator, cooked his own meals and ate them alone.

But the trouble began over the washtub and the sewing machine.

Mrs. McCluskey, who does dress alterations in her home, said her husband had threatened to lock up the machine.

"That's because she changes the tension and stitches on the machine," he said. "Then when I sew a row it's all wrong and I have to rip it out."

The feud reached its climax over washdays. Both wanted Mondays. Last Monday, Mrs. McCluskey said, her husband threw her clothes out of the tub, put his own in. She took him to court on a disorderly conduct charge.

### National Income Expected To Be 40 Billions by 1959

NEW YORK.—A presidential economic adviser said national income should be increased 40 billion dollars a year in the next 10 years if we are to maintain a stable economy.

Leon H. Keyserling, vice-chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, said such an expansion was needed to absorb the one to two million a year who would be seeking employment for the first time.

In an address to the convention of the national association of tobacco dealers, he said economic stability should mean "moving ahead—and should never mean standing still."

### Senator Balks At Weird Items In U. S. Tracts

WASHINGTON.—Economy-minded Sen. Styles Bridges (R., N. H.) asked if any of his fellow senators knew "how to tell the sex of watermelons."

If they did not, he said, they could find out about it in a government publication.

He also asked if they knew anything about the economic status of the band-tail pigeon.

He admitted that he did not know that said pigeon had an economic status until he found a government booklet on "Habits, Food and Economic Status of the Band-Tailed Pigeon."

Could Shorten Shelf  
Bridges suggested that the book was—or at least might be—one of the reasons why congress should shorten the "1,000-foot shelf" of Government books. He said he was not criticizing any particular publication but that congress ought to do something about "Uncle Sam's Book of the Minute Club, Unlimited."

No one can estimate the overall cost, he said, but the appropriations committee, which he headed in the last congress, collected 83,000 publications when it asked each federal agency for one copy of each publication.

He reported the government printing office had delivered 133,582,867,587 copies of printed matter in the last 10 years. And, he added, the government departments and agencies turned out additional "immense quantities" themselves.

"The people ought to feel fortunate that we didn't pass a law forcing them to read all that stuff," said Sen. Homer Ferguson (R., Mich.)

Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, (D., N. M.) who used to be head of the agriculture department, interrupted to say that the printing mentioned "included 500,000 reprints for one senator alone."

### Wants "Useful" Books

Bridges hoped that senators and house members would try to supply only useful publications to their constituents.

"Let's continue to send them 'Infant Care' and let's think twice before we send them publications on 'eliminating Bats from Buildings,'" he suggested.

He disclosed, incidentally, that bats were evicted by closing all but one or two escape hatches in a barn in the daytime. At midnight, when all the bats are presumably gone through those "two outlets, they are plugged too."

"Remarkably simple," said Bridges, "but do we need a government brochure?"

### Doctor Says Operations Inside Heart Possible

CLEVELAND.—A research specialist has predicted that surgeons would be operating inside the heart before many years.

"Ways will be devised to stop the heart, keep the brain alive, open the heart, close it, and start it beating again," said Dr. Claude S. Peck in an address to the city club forum.

Dr. Peck said the newest technique of heart surgery involved the grafting of a section of vein between the aorta and coronary veins to act as "feeder" to dry areas of the heart blocked by clogged arteries. The operation already has been performed on human patients, he said.

Dr. Peck is engaged in research work to conquer coronary disease, commonly known as "heart attack."

He and his associates have performed nearly 5,000 experimental operations on animals and humans, he said.

### Lucite Now Being Used In Plastic Eye Lenses

LOS ANGELES.—The lucite that made the bubble turrets of combat aircraft is now being turned into a sort of bubble turret for the poor eyed public.

It is the material from which tiny new plastic lenses, covering only the cornea of the eye, are being produced. Although they were considered in the stage of "active research" until a few weeks ago, the corneal lenses may someday make contact lenses obsolete.

The lens caps only the colored part of the eye, and is held in place by a natural capillary attraction. There is no flange to fit the eyeball, and no auxiliary fluid needed.

Nor do they flip out with a hearty slap on the back or a sly wink. Tears, just tears, hold them in. They are visible only to the expert.

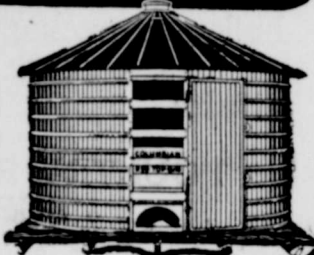
