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CAR REGISTRATION RULES TIGHTENED

Austin, July 30.—Texas motorists were served notice today that after Sept. 7 a manufacturer's certificate will be required before registration and certificate of title may be issued on new and unregistered automobiles.

The Texas Highway Department said the manufacturer's certificate is required under a new law enacted by the 52nd Legislature which takes effect Sept. 7. The measure will apply to all new and unregistered vehicles brought into Texas, the Highway Department said, whether by an individual, company or corporation, and whether imported from another state or a foreign country.

The department warns prospective purchasers of new automobiles in another state or country to insist upon being furnished a manufacturer's certificate by the dealer.

In states where it may be impossible to obtain a manufacturer's certificate, the department said the purchaser will have to secure license plates and pay fees required in that state, to show proper evidence of ownership.

Time to get Ready for P. M. A. Committee Elections

Although PMA Committeemen elections are several months away it is time for farmers of Briscoe County to begin thinking about the people they want to administer conservation, farm commodity loans, farm storage and other PMA Programs in 1952, says Spencer Long, chairman of the County PMA Committee.

He explained that every year elections are held in each agricultural community in the county. At these elections farmers vote for members of a local community committee and delegates to a county convention where a county committee is elected.

This year the committeemen elected last fall are administering the PMA Programs in the county. The chairman explains "How well the are doing that job is the concern of farmers who are participating in PMA Programs. Their performance should be the guide as to whether or not they should be re-elected."

Long, says that the administering of PMA programs by elected farmer committeemen is recognized as one of the pillars of strength of these programs. He suggests that to keep the program strong farmers must continue to maintain a strong interest in those they elect to administer these programs. "There must be a continuing effort to see that the most able farmers are elected to these community and county committees."

CAP ROCK SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT

July 24.—During the past week, terrace lines were laid out for Mr. Theo Geisler whose farm is located about three miles north of Quitaque. Mr. Geisler is a cooperater with the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District and his lines on this field were laid out by SCS technicians. Mr. Geisler's farm is located at the top of a long slope. Therefore, proper terracing of this farm is not only going to be a benefit to Mr. Geisler, but will benefit his neighbors down the slope as well. I say proper terracing because there are several factors that can make a terrace system inadequate.

Why do we terrace a field? Usually it is for erosion prevention and water conservation. Actually the water conservation contributes to a great extent towards the prevention of erosion. If we can get the water into the ground where it falls, most of our problems are taken care of.

Keeping in mind the purpose of terracing let's consider some factors making terraces inadequate. In the area below the Cap Rock one of the first factors is outside water coming across the farm. In some cases this may be controlled with a diversion terrace. In other cases a vegetated waterway may be necessary. However, the most satisfactory method is to treat the land from which the water is coming. Simply throwing up a terrace system without providing means to control the excess water will not prove satisfactory.

Another thing to take into consideration is the size of terraces to be built. To a certain point, the larger the terraces the more water they will handle. Until recently, the recommendations by the SCS for the district were based on a ten year frequency of rainfall. Due to conditions existing in the Quitaque area, recommendations for that area are now based on a hundred year frequency. This calls for larger terraces and of course the cost of construction is higher, but the farmer will actually be ahead to build this type. The larger terraces are easier to farm, they cut down on breakage and ditch cutting, they more adequately control erosion and they hold the water on the land for crop use.

On any terrace system adequate fills and proper outlets have to be provided to have a satisfactory system. The fills have to be large enough to prevent breakage. The outlets have to be protected against erosion. The easiest means of doing this is to block the ends of the terraces.

At least two other factors exert an influence on how well a terrace system functions. A good crop rotation including those crops that will open up the soil and allow the water to go into the soil rapidly is important. It helps prevent drowning of crops in the terrace channel, runoff of rainfall, washing and blowing to some extent, cuts down in maintenance cost and increases production. The last factor to consider is the maintenance of the terraces. Each year the terraces are cultivated, a certain amount of dirt is removed from the ridge. Unless this dirt is replaced, the terraces become smaller and smaller until they cannot adequately control the rainfall. There fore, we can see that a continual process of maintaining these terraces is necessary.

We have discussed some of the most important factors to consider in laying out and constructing a terrace system, but let's review them briefly. What needs to be taken into consideration?

1. Amount of excess water coming across the farm a provisions to control it.
 2. Adequate size.
 3. Adequate fills in terrace ridge.
 4. Proper outlets at end of terraces.
 5. Cropping system.
 6. Maintenance of terraces.

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JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT to Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts so as to provide the Legislature may authorize an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation.

IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"SECTION 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the majority of the voters residing therein."

SECTION 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, which election all ballots shall be printed thereon (or in counting voting machines, the machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;"

AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;"

Each voter shall mark out one said clause on the ballot, indicating the one expressing his preference on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

SECTION 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT to Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board is increased to One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds under certain conditions relating hereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for the election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows: "SECTION 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue bonds not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now prescribed by Senate Bill No. 29, Chapter 318 of the Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature (provided, that when the limitation of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) is used in said Senate Bill No. 29, the same shall hereafter be construed as One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000), or as said act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws that the Legislature may hereafter enact; provided,

however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"IN THE SALE of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board.

"THE VETERANS' LAND FUND shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"ALL LANDS thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"THE LANDS of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law.

"ALL MONEYS received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period ending December 1, 1959; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary during the period ending December 1, 1959, to pay principal of and interest on the bonds heretofore issued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, all moneys received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute obligations of the State under the Constitution of Texas. Of the total One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) of bonds herein authorized, the sum of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) has heretofore been issued; said bonds are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

SECTION 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: FOR the AMENDMENT to Section 49-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945."

THOSE OPPOSING said proposed Amendment shall write or

have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945."

IF IT APPEARS from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

SECTION 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section after Section 11 thereof to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for the necessary proclamation and publication, and calling of an election therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows:

"SECTION 11a. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in such other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper investment for said fund; provided, however, that not more than fifty per cent (50%) of the said fund shall be invested at any given time in stocks, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of the said fund be invested in securities issued by any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. This amendment shall be self-enacting."

SECTION 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution."

SECTION 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such Amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

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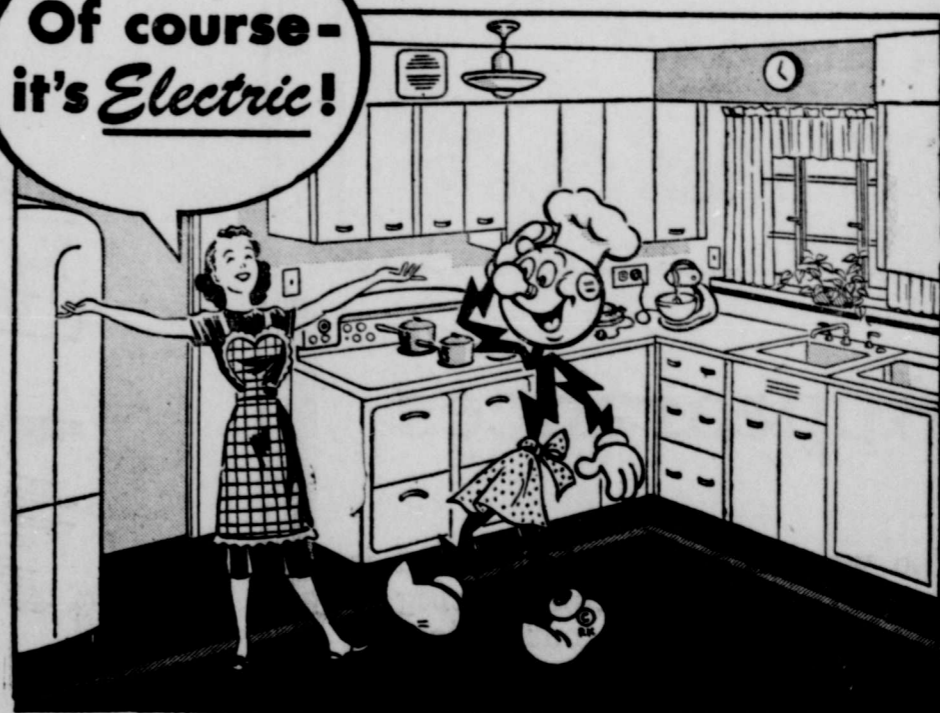
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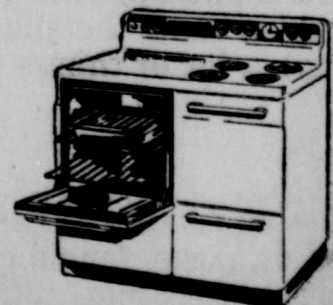

USO In Texas Makes Appeal For \$700,000 This Year

Sam Wooten, Dallas banker, today was named campaign chairman of the forthcoming \$700,000 appeal for the USO in Texas.

Selection of Wooten to head the state-wide campaign was announced by Attorney General Price Daniel, chairman of the Texas United Defense Fund Committee.

"Each county has a vital interest in maintaining home-ties with the young men and women in military service," Wooten said, "and each will be asked to assume its proportionate share of the USO budget to assure that the USO in the armed forces is maintained on a high level."

Local campaigns throughout the state will coincide with the regular Community Chest campaigns during October and November.

"Regardless of what happens in Russia, as long as Russia continues the cold war and millions of our youths are engaged in the defense of our freedom, there will be a need for the familiar home-away from home services of the USO," Wooten said.

PROBLEMS OF BEEF CATTLE BREEDERS ARE MANY AND PERENNIAL

Technical problems ranging from breeding and herd management to marketing are perennial to the beef cattle producer. During 1950, however, animal husbandmen sought to familiarize themselves with means to simplify major problems through practical demonstrations coupled with the use of visual aids. In the field of herd improvement alone, 25 type demonstrations were conducted with the objective of encouraging farmers and stockmen to select for breeding, animals which had proved consistent producers of the largest amount of high-priced cuts.

Market grade demonstrations were given at the annual agents' conference held in mid year at the Challenge Station in association with agencies of fattening and finishing cattle for market. Steers and calves representative of the USDA official market grades were selected for the purpose and the county agricultural agents

permitted to grade them. Official Production and Marketing Administration graders present did the official grading on live weight and carcass basis. Subsequently 14 beef cattle grading demonstrations were held on ranches where all classes including weaners, calves, steers, cows, bulls and stags were graded with farmers and ranchers participating. Through these programs farmers and stockmen are becoming increasingly familiar with reasons for variations in buying prices for cattle places on market. Meanwhile, market days were held for 4-H Club boys with the same type of program being presented.

Feeding minerals to beef cattle was emphasized by the animal husbandmen throughout the year; bulletin No. 174, "Minerals for Beef Cattle," being revised and made available to producers meanwhile. This subject was presented at 25 livestock clinics throughout the year with the Extension Service veterinarian and entomologist participating, and given wide publicity through press and magazines.

At these livestock clinics the Extension veterinarian demonstrated the approved method of administering phenothiazine for control of stomach worms, to-

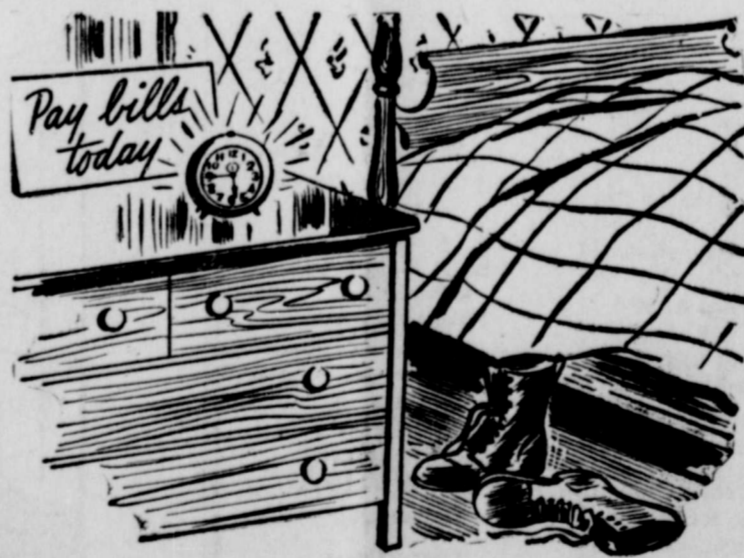
