Farmers Gin Installing New Equipment, Making Repairs

The Farmers Gins of Silvertown are busy installing new machinery and repairing their plant preparatory to being ready for the coming cotton harvest. Mr. Shelly Tomlin, manager of the gin stated this week he would have everything ready in time for the new crop.

A new office building 24x24 feet in size is nearing completion. It will give an office space of 12x24 feet for the main office and scale room. A nice large space is set aside for a cotton room and the office books, also a shower bath, lavatory and commode are included in the new structure.

The gin yard is being filled in with dirt and gravel to make the driveway an all-weather parking and driveway.

Three large electric motors will replace the gas engine which had powered the plant in former years—Combined the motors will produce 170 horsepower.

The seed hopper and scales are being reworked as is the case of the gin stands. New saws will be installed in all of the gin stands, and an individual electric drying unit will be installed for each gin stand. A new burr burner 35 feet tall and 13 feet in diameter has been erected with an 18 inch double wall. This burner will eliminate much of the fire hazard at the gin.

A double suction for unloading cotton replaces the single suction which has been in use at the gin making it possible to handle cotton much faster from vehicle to gin stands.

Mr. Tomlin says he will be unable to contact all farmers between now and harvest, but would like to invite them to visit him at the gin and see what he is doing to rush up their ginning this fall and winter.

An expenditure of some 8 to 10 thousand dollars is being spent to better serve the cotton growers of the community and the new repairs will increase ginning capacity about 50 per cent Mr. Tomlin said.

Stone was born Mary Lee Cooper, on March 29, 1864, at Cedarhill in Dallas County, Texas and departed this life at her home in Silvertown, August 23, 1952 at the age of 88 years, 4 months and 25 days. She moved to Thorp Springs, Texas in 1890 to attend school and while there, was married to M. P. Stone on January 1, 1890. The Stones moved to Silvertown in 1894 and have made this their home since that time. Mrs. Stone obeyed the gospel in 1876 and attended services at the local Church of Christ. 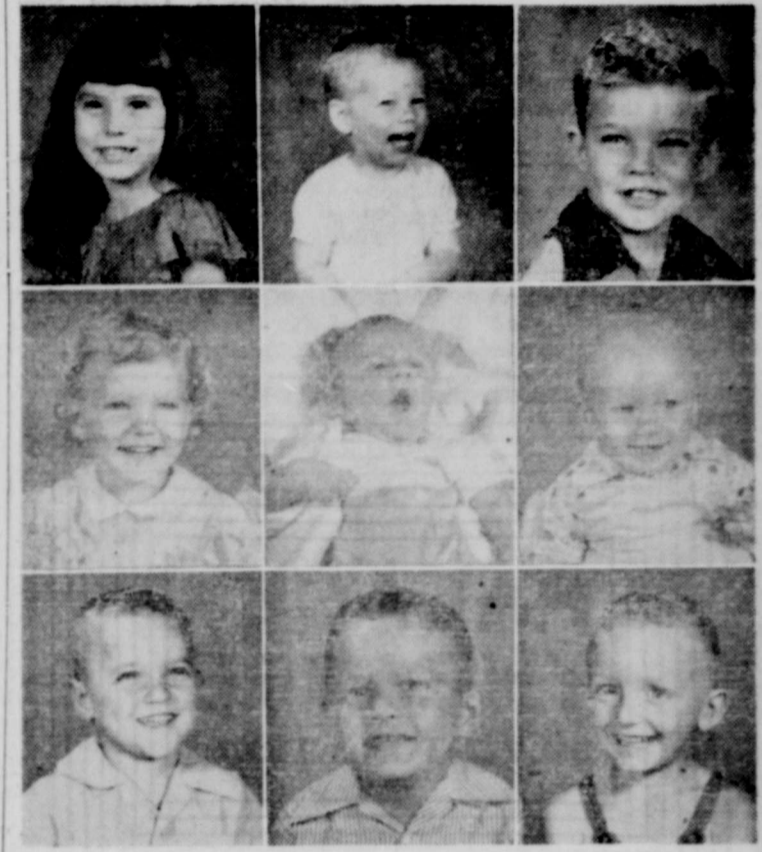
