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CAP ROCK SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT

Do you know that each year farm people suffer about 18,000 deaths and 1,500,000 disabling injuries? For this reason, President Truman has proclaimed July 22-28, 1951 as National Safety Week. The National Safety Council, which conceived National Farm Safety Week in 1944, is sponsored by the council and U. S. Department of Agriculture, in cooperation with the National Fire Protection Association, Farm Equipment Institute, Farmer's Union, the National Grange, and many other organizations interested in agriculture and farm life.

The Department of Agriculture has set up a calendar for this week which we feel should be passed on to the farmers:

Sunday: Safety is humanitarian.

Banish fatigue and tension of routine living.

Plan to avoid an over-crowded schedule.

Monday, Home Safety: Make stairs and steps safe.

Avoid slippery floors and insecure rugs.

Keep matches out of children's reach.

Tuesday, Livestock: Keep small children away from animals.

Check and repair livestock equipment.

Avoid handling the bull—use a safe bull pen.

Wednesday, Falls: Repair or discard broken, unsafe ladders.

Place guards at hazardous places.

Thursday, Highway Traffic: Remove trees and shrubs from farm driveway entrance.

Learn and obey proper signals

and signs on the highway.

Provide lights on all equipment moved after dark.

Friday, Machinery: Keep children away from machinery.

Do not oil or adjust machines in motion.

Saturday, Review Day: Check up on any farm and farm home hazards that might have been overlooked.

Find and eliminate at least two additional unsafe practices.

Let's not forget the 1951 theme: Adopt Safe Practices and enforce it throughout the year.

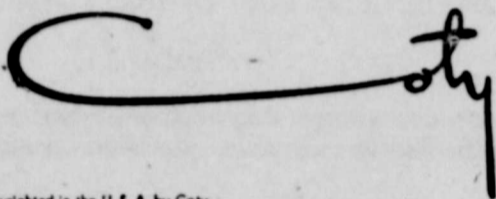

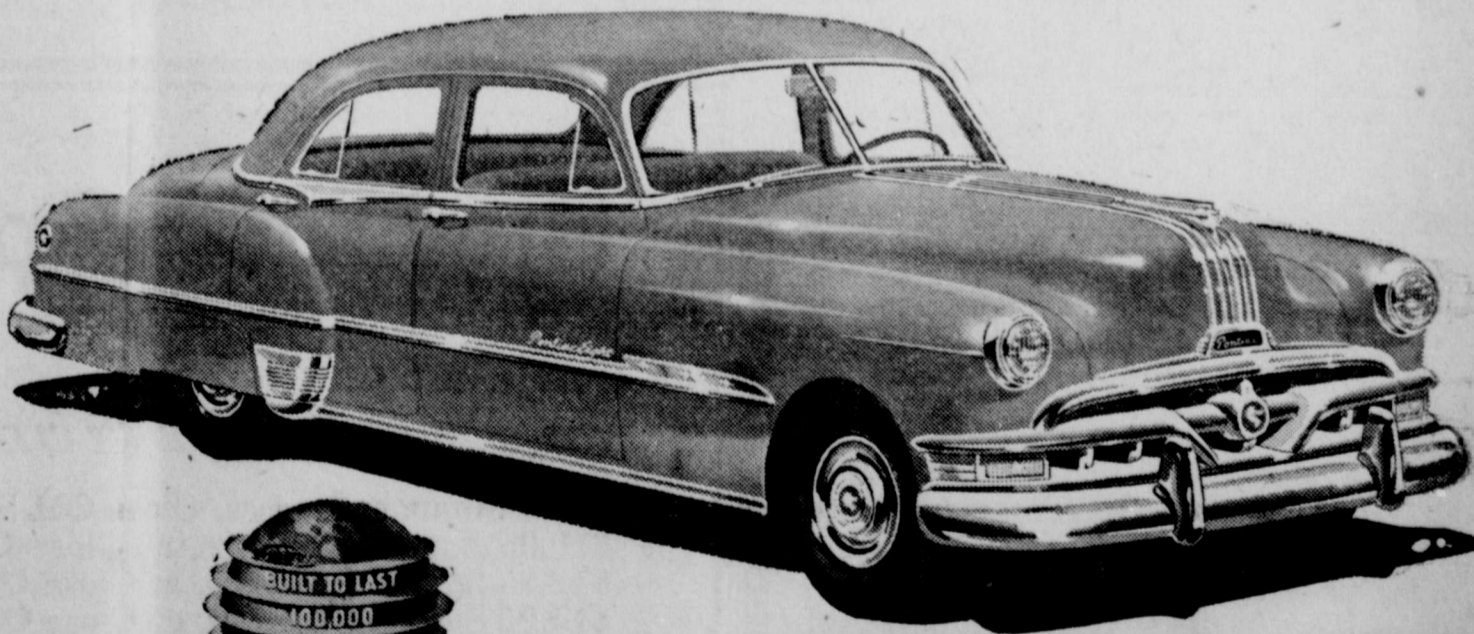

No Acreage Allotments, No Marketing Quotas on 1952 Crop Wheat

Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannon announced there will be no acreage allotments and no marketing quotas on 1952 crop wheat.

Department officials stated that the supply of wheat during the 1952-53 marketing year is expected to be below the quantity specified for marketing quotas in existing legislation, and that the continuing need for food in the uncertain world situation makes it advisable not to establish acreage allotments for the 1952 crop. Legislation requires that the determination as to marketing quotas be made before the beginning of the marketing year—July 1.

National Farm Safety Week—July 22-28, 1951

The President is again calling upon the Nation to observe National Farm Safety Week. The President's Proclamation designates the week of July 22-28 for this purpose.

Each year farm people suffer about 18,000 deaths and 1,500,000 disabling injuries due to accidents.

Defense needs also emphasize the importance of farm safety. Farm workers are now more highly skilled and replacement more difficult. There is little reserve manpower to meet the need for increased output. This year there will be some replacement of trained farm workers by

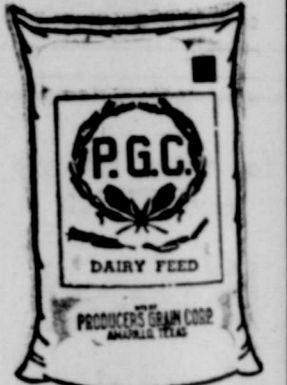
