# **Cutting Down** Traffic Deaths

LOS ANGELES. - Judge Roger Alton Pfaff, tough but fair-minded war veteran, was becoming one of the most talked-about men in Los Angeles and his reputation was spreading beyond his own bord-

His domain is the downtown Civic Center traffic court here. He is the gap in accordance with the operating in the manner of a blackrobed evangelist to stop the terrific traffic carnage which has been rampant here.

Since he began handing out penalties, the traffic death rate in Los Angeles had dived. Deaths by autos numbered 409 in 1947. After only 10 months of Judge Pfaff's term, they amounted to 289-a dro of 30 per cent. Los Angeles had gone from the highest of the 14 big United States cities in traffic

The Pfaff crusade was born 14 years ago when he, a young law student, was haled into court on a charge of driving through a red light. The judge asked for his plea. "Guilty, but-

"Five dollars. Next case." The judge recalls that he came out of the courtroom "boiling

The next years were too busy for him to devote any time to traffic infractions. He was graduated from law school, practiced in Los Angeles, served in the state legislature and in the infantry and OSS during the war.

Highway Deaths Shocking

Returning from Europe, he was shocked to observe slaughter on United States highways that measured that of the battlefield. When he was appointed a Los Angeles municipal judge in 1948, he surprised his colleagues by requesting traffic court duty. Most of them avoided it.

Los Angeles drivers now warn each other, "Judge Pfaff will get have reason to fear the 42-yearold jurist. An offender came before him with a record of two previous \$100 drunk driving fines. He was charged with driving without a license.

"I notice in the officer's report," said the judge, "that you stated you were not going to serve time, that you had lived in California long enough so that you could 'pull strings' and pay fines. Well, it looks as if you're in the wrong court. You can't buy that kind of driving

The sentence: 180 days in jail. Stiff judgments aren't the only element of the Pfaff formula. He preaches traffic safety with a zeal of a Billy Sunday. Before each session he tells the defendants:

"I want each of you to become a crusader for better driving.'

Offers Advice He talks for 20 minutes and offers

this advice: "1. Practice courtesy. Sixty per cent of citations arise from failure to yield the right of way. Why be so rude to one another? Courtesy can be infectious. Try it.

"2. Slow down! If you are late to work, don't try to make it up on the road. You'd be better off staying at home in bed and not going to work at all."

The lectures have paid off. Of the 200,000 persons who passed through his court in 1948, only two percent returned. One happy defendant wrote the Los Angeles Times: "Maybe it's the heat! For imag-

ine receiving a ticket for speed-ing, spending the morning in traffic court, getting fined \$20 and thoroughly enjoying the consequences . . . "Truly the judge is a man with

a mission going far beyond the call of duty in a tremendous per-sonal effort to assist the cause of traffic safety. . ."







#### **Rocket Moon Trip** In Next 50 Years Seen by Scientist

LINCOLN, NEB .- Some day, say about 50 years from now, a space ship may make the 240,000-mile trip to the moon and return to earth within 24 hours.

That is the belief of J. P. Colbert, professor of civil engineering at the University of Nebraska. He is confident that science will solve the problem of fueling a giant rocket ship for the expedition by about the year 2,000.

According to Colbert's predictions, the ship will take off at an almost perpendicular angle and huitle through the air at the necessary sever-mile-a-second "escape the air sur ounding the earth, he Wayne Hamilton, Pat Northcutt ton. said, its rockets can be cut off and and Billy Tennison. The arrival on the moon will be timed for the "dawn line," just as that planet's 336 hour "day" is bethe sun is directly overhead, he noted, and the two week long "nights" get as cold as 215 degrees below zero. Therefore men must plan to arrive at the most temperate time, he explained. Astronomers believe men can re-

main safely on the moon one or two hours before beginning the return voyage, Colbert said. The take-off from the moon will

be far easier, he said, since its gravity is only one-sixth as strong as the earth's.

Unmanned, guided missiles undoubtedly will be used on test flights before a staffed expedition tries it, Colbert said. If these rockets were filled with an explosive, colorful substance to spatter the surrounding area, the landing could be seen by strong telescopes on earth, he thinks.

Colbert said it is reasonable to assume the last half of the century will see development of the fuel needed for the trip.

"Look what we've done in the first half," he said. "If anyone had tried to describe television or jet planes in 1900, people would have thought he was crazy.'

#### Ancient Spanish Crown Found in Old Cathedral

MADRID, SPAIN .- Lost for seven centuries, the ancient Spanish crown of King Alfonso X, known as the "sage" is among precious historic relics that have been found in tombs in Toledo cathedral, accord-

ing to information received here. Spanish scholars in recent years have turned up a number of imtombs and in some cases the dry climate has kept them almost intact. The finds in Toledo are among the most important of all, it was said by Prof. Manuel Gomez Mor-

eno, noted Spanish archeologist. Besides the crown, scholars found a sword at least 700 years old and in perfect condition, two of the finest specimens known of medieval brocades, a pair of silver spurs and one of fine gilded leather shoes more than 600 years old and in fine condition.



#### **Duke University Traces** History of U.S. Consus

In recognition of 1950 as a census year Duke university library has prepared an exhibit of documents tracing the history of the national nose-count from the initial census in 1790 to the multi-volume product of the last 1940 effort.

Under the direction of Assistant Librarian Robert W. Christ the display was made up to include one of the rare original volumes of the first census along with later issues demonstrating the constantly increasing interest of the government in the private lives of its citizens.

Hardly had the battle smoke of the Revolution cleared away before the infant republic decided to find out just how many people it comprised. The first census of 1790 was an informal affair conducted by field agents who wandered about the country counting heads. They used no elaborate printed blanks and carried most of the information in their heads or on scraps of paper that they chanced to have in their pockets.

There were only five classifications in the first census. The government wanted to know the number of free white males over 16, including heads of families, free white males under 16, free white females, all other free persons, and slaves. The total for the entire country at this time was 3,929,214 while North Carolina embraced 393,751 persons of which 100,571 were slaves. It is interesting to note that New York at this time numbered only 340,120 with 21,324 slaves.

The first census was published in a little paper-backed volume of 56 pages in 1791, and the results were given to the President. Much of the propertional representation in Congress was worked out from the figures in this little book. The whole operation cost about \$44,000. Very few of these first census reports are in existence today and the Duke University Library is one of the few institutions to own a nearly complete set of originals.

#### Mice Damage

Shrubs and trees, especially fruit trees, are frequently damaged by mice during the fall and winter months. This is especially true if a sod mulch is used or if weeds are allowed to grow near the base of the plants. All plants should be cleared away from the base of the tree for about 12 to 18 inches and poisoned grain placed in small tin cans wherever mouse runways are found. Tin cans with holes about an inch in diameter are the best because they will keep birds and other animals from eating the

Undulant Fever Program

A nationwide program to control and eradicate undulant fever in animals has been recommended by the National Research council. Approximately 4,000 cases of undulant fever (brucellosis) in human beings are reported annually to the state departments of health, but it is estimated that the truer figure would run to at least 30,000 to 40,000 cases annually. Man acquires the disease from drinking unpasteurized infected milk and from contact with infected material from animals.

Often the meaning of traditional fiests ceremonies has been lost thru centuries of repetition. In Oaxaca, Mexico, for instance, the people raise large and misshapen radishes and dress them like human beings. After the Oaxacans have feasted they dash their plates to bits in the street-no one quite knows why, notes the National Geographic So-

In Metepec, the fiests parade is "manned" not by costumed humans, but by oxen and burros, freshly washed and bizarrely dressed. Veracruz State's Papantla features men dressed like birds. They climb tall poles and "fly" off on ropes.

Origins of some mummery can be traced. Near Puebla, Indians re-enact the war against the French under Maximilian. Other fiestas relive the Spanish conquest, with lucky mummers dressed as Cortes and Alvarado.

Even the war between Spain and the Moors is remembered. Mexicans, to whom this old world conflict means nothing, solemnly dress as Moors and dance in battle against Spaniards.

When saints' days are lacking. Mexicans seize on marriages and funerals as occasions for fiestas Funerals are made gay, the idea being that the deceased is freed from earthly drudgery. Mastitis in Cattle

Many cases of mastitis in cattle could be prevented by lowering door sill entrances to the dairy barn and by fencing off contaminated mud holes and pasture ponds. Mastitis in cattle may reoccur folloving apparent recovery just as readily or more so than contracting the disease for the first time. It is quite difficult to determine when an animal has actually been cured for mastitis and should a small area of infection remain in the udder it could serve as a focus of reinfection for the entire quarthat one attack of mastitis does not render immunity and that the animals remain susceptible to actional attacks of mastitis.

#### Save a Month on the Feeding Period for Hogs - Be Early

The efficient pork producer nakes every pround of feed count and he gets his hogs to market weight just as fast as possible. Dr. W. C. Banks, extension veterinarian of Texas A. and M. College, says that spring pigs will reach market weight faster and will do cheaper if farrowed in clean pens an dhouses and fed in sanitary lots.

He says recent tests show that well cared for pigs reached a market weight of 210 pounds, a month earlier than pigs that had their growth retarded by internal parasites. The test also showed that pigs raised on clean ground required a half pound less grain per ounds of gain.

Sanitary farrowing and feeding practices also help to prevent a umber of infectious diseases and intestinal disorders which annually take a heavy toll of pigs each spring in the state, he says.

He points out that the installaoinof guard rails and a pig brood er in the farrowing house will save many a baby pig from being crushed or chilled. Every pig that can be saved increases the producer's income. Pigs lost at farrowing time or soon after may mean the difference between a profitable farm enterprise or a inancial loss.

Dr. Banks says the rations you are feeding should be checked against deficiencies of B-complex vitamins and for balance. Feeding a ration too high in rich concentrates is wasteful.

Profits are made, says Dr. Banks, only from feeding and producing healthy hogs. At the first sign of trouble, remove the sick animals from the herd and obtain a diagnosis so the cause can be removed. Only healthy and thrifty animals can fully utilize the feed pigs against hog cholera with the inside. use of a dead serum vaccine.



Over the years, Iowa has accounted for close to one-third of the nation's popcorn production. Illinois, Indiana, and Ohio have provided another third. The remainder of the commercial crop comes largely from eight states-Missouri, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Kentucky, Texas, Kansas, Michigan, and California.

Two adjoining counties in northwestern Iowa, Sac and Ida, have at times produced more popcorn than any state except Iowa itself. The Sac county town of Odebolt has laid claim to honors as "the popcorn center of the world."

Iowa's plant wizards, known for Burkanbian progress in improving types of corn, have not overlooked the popping grain. Concentrating on taste and popability, they are developing strains that will expand 30 more times their unpopped colume, as compared to the usual 20 times or less.

#### New Device May Aid Deaf To Hear Through Fingers

NEW YORK .- A device which its lesigners believe will enable the deaf to "hear through their fingers" has been described by Prof. Norbert Wiener of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Prof. Wiener, one of the world's most noted mathematicians, said the device, when perfected to the portable stage, is expected to take the form of a glove to be worn on the left hand.

Each finger will receive a different set of vibrations, or frequency bands, tuned to receive the sounds in the range of the human voice, which the deaf person will learn to translate into meaningful patterns The vibrations received by the ingertips will take the place of the ribrations created by sound freuencies inside the ear.

The present machine, still in a crude stage of development, Wiener reported, already has been test ed successfully on a number of normal persons whose ears had been stopped up, and on one blind deaf
