Rev. J. L. Aldridge will preach at the Presbyterian Church Sunday, January 22, at 3 o'clock. Everyone is invited to attend this service.

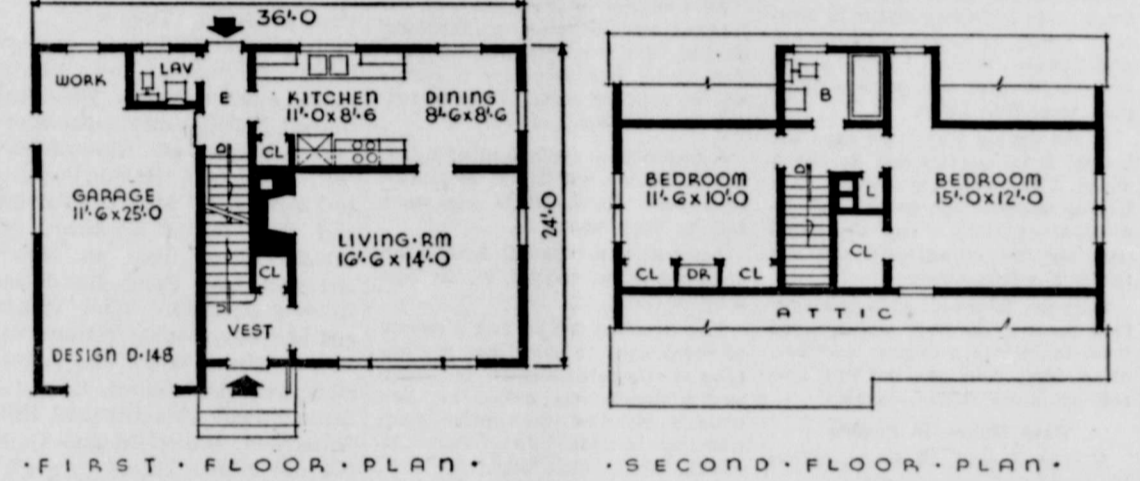
Soil Conservation Office Force Attends School at Plainview

Borger to Post Highway Plans Due For Action

Change Made in Post-office Hours Past Week at Local Office

Last week the following changes were made at the postoffice in the hours the office will be open. Postmaster Clay Fowler said the window will be closed each day from 12 to 1 o'clock for the noon hour, and will close at noon on Saturday and will remain closed for the afternoon.

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Claude, January 13.—A request for construction of the long projected highway across the Palo Duro Canyon may go before the Texas Highway Commission in its February sessions, County Judge Richard S. Morris, announced here today.

Decision to take the highway plans before the state commission was reached by directors of the Borger to Post Highway Association in a meeting here this afternoon.

County judges, commissioners and highway backers on the Borger to Post route have been busy for more than a month compiling information to substantiate their request to the highway commission.

"We have most of the information at hand," Judge Morris declared. "Soon, we'll have a summary run on this information and I think we'll have prepared a convincing brief in support of the request."

The Borger to Post highway group was re-activated in early December to push plans for a trans-canyon highway project. All the route from Borger to Post is in process of completion, except the jump across the canyon, connecting Silvertown and Claude.

A meeting in Amarillo at the time of the association re-activation scheduled a complete follow-through campaign to get the needs and requirements of residents in the several counties squarely before the state highway group.

"We have had enough time now to build up our case pretty well," Judge Morris continued. "That's why we are going to request audience at the February session of the highway commission."

Judge Morris said he did not know what days the commission is meeting next month. But he suggested the meeting probably would be the last Monday and Tuesday, February 27-28.

Meredith, of Borger Chamber of Commerce, Judge Morris, of Claude, Alton Steele, Commissioner of Briscoe County, Silvertown, Texas.

Discipline Must Fit Child, Parents, Teachers Advised

To puzzled, worried parents and teachers who feel that the old disciplinary methods don't work but who think that the modern way is "no discipline at all," Dr. Dorothy W. Baruch explains how we can fashion discipline to fit the child and suit ourselves, making it a creative undertaking instead of a mechanical thing.

Dr. Baruch does not give specific remedies for specific problems but outlines some useful principles that hold good "whether a child is two or teen-age."

The essential fact that every parent must know, the author states, is that "bad feelings cause bad actions."

And the three kinds of "bad feelings" that cause most kinds of misbehavior are expressed in this way: "I'm feeling hurt... I'm feeling angry... I'm feeling scared."

These "bothers," stored up inside, may pop out in different ways: "Sue, at six, grabs from every child in the neighborhood; at sixteen, she steals. Both problems are her way of saying, at different ages, 'I'm hurt. I never get enough love.' I feel mean and want something tangible to make up for the lack!"

The hurts that "pop out" in fear and anger and misbehavior can be prevented, Dr. Baruch points out, by feeding the "emotional hunger" of the child for the three basic foods of love, understanding and success.

"The best way to give a child of any age enough loving is really to love him." And really loving a child, Dr. Baruch explains, means having good feelings inside ourselves about him... means learning to know him as an individual, for the child needs most to count on our understanding his "bad" feelings as well as his good ones.

Quick Test for Newcastle Announced by Veterinarians

A quick new test for Newcastle disease—now one of the nation's most widespread poultry maladies—has been announced by research veterinarians.

Former tests have required laboratory work to identify the disease. The new test, however, can be applied by veterinarians on the farm.

It is similar to a rapid test now widely used in diagnosing pullorum disease in poultry flocks.

It requires only a drop of blood from each bird and results are obtained in two to five minutes.

Two veterinarians at the University of Minnesota developed the test. Their report indicates that it is practical and reliable for checking farm flocks, since large numbers of birds can be tested in a short time.

Testing for Newcastle disease is essential because the symptoms of this infection can easily be confused with those of other diseases. The disease is highly contagious among chickens and is responsible for many poultry deaths and heavy losses in egg production in the United States. Caused by a virus, it was first detected near Newcastle upon Tyne, England, nearly 25 years ago. Since then, it has spread widely throughout the world.

If the new test fulfills its promise, it will give poultry raisers and veterinarians a head start on fighting Newcastle disease when the test shows this infection is present.

Vaccinations for TB

Vaccination is being used in a new program to further reduce the threat of tuberculosis in medical and nursing students at the University of Michigan subject to exposure to the disease. Dr. Norman S. Hayner, tuberculosis control officer at university hospital, said 58 medical and 46 nursing students had been vaccinated. The vaccine employed is a preparation of living bovine tubercule bacilli, he reported. The bacilli used to build up resistance to the disease have been grown on culture material over a period of years so that their virulence is greatly reduced. Use of this vaccine, known as BCG (bacillus of Calmette and Guerin), is recommended for use in student

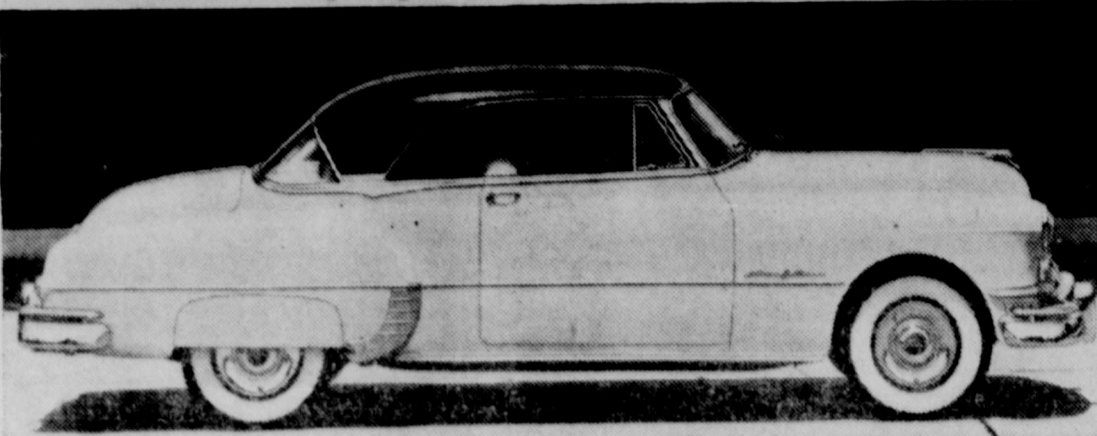

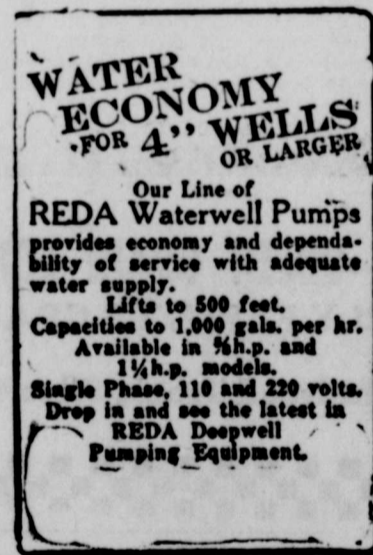
