TAAS, TEAMS registration packets available at MHS

The out-of-school examinee registration packets for the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) and the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) exit level tests are now available at Muleshoe High School.

During each regular exit level test administration, individuals who are no longer enrolled in school and have not previously passed all sections of the TEAMS/TAAS test, but have met all other graduation requirements, may retake the section(s) not passed.

During the October administration, the TAAS writing

will be administered on Tuesday, Oct. 18, the TEAMS/TAAS English Language Arts and reading test on Wednesday, Oct. 19, and the TEAMS/TAAS mathematics on Thursday, Oct. 20.

Individuals who are no longer enrolled in a Texas public school and wish to register to retake the exit level test(s) may pick up a registration packet at any high school campus, district central office or education service center.

County grants easements, discusses comp time, roads

The Bailey County Commissioner's Court met on Monday at the courthouse. On Monday, the Court approved granting an easement in Precinct #1 for a water line to run under a road and granted antoehr easement to Pe-Ru corporation for an electric line in Precinct #4.

The Court discussed compensation time of deputy sheriff's and other county employees and possible solutions. No action was taken on Monday.

Following a discussion, the Court tabled action on oil collection grants and consideration of sharing any incurred expense with the City of Muleshoe.

They also approved the appointment of Berta Combs as Veterans Service Officer and Community Services Advisor for Bailey County and approved waiving a probation period for her, as to salary only.

Mules open 1994 season against Portales Friday

The numbers aren't many and the size isn't overpowering. The pollsters pick them dead last in the District 2-3A race.

Despite those facts, Muleshoe head football coach Randy Adair remains positive about the upcoming season, which begins in earnest Friday at 8 p.m. when the Mules take on Portales, NM, at Greyhound Stadium across the New Mexico line at Blackwater Draw.

Adair feels his team is in its best position to be competitive overall and in District 2-3A since he's been in Muleshoe.

"With 25 kids suited up, we have zero depth, so a lot of what we do depends on

our ability to stay healthy," Adair said. "If we do, we believe we'll be competitive and we're excited to test ourselves against Portales."

The Mules held their won against top-10-ranked Springlake-Earth in the second pre-season scrimmage of the year last Friday in Muleshoe. A Class AA state quarterfinalist the past two seasons, S-Earth scored three times to the Mules one. But for the most part, Adair and his staff were pleased with what they saw on their side of the football.

"We had some good things happen," Adair said. "Springlake-Earth is big, talented and well-coached. But

they didn't dominate the scrimmage like some people expected them too. We were encouraged by what we saw."

Against Portales, the Mules face a team which is annually a contender in the toughest Class AAA district in New Mexico; a district which has produced the state champion in 18 of the past 20 seasons. But like the Mules, the Rams are in a rebuilding mode and took it on the chin from AAAA power Clovis 49-0 in their season opener last week.

"Portales is still a real unknown," Adair said. "It's hard to evaluate them because we haven't seen them against anyone we're familiar with. Against Clovis, it was hard to tell. It was 14-0 at the half, but Portales got tired and Clovis

just blew them off the ball after that."

"Just looking at the media information, it looks like Portales will be down a little from last year and we should be up a little. I think that makes us real equal."

Portales will have the advantage of having a game under its belt and special teams play could be a factor, Adair said.

While the Mules will have just 25 suited up for the contest, Adair expects 18 different starters in the 22 positions and said 20-22 players will probably see regular action.

One question for the Mules is junior running back and defensive back Jake Adair. The 5-11, 150-pounder has been plagued with a nagging knee problem that kept him out of the S-Earth scrimmage. He is expected to start at tailback and corner back

for the Mules. But if he can't go, he will be replaced by sophomore John Brian Cowart on offense and Mike Villareal on defense.

Other players scheduled to start offensively for the Mules are: senior Jimmy Gauna at quarterback; senior Jesus Flores at wingback; Villareal, a senior, at fullback; junior Daniel Garbarino at split end; sophomore Jason Rasco at tight end; senior Russell Black and junior Raul Del Toro at the tackles; juniors Gabriel Mendoza and Chad Johnson at the guards and

junior Josh Otwell at center.

Defensively, the Mules will go with Garbarino at safety; Flores and Adair at the corners; Field and senior Rashad Kirven at defensive ends; seniors Robert Toscano and Edward Rodriguez at linebackers; Johnson and junior John Mesa at defensive tackles; and senior Ryan Clapp at noseguard.

Following the Portales game, the Mules will open their home season Sept. 9 when they host Denver City.

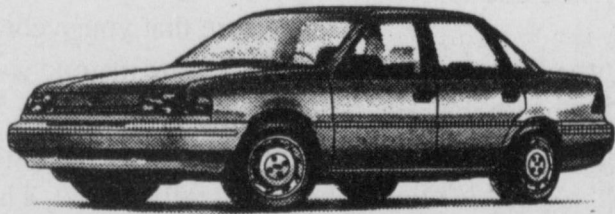

The library also has videos to rent. They have kid's programs and games for the computer. Also, a laminating machine is available. Lots more information was given. Ann encourages everyone to support the library.

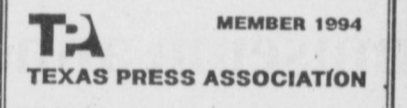
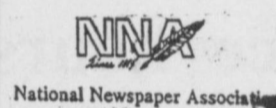

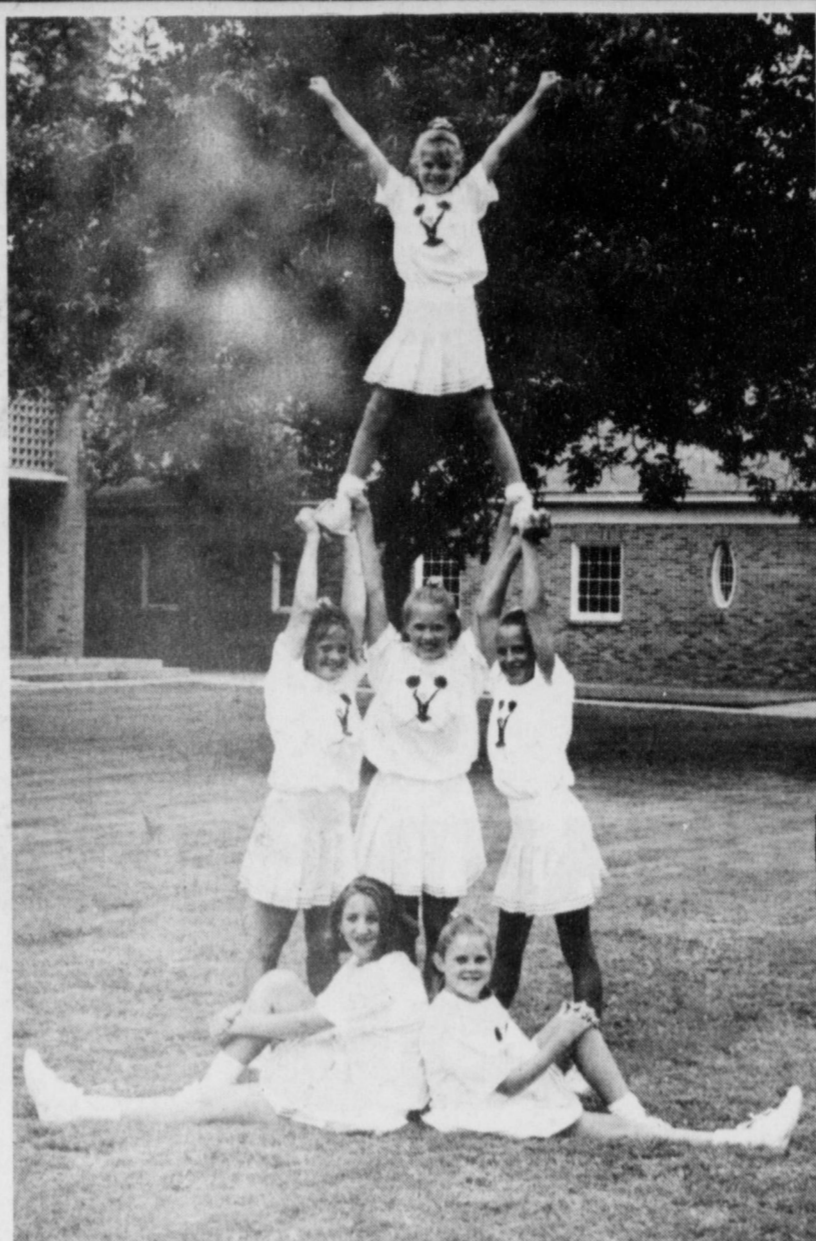
Lazbuddie cheerleaders earn top camp honors

Letter to the Editor

Local businessmen feel need for Texas initiative, referendum

Dear Editor:

Do you often feel that government at all levels is out of control? Does it seem that elected officials are out of touch with the voters as they tax and spend us into oblivion? Have you wondered if there is anything you can do to return power to hard working taxpayers who foot the bill?

You are not alone. Dissatisfaction with government is at an all time high. More and more people are becoming so disgusted that they are not voting at all.

Now there is a window of opportunity for Texan to obtain Initiative and Referendum powers which would give us the right to gather signatures on citizen-initiated petitions to require a direct and binding ballot election on various is-

sues.

This ability, which goes back to the founding of our nation, is currently available in about half the states. In Texas, all home rule cities have had this right locally since 1913, but not on state issues.

Texas legislators have failed to adequately address two main issues, education and prisons. Endless special sessions and legislative gridlock have resulted in decisions being made by unelected federal judges who are dictating how much we pay in taxes. This absurd practice violates the constitutional guarantee against taxation without representation. It has also caused many people to feel that Initiative and Referendum is long overdue.

The Texas Constitution places all political power in the

people, including the right to petition. Therefore, the Texas Association places all political power in the people, including the right to petition. Therefore, the Texas Association of Concerned Taxpayers (TACT) is circulating petitions to add a constitutional amendment so that the public can force a vote on new laws or amendments they propose if they collect signatures equal to 5% of the number of voters in the preceding state-wide election.

They can also call for a binding referendum to reject or repeal existing legislation or court decisions with 3% of previous state election voters, or, with 5%, force a recall

election to remove elected officials who refuse to do the will of those who put them in office.

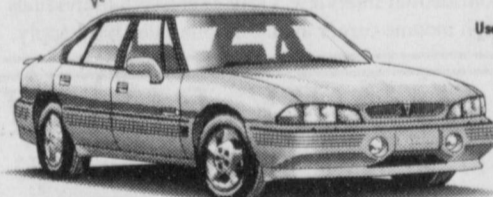
