Felon Admits Eleven Postoffice Jobs; Silverton Included

Eleven post office burglaries, including several pulled in the High Plains area in the last two years, were solved over the week end when John Paul Harris, Big Spring, admitted participating in the break-ins.

Harris was captured last month when he and two companions shot it out with lawmen in Arizona as they were attempting to rob a hotel.

One of the trio was killed in the gunfight.

A Santa Fe special officer, who also is a deputy sheriff, surprised the three men as they were holding up the swank El Tovar resort hotel on the rim of the Grand Canyon.

Harris is now serving a prison sentence in Arizona state penitentiary for armed robbery.

Harris admitted, according to officers, burglarizing the Silverton post office Sept. 4, 1949; the Dawn post office on Oct. 23, 1949; the Paducah post office, April 18, 1950, and several others.

George T. Heaberg, post office inspector from Fort Worth, took a statement from Harris. According to authorities, Harris said he burglarized the Dawn post office and the Bangs post office the same night. Bangs is near Abilene.

Postal authorities said very little was taken in any of the burglaries. Some merchandise was stolen in the burglary at Dawn. The post office was located in a grocery store at the time of the burglary.—The Amarillo Daily News.

The Silverton Owls rolled over the Kress Kangaroos to the tune of 32-0 in a one sided game Friday night, September 14. It was a very decisive victory for the Owls but a very costly one, because tailback Joe Munday was lost for most of the season when he received a broken leg. It is hoped that he will be ready to go for the last two or three games of the season.

Silverton started the scoring on the third play of the game when fullback Brooks broke over right tackle for 47 yards and pay dirt. The kick for extra point was blocked. In the same quarter Joe Munday got loose for 8 yards over left guard to bring the score to 12-0. An attempted pass for the extra point was no good. The first half ended 12-0.

In the third quarter Joe Brooks went for 15 yards up the middle and added six more points for the Owls. Brooks also made the extra point on a wide end run. In the same quarter Joe Munday again hit pay dirt when he went 25 yards behind good blocking. The extra point came on a pass from Brooks to Munday.

In the final stanza, Joe Brooks intercepted a Kress pass on the 30 yard line and went all the way for another 6 points. The try for extra point was no good and the scoring ended with 32 for Silverton and 0 for Kress.

The forward wall for the Owls was very impressive in their blocking and tackling. Kress was thrown for losses time after time. Richard Tunnell, Jim Baird, Dorrell O'Connor, Joe Bomar, Melvin Hamilton, and Delbert Mathews played a good game. Freddie Hamilton was in the quarterback slot most of the game and Red Stephens filled his position well at the blocking back post.

The Owls will no doubt be the underdogs in their game this Friday night on the local field against their old rivals the Happy Cowboys. Game time is 8:00 p.m. Reported.

Price Specialist Here Thursady Afternoon September 27th

A price specialist from the Office of Price Stabilization will be here next Thursday afternoon, September 27 to remind business men whose firms are covered by ceiling price regulation 7 of a new amendment which requires a supplementary filing with the district office not later than September 29.

That amendment to the regulation which covers sellers of wearing apparel, furniture, variety store merchandise, sporting goods, jewelry and hardware now requires the filing of a pricing chart which includes toys, games, Christmas decorations laces, yarns and ribbons.

Price Specialist Fidel Eggel, who will visit Silverton next week to help merchants of this immediate area, will be able to answer questions concerning all types of businesses who seek information regarding compliance with regulations.

Social Security Office Gives Out Following Information

The Amarillo social security office is still receiving inquiries as to the status of household workers under the Social Security Act, according to John R. Sanderson, manager of that office.

Just about a year ago, Congress amended the Social Security Act to provide that beginning January 1 1951 regularly employed household workers would

be covered by the old-age and survivors insurance program. Workers in this group include maids, cooks gardeners, children's nurses, chauffeurs, and others engaged to work in a private home.

If such a person works on 24 different days in a calendar

quarter and earns \$50 or more in cash wages, the employer files a quarterly return with the Bureau of Internal Revenue. The report form is simple and easy to prepare. It calls for the worker's name, social security number, and amount of wages paid during the quarter.

Penalty on Farm Marketing Excess of 1950 Cotton Crop

In accordance with Section 346 of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended, and the regulations issued thereunder by the Secretary of Agriculture, cotton produced in 1950 on a farm for which the penalty on the farm marketing excess of cotton has not been paid is subject to the penalty of 15.5 cents a pound, and until the penalty on the farm marketing excess is paid the entire crop of cotton produced on the farm in 1950 is subject to a lien in favor of the United States.

Cotton marketing cards issued with respect to the 1950 crop of cotton became void after July 31, 1951. After that date, a person buying cotton which was produced in 1950 should take proper precautionary measures to assure himself that such cotton is not subject to penalty and the lien thereon. He should ascertain from the production and marketing administration county committee for the county in which the cotton was produced whether the cotton is subject to penalty and, if so, the amounts of the penalty and interest which are required to be collected and remitted. A person buying cotton which was produced in 1950 may relieve himself of liability for any penalty due with respect to such cotton only by collecting the penalty from the producer on each pound purchased and remitting the amount collected to the appropriate PMA county committee.

Conservation Practices
We still have money available for conservation practices. If you need assistance in carrying out the practices we will be glad to discuss the practices with you if eligible under our present program.

We wish to call your attention to: Practice No. 9. Leaving on the land as a protector, against wind erosion the stalks or stubble of sorghums or millet, 25¢ per acre. Specifications: The stalks (at least 16 inches high) of sorghums or millet listed or drilled in rows not more than 4 feet wide, or the stalks (at least 3 inches high) of sudan grass, sorghums, or millet when drilled with spacing not more than 20 inches wide, must be left on the land until sufficient moisture is available to prepare the land for a following crop, but, in any event, until January 1. Stalks must not be grazed.

1952 Small Grain Crop Goals:
The National Agricultural Mobilization Committee recently announced goals for 1952 small grain crops to be seeded in the fall of 1951. The significant changes in 1952 goals from 1951 acreages are increases for barley and oats and a slight increase for wheat. 1952 goals set are: Wheat 6,400,000 acres; barley 200,000 acres; Rye 21,000 acres; Oats 1,600,000 acres.

CAP ROCK SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

G. W. Selmon has a farm or rather a combination farm and ranch located in the Antelope Flat Community. He is using his farm for as much production as possible, but is also using conservation practices to maintain that production. Last year he had a large part of the farm terraced with level, broadbase terraces to cut down erosion. This year he has made a trial planting of Crimson Clover on his own hook. He intends to find out for himself, if this type of clover will be successful here on dry land. If the planting grows and does well, Mr. Selmon will have winter cover to protect his land and other beneficial effects such as nitrogen fixation and the addition of organic matter. If this planting doesn't produce as he thinks it should, he will likely try other cover crops to get the same effect. Mr. Selmon is also considering building a dam for livestock water. This will help to get a more even distribution of grazing.

Level terraces are being built on Theo Geisler's farm north of Quitaque. A portion of the farm was terraced last year and the soil conservation service is assisting in the layout and construction service is assisting in the layout and construction of terraces now. In addition to the protection these terraces will give his land, is the protection they will give those farms farther down the slope.


