## Texas Local Board No. 20, Reclassify College Students

Childress, September 28, 1951. At a board meeting Tuesday evening, September 28, the board members of Texas Local Board No. 20, serving Childress, Cottle, Collingsworth, Hall and Briscoe counties, completed the job of reclassifying the college students. This phase of the board members' work was one in which the public showed the most interest although the reclassification of college students was only a part of the board's work. There are approximately 3,258 men registered at the draft board here, and of this number 41 are classified Class II-A-S (Deferred because of college enrollment). The student's major in college, the score on the deferment test, and their scholastic standing in college was the basis on which the board members gave Class II-A-S to college students. The college students are among the smallest groups to be temporarily excused from the draft. Persons now, or hereafter, deferred from induction on scholastic, occupational, or dependency grounds will remain liable for induction into the armed forces or the National Security Training Corps until they attain the age of 35 under the Universal Military Training and Service Act. Mrs. Frances Starkey, clerk of the local board, has released the following information regarding the number of registrants in each classification as of September 24, 1951. Class I-A, 177; Class I-A-P, 36; Class I-C Ind, 155; Class I-C Exl, 269; Class I-C Disc, 28; Class I-C Res, 14; Class I-D, 49; Class II-A, 14; Class II-A-S, 41; Class II-C, 29; Class III-A, 598; Class IV-A, 532; Class IV-D, 9; Class IV-F, 409; and Class V-A, 938.

## Scrap Drive Set for October 15 to November 15

Secretary of Agriculture, Charles F. Brannon, asks the National Farmers to co-operate in an iron and steel scrap harvest October 15 to November 15 to help obtain raw materials needed in the production of essential equipment in the Mobilization Program. Pointing out the importance of the farm scrap drive the secretary said "Our first great need is to obtain enough of the raw materials we must have to keep our defense program going forward in good order, but farmers have a very direct interest in seeing that our mills and foundries have enough scrap iron and steel. By taking steps that will add to the supply of the raw materials which are essential to steel production, farmers will be helping to guarantee more adequate manufacture of the farm machinery and equipment they need. "Farmers have given generous support to scrap drives before production authorities have informed us that steel mills and foundries continue to operate with a dangerously short supply of scrap. They also point out that farms are a good source of the higher-grade, heavier types of scrap the mills and foundries need in defense production. I am confident that farmers will meet this vital defense need. We are asking the Agricultural Mobilization Committees to give every possible assistance in doing so." The period from October 15 to November 15 coming at the end of the harvest season has been selected as a time most convenient for farmers to collect scrap and sell it to dealers or to assembly points.

## Winter Cover Crops

Winter cover crops, especially if those crops consist of adequate winter legumes are an effective method of getting higher production per acre from following crops. Increases in yield of from 25 to 30 per cent are possible where a good stand of winter legumes is secured and the crop is turned under as green manure in the spring. Austrian Winter Peas and Hairy Vetch have been approved for Briscoe County, so if you intend to plant either of these, remember to get your approval before they are seeded, and, November 15 is the latest seed date for this County.

## The services of P. M. A. Committeemen are available to all farmers. Although PMA committeemen are not full time employees of the U. S. Department of Agriculture they are available to help farmers with conservation, price support problems at any time.

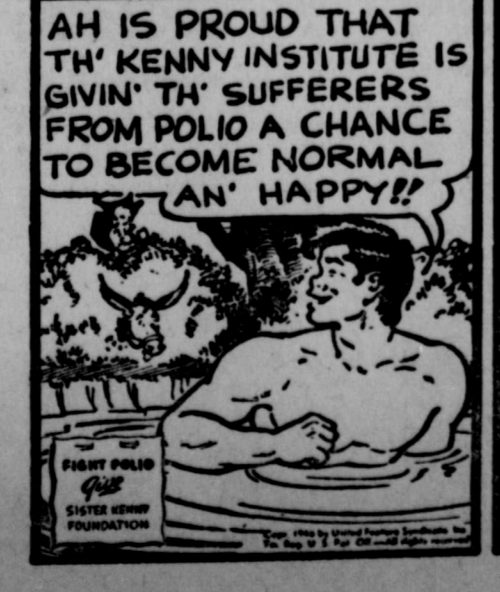

## CAP ROCK SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT

Winter cover crops for your farm will give returns in the spring by improving the soil condition and fertility. The use of winter legumes of this cover will do the job of improving production and reducing the danger of wind erosion.

H. H. McPherson, southwest corner of the county, planted 20 acres of hairy vetch in September. Mr. McPherson planted vetch to get extra winter grazing and soil improvement. This crop, under irrigation, responds well to an application of 200 pounds 20%

superphosphate per acre. The fertilizer can be applied in bands about 2 inches below the seed at the time of seeding.

E. J. Hamilton, Quitaque, planted about 60 acres of rye and vetch in rows in his cotton. This spring Hamilton planted his cotton three rows and left two rows. The first of September vetch and rye was seeded in the two row strips for winter cover and soil improvement.

H. H. McPherson and E. J. Hamilton are cooperators with the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District No. 126.

### CITY ORDINANCE

An Ordinance Regulating the Parking of Vehicles on the streets of the City of Silverton, Briscoe County, Texas, and prescribing a penalty.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Silverton, Texas:

SECTION 1. Every person in charge of any vehicle, when parking the same upon the streets of the City of Silverton, Texas, including the parking zones shall park said vehicle at an angle of approximately forty-five (45) degrees with the curb, and with the right front wheel of said vehicle not more than six (6) inches from said curb; no vehicle, when parked at such an angle, shall have any part of same or any accessory attached, or anything carried thereon, extending more than eighteen (18) feet from curb line; and where markers and painted lines adjoining the curb and extending outward at an angle of approximately forty-five (45) degrees have been placed along any of the streets by the police officer of the City of Silverton, Texas, or under their direction, then all vehicles parked along said streets where such lines or markers are located shall be parked between such lines with no part of such vehicle upon or over or across such lines. There shall be no double or center parking, except where the streets are marked for center parking. No vehicle extending more than eighteen (18) feet or any part of same or any accessory attached or carried thereon, shall be parked on Main Street between blocks, 36, 37, and 49, on Commerce between blocks 37-48 and 38-49.

SECTION 2. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$25.00.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be cumulative of all other ordinances or regulations of the City of Silverton, Texas, unless in conflict with the terms of said ordinances and regulations, in which case the terms of this ordinance shall prevail.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall become effective from and after its passage and publication, according to law.

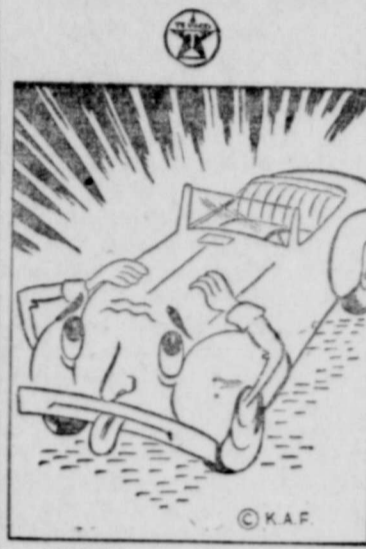

### AGRICULTURAL FILLERS

The early destruction of cotton stalks is one of the most effective practices known for controlling cotton insects especially boll weevils and pink bollworms. Community and countywide stalk destruction programs are the most effective and the practice should be carried out just as early as is possible. The job must be complete for new growth means food for the insects.

The best season for planting the winter legume crop has arrived and moisture conditions are now favorable. Legume seed should be inoculated and the land fertilized before the seeding operation is performed.

For the sake of the soil, plant winter legumes.

Scarce feed items in the winter livestock ration are abundant in small grains. Now is the time to plant the supplemental small grains pastures and the use of the right fertilizers will increase pasture yields and speed their growth.

The dairy cow needs a rest of from six to eight weeks between lactation periods. During this time, she should be fed well.
