Soil Conservation District News

To many farmers in the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District the word water-way is a word that they have heard very little of until recently. As more of our native sod is broken out, waterways, as conservation practice, are becoming more important.

In other parts of Texas waterways have been in use several years and have proved their worth in preventing erosion and in safely disposing of excess water.

A waterway is a strip of land that has been shaped to a desired specification and seeded or sodded to a permanent vegetation, usually a grass. The flow of the water is kept down to such a speed that no erosion will occur in the waterway.

The size and width of a waterway depends on several things, one of the most important being the amount of water that it will be expected to carry safely.

Robert Spillman, a district co-operator whose farm is west of Silvertown will construct two waterways, which will be used to receive water from a diversion.
