Charles Morris Jenkins

Charles Morris Jenkins, son of Charles A. and Flora Jenkins, was born Jan. 31, 1912, in Silverton, Texas, and died Sept. 5, 1952 at his home in Buckner, Mo., after a long illness. He was 40 years, 8 months and 4 days old. He came to Missouri while a mere lad with his parents when they returned to their native community of Cross Timbers to make their home. He was educated in the Benton and Hickory county public schools, and graduated from the Cross Timbers high school. He was a member of the Methodist church. He was married to Mary Alice Kugler on Oct. 12, 1938. They were blessed with one child, Ronald Morris, aged 8 years.

Morris served in the ordinance branch of the U. S. Army during World War II, but never left the United States. He and his wife moved to Buckner eleven years ago. He had worked at Lake City Ordnance Plant 10 years, and at the time of his last illness was a paint foreman at the Arsenal. He was commander of the American Legion Post at Buckner; an accomplished musician and singer and was always in demand at social and community functions. As long as his health permitted, he was active in the community activities. He was a member of the Co-Workers S. S. class of Buckner Methodist church. Members of the class served as pallbearers and flower girls at the funeral service at Buckner. The 12 honorary pallbearers were foreman friends at the plant where Morris worked. The visit of friends, the gifts bestowed upon him, the profusion of flowers that filled his sick room, and the floral offerings for the funeral service, surely were testament of the high esteem in which he was held. The last service was held in the Methodist church at Cross Timbers and burial was in the C. T. cemetery.

Besides his wife and son he is survived by his mother, Mrs. Flora Jenkins, a sister, Mrs. Ethel Drennon of Cross Timbers and hosts of other sorrowing relatives and friends.

Morris was a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Dickerson and Mrs. W. A. Dickerson of Silverton.

4 Hundred Dollars in Prizes For 4-H and FFA Contests

The 4-H and FFA members in the 20 counties of the Texas Panhandle will not only enjoy some interesting contests but will have an opportunity to compete for about \$400 in prizes. The contests will be held at the time of the Southwest Soil Management Demonstrations and Plowing Contests at the Pan Tech Farms on U. S. Highway 60 between Amarillo and Panhandle.

The stubble-mulch plowing contests will be held for 4H and FFA boys, each having their own contest. The winner of each contest will receive a \$50 cash prize; 2nd place is \$30; 3rd place is \$20 and 4th place is \$10. A splendid plaque will be presented to the top winner of each contest in addition to the prize money.

The 4H boys and girls and the FFA boys competing in their respective tractor driving contests will also receive generous prizes. The first prize will be \$25, the 2nd place \$15, third place \$10 and fourth place \$5. The 4H girls will compete with girls only, the 4H boys and the FFA boys have separate contests.

In the range or grass judging contests there will be prizes for the adults and prizes for the juniors. Each group will receive a \$15 first prize; \$10 second prize; \$7.50 third prize and \$5.00 fourth prize.

Those interested in any of the contests are urged to get in touch with their extension agents or vocational agriculture teachers at once. Rules and regulations have been sent to each county agent office and each voc-ag office in this area.

Try-outs for all plowing and tractor driving contests will be at 9:00 o'clock in the morning Wednesday, October 1st, at Pan Tech Farms on U. S. Highway 60 between Amarillo and Panhandle. The finals will be held in the afternoon following the demonstrations and speaking programs during the noon hours.

Dedication Ceremonies Friday Opening New Bridge

More than 250 persons representing ten Panhandle cities attended the dedication ceremonies last Friday opening a new bridge which forges a link in two transcontinental highways.

The \$193,000 concrete and steel span over the Prairie Dog Town Fork of Red River is located about 26 miles east of Silverton on Highway 70 and 256. It replaces a bridge that has been out for more than a year up the river about two miles.

Highway 70 is a Canadian-to-Mexico route and Highway 256 extends from Buffalo, N. Y., to the West Coast.

Delegations were present from Perryton, Pampa, Clarendon, Hedley, Memphis, Silverton, Turkey, Quitaque, Flomot and Matador.

Speakers for the occasion included J. W. Lyons, Jr., County Judge of Briscoe County; John Mayfield, Perryton Chamber of Commerce Secretary; J. B. Maguire, county judge elect of Gray County, Pampa; Albert Ratton, representing Motley County; Judge M. O. Goodpasture of Memphis, Palmer Massey, Childress, district engineer for the Texas Highway Department, and Jimmy Faulkner, Clarendon Chamber of Commerce Secretary.

Judge Goodpasture reviewed the 30 year campaign by southeastern Panhandle civic groups which has resulted in construction of the bridge. He cited cooperative effort between citizens of Motley, Hall, Briscoe and Donley Counties.

In 1908 he and his family moved to Throckmorton County and lived there until 1915 when they moved to Briscoe County.

Mr. Joiner is survived by two sons, Carlton Joiner, of Oxford, California; Paul Joiner, Corpus Christi, Texas; three daughters, Mrs. S. T. Davis, of Denton, Texas; Miss Iweta Ann Joiner, Houston, Texas; Mrs. Alvin Redin, of Silverton, Texas; one brother, D. G. Joiner, of Fort Worth, Texas; nine grandchildren and five great grandchildren also survive.

World's Fastest Ship
The graceful superliner United States is believed to be the fastest large vessel in the world. In a recent speed trial her four massive propellers pushed the 53,000 ton black and white beauty through the water at something ear 40 miles an hour. An official announcement put the speed at "considerably" in excess of 34 knots. This means that the 990 foot queen of the United States merchant marine traveled at least 37.5 miles an hour. The ship is designed for rapid conversion to a troop transport in the event of war. Even during the full power run, the rapier bow of the ship piled up surprisingly little wake. Her propellers, on the receiving end of upward of 160,000 shaft horsepower, left a boiling highway of foam a mile astern. Britain's Queen Mary holds the Atlantic passenger speed record with a mark of 31.69 knots.

1,200 Drown Annually
Approximately 1,200 people a year are drowned in the United States in accidents involving small motor - driven boats, rowboats, canoes and similar craft. Sudden storms, high winds, and dangerous water conditions cause numerous accidents. Nearly one fifth of the victims lose their lives when boats are swamped, capsized, or their occupants are swept overboard. About half the drowning takes place in the three months of June through August. Males account for more than 90 per cent of the deaths and about one fourth of the victims are between the ages of 15 and 24.
