Proclamation Office of J. W. Lyon, County Judge

County of Briscoe, State of Texas.

WHEREAS, It has been called to my attention that the citizens of Briscoe County will be presented the rare privilege of donating their blood to our sons and daughters—the fighting men—in Korea, in the one-day period;

Thursday, December 4, at Silvertown, when the Bloodmobile of the Armed Forces, sponsored by the Briscoe County Chapter, American Red Cross, is asking for 150 pints of blood to be assembled quickly and sent by air to the Korean front;

Now, Therefore, I as County Judge of Briscoe County, urge that every citizen of our county make himself available for the purpose of donating our full share of blood to this bank; and that each of us arrange his affairs so as to facilitate the greatest speed in this enterprise;

And I issue this proclamation officially to give the citizenship notice of our responsibility for the lives of our men and boys in Korea, whose very lives may be dependent on our liberal attitude on this occasion.

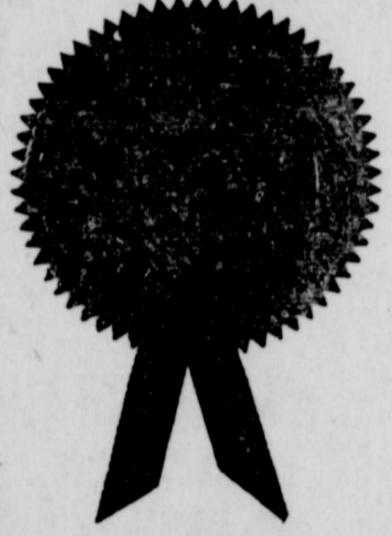

Mill Iron Ranch Sells 703 Calves

Estelline, Texas — Mill Iron ranches of Denver, Colo., and Wellington, Texas, sold 703 registered Hereford bull calves here for a total of \$210,900 as 134 buyers from twenty-one states lined up to pay \$300 a head for prospective sires.

Severe drought and a declining cattle market seemingly had no effect on the unique sale. More than 3,000 persons were on hand with buyers drawing for the priority of selection but paying the same price across the board.

Sears Roebuck foundation again was the heaviest buyer. The organization took 304 bulls for distribution to Future Farmers of America in various states.

Louis Barby & Sons, Meade, Kan., and Laverne, Okla., drew first choice and purchased five bulls for use as prospective sires on commercial cows.

Lafayette M. Hughes, trustee of the Mill Iron ranch with offices at 1200 Grant street in Denver, Colorado, directed the colorful sale.

Members of the committee, which selected the 703 salable bulls from the Mill Iron herd, included Raymond Lewis, Hereford breeder at Colorado Springs, Colorado; John Burns, consultant for the ranch and judge at major stock shows including the National Western in Denver, and Dr. Jack Miller, head of the department of animal husbandry, Texas A. and M. college.

Austin O'Neil, manager of the Mill Iron ranches, said buyers represented Oregon, California, Arizona, Alabama, Virginia, Arkansas, New Mexico, Colorado, Kansas, Florida, South Carolina, South Dakota, Illinois, Texas, North Carolina, Georgia, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Tennessee, Mississippi and Utah.

Scientific Improvement Was Theme for Club Program

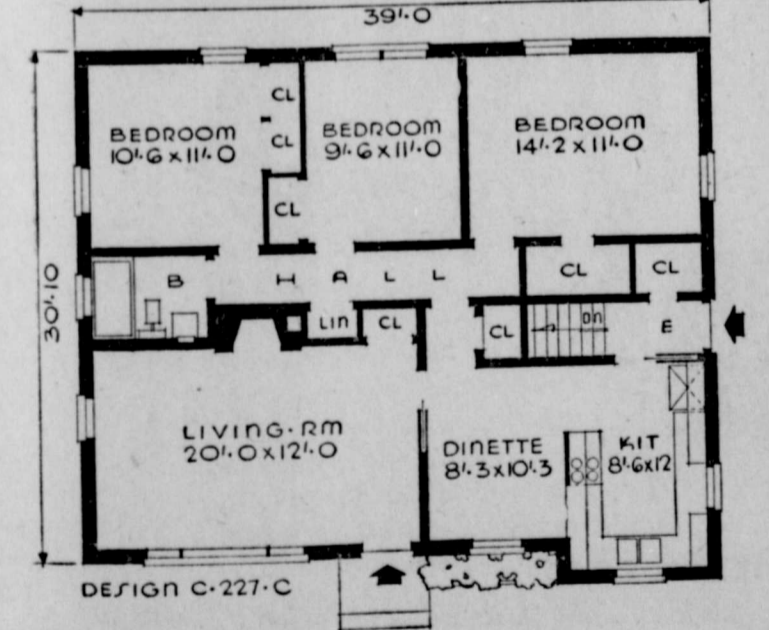
"Scientific Improvement" was the program topic presented at a regular meeting of the 1952 Study Club, held Wednesday afternoon in the club room.

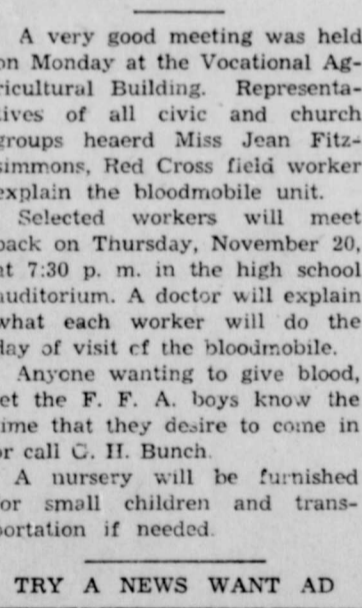

FRESH APPLESAUCE

There are tricks to making even as simple and familiar a dish as fresh applesauce if you want to save time and fine flavor.

Foods and nutrition specialists for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service say if you are making large amounts of apple sauce, here is suggestion to save time in peeling: wash, quarter and core the apples and cook in a covered pan with a small quantity of water. Put the apples through a food press to remove skins easily and to obtain a smooth sauce. If red apples are used, the sauce will have more color. Add a few grains of salt and enough sugar to sweeten while hot.

PREPARE FOR WINTER

The recent "cold-snaps" are the forerunners of more severe weather to come. It is just good management, says W. S. Allen, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, to do now the maintenance and repair jobs around the home and farmstead that will make for more comfort and safer living this winter.

Check the floor furnace burners, controls and plumbing before lighting it, says Allen, to make sure there is no escaping gas to cause an explosion. Do the same for gas heaters and vent them if possible. Vents will eliminate the problem of moisture condensing on the walls and furniture. Check the fireplace and chimney for loose mortar or cracks and if repairs are needed, make them before the first fire is started.

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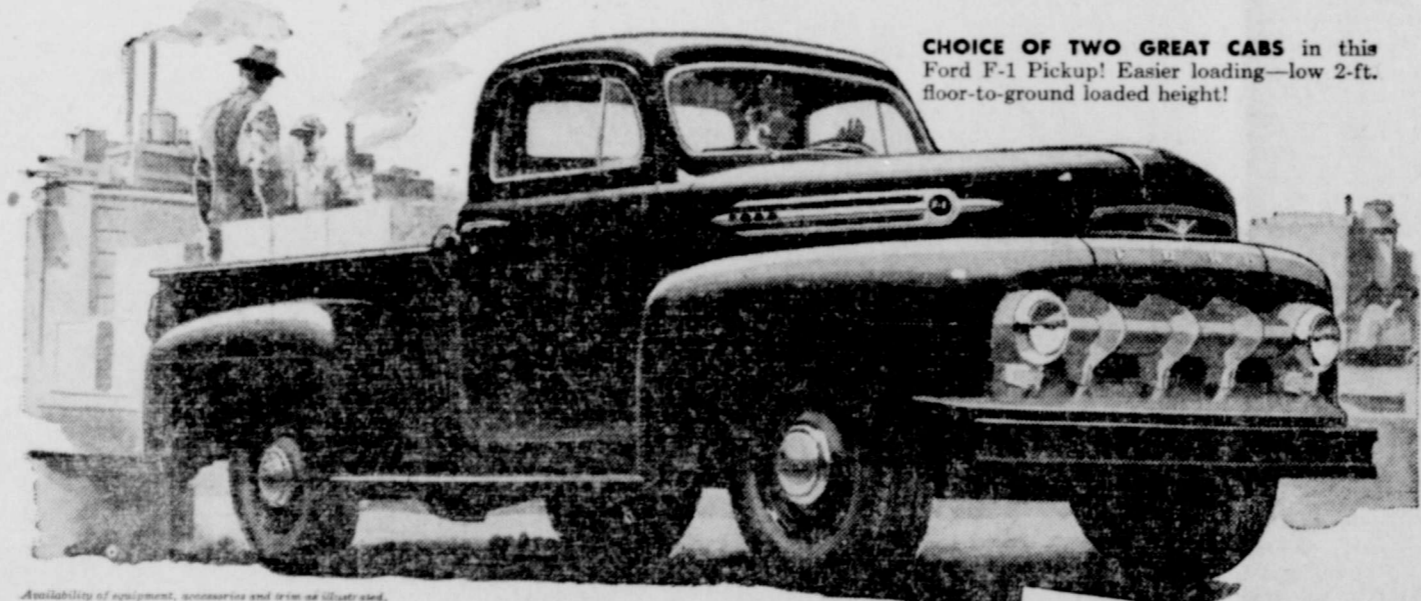
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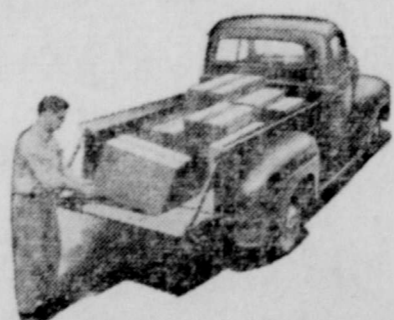
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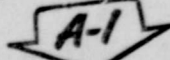
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
