## School Board Calls Election For Saturday, July 8th

### 1 Answer to Winter Grazing Problem Is Solved Here

The Briscoe County News has been authorized to publish the following statement of information given out by the Silvertown Independent School Board. The statement is self explanatory: "An election will be held on July 8 (Second Saturday in July) for the purpose of determining whether the Trustees of Silvertown Independent School District shall be authorized to issue bonds in the amount of \$65,000.00 at a rate of interest not to exceed 3 1/2%."

"Money thus obtained will be used to build four (4) additional classrooms onto the Grade School and repair the present buildings. The building now used as a School Lunchroom is to be made into a Homemaking Cottage. This will enable us to have a first class Vocational Department for our girls. A more modern type Lunchroom will be constructed. The entire school plant will be given much of the needed repairs. We believe that you will want to vote for these propositions when you consider the crowded situation of the schools and if you understand that we cannot keep up the high standards of the system except we be given the buildings and equipment needed.

"The tax rate will be set at not more than \$1.25 on the \$100.00 valuation and in our opinion will not be set at the maximum figure. The rate of 3 1/2% on the bonds is as you will notice, not to exceed 3 1/2%. We are sure that some of the bonds will sell for less than this rate. We believe that some will go at 2 1/2%."

"Remember that the school board is made up of men who pay taxes as you do. They are interested in a good school but they are interested also in seeing that you get value received for your tax dollar. "Come out and vote for these two propositions July 8."

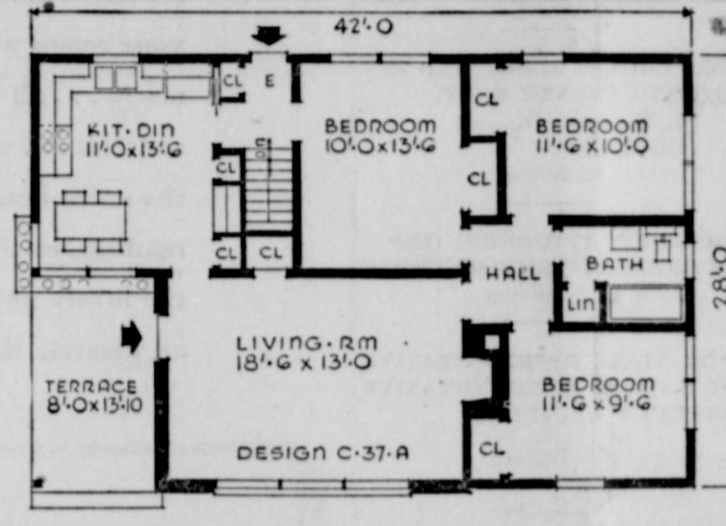
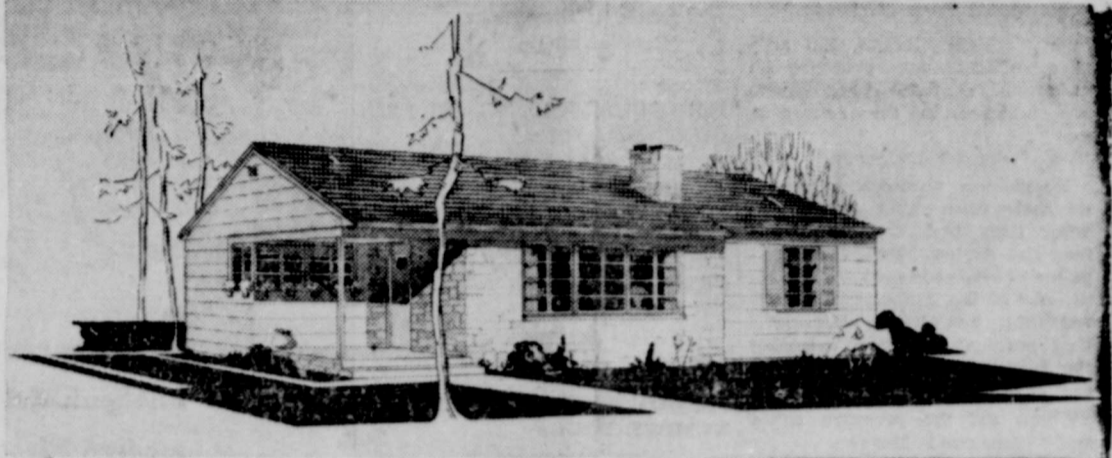
### "The Baron of Arizona" Playing at Palace Sunday, Monday

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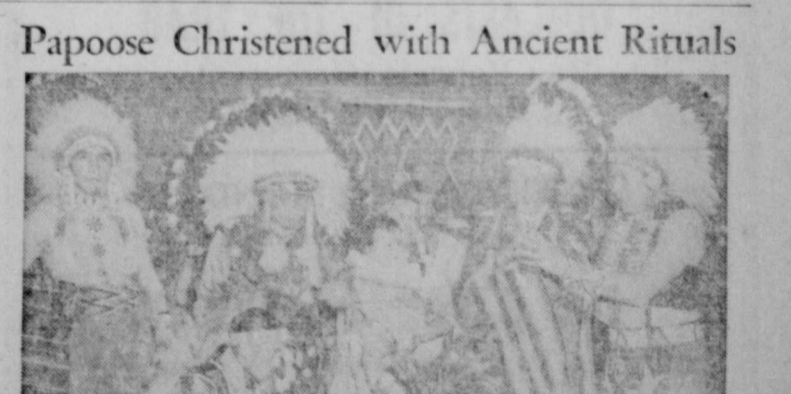
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### Third Irrigation Well For Orlin Stark Farm Comes in

## CHILDREN LEARN EASY WAY AT TECH MUSEUM CLASSES

Junior will have plenty of fun and still learn a few things about art and literature under a summer plan the Museum at Texas Technological College has adopted. Children participating in the program will have a workshop for crayon and finger painting. The second part of the period will be devoted to a study of Yaqui Indian dances which will be presented by Ramon Rasario Valencia in full costume. The dances will be held under an authentic Yaqui arber which has been erected in the Museum's natural history section.

Mrs. W. C. Holden, who has charge of the program, said the first phase will end July 22, and enrollment will begin on the following day for the second program which ends August 19. Nursery groups (age 3-6) and juniors (7-12) are enrolled.

A 22-acre oat pasture at the Brazos River Field Laboratory of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station near College Station furnished good grazing during the past winter for 85 steer calves for 94 days and for 88 cows and 30 calves for 21 days.



## Amerasia Case

JIM McINERNEY, the assistant attorney general, was testifying in secret before the Tydings committee regarding the stolen documents in the Amerasia case.

McInerney, now in charge of the justice department's criminal division, handled the Amerasia prosecution when he had a lower position in the justice department five years ago. And the man who cross-examined him, senate committee counsel Ed Morgan, once worked in the FBI as a top expert on Communists. They knew each other well.

"Jim," asked Morgan, did anyone ever bring any pressure on you regarding these people who were indicted in the Amerasia case?"

"Yes," replied McInerney. Republican senators pricked up their ears. This was just what they had been looking for. The Scripps-Howard newspaper chain, now sued for libel by one of the Amerasia ex-defendants, has been claiming that political pressure caused the justice department to drop the case.

"Where did the pressure come from?" continued Morgan.

"The White House," replied McInerney.

Republican senators were all smiles. Democratic senators looked worried.

"Who in the White House?" pressed Morgan.

"The President," said the tight-lipped McInerney, apparently not willing to volunteer anything unless asked.

"What did the President say?" asked Morgan. By this time both Democrat and Republican senators were almost holding their breath.

"The President called me on the phone," said McInerney, "and said, 'Don't let anything stop you from sending those B—S to jail.'"

The senators relaxed. The Republicans looked disappointed. But they knew if for no other reason than because they were familiar with the President's mule-driver language, that McInerney was telling the truth.

## Why Case Was Dropped

The real story of why McInerney could not carry out the President's orders is now fairly well understood—namely, because OSS and FBI men searched the Amerasia office and Emmanuel Larsen's apartment without a warrant, thereby violating the 4th amendment.

However, the slow-speaking McInerney, a Catholic, conscientious, and with the map of Ireland written all over his face, gave a graphic account during his first closed-door session with the senators. He told, among other things, how he had persuaded Judge James Proctor to hold special court on Saturday, September 29, 1945, in order to handle the Amerasia case.

At first Judge Proctor had demurred at holding court on Saturday, but the reason for the special session, McInerney explained to senators, was because one defendant, Larsen, had discovered the FBI illegally entered his apartment, had filed a motion to dismiss, and McInerney feared other defendants would get wise and also move to dismiss.

Therefore, he had to act fast. The chief defendant, Philip Jaffe, had hinted that he might plead "guilty." So McInerney immediately got hold of his attorney and put across an agreement that the justice department would accept a fine if Jaffe would plead guilty. McInerney said he knew that if Jaffe's lawyer and Larsen's lawyer had a chance to confer and Jaffe learned about the illegal search, the government would not be able to convict anyone.

Therefore he phoned the District of Columbia clerk of the court and asked him to withhold from the press Larsen's motion to dismiss, for fear Jaffe would hear about it. This was on Friday.

The clerk replied that once a court paper is filed, it becomes a public record.

Fortunately, only a small squib about the case appeared in the Washington Star on Friday afternoon. By Saturday morning, however, Jaffe's attorney realized that the entire prosecution was about to collapse, and grumbled about going through with his agreement to plead Jaffe "guilty." However, he finally did so.

## Newspaper Chain Tactics

One interesting fact about the Amerasia case is that the illegal search by the OSS and FBI has been well known to the Scripps-Howard newspaper chain for some time. However, when the American Society of Newspaper Editors met here April 23, Roy Howard, head of the chain, instructed his editors to stage a steady campaign on the Amerasia case and for Senator McCarthy and withhold the fact the case would have fallen in court.

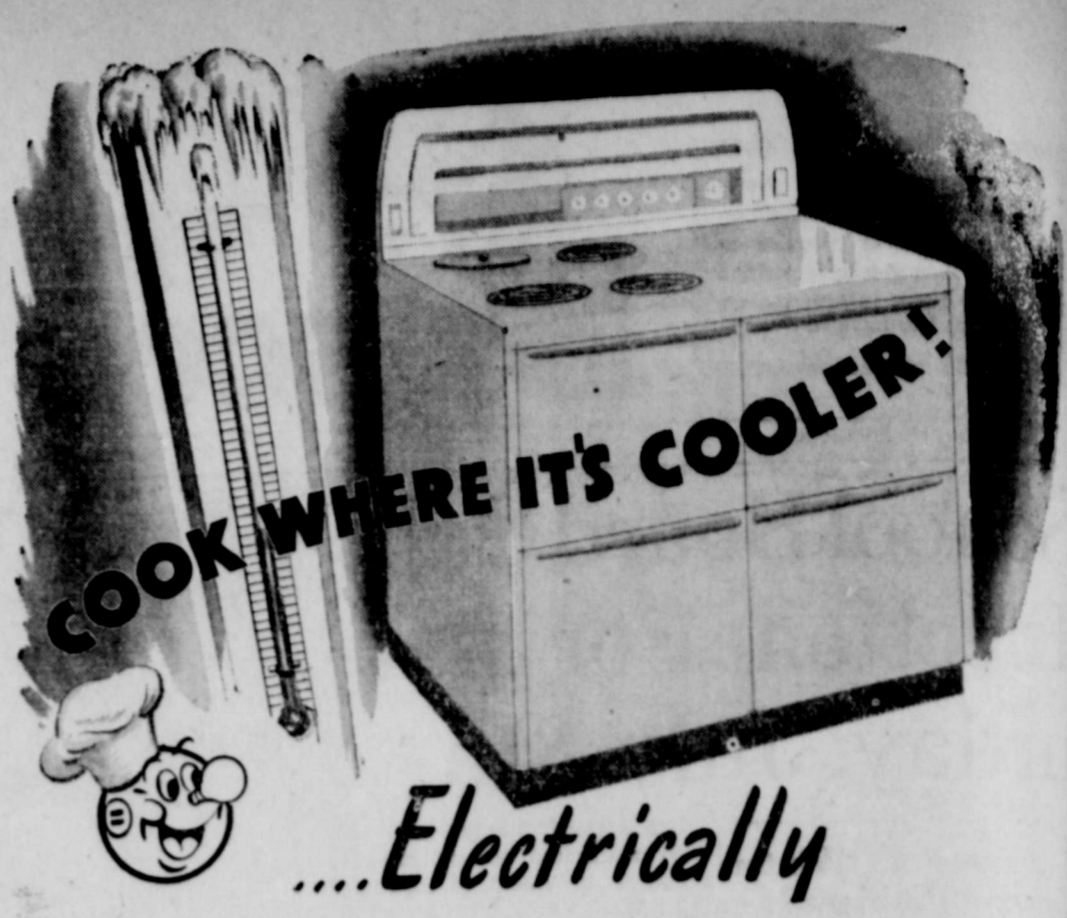

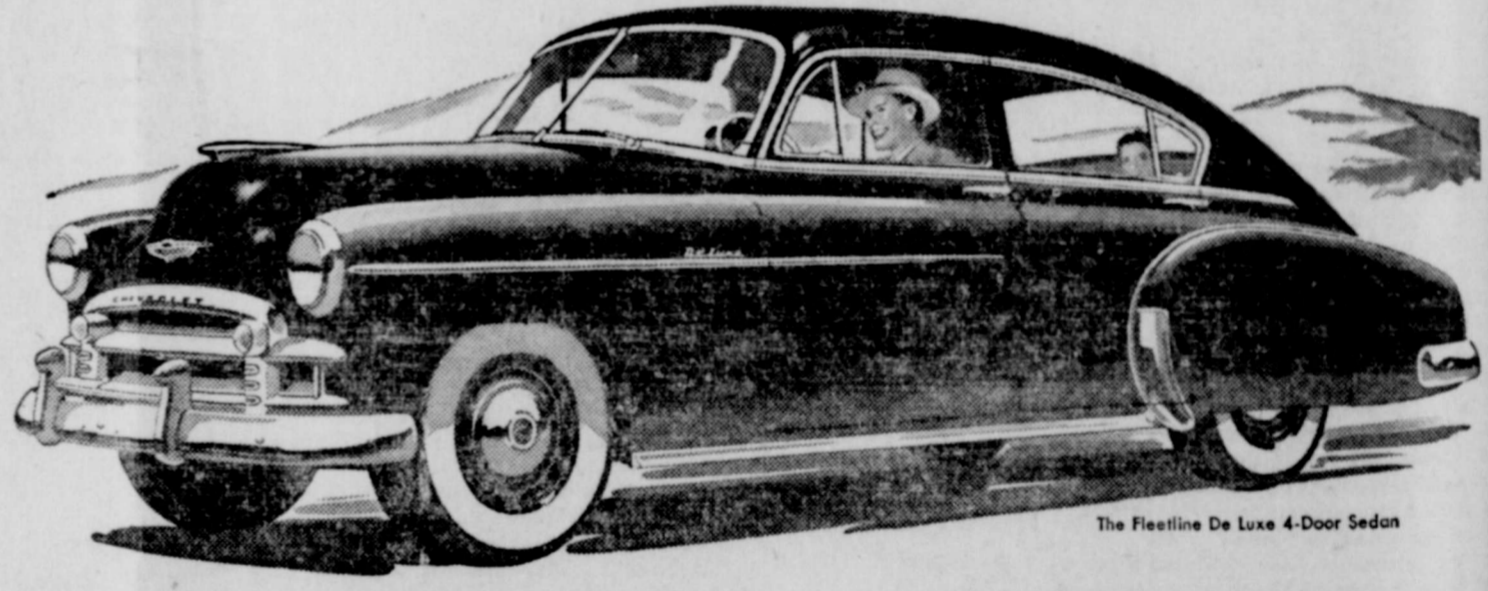

Guide Vegetable Canning With This Chart (See Recipes Below)

**Canning Vegetables**  
 THOSE GARDENS will soon be bursting with lovely green, yellow and red vegetables which you'll want to speed onto your canning shelves for healthful eating this fall and winter. Best results can be achieved when you have the kitchen ready, the night before, to take in the produce early in the morning while the dew is still fresh on them.

Whether you pick your own vegetables or buy them from somewhere else, try to get them well on their way to canning within two hours. Vegetables which have been picked for longer than eight hours before canning do not give as tender or high quality canned products.

Can only young beets and carrots. Store the older ones in a cellar or pit.

Certainly the work is made easier if the kitchen is all set for action. This means that you have your jars freshly washed and scoured, sitting in tubs or large kettles ready to sterilize. You can put them on to boil when you go out to pick the vegetables.

Have a work table ready with colanders, knives and spoons where you can work on the vegetables after they're washed.

The pressure cooker should have been checked for use to see that the gauge is accurate. It should be clean and fitted with a rack, ready to receive the jars after they're packed.

Have a large kettle ready on the work table or range so that vegetables can be pre-cooked. Some women still use cold pack, that is pack the jars without any cooking of the vegetable. However, most women say they have more luck with pre-cooking since this shrinks the vegetable before packing and also sets the color better.

**Choosing Vegetables**  
 IT'S EASY to determine whether a vegetable is right for canning just by careful inspection. Here are tips to guide you.

Asparagus stalks should be green for the greater part of their length, inasmuch as the white parts are woody. Choose firm stalks.

Lima beans or snap (green) beans should be young and tender. Both types should look green and fresh. Green beans should snap readily when bent.

Kernels on corn should be plump and full of milk. The husk should be fresh and green. In greens, choose those with tender, young and unbruised leaves. Never use wilted leaves.

Pea pods should be bright and full. Avoid the puffy pods with small peas. Peas, when shelled should be tender.

**Follow These Directions**  
 WHEN VEGETABLES are brought in for washing and preparation, have your pressure cooker all ready to use. The rack should be in place, the safety valve assembled and the petcock open. The jars should be ready, too, after washing, in a pan of hot water.

Have the teakettle or other vessel with boiling water ready, too, as this is the liquid you'll need for filling vegetable jars.

Wash and prepare the vegetables to fill the jars you have.

Pre-cook the vegetable for the specified length of time, then ladle into the jars immediately. Add enough boiling water to the jar so that it reaches to within 1/4 to 1/2 inch of the top. Add salt to the jar, in the proportion of 1/2 teaspoon to pints and 1 teaspoon for quarts. Run a spatula around the inside of the jar to release air bubbles. Wipe the sealing surface of the jars with a clean cloth.

Adjust the jar closure, using manufacturers' directions. These vary with different caps, so it's smart to read directions for the particular one you're using.

Place jars in cooker, seeing that they do not touch, and that there is enough room for the hot air to circulate.

There should be enough water in the cooker to cover the bottom or the rack.

Adjust the lid on the cooker, and tighten clamps as directed by manufacturer.

**Processing Under Pressure**  
 TURN THE heat under the cooker on, and let steam pour from the petcock for 7 to 10 minutes. This is necessary for releasing the air from the cooker so that when you do start the actual pressure cooking, you'll have correct temperature.

Close the petcock and let the cooker come to the desired pressure. It's important that this be maintained, as fluctuations of a pound or two either way several times during processing will drain liquid from the jars, thus giving an unattractive look to them, as well as leaving them dry to the point where they are uncovered.

Process according to vegetable chart given above.

Turn heat off and remove to a cooler place until the gauge registers zero, then release petcock, clamps and cover. Always stay far enough away so that the steam does not burn you as you open the cooker.

When you want to clean the petcock and safety valve, use a pipe cleaner, running it back and forth through the openings. Never use toothpicks as these may break and clog the cooker.

Never store the pressure cooker away without insulating it against any moving or dust and dirt. Wrap well in newspaper and cloths.

It's best to store the lid separately from the cooker, so that no musty odors, difficult to rid, can develop in a closed utensil.

May holdings of cream increased 49 per cent from April, while evaporated and condensed milk stepped up 44 per cent, creamery butter, 20 per cent, and cheese, 1 per cent.

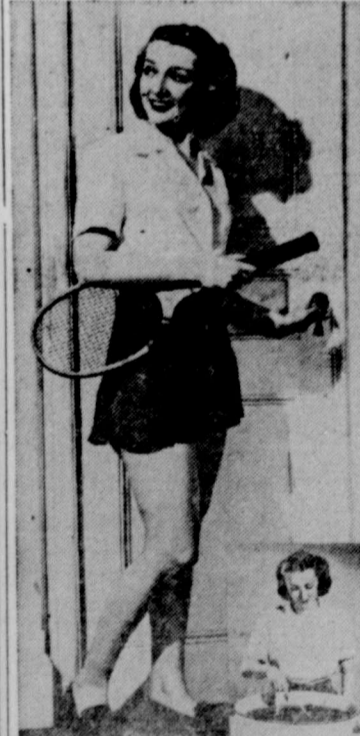

### Livestock Shipments Texas Rose 25 Per cent In April

Livestock shipments in Texas rose 25 per cent in April from 75 per cent in April of 1949, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

March to April shipments of sheep and calves were up 87 and 100 per cent, respectively. Hog shipments slid 10 per cent during

the monthly period.

In comparison with April 1949, livestock shipments rose 15 per cent in April 1950. Compared with April 1949, hog shipments were up 38 per cent; calves, 35 per cent; and cattle, 3 per cent.

### Wheat Variety Survey Shows Improvement

The 1950 Millers Buying Guide just published by the Texas-Oklahoma Wheat Improvement Association shows a big improvement in the varieties of wheat being produced in Texas and Oklahoma this season. Areas containing over 70 per cent acceptable milling and baking varieties are colored a bright green, while those areas with 70 per cent or less, good varieties are colored red. Millers will buy wheat for flour making in the large green areas and avoid entirely the few red colored areas, as they have in the past.

The principal acceptable varieties, Wichita and Triumph, have reached the peak of their popularity with farmers, believes Keats Soder, director of the Texas-Oklahoma Wheat Improvement Association. The mid-season varieties Comanche and Westar, have made the best yields the last two years, according to Soder.

### Civil Service Commission Announce an Examination

The U. S. Civil Service Commission today announced an examination for cotton technologist to fill positions paying from \$3,825 to \$6,400 a year in the Production and Marketing Administration of the Department of Agriculture in Washington, D. C., and in the southern and southwestern parts of the country. The optional branches of the examination include cottonseed technology, fibre technology, ginning technology, and textile technology.

No written test is required. To qualify, applicants must have completed a 4-year college course in one of the branches of cotton technology or have had 4 years of appropriate technical experience. In addition, they must have had from 1 to 3 years of professional experience in one of the branches of cotton technology. Provision is made for the substitution of pertinent graduate study for 2 years of the required professional experience.

The maximum age limit of 62 years will be waived for veterans. Full details concerning the requirements are given in the examination announcement. Information and application forms may be obtained from most first and second class post offices, civil service regional Applications for the examination will be accepted by the Commission's Washington office until further notice.

### Farm Women Are Learning About Irrigation Water

Texas farm women in an 18 county area which depends on underground water for irrigation are learning about the water conservation law.

Members of home demonstration clubs in the Plains-Panhandle area are studying a bulletin issued recently by the Texas A. & M. Extension Service and titled "The Underground Water Conservation Law." Miss Kate Adele Hill, home demonstration agent in charge of District 2, estimated that the information would reach 2,000 women.

The law, passed by the 51st Texas Legislature, has two central points:

First, it recognizes the "ownership and rights of the owner of the land, his lessees and assigns, in underground water."

Second, the law lays the framework for organization of underground water conservation districts as local, independent units, assigning them the powers of conserving, preserving, protecting and re-charging the underground water in reservoirs over which they have jurisdiction.

Three major powers are designed to insure a continuing abundance of water: The right to prevent waste, by court injunction if necessary; the power to regulate spacing of wells; and the power to put more water underground in re-charging projects.

The law limits the districts' powers in that they cannot appropriate or allocate water and they cannot deny a permit to drill a new irrigation well, so long as the applicant complies with spacing regulations.

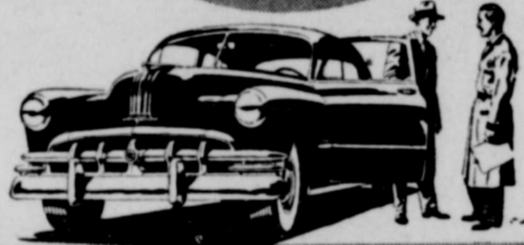

Water-Thinned Paint Offers Economy, Easy Application

Back in the days of the Roman Empire, painters used to carry a bucket of skim milk with them. At milk, however, was not for drinking, but for blending with the pigments to make paint. Even in our own colonial days, painters often consulted the cook for a recipe containing skim milk, salt, boiled rice, coffee and white. They weren't getting ready for lunch, either. The recipe was a formula for paint in which the casein from the skim milk served to bind the pigment particles together. Since those early days, casein paints have been perfected until they are exceedingly popular members of the water-thinned paint family. Other members are the emulsions, the cement-base water paints and the calcimines. All are used because they are easy to apply, they dry quickly and they present a wide range of lovely colors from which to choose. The casein paints for interior cover a wall surface well with a coat and provide a reasonable degree of washability. They may also be used without a preliminary coat on new plaster walls which are not completely dry. Needless to say, they may also be used on dry plaster and on wall construction, as well as on paper. Water-thinned emulsion paints gained wide attention about ten years ago. They began as finishes, but are also now available in semi-gloss. That means they can be used on woodwork as well as on plaster, wall paper and linoleum. Outstanding newcomers in the family of emulsions are the latex paints. These are designed as finishes for all interior surfaces.

High Rate of Eye Fatigue in Various Lighting Levels

An investigation is underway by scientists to determine the rate at which your eyes tire under various conditions of lighting in plants and offices. Standards are available to indicate the visual efficiency at different levels of illumination, the scientists point out. But little work has been done on the progressive effects on visual function of one type of lighting in comparison with another. Types of lighting to be used in the study are incandescent, mercury, fluorescent and sodium light. The object of the experiment will be to determine the visual efficiency of the five types of illumination for periods of from one to four hours. A special test has been designed by the researchers to determine to what extent visual ability to resolve details is affected after the various tests under the lights.

Preventing Calf Scours

Get away the vitamin pills and bring on the colostrum if you want to protect calves against scours. When calves are given a small amount of colostrum each day along with regular cow's milk, it was almost impossible to infect them with scours or other ordinary diseases. The explanation is that colostrum—the milk a cow gives after calving—contains protective substances not found in ordinary milk or other milk the calf gets. By freezing the colostrum the newborn calf does not consume, and feed this remainder gradually during the first few weeks of life, costly scours troubles often can be prevented.

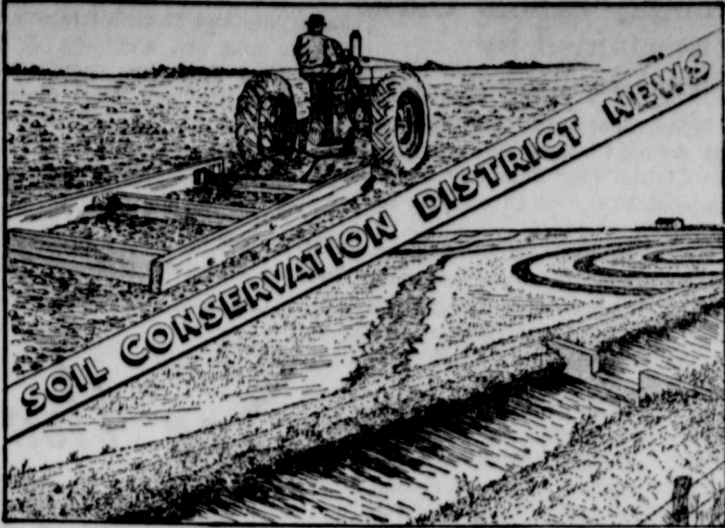
Bicycle accidents are taking well over 500 lives each year. Safety experts plead that bicyclists observe these precautions: Don't ride in and out of traffic in company with motor vehicles. Exercise extreme caution, always, while riding out of or turning into drives. Never hitch onto trucks or automobiles! Don't ride two people on a single bicycle. Use lights at night. Observe all traffic rules and signs; they apply to you just as much as to the biggest cross-country transport truck.

Pirate House Painting

A paneled fireplace wall, so painted that it resembles gold-toned marble, veined in green, is a feature of an attractive bedroom in a house on Holly Hill, a seventeenth century house in southern Maryland. In the balance of the room, the walls and ceiling are painted in the trim, olive green. The owner has it that the house was used by a pirate named Hoth who had dug an underground passage to Herring bay, half a mile away, through which he carried plunder from his boats.

Hardware-Eating Cattle

Cattle owners: If there's a needle in your haystack, better find it. Loose hardware that finds its way into cattle feed is getting to be a multi-million dollar headache for the livestock industry. Nails, pieces of wire, and other sharp objects that fall into hay and grain are eaten by cattle often pierce the stomach wall and puncture the stomach, causing death.

The above figures serve to remind all sober minded owners and operators of our farm lands of the present danger of a recurrence of the dreaded time which we remember and refer to as the "Dust bowl" days of the early thirties.

We have been lulled into a

false sense of security by the 15 years of comparative soil stability which has been ours only because we have had a cycle of sufficient rainfall to produce vegetation enough to keep the land "sewed down."

Now, all indications from every source show we are entering into another dry cycle comparable to those "dark" days, and unless we begin immediately to put to use every possible method at hand, our "own heritage" will again be shifting.

There is no need for hysteria however, but only for a prompt, systematic, diligent, application of the principles of soil conservation that our government through its experiment stations, has been proving to be effective in erosion prevention. These practices have been and are being passed on and even urged earnestly, by the agencies which are located among us. We, the Board of Supervisors of your Soil Conservation District sincerely urge that you apply your selves now to this task.

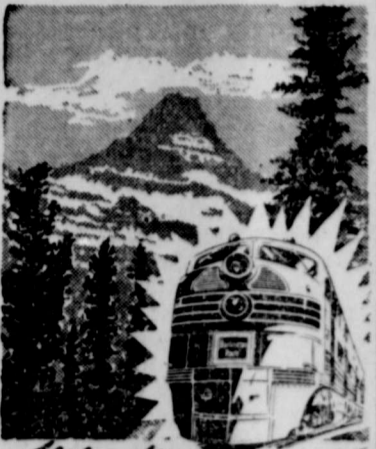
judgment in the grazing of it. If in doubt as to what is best suited for this purpose we will be pleased to pass on any information of proven worth.

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### British Diver Says Spanish Galleon Has Been Found

TOBERMORY, SCOTLAND—The search for a sixteenth century Spanish treasure galleon, reported carrying about \$68,000,000 in gold ducats when sunk, has been found according to some reports.

The British navy has been searching for the ship for weeks. They recently came up with two silver medallions from the wreck of Tobermory bay where the search was conducted. The navy, however, called off the operation.

The Duke of Argyll owns the galleon, if there is one, and the treasure. The navy operation was for practice. Any other move to recover the gold is up to the duke.

According to old stories, the galleon Duque Florencia of the Spanish Armada, was sunk in 1588 while carrying gold to pay Spanish fighters attempting a conquest of Britain. A decree of King Charles I gave the wreck to the Dukes of Argyll.

Small boys all over Scotland have thrilled to the adventure. They have read every word printed about the search.

If any gold is found the duke will have to turn it over to the British treasury for modern pounds sterling and a treasury spokesman commented:

"Thirty million gold ducats would make a very useful contribution indeed to the nation's gold reserves."

Lieut. Comdr. Reay Parkinson, boss of the treasure hunt, is confident that the galleon has been found.

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### Traitor Gives Eyes To Blind Parisian

PARIS—Maurice Bey, was condemned and executed for being a member of the French gestapo organization. As one of his last jestures he offered his eyes to science.

At dawn on the day of execution physicians were at hand to remove the corneas. Upon completion of the execution they were removed and placed in an eye bank at the hospital.

The following day the corneas were transplanted to the eyes of a sightless Parisian. Bey was executed by a firing squad.

### Many Captives in Russian Labor Camps, Returnees Say

BEREA—German prisoners returned from Russia—191 of them—laughed with bitterness when informed that the Soviet reports all but 13,000 of them have been returned to their homes.

"Why, there are tens and tens of thousands still there. We just left them, just in the camps we came from," one said.

"Why, the Russian officers themselves told us in Bresk-Litovsk two weeks ago that they expected another 150,000 to go through that one transient camp," said another.

Each of the tattered, vermin infested men on the train had a personal story of a Russian slave camp still filled with prisoners.

One man said, "I saw them working in a coal mine, standing in water up to the waist. They are all sick from it."

Albert Rether, 26, said: "We were always hungry. They gave us enough to live on, but not little enough to die."

Another said: "Hunger is what most men died of. Hunger and typhus. Nobody will ever know how many. At Bresk-Litovsk, from 1945 until now, they buried more than 3,000."

### Rolling Pin Rule Is Enthroned in Ozark Town

STELLA—The name Stella is a woman's name, so the women of Stella—the town—look over after a recent election and are running the community.

It all began when the ladies had their names placed on the ballot as a joke. The men in the little community of 300 thought it would be a better joke to give them a vote or two.

The result—Stella has a woman mayor and all-woman city council. The mayor is a spinster, Norma Westcott. She opened the first meeting of the council using a rolling pin instead of a gavel.

Said the mayor: "We women believe the town has been needing new blood for a long time. The men have run the women as long as we've had a town. Now it's their turn to jump when we say 'frog!'"

The first major problem that faced the new administration was the appointment of a dog catcher—a woman in an administrative capacity and a man as her assistant to do the work.

### Top Kick's Re-Enlistment Vetoed By Son

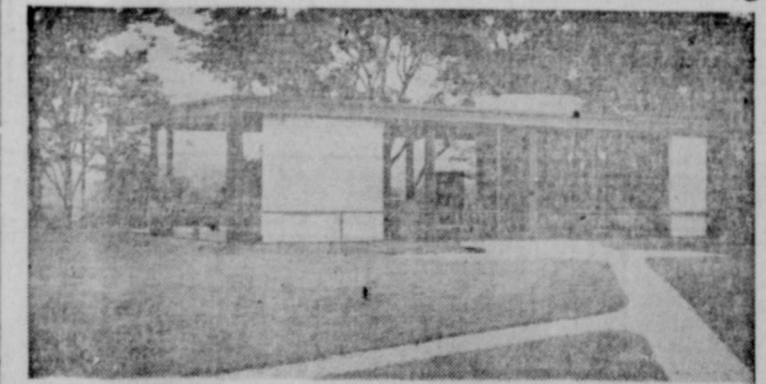

### Glass Walls For A New Mode Of Living



NEW CANAAN, CONN.—Here's a house designed to bring the outdoors indoors. It sits on the edge of a grassy plateau overlooking the gently rolling hills of Connecticut and was designed by Philip C. Johnson, Director, Dept. of Architecture, Museum of Modern Art. The four walls are polished Pittsburgh plate glass supported by thin steel beams, the floor is polished brick, it has an acoustical ceiling and is warmed by radiant heating. As you're used to thinking of it, this house is not a complete dwelling, just a single unit of an entire living space. Other units are a large lawn or "floor", a contrasting brick guest house and a display of sculpture outside. The entire tree-bordered grass-covered piece of ground binds them together. Also, it's not a house in the conventional manner, but rather a single large room. Except for the bathroom it has no inner partitions. The bathroom and fireplace are back-to-back in a large floor-matching brick cylinder. Furniture is positioned to create the illusion of different parts of the house. For privacy, and to keep the sun's rays out, pandanus drape-like cloth hung from metal tracks in the ceiling can be moved to partially or completely cover the walls.
