If you plan on doing any mosquito or cedar eradication be sure and check with the PMA office and obtain prior approval before the work begins.

From Texas State Teachers Association Auslin, Texas

Texans must spend more of their state tax dollars on public schools or see their children handicapped by receiving an inferior education.

That blunt warning was issued at Austin May 13, by Miss Ruth Hillyer, president of the Texas State Teachers Association, who urged Texans to realize the seriousness of the situation.

Heavy annual increased enrollment in elementary and high schools, which is expected to continue at least through 1959-60, plus many antiquated educational plants now in use are the main reasons for the need of more funds.

The increased attendance makes necessary a minimum of 1,000 more teachers each year, and the same number of additional classrooms, Miss Hillyer said.

That, plus the need to make it more attractive for teachers to keep them from going to better paying positions, makes it imperative that the next legislature provide additional funds, Miss Hillyer declared.

Local school districts cannot raise even half of the millions of dollars needed, she said.

The increase in the number of scholastic-age children in Texas is increasing by 50,000 annually and it is expected to continue to do so for several years. Of that number, at least 75 percent will enter the public schools through each year until 1959-60.

"That means that even with teachers having classes of 30 pupils (the ideal proportion is 24 to one teacher,) that an average of 1,000 additional teachers, and, of course, that many new classrooms, must be added each year," Miss Hillyer pointed out.

"Too, more adequate pay for teachers to keep them from leaving the profession and to attract new ones is a necessity.

"Texas teachers are 6 percent below the average of all employed persons in the United States and there is already a heavy exodus of instructors.

"Retirement, death and the lure of more pay in other professions takes 3,500 teachers annually out of our schools. In addition, we annually need those 1,000 additional teachers."

Texas must soon build more than a half billion worth of classrooms to keep pace with the increasing enrollment, Miss Hillyer stated.

"Unless we do so, huge numbers of our children will be attending school half time, in double shifts," Miss Hillyer said. "More than 17,500 are doing so this year and that number will be tripled next year."

Miss Hillyer explains the need for more of the state tax dollar for schools by quoting a recent survey made by the Teachers Association. It disclosed that even if local districts increased assessed valuations and bonded themselves to the limit that they could raise only \$259,383,889. That is less than half enough to provide adequate classrooms, let alone aid in increasing teacher remuneration, Miss Hillyer declared.

Miss Hillyer also pointed out that schools now cost less than 2 cents more of every tax dollar than they did in 1939-40, the last year before World War II dissipated usual conditions.

Out of each tax dollar, 32.15 cents goes for public education now, whereas 30.31 cents was spent for this purpose in 1939-40.

"When we consider the enormous increase in attendance and the additional teachers required for this increase, the cost of public school education has not kept pace with other governmental costs," Miss Hillyer asserted.

Changes in District Boundaries
Probably greater interest attaches to proposed changes in district boundaries. Tentative plans call for abolishment of the Clarendon and Perryton districts, and the creation of a new district in the western high plains to be known either as the Brownfield or Levelland district. Perryton district headquarters would be moved to Pampa. District headquarters at Vernon, under the proposed plan, would be changed to Childress.

District headquarters of the Sweetwater district would be moved from Sweetwater to Big Spring. The plans suggest that Sweetwater City Churches be placed in the Abilene district.

Keep the Bugs Out of Stored Wheat

College Station, May 28—Recent regulations announced by the Food and Drug Administration regarding the grading of wheat which has been in storage and damaged by insects is of great economic importance to wheat producers in Texas. Losses, says Fred Dines, wheat marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, can be held to a minimum if producers will take the necessary precautions in storing their wheat especially that stored on the farm.

The first job, and it should be done now, is to thoroughly clean an athen treat the storage bin for insects. Dines emphasizes that all accumulations of residue grain-whole, cracked, ground or grain dust—must be removed from the interior or exterior of the bin. Check the cross braces, rafters, cracks in the floor and walls and if available, the specialist recommends using an air blasting machine to get the accumulations cleaned up.

If the storage bin is inside or attached to other farm buildings, Dines says special care must be taken to see that all materials such as mixed feed, other grain, hay and straw in which insects may breed are removed from the storage area.

After the clean up job is completed a residual spray should be applied to the surfaces of the bin at least two weeks before grain is placed in storage. Dines and Extension Entomologist A. C. Gunter recommend the use of lindane, pyronne base, methoxychlor or DDT residual sprays. A pyrethrum piperonyl butoxide spray may also be used. They point out that directions for the use of each of these materials is carried on the label of the container and urge that these instructions be followed to the letter. Menthoxychlor and DDT sprays, they warn, should not be used in concentrations of more than two and one-half per cent. Every crack, crevice, corner,

ledge, beam and cross brace that could harbor insects should be thoroughly covered with the spray. Do a complete job, say the specialists, inside and out.

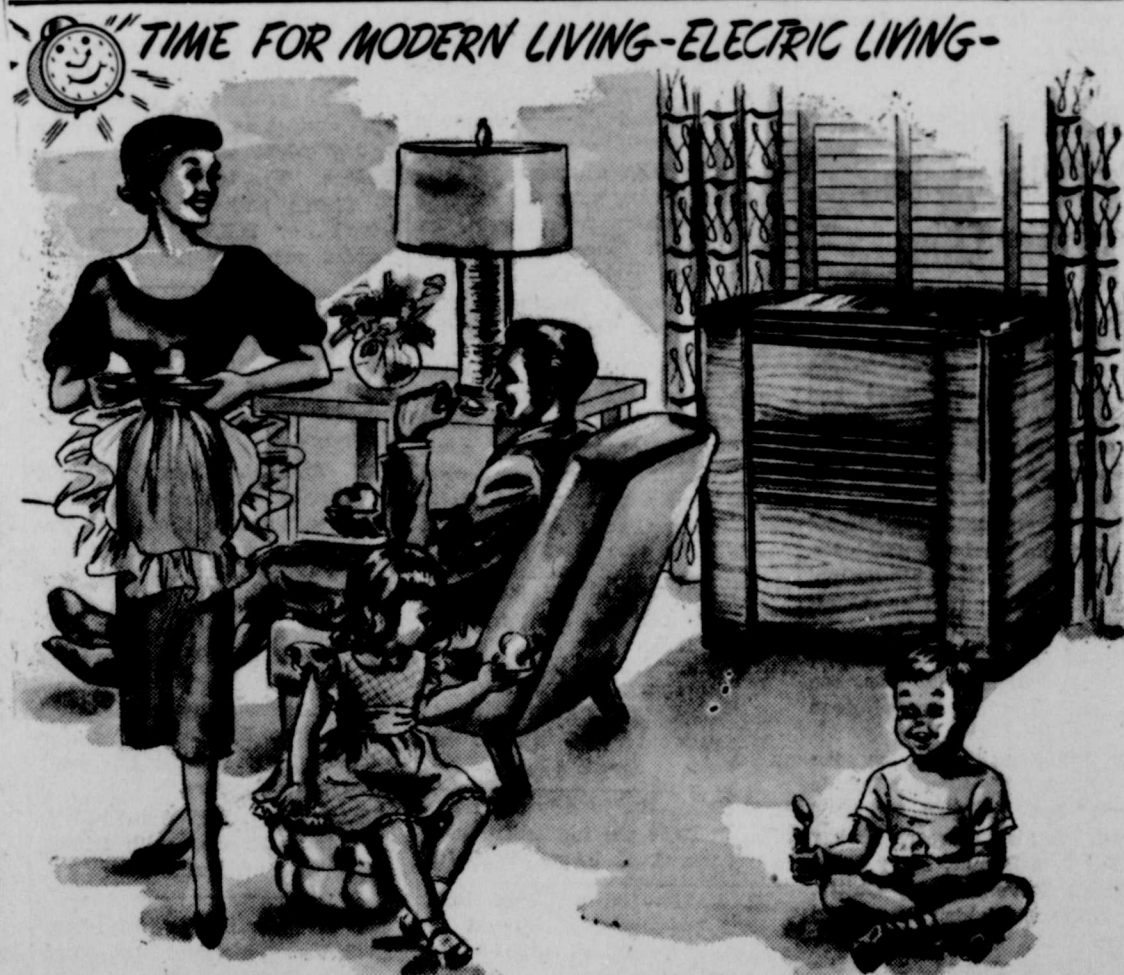

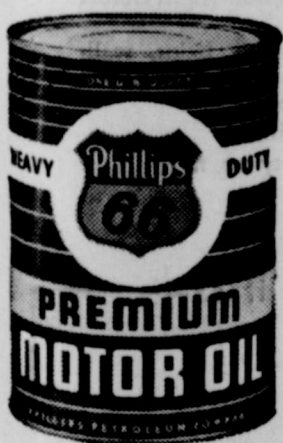

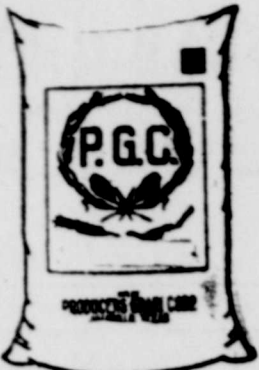
