Judge LaFont Makes Announcement for State Senator Office



This week Judge Harold M. LaFont made his announcement for the office of State Senator of the newly created 30th Senatorial District of Texas. In making his announcement, Judge LaFont submitted the following statement:

In asking the people to elect me to this office, it is with a full realization that whoever the people elect has the responsibility of making the laws that govern over 7,000,000 people of the State of Texas. These laws directly affect the daily lives of practically all of us, and serious thought and consideration should be given to each and every law that is passed by the Legislature. It is my humble judgment that men who fill these offices of responsibility and in whom we place our trust and confidence, should be experienced, honest, sincere and capable.

As citizens, all of us are interested in the progress and welfare of our Senatorial District and of the State of Texas as a whole, and we have a right to expect our fair share of those things for which our tax money is spent. These include educational assistants, police protection for our families and property, a good system of state highways and farm-to-market roads. All of these items of state government help make our district a better place in which to live and to rear our families.

My home is located on an irrigated farm about three miles northeast of the town of Plainview. I am married and have a son 11 years of age and a daughter 7 years of age.

I am now serving as Representative of the 120th Representative District of Texas, which includes eight of the fifteen counties in this Senatorial District. At the close of the last session of the Legislature the Speaker of the House of Representatives appointed me as a member of the Legislative Council of Texas, which consists of ten members of the House of Representatives and five members of the Senate, whose duty it is to study state-wide problems.

Having served as County Judge of Hale County, Texas, from 1932 to 1939, and District Attorney for six counties in this Senatorial District from 1942 to 1949, and having practiced law for twenty-two years, I believe that this experience should qualify me to represent our people in this new Senatorial District.

It is my plan to make this race on whatever merits I may have and not on the demerits of anyone else who may run. It will be my endeavor to see every voter in the District, and, if elected, I assure you that no one will try harder to serve all of the people of the 30th Senatorial District of Texas.

South Plains Jr. Fat Stock Show to be March 17, 18, 19

Premium lists and entry blanks for the South Plains Jr. Fat Stock show have been mailed to more than 125 county agents and vocational agriculture teachers in Texas and New Mexico, George Wilson, general chairman of the show, announced this week.

Dates for the show are March 17, 18, 19. A survey of the area's agriculture leaders revealed these dates most favorable.

FFA and 4-H club exhibitors are expected in record numbers this year from the 29 counties in Texas and New Mexico, in the established show area. Wilson predicted more entries this year than in 1951 when entries hit a record of 568 pigs, 266 calves and 142 lambs.

Planning to Retire? See SS Manager, Sanderson

Wage earners and self-employed persons planning to retire this year under the new Social Security Act should get in touch with the Amarillo Social Security office, John R. Sanderson, manager, announced today. Because of the nature of certain changes in the law, it is important that these persons know just how they may be affected by them before actually retiring.

"Those who retire before July 1, 1952, will not qualify for the maximum benefit—except in rare cases," he declared. "And only in a few instances can the \$80 monthly benefit be paid before January, 1953. This is the main reason why those planning retirement this year should ask us where they stand."

The maximum retirement payment under the new formula is \$20 a month and the minimum is \$20 monthly—depending on the average monthly earnings.

"Beginning April, 1952, two new factors enter the old-age and survivors insurance picture," Sanderson said. "One, the new formula for figuring benefits may be used for the first time. And secondly, those aged persons whose work came under social security for the first time beginning January, 1951, may, by April, have enough credits to qualify them for benefits."

The manager pointed out that beginning January, 1951 regularly employed domestic and farm workers, many self-employed persons, and others were brought under the provisions of this Federal insurance system for the first time in its history.

Texas Highway Department Issue Travel Map

The shortest distance between two points is established by an old axiom, but from the standpoint of motorists, the shortest distance between two points can only be established by the Official Highway Travel Map.

Mr. D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, announced today that the Department's new 1952 Official Travel Map is now available free to the general public. The Official Highway Map is revised and published annually. It is used by all state agencies as the basis for computing official car mileage. The new map is 28"x36" and is chock-full of travel guidance and information on Texas.

The material is illustrated and in color for easy comprehension and appearance. Several important changes have been made in this year's map which include a topographical relief drawing along with the addition of symbols which show the locations of the 854 roadside parks and turnouts. Special emphasis has been placed on indicating various recreational, scenic, and historical spots. All U. S. and State highways are shown. The more important Farm and Ranch to Market roads which serve the cross-country motorist are also shown. The travel information reflected on the map is designed to supply motorists with guidance needed for safety, comfort, and pleasure while traveling Texas highways.

The back side of the map is jam-packed with factual and pictorial Texas history. The story of Texas is unfolded with the map. Many famous milestones and landmarks are described and portrayed pictorially. There are 25 pictures in full color of the more popular historical points of interest in the State with a full caption explaining each scene. A panorama is used to introduce some of the more popular historical characters in a "passing parade" of Texas history.

Included also for the first time is a map of Mexico, incorporated with the small U. S. map, showing the principal highways and cities, however, it is primarily for geographical purposes.

This new map can be obtained by mailing the map card distributed by the Tax Assessor-Collector's office with the sale of license plates, or by writing directly to the Texas Highway Department, Austin 14, Texas. Copies are also available in any Highway District Office or the Highway Travel Information Bureau.

Farm News From The PMA Committee Briscoe County

A grass new to the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District will be planted this spring by G. W. Lee, H. Roy Brown and Milton Dudley. This grass is Caucasian bluestem, a species which came to this country from Asia. It has been tried in the Floyd County District for two years and has shown good promise.

The grass is a perennial, upright bunchgrass, 2 to 3 feet tall, leafy at the base, and with rather fine stems. It closely resembles King Ranch bluestem, the difference being that Caucasian bluestem has a more upright, stiff stem, which seldom dries a straw color.

The growth period of Caucasian bluestem starts in early spring and will produce green forage until frost. The seed are produced from June until frost. This grass is well liked by cattle and they show a good gain on it.

The seed to be planted here was obtained from the Floyd County Soil Conservation District and was grown on a co-operator's place.

Mr. Lee will plant about 20 acres of this grass on non-irrigated land; Milton Dudley will also plant on dryland, while Brown will try about 5 acres under irrigation.

The seed will be planted in the near future so that the grass can get a good root system and vegetative growth during the spring and summer.

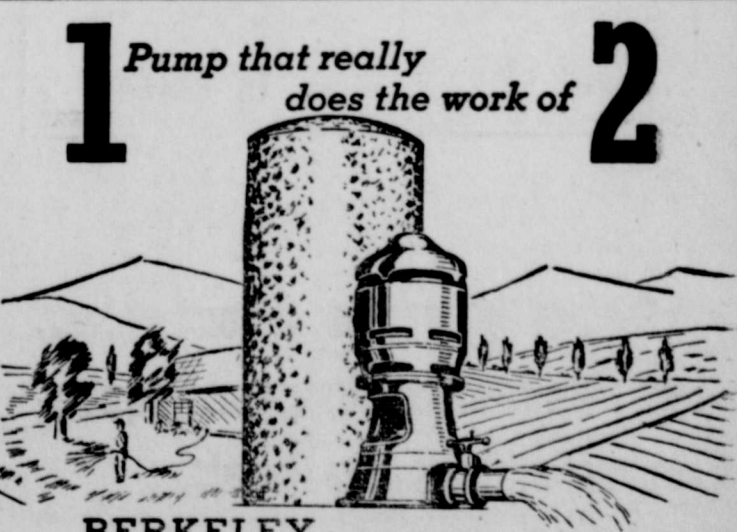

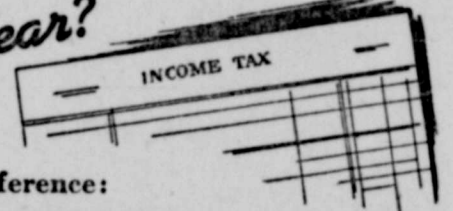
