The ladies will make children's garments, infants' to size ten; also ladies' blouses, aprons and various novelty items.

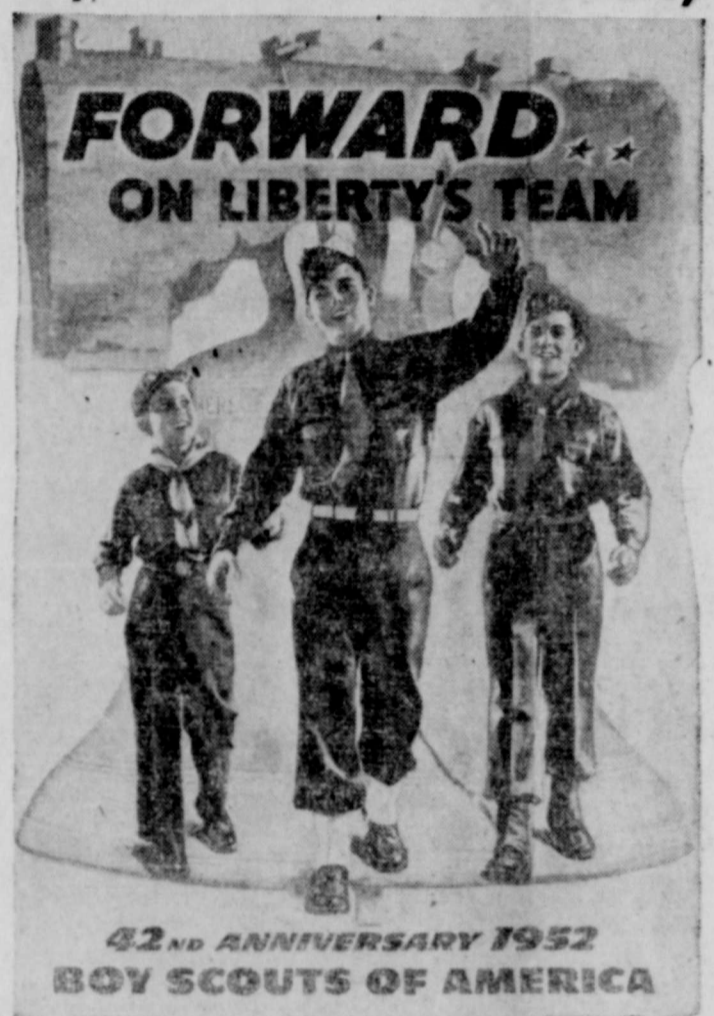

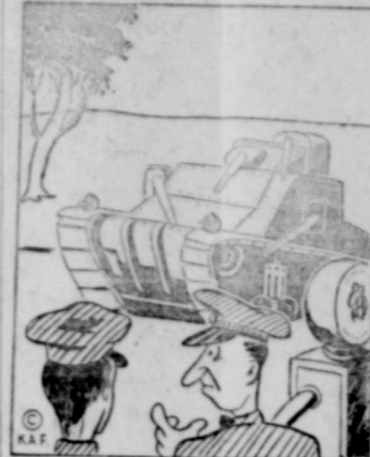
