Lightning Storm Damage To S. W. P. S. Co. System

Peas Can Be Preserved By Freezing for Winter Use

Texas homemakers are urged to take advantage of the plentiful supplies of black eye and other varieties of peas such as cream and purple hull that are now available, and to preserve a supply for use this winter. They are best frozen; are a nutritious food and will add variety to your meals for the year, says Jimmie Harris, associate extension food nutrition specialist of Texas A. and M. College.

Homemakers should remember that freezing does not improve the quality of a product and if you want a quality product, she says, you must very carefully select the peas to be frozen. The peas should be tender and at the right stage for good eating. It is best to harvest them early in the morning before they absorb heat from the sun.

Once they have been picked, the preparation and processing for freezing should not be delayed. The peas should be washed, shelled or cut as you would prepare them for eating or canning. Next they should be scalded in boiling water.

She suggests that you use a large enamelware, aluminum or stainless steel kettle for the scalding operation. It should contain about one gallon of boiling water and only about one pound of the prepared peas should be placed in the kettle at one time. It is best to use a wire basket or a mesh cheese cloth bag for holding the peas while they are in the boiling water. After the peas are scalded in the kettle, replace the cover and keep the heat on high so that the water will continue to boil and don't she cautions, attempt to scald large amounts of peas because the water will be boiled too much. Start timing as soon as the peas are immersed in the boiling water and for small amounts containing a high percentage of snaps, scald for three minutes. Shelled green peas should be scalded for four minutes, she says. Place the scalded black eye peas immediately in running cold water in a container of ice water. This chilling stops any further cooking and prevents loss of quality, she adds. From two to three minutes will be required to cool the peas and next they should be drained and packed in air-tight, moisture-vapor-proof containers. Seal the containers immediately. Black eye peas which have been carefully selected, properly prepared and frozen may be stored in the freezer or locker box and will retain their quality for one year, says Miss Harris.

Homemakers should remember that frozen black eye or other peas will require only about one-half the cooking time of fresh peas. Here are suggestions from Miss Harris on cooking frozen peas. Bring one-half cup of salted water to a boil and add to one pint of frozen peas and don't thaw the peas before cooking. Boil them, she says, from eight to 15 minutes and season as you would fresh peas.

A lightning storm Tuesday night at 8:18 P. M. struck the main 66,000 volt buss at the Tuco Plant near Abernathy, blowing out the breaker on the Littlefield line and also causing two more major burned out faults in the Tuco station.

This lightning created a high voltage condition of approximately 300,000 volts, which followed along the 115,000 line to the Denver City plant, there knocking out the station power transformer. The lightning continuing through the Denver City plant along the transmission line to the Carlsbad, New Mexico plant. This surge completely destroyed the large 25,000 KVA transformer there.

This quick operation put out of service three generating plants and the south portion of the 115,000 volt transmission line.

At 8:26 p. m. Tuco station closed in and was able to hold the load for eighteen (18) minutes, but because of low voltage and low frequency the second interruption was caused. At 8:40 p. m. the Amarillo and Borger generating stations were overloaded and it was necessary that they clear the lines.

At 9:00 p. m. the Denver City transformer trouble was found and isolated. At 9:15 p. m. transformer troubles at Carlsbad were also determined and isolated from the system.

At 9:30 p. m. the Tuco station was back in service and the entire system loads were put back into service at 9:50 p. m.

The company report they will have very little salvage in the entire loss.

Although the storm caused interruption on the entire S. W. P. S. Co. system and eighteen (18) REA systems, the damages in no way caused a shortage of power for the Panhandle of Texas and Eastern New Mexico.

MOURNING DOVES - OPEN SEASON - NORTH ZONE: Sept. 1 to Oct. 15, both days inclusive. Shooting hours, one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

SOUTH ZONE: Oct. 29 to Dec. 3, both days inclusive, except in Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Dimmit, LaSalle, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kenedy and Willacy counties where mourning doves may be hunted only on Sept. 15, 17, and 19, from 4 p. m. until sunset, and from Oct. 29 to Nov. 30, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

BAG LIMIT: Not more than 10 per day and not more than 10 in possession.

McMULLEN COUNTY: State law Nov. 1 to Dec. 15. Federal law, Oct. 20 to Dec. 3

GAME SANCTUARY

Unlawful to take whitewings or chachalaca south of U. S. Highway 83, formerly State Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas marked on the map as "GAME SANCTUARY."

No hunting permitted in game refuges and game preserves.

Shotguns must be permanently plugged to three shell capacity.

Shotguns may not be larger than 10 gauge.

A hunter may not have more than 10 a day of either or both species (Whitewings or mourning doves) in the aggregate.

OPEN SEASON: Sept. 15, 17, and 19, inclusive, only in area indicated.

SHOOTING HOURS: 4 p. m. to sunset.

BAG LIMIT: Not more than 10 per day and not more than 10 in possession.

Four Point Cotton Ginning Program Is Being Promoted

A four point program for improving cotton ginning is now being promoted on a belt-wide basis, according to F. E. Lichte, extension cotton gin specialist.

This program was initiated because of complaints received from the spinners about the spinning qualities of the 1949 cotton crop.

Lichte says that the first point in the program is to maintain uniform loose rolls. In addition to giving better grades of cotton and higher income for the producer, this practice reduces the power cost of ginning.

The overflow should be kept to a minimum. A by-pass on ginning machinery allows overflow cotton to be ginned without the redrying and recleaning which often cause two-sided bales and damage to the cotton fiber.

If valves and by-passes are installed in the ginning machinery, a selection of machines is possible, and only the necessary equipment must be used. Rough or machine-harvested cotton may require the use of 12 to 22 cleaning cylinders plus extractors. Clean hand-picked cotton should be handled carefully and with less equipment.

Only enough drying should be used to insure smooth ginning. Green, damp or dew-laden cotton requires drying only for smooth preparation. Mid-season trashy or machine-harvested cottons may require extra drying for better cleaning. Late-season harvested, weather-damaged cotton can stand more drying than earlier premium cottons. Net values from drying should be measured in terms of both grade benefits and weight losses.

Lichte says that practically

every ginder in Texas will be contacted in regard to this program through scheduled meetings of district cotton ginners' associations.

He states that planning, maintenance, and repair plus good operation on the part of the ginners should result in better prepared cotton for the spinner and higher grades for the producer.

Inventions Speed Labor in Today's Modern Offices

Today's business employee lives in a mechanized mecca.

An automatic letter-opener opens the morning mail. The employer calls his secretary on the interoffice communications system. She takes dictation on her stenotype machine, transcribes it on her typewriter, and a special machine automatically seals and stamps the envelope. When she catches up with her work, she reaches for the voice recorder for assignments dictated some hours earlier by her employer.

When she is out to lunch, an electric secretary answers the phone, reels off a recorded message and gives the caller 30 seconds to leave his own recorded message, then tells him to call again if he needs more recording time.

The accounting office clips up a neat and accurate column of figures on the automatic computing machines and makes entries with the speedy accounting machines—more than 100 entries per minute. By a new electronic computer, complex mathematical problems are worked out 5,000 times faster than the human mind could solve them.

Laborious filing methods are replaced by a microfilm system, punch-card files, or the revolving wheel file. Unnamed devices speed work in every conceivable phase of business.

How did it all start? They wouldn't believe it 75 years ago. No machine invented could think—much less add! But a young bank clerk in Auburn, N. Y., dreamed of the machine that would free him of his high stool and relieve his aching eyes and fingers of endless hours of copying and computing figures.

2,4-D Weed-Killer Causing Damage by Drift to Cotton

Researchers have found that a single ounce of 2,4-D weed killer is enough to possibly cause serious damage to as many as 35 acres of cotton.

The national cotton council is issuing this warning after receiving a number of complaints of cotton being damaged by 2,4-D drifting on to cotton during its application to other crops.

Application of insecticides and other chemicals with equipment that has been used to apply 2,4-D also has been responsible for damage to cotton. The council's production and marketing division warns that even a small amount of 2,4-D remaining in a sprayer or container is enough to seriously injure susceptible crops.

If it is necessary to use the same equipment on susceptible crops that has been used previously to apply 2,4-D, machines should be cleaned thoroughly with a solution of household ammonia or a mixture of activated charcoal.

Rinse the sprayer thoroughly with water. Prepare a one per cent solution of household ammonia, using two teaspoons of ammonia to each quart of water. Fill the sprayer and leave the solution in the tank, booms and hoses from 12 to 24 hours. Drain and rinse thoroughly with water. Cleaning with commercial mixtures of activated charcoal is much quicker but more expensive.

Food Requirements Vary

According to a Twentieth Century Fund report those engaged in very active physical work require much more energy-producing food such as potatoes, flour, legumes, meat, fats and sugars than do sedentary or moderately active workers. They, however, require larger quantities of the leafy, green and yellow vegetables and the same amount of protective foods such as milk, eggs, and citrus fruits. Both the active workers, who become physically tired, and the sedentary workers, who become fatigued by the mental strain and emotional tension of their work, are alike in their need of plenty of restful sleep to restore spent energy and make them fit for the next day.

Weight of Gold

The troy ounce is the unit in weighing gold. An ounce of fine gold means an ounce of pure gold. In 1934 the President proclaimed the United States gold dollar to be 15 5/21 grains of gold, nine-tenths fine, which is equivalent to \$35 per fine troy ounce. The former value of gold was \$20.67 per fine ounce, based on the dollar of 25.8 grains of gold nine-tenths fine. Weighings are made in troy ounces and decimals thereof. Jewelers use the penny-weight and grain. The troy pound never is used.

Telling Age By Teeth

An individual's age can be told within three to four years by examination of a single tooth, according to a newly-devised system. For the first time, a mathematical formula to detect the age of a person by his teeth has been worked out by Dr. Gosta Gustafson, of the state dental department of Malmo, Sweden, who reported results of a hitherto unknown accuracy. Under Dr. Gustafson's formula, age can be determined within 3.6 years, as contrasted with errors up to 32 years in methods in longtime use.

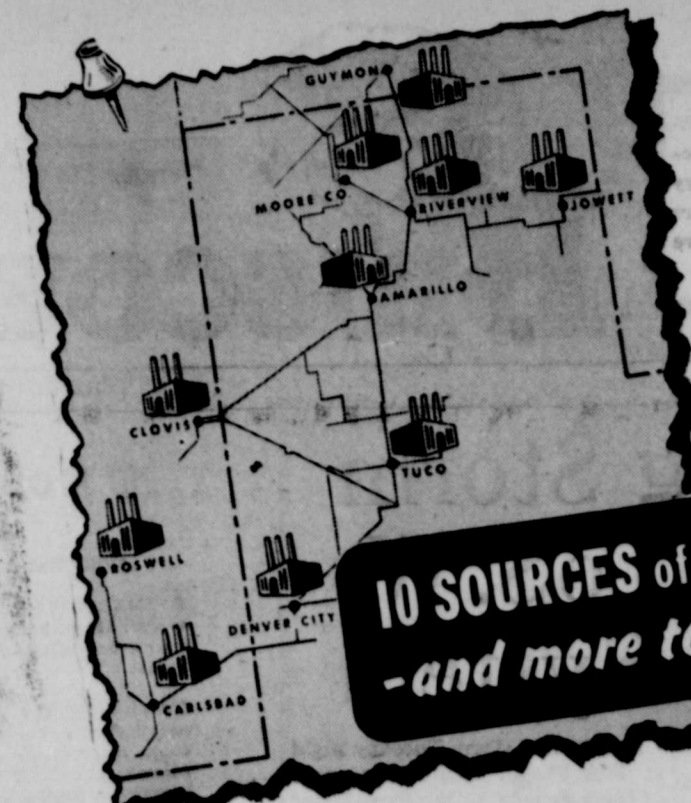

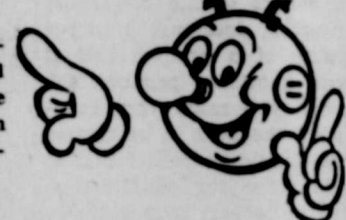

Baltimore School, Babe Ruth's Home, Closed to Juveniles

BALTIMORE, Md.—For 84 years—since 1866—St. Mary's Industrial school in Baltimore carried on the work of turning many juvenile delinquents into solid citizens. Now it has closed its doors.

Among its products were two famous men—the late Babe Ruth and Al Jolson.

Babe Ruth entered the school when he was seven because his father, a saloon keeper, thought his environment around his place wasn't too good. Young Ruth was listed as an incorrigible, but in later years you could never get the monks at the school to agree that he was.

He stayed there until he was 18. The school must have made an impression on the future home run king. Father Albert, who knew him at the school, said Ruth once told him, when he was at the height of his glory: "We're all in life to do good. And I hope that when I die I will have lived so I can help the boys of America to live straighter and cleaner lives."

And there's Jolson. He visited the school last September for the first time in about 50 years.

"That's the yard where I used to play," the singer and actor said. "When was that? About the time of the Spanish-American war."

"I was a bad boy then, but not too bad. I had run away from home. I gave my brother's name, because he was supposed to be the black sheep of the family. After a few months my parents came from Washington and took me home."

President's Fancy Tie Puzzles Newspapermen

ST. LOUIS, Mo.—Two St. Louis newspapermen were trying to decide just what pattern appeared on one of President Truman's ties.

"What's wrong, boys?" the President asked.

They told him. Mr. Truman looked down at the design as if seeing the tie for the first time, and said: "I don't know what it is—swans or something, I guess."

Now the newspapermen are wondering if Mrs. Truman picks the President's ties for him.

74-Year-Old Marine Takes Rifle Firing Test

QUANTICO, Va.—Usually it's the old salts in the Marine Corps who teach young leathernecks how to shoot with the startling accuracy for which the Marines are noted, but that situation was reversed recently when 74-year-old Master Sergeant Harry D. Bartley, of Philadelphia, reported to the rifle range along with many younger men to fire the carbine for annual re-qualification. His coach was a 20-year-old private.

Bartley, whose uniform sleeve is covered with bright red hashmarks representing 42 years of service, could have stopped firing the weapons courses when he was 35, but he chose to fire again this year. He has more straight enlisted time in the military service than any member of the Marine Corps.

Cleveland Man Invents Traffic Light 36 Years Ago

CLEVELAND, O.—August 5 will be the 36th birthday anniversary of the traffic light—that instrument that has given many Americans high blood pressure.

According to the Cleveland Automobile Club, on that day James B. Hoge hung up the first traffic light at a now bustling east-side intersection in Cleveland.

Hoge's first signal was hand operated by a policeman stationed at the corner, who would ring a bell and turn the light on whenever the nearby firehouse received a call.

The signal had full approval of the chamber of commerce and a few months later a second set was installed. However, Hoge's success was cut short when the lights were declared unnecessary and impractical.

Retired Officer Says Stalin Had Heart Attack

SALEM, Mass.—Col. Roland W. Estey, retired, a former office of strategic services officer, has reported that Premier Stalin suffered a heart attack in June while on a plane flight.

The former officer said he received the news in a letter from Europe and that the information had been turned over to our intelligence agency.

According to Estey, Stalin was enroute for a conference in the town of Chita, about 100 miles north of the Chinese border.

The attack apparently was of such a nature, Estey said, that it seemed wise to return him to Moscow and permit his impersonator to proceed on the trip.

The letter also contained this message, Estey said: "Watch Forosa or Chosen before the first of July". Chosen is another name for Korea.

Estey said his friend had the information six days before the aggression, leading to the belief the communists in North Korea had pumped the gun.

Starving Babies Given Living Chance by Surgery

In the last ten years, modern surgery has learned techniques that give a chance for life to at least half the babies born without a tube between throat and stomach, all of whom die before that time.

In most of the little patients, the stomach was connected to the trachea or windpipe, which normally leads to the lungs instead of the esophagus. The lower part of the esophagus leading to the stomach was missing.

Ten years ago, all these cases were considered inoperable and all died. Today, with present surgical techniques, more than half are operable and the mortality is being steadily reduced. Of this series 50 per cent of the operable cases survived and, while we are not content with the mortality by any means, we take some pride in the steadily dropping mortality.

The important element in saving the baby's life is speedy recognition of the condition. With access to the stomach impossible, the baby cannot be fed and will quickly starve unless proper intravenous feeding measures are started immediately. The physician who first sees the baby must diagnose the condition in a few hours. Moreover, the throat of the baby is likely to fill up because they cannot swallow anything and they may choke to death. Also, he added, many are premature, in fact, all the patients under five pounds at birth died. They are especially vulnerable to infection.

Steel Technicians Using Marvelous New Instruments

An instrument that can determine the hardness of a single crystal of steel is one of numerous new devices being used by steel company technicians in their widely varied activities.

Known as the "microhardness tester," the instrument is capable of taking hardness readings at three spots within the width of a human hair.

The technicians in steel are also now using autoradiograms, which are patterns produced on photographic plates by the action of radioactive elements, to supplement microscopic studies. The Geiger counter, famed for its ability to detect uranium and other radioactive substances, has been adapted to a quick, accurate way of analyzing steel.

Another new instrument is the "recording torque magnetometer." It measures the ability of steel to stretch uniformly under the action of dies.

High speed color photography has been employed to study the physical reactions inside the hearth of a blast furnace. The pictures, taken at a speed of 3,000 frames a second, show the travel of incandescent particles of raw materials which are estimated to be moving at a speed of 135 miles an hour.

Cattle Disease Test

Accuracy of 90 percent has been reported for a test that singles out cattle which are carriers of anaplasmosis. It is called a complement-fixation test and is regarded as a valuable means of preventing the spread of this malaria-like disease.

Cattle which recover from anaplasmosis remain carriers and serve as a springboard or reservoir from which the disease may spread to healthy animals. Helping in its spread are biting insects of several kinds. Although heaviest anaplasmosis losses have occurred in the South and Southwest, cases may appear anywhere, particularly if cattle are shipped in from infected areas. This was demonstrated recently in a Michigan dairy herd. The disease was diagnosed for the first time in native cattle of that state and linked with animals brought in from the Southwest.

Pinkeye in Cattle

Farmers and veterinarians often have battled outbreaks of pinkeye in cattle herds with apparent success, only to have the disease bob up again at a later date. A possible explanation for this is that a germ commonly involved in this infection will persist in the eyes of cattle even after they recover from an attack. The recovered animals thereby become carriers, spreading the germs when conditions become favorable for another outbreak. This also may explain how newly purchased animals which seem to be perfectly healthy can introduce pinkeye into a herd previously free of the disease.

Reducing Diet of Dogs

Science is putting overweight dogs on a reducing diet. The purpose is not stylish canine figures, but health. The American Veterinary Medical association explains that excess poundage may be just as dangerous to a dog as it is to a human being. But finding a formula which would reduce weight yet give the dog adequate nutrition was long sought by research veterinarians, the A.V.M.A. says. Now, not only has a satisfactory reducing diet been worked out, but so have special prescription diets for dogs suffering from kidney and intestinal diseases. One even has been devised for expectant canine mothers.

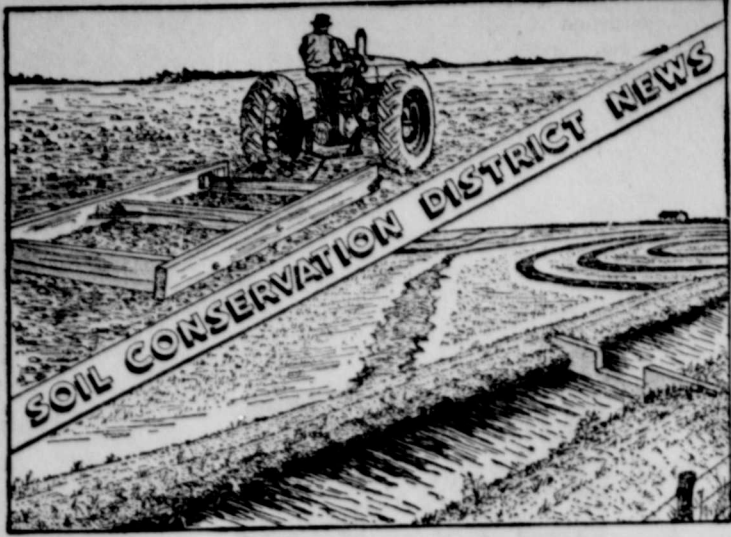

The board of supervisors of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District are convinced that the soil conservation measures installed by farmers working with the district saved many thousands of tons of soil during the heavy rains in July, according to Earl Cantwell, chairman of the board. Earl has an irrigated farm 4 1-2 miles south of Rock Creek. Due to his management practices and the bench levelling of the steeper slopes, the run-off was small and there was practically no soil loss.

Some of the soil conservation structures such as terraces and diversions were damaged during the heavy rains. Even where this damage occurred, the actual soil loss was much less than on unprotected fields. The kind of rains that fell during July could easily remove as much as one-half inch of topsoil from an unprotected, sloping field. There was little if

any, soil loss on fields protected by crop residues and terraces except in those cases where the terraces broke. Even where terraces broke, the total soil loss was many times less than it was on unprotected fields. The terraces and crop residue protected all of the field except small areas below the breaks. The loss from these areas was very small when considered for the field as a whole. Mr. Gregson, operator on W. A. Graham's land, says that he is confident the damage on that farm would have been much more serious had the land not been terraced, even though the terraces broke rather badly. Other farmers in that area have similar opinions about the situation.

Cantwell stated that the supervisors were not surprised that some of the terraces had breaks in them considering the rate and intensity of rainfall during July.

Many of the farmers in the area around Quitaque estimate that between 20 and 30 inches of rain fell between July 28 and July 31. A lot of the rainfall came in heavy downpours, much faster than it could be taken up by the soil. The terraces recommended by the district are designed to handle approximately 3 inches of run-off in a few hours. Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the district have evidence that some of the rains produced more than 3 inches of run-off. The technicians have measured the rate that the soils will take water. They have found that on the average the hardlands of the district will take water at the rate of a little more than one-half inch per hour. The average for the mixed sandy lands was found to be one and seven-tenths inches per hour. During some of the July storms it is estimated that as much as five and one-half inches of rain fell in less than two hours. This meant that the amount of run-off water was greater than three inches. It was this type of storm that caused some of the terraces to break.

Some damage to terraces was caused by water flowing across the fields from outside sources. In many cases the rains were so heavy that the runoff could not be carried by the natural water courses. The water courses overflowed and added extra water behind terraces already nearly filled. This extra load was more than the terraces could handle.

The rains pointed out the need for farmers to keep their terraces up to proper size at all times. In several cases the terraces had been worked down in regular farming operations and were not large enough to handle even a normal rain. If terraces are to work right they must be worked up at least

once a season. This can be done very satisfactorily by plowing to the terrace to replace the soil worked down in farming operations.

At a rain gage 4 miles east and 7 miles south of Silvertown, five and one-half inches of rain was measured the night of June 28. Farmers in the area are of the opinion that most of this rain fell in one hour. A rain of that intensity is not expected to occur more than once in 100 years. Mr. Chappell said the rain was accompanied by high winds. Mr. Chappell had several breaks in his terraces due to the storm, but is doing a good job of repairing and maintaining them.

Mr. Cantwell stated that the supervisors of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District are encouraging all farmers or district co-operators repair their terrace breaks as soon as possible. Cantwell pointed out that if repairs are not made at once, there will be additional erosion on the fields below the breaks each time it rains. The longer the job is delayed, the greater the repair cost will be.

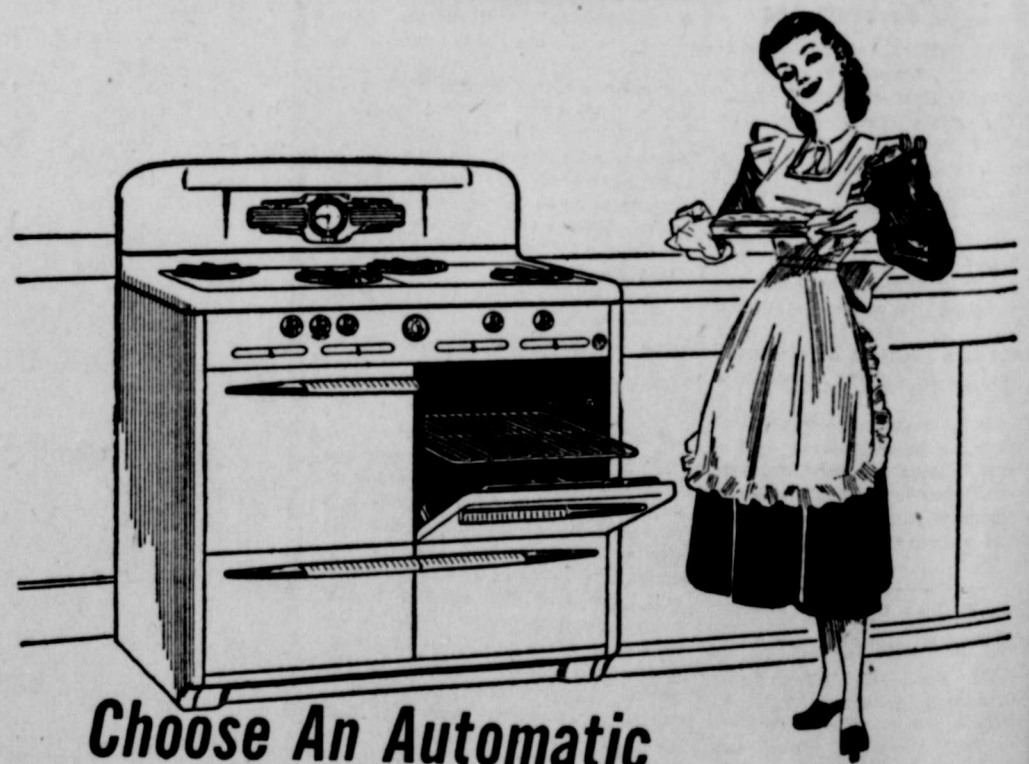

Sacred Tibetan Volumes Displayed at Yale Library

Eighteen leather-covered cases containing a collection of rare and sacred Tibetan books arrived at Yale university library some time ago, after a six-months' journey by pack train and steamer.

The 99 volumes within the hand made crates make up Tibet's holy "Kagyur." The collection was presented to Yale by His Holiness the 14th Dalai Lama, 14-year-old ruler of that remote land.

The "Kagyur"—or "Kanjur" as it is known to American scholars—contains almost 1,100 separate works attributed to the Buddha and is immensely valuable to Sanskrit scholars because of its great accuracy.

Each one of the 99 volumes was wrapped in orange cloth, symbolic of Tibetan reverence. The books measure two feet long by six inches wide and contain between 300 and 400 loose-leaf pages, block printed on both sides and held together by boards.

The books were placed in wooden crates and then the skins of yaks—Tibetan oxen—were bound around the crates, stretched tightly and sewn together with rawhide. The skins protected the books from the elements.

A pack train of small Tibetan horses carried the collection from Lhasa, capital of Tibet, across a 1,000-mile mountain route to New Delhi, India. The crates were then sent to Calcutta and finally shipped by freighter to the United States.

The newly-acquired Yale collection is a Lhasa edition, which exists in this country only at Harvard university. It was first printed in the reign of the 13th Dalai Lama, who was enthroned in 1693 and died about 1933.

Dreary Barn May Lead To Pneumonia for Calf

Reports in veterinary medical journals indicate that calf pneumonia is becoming more prevalent, especially on diversified farms and in small herds where not enough attention is paid to scientific housing. Generally, it strikes calves under six months old, the most susceptible age being three to eight weeks. As calves grow older, they become more resistant to the disease and even if they happen to contract it, their chances of recovery are better.

In human beings, pneumonia is likely to strike when the body is in a weakened condition, such as after a bad cold or after influenza. The same applies to calves, particularly if they are neglected when they have digestive disturbances or if a seemingly mild case of "sniffles" is allowed to go on unchecked. Susceptibility to pneumonia is even greater when, in addition to such disturbances, the calf is inherently weak—due to improper nutrition of the cow during pregnancy.

Under such conditions pneumonia can easily gain a foothold. Chilling or exposure to dampness and filth may be the opening for a serious attack. If the calf is housed in a dark, gloomy pen, with little or no exposure to the sun's rays, its powers of resistance are lowered still further.

Viruses Studied

Key to victory over many viruses that now cripple and kill domestic animals may soon be found with the aid of the electron microscope. Viruses, which are disease-producing agents too small to be seen under most laboratory instruments, can now be studied under electron microscopes that magnify objects 60,000 to 70,000 or more times. According to veterinary medical reports, the viruses of equine infectious anemia, Newcastle disease of poultry, and foot-and-mouth disease recently have been photographed through these powerful magnifiers. Information gleaned from a study of the photographs is expected to guide future animal disease research.

To Extend Life of Glazing

Before any glazing is started, on either wood or steel sash, a good priming paint should be applied. The use of shellac and varnish as primers should be avoided because glazing will not stick to them. A metal primer that will both retard corrosion and provide a rough surface should be applied to all steel sash before glazing materials to insure a long-lasting bond between metal and glazing material. The priming coat should be allowed to dry thoroughly before glazing material is applied. The glazed sash should be painted very soon afterward to extend the life of the glazing job.

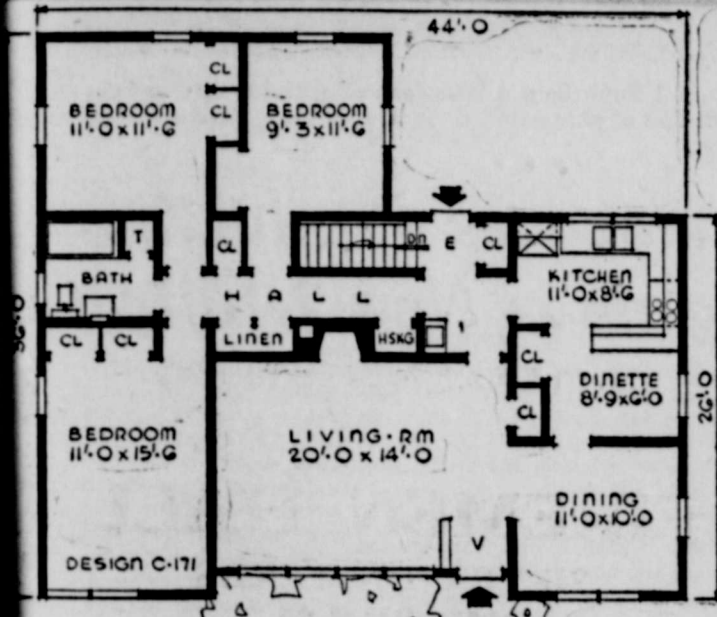

A Few Simple Rules On How to Keep Water Supply Safe

A few simple rules, a few checks, and probably a little work will assure a safe supply of water for the farm home at very little expense, says W. S. Allen, extension agriculture engineer—buildings of Texas A. and M. College.

To be safe, Allen warns, water must be protected from contamination by dust, ground water, bugs and animals. He says that it doesn't matter what the source of water is — stock pond, well, a spring, or a cistern—if it isn't properly protected, it may be dangerous to the health of the family.

He says that pit privies, septic tanks, barn lots and manure piles should be at least 100 feet away and down the hill from the well, and the septic tank disposal field should be at least 150 feet away from the cistern or well.

He cautions that barn lots and septic tank disposal fields should not be laid out where they will drain toward a stock tank that is the source of water for the household. Surface privies are often a dangerous source of contamination, and Allen recommends that they be replaced by sanitary pit privies, or even better with properly constructed septic tank systems.

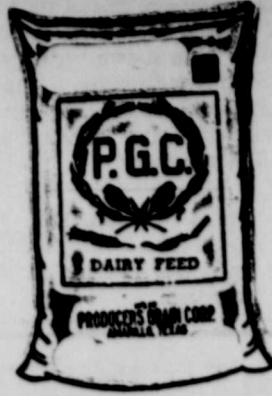
Giving general precautions to insure the safety of water in a well or cistern, Allen advises making sure that the cover over the well or cistern is dust tight, rodent proof, and insect proof. The well should be lined for about 19 or 15 feet down from the top with some impervious material like concrete to prevent surface water from leaking in.

A good insurance measure to determine the safety of the farm water supply is to take a sample of the water and send it to the State Health Department for a bacteriological analysis. However, the well must be chlorinated before the sample is taken, and a specially sterilized bottle must be used. A bottle and specific instructions for taking the sample can be obtained by writing to the State Health Department, Austin, Texas or from the local county health unit.

When surface tanks are used for the home water supply, they should be fenced off from livestock. For watering the stock, Allen recommends the use of a trough set below the tank level with a pipe leading from the tank. This setup protects the water for household use and provides cleaner drinking water for the livestock.

If the tank is filled with silt, the muddy water can be cleared up by using a commercial filter. Plans for making a homemade filter can be obtained by writing to the Agricultural Engineering Department, Texas A. and M. College.

Attitude Toward Divorce Changing Fast in America

The American attitude toward divorce has changed from "severe condemnation" to acceptance as "perhaps inevitable and even necessary," according to a Yale University sociologist.

"A high divorce rate," John Sirjamaki declares, "is logically necessary when marriages are based on individualist and erotic criteria."

"With our emphasis upon personality attraction and romance in selection of marriage partners, we must expect many couples to discover themselves seriously mismatched psychologically and unable to live tractably with each other. When couples frustrate each other in the basic purposes of marriage, they very quickly fall out of love and have to be freed from unhappy or intolerable marriages."

The Yale sociologist predicts that America's divorce rate will remain high. Although he says that now "divorce seems pretty much a part of our way of family life," Mr. Sirjamaki cites the "bumper crop" of babies during this past decade, social legislation in housing, employment, urban redesign and social welfare as "good signs on the horizon."

Such stabilizing action, he states, is "increasingly important in keeping families intact." In addition, Mr. Sirjamaki praises the new emphasis on intelligent discussion of and education in marriage and family problems. "All of these can affect the divorce rate: it is amenable to rational control."

In 1946, Mr. Sirjamaki says, the U.S. reached a peak with 610,000 divorces, roughly one failure in every three marriages. He estimated that at present one of every four to five marriages results in divorce. Similar trends in divorce are found in virtually every European society.

Science Puts New Materials Into Products, Furniture

Out of the laboratories and into new furniture!

Many recent developments of science are adding new color and life to products and furniture for the home. Homemakers shopping for new furnishings may wish to look for these new features.

At least one manufacturer is using steel framing in upholstered furniture, and wide use is being made of foam rubber. Some pieces of furniture, such as dressers and chests, are being made in sections. Two or more sections can be placed together to make as large a piece of furniture as you need.

Mahogany, walnut, oak and maple remain among the popular woods, but new finishes are being used on some pieces. These finishes are attractive, and most seem to be durable.

In dinettes, wide use is being made of square chrome tubing. Some chairs are being made larger and fuller. Wood dinette tables are appearing with plastic tops that resist all sorts of damage short of using an axe.

Fabric prices will go higher. More abstract patterns are coming on the market. Multi-colored patterned plastic material has been introduced. There is also an increased supply of nylon upholstery material, which is easy to clean and may make pastel upholstery more practical than it has been.

Penicillin for Cows

Penicillin, used for treating cows with mastitis, can also affect the processing of butterfat and cottage cheese. Farmers using penicillin for mastitis should hold out milk from treated cows for two or three days following treatment. By that time, effects of the penicillin usually are gone. Extremely small amounts of penicillin in milk will prevent proper acid development. Treatment of one quarter of one cow's udder may result in trouble at the dairy plant even though the milk may be mixed with that from 20 cows. It will be better business to dump a few pails of milk than to risk having a whole can rejected upon delivery.

Refrigerator "Takes It"

The finish on a refrigerator is subjected to a great variety of severe conditions. Its outer surface is in contact with a hot, steamy kitchen, while the inner one is many degrees lower. The finish must also resist the inevitable hazards of bumps from milk bottles, smears of grease, spills of soup or fruit juices, or energetic scrubbing with alkaline cleaners. The excellent finishes produced for refrigerator surfaces these days takes such treatment without chipping or showing the slightest variation from gleaming whiteness.

Ironing Cord

Just don't think the length of your ironing cord isn't important. The location of the electric outlet which you use for ironing will determine the length which will be most convenient, says O. J. Trenary, agricultural engineer. Oregon studies show that a cord five and a half feet long is needed when the outlet is on the wall faced by the work, and 36 inches above the board, but that a six foot cord is needed for an outlet on a side wall. This applies to a standard size board which measures 54 by 14 inches.

White House Reinforced With Steel Skeleton

WASHINGTON—One day during the Christmas holidays, 1947, the 210-pound butler at the White House walked across the second floor study and produced an "over the waves" sensation and tinkling of the chandelier in the Blue room directly below.

That was the first indication that old age was creeping up on the historic structure and it was time to call in the experts.

A problem presented itself. To build a strong modern structure within the walls of the old which was first occupied by John and Abigail Adams in 1800. There were proposals to tear down the entire building and put up a brand new, more modern home for the president.

But the people of the country would not stand for this and the decision was made to spend 5.4 million dollars on rebuilding within the old shell.

Delicate Operation
The work of tearing down the interior is finally finished and the job of rebuilding has begun. The reconstruction job should be finished sometime in October 1951.

Preserving the outer wall of the White House has been a delicate operation. To keep the stone outer wall and the roof it has been necessary to plan a strong steel frame, with new inner walls and floors. Workmen dug 25 feet below the surface to find a solid gravel footing and then built 120 concrete piers to support the outer wall.

Steel H columns resting on separate footings will support the floor beams and the base of the roof trusses. Heavy anchor bars will tie the steel columns to the stone wall. When this job is done the president's butler, no matter how heavy he is, will be unable to make the chandeliers tinkle merely by walking across the floor above.

New Features Added
Although there will be no changes made in the historical rooms, and they will have the same locations and appearances as before, the White House will not be put back together exactly as it was. The building will have three new features—a two level basement, a grand stairway and a modernized third floor.

The two story basement will provide the additional space since the height of the White House cannot be changed. There will be offices for a doctor and a dentist, and a room for a barber. The basement also will house a heating system and air conditioning machinery, and will provide needed storage space.

Most striking change will be the new grand stairway—a dignified, winding, open stairway from the second to the first floor. The old stairway was enclosed. In former days, when cabinet members and their wives marched down the stairs at formal receptions while the red coated marine band played the Blue Danube waltz, they would not be seen except at the bottom two steps.

The new third floor was an attic until 1927. Now this floor will have eight guest rooms with baths, all decorated in the same style as the second floor bedrooms.

Pilgrim's Progress Heads List of Most Boring Books

NEW YORK—The Columbia University Press held a poll to determine the 10 books readers considered the most boring and came up with some surprising answers.

Nearly all of the first ten were required reading in high school. Some still are. John Bunyan's "Pilgrim's Progress" took the doubtful honor of first place. These round out the first 10 in the unpopularity contest:

"Melville's 'Moby Dick', Milton's 'Paradise Lost', Spencer's 'Faerie Queen', Boswell's 'Life of Samuel Johnson', Richardson's 'Pamela', Eliot's 'Silas Marner', Scott's 'Ivanhoe', Cervantes' 'Don Quixote' and Goethe's 'Faust.'"

Shakespeare led the field with 17 of his 37 plays gaining mention at least once. However, only one, "As You Like It," ranked as high as 41st place.

The balloting cited works ranging from the Old Testament to Dr. Alfred C. Kinsey's "Sexual Behavior in the Human Male" as at once classic and tedious.

Russians Charge Americans Preparing Bacterial War

LONDON—The Soviet Union, just recovering from the famous potato bug scare, has charged that "American militarists are actively preparing bacterial war."

The United States was accused early this year of dropping potato bugs on East Germany in an effort to destroy the potato crop.

Now the Moscow radio charges: "At the beginning of 1946 eighteen Japanese specialists were sent to the United States—bacteriologists who handed over to their new masters all their material on the production of the bacterial weapon."

The broadcast said secret laboratories in Maryland and Utah were working on the weapon.

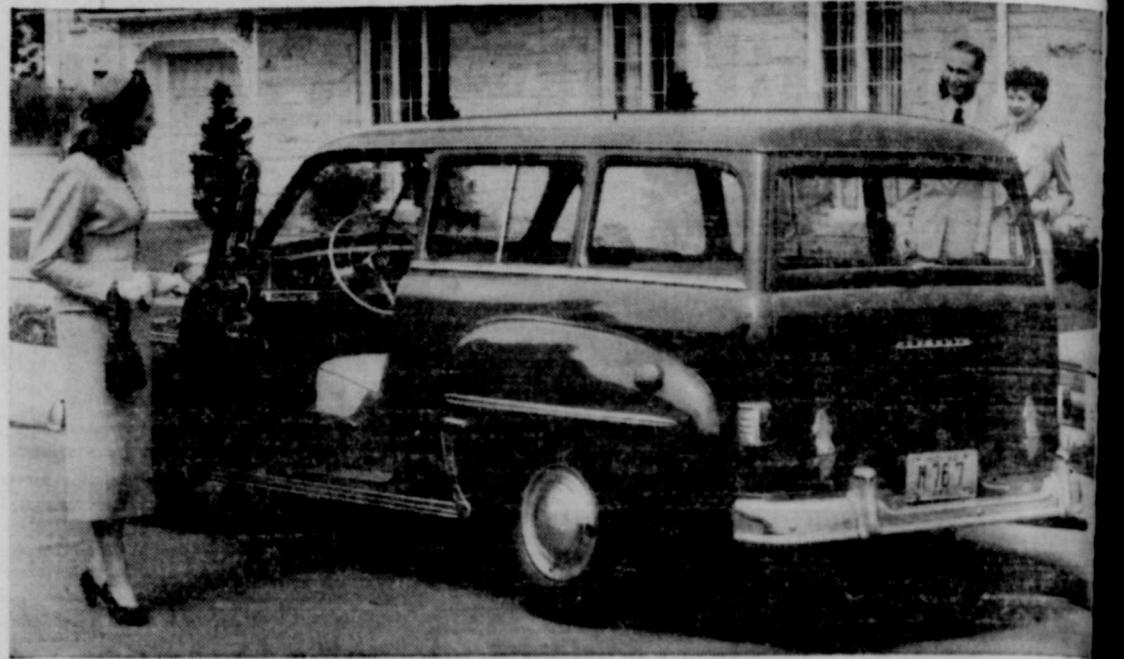
