Funeral Services for Buel Hill Held here Sunday Evening

Last rites were held Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock for W. B. (Buel) Hill at the Silvertown Methodist Church by Rev. H. M. Secord. Mr. Hill died suddenly Thursday night at his home in east Silvertown.

Mr. Hill was born October 15, 1895 in Benton County, Missouri, and moved to Briscoe with his family at the age of about six months.

He was one of the first six men called to service in World War One from Briscoe County and was wounded in the Orgone Forrest Battle.

Deceased Was World War One Veteran

W. B. Hill was inducted into the U. S. Army September 17, 1917, at Silvertown, Texas; assigned the 48th Company, 12th Battalion, 165th Depot Brigade; transferred October 29, 1917 to Company D, 144th Infantry; transferred April 18, 1918 to Infantry Company 2, Camp Bowie April Replacement Draft; left the United States May 3, 1918, and arrived in France May 19, 1918, and remained in the Classification Camp, First Depot Division until assigned June 28, 1918 to Company D, 163rd Infantry. He was transferred July 4, 1918, and returned to the United States as a casual on January 25, 1919, and was honorably discharged on demobilization February 26, 1919, at Camp Bowie, Texas, while serving as a private, Company 46, Casual Camp No. 2.

Surviving are three daughters, Mrs. Orlan Simmons, Silvertown; Mrs. Jack McGilvray, Spokane, Washington; Mrs. Al Heirford, Los Angeles, California.

He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Clarence Burson, of Idaho; and Mrs. A. B. Childers, of Silvertown; four brothers, J. C. Hill, Richard Hill, R. L. (Bob) Hill and Bailey Hill, all of Silvertown; his stepmother, Mrs. R. M. Hill, two step-sisters, Mrs. Troy Burson and Mrs. Rex Dickerson, all of Silvertown. All of the children, brothers and sisters were here for the funeral.

He is also survived by five grandchildren, they are: Michael David Simmons, Cheryl Danese Simmons, Neva LeJean, Simmons, William Bruce Simmons, all of Silvertown; Janise Arlane Herriford, Los Angeles, California.

Interment was made in the Silvertown cemetery under direction of Douglas Funeral Home.

State Selective Service Headquarters Announce Call

The biggest state draft call in two years—calling for the induction of 2,939 men in March—was announced Tuesday by state Selective Service headquarters.

Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said that more than 6,800 men also would be examined in March to keep the state ready to fill future calls.

Local board quotas for the March induction call will be figured and placed in the mail on or about February 10, the state draft director said. The March quotas for physical examinations are scheduled to be sent to local boards Tuesday.

General Wakefield said that local boards will be authorized to induct men in March down to the age of 19 years and 9 months and examine men down to the age of 19 years and 4 months.

Not many men below the age of 20 will be inducted in March, according to prediction of the state Selective Service director. Local boards will be advised to fill March calls to greatest extent possible with men 20 or older.

"I believe only a very small percentage of those inducted in March will be below the age of 20," General Wakefield commented. "Latest available figures from our local boards show only 536 men below 20 who are examined and acceptable. Of course, this number will grow between now and March."

The state draft director said that present inductees for the armed forces are replacements for drafted men who are now getting out after two years of service.

Texas has inducted more than 52,000 men since beginning of hostilities in Korea and has examined more than 125,000 during the same period.

50 Years of Extension Work Gets Resolution

Significant developments in the 50 year history of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service were pointed out in a resolution recently passed by the Board of Directors of the Texas A & M College System.

The resolution states: "It has come to the attention of the Board that 1953 will mark the 50th anniversary of one of the great parts of the Texas A & M College System. The Agricultural Extension Service had its beginning in February of 1903 when Dr. Seaman A. Knapp, representing the United States Department of Agriculture, established the first farm demonstration in the nation on the farm of Mr. Walter Porter near Terrell in Kaufman County. This successful demonstration, which proved cotton could be grown profitably despite the boll weevil, became the foundation for the development of Extension work throughout the nation.

"In 1904, Farmer's Cooperative Demonstration Work was organized in the Bureau of Plant Industry, USDA, with Dr. Knapp in charge and with headquarters in Houston.

"The first county agricultural agent to work exclusively in one county was appointed in November, 1906. He was Mr. W. C. Stallings and the appointment was made in Smith County.

"The Board," states the resolution, "especially takes note of another important early date. Jack County Agricultural Agent Tom Marks, in 1908 organized the first boys' corn club in Texas. This was the beginning of the youth phase of Extension—the 4-H clubs.

"The Texas Legislature in 1911 passed the first law authorizing county commissioners' courts to appropriate money for agents' salaries. Work also started that year with the Negro farm families of the state.

"Texas A & M College became a part of the rapidly expanding demonstration work program in 1912 when a cooperative agreement was signed with the USDA. Mr. C. M. Evans, now of Dallas, superintendent of the Extension Division, A & M College. The first county home demonstration agent, Mrs. Edna W. Trigg, was appointed that same year in Milam County."

In 1914 the Federal Congress passed the Smith-Lever Bill which officially set up the Agricultural Extension Service on a national basis and made it a part of the Land-Grant College System—other parts of this system are the resident teaching and experiment stations.

Continuing, the resolution states "The Board extends its congratulations to all, past and present, who have contributed to the advancement of the Extension Service and to their efforts in raising the standard of living in rural Texas. Better livestock, crops, cultural methods, increased production, home life, insect control, 4-H club work, soil and water conservation, soil improvement and training rural leaders to assume responsibilities in their home communities, county, state and nation are but a few of the outstanding achievements.

"Through two World Wars, depressions, floods and droughts, the teachings of Extension workers have been used by rural Texans in solving their problems. Through the demonstration, these workers have shown the practical application of research on the farms, ranches and in the homes of the state. The complex problems of modern living and agriculture have increased the usefulness of the Service and at the same time challenges its workers to even greater achievements

Self-employed -- Do You Have Your Social Security Number?

John R. Sanderson, manager, Federal Security Agency Social Security Administration, Amarillo, Texas says three million or more self-employed people will have new insurance protection when they file their income tax return for 1952 and include their self-employment report. For those who have been continually in business since 1950, this report will put on record two full years of coverage under social security and will make each of them full insured, at least until July 1955. As they continue in business and continue to report these earnings once every year, their fully insured status will be maintained.

By fully insured we mean that these persons or their survivors have a measure of protection against loss or earned income due to old-age and death—that benefits can be paid in the event of their retirement after age 65, or to their survivors in case of death at any age. In most cases, these benefits are substantial and are an important source of income. Care should be taken by all self-employed persons to report their earnings properly.

Last year many reports were received without a social security account number anywhere on the return. We are still contacting people to obtain their social security account number, for without it we cannot give credit on a wage record. We must have the social security number before the wages can be posted.

The self-employed who are required to report for 1952 should have their account number ready for income tax time. If the social security card has been lost or destroyed, a duplicate card should be obtained from the social security field office now. All self-employed persons who make a net profit of \$400 or more in an occupation covered by the law, must file a return and a profit statement (Called Schedule C). This must be done even if their income is not high enough to require income tax payment.

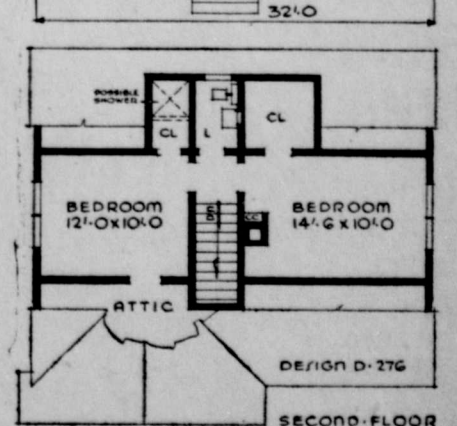
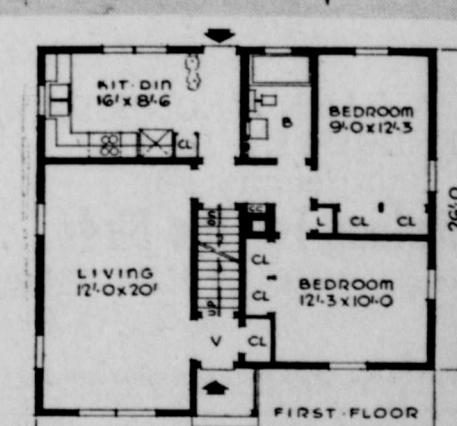

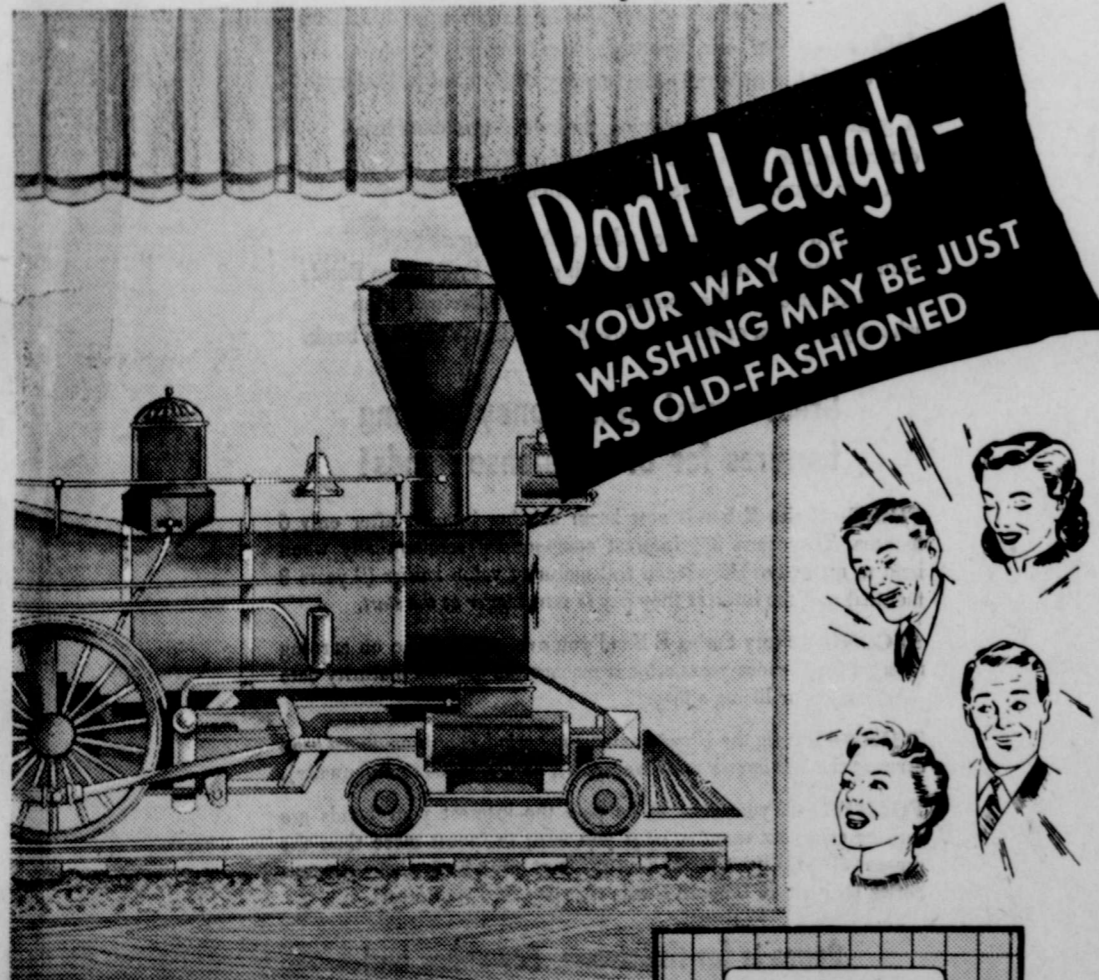
