Panhandle Plains Dairy Show Dates April 11-17

Plainview is getting set to serve as host to the 26th annual Panhandle-Plains Dairy Show. The dates are April 11-17 inclusive.

Entries began coming in to Wayne Smith, Chamber of Commerce manager and manager of the Dairy Show, more than a week ago and at last weekend more than 20 head of cattle were listed for exhibition.

Smith said indications now are that this year's entry list may be lighter than in several shows. Last year 470 head were exhibited in the five divisions and entries have ranged from 400 to more than 500 for several years.

Exhibitors from several states, most of them from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico, will compete for \$3,636 in cash premiums.

The Dairy Show facilities are in better condition for the 1953 exhibit than they have ever been, Smith pointed out.

The Panhandle Plains Dairy Show ranks among the three largest such expositions in the United States, Smith points out. The Dairy Show here, supported entirely from public subscription, moved up a notch in national rating with the bankruptcy of the International Show in Indianapolis, Indiana, last year.

The Panhandle Plains Dairy Show is the only one in the country that is supported by public subscription. That was the way it was originally set up and, so far, no majority of the Association members has seen fit to change the situation. There is no gate charge.

National Red Cross Established Hd'qrs At Plains

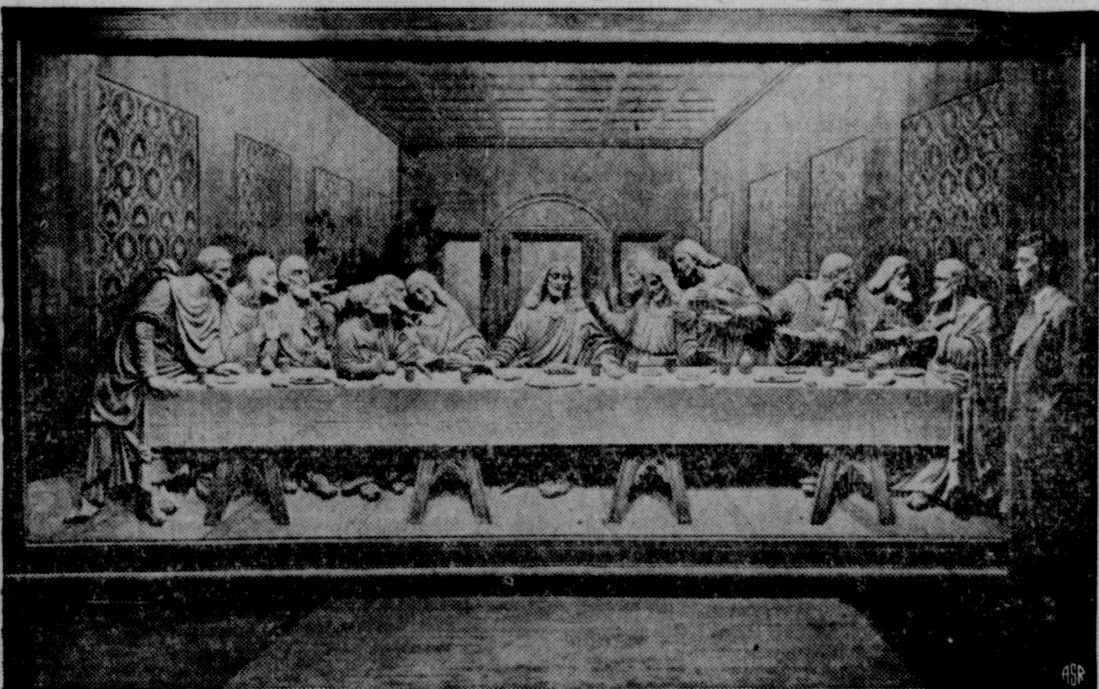

Life-size Wood Carving of Last Supper



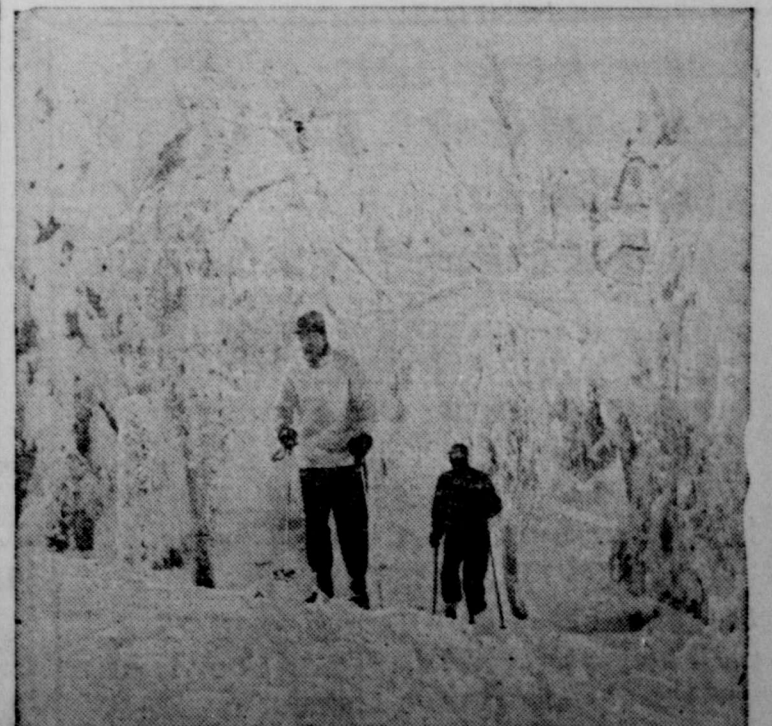

BOSTON, MASS.—All the specialized skills of some of the finest craftsmen of New England have been combined to create this life-size copy in wood of the famous painting "The Last Supper" by Leonardo da Vinci.

More than a year was used in preparing the great carving—18½ feet long and 8½ feet wide. The figures, of limewood, are delicately tinted to give a feeling of lifelike reality, and a giant frame of contrasting walnut gives it depth. The carving will be the point of central interest in the Upper Room chapel, now nearing completion in Nashville. It is expected that visitors who view the carving will be moved to spend a few moments in prayer and meditation in keeping with the purpose of The Upper Room—a devotional guide issued in 17 languages and used round the world. The chapel itself is part of the new headquarters building for The Upper Room, the world's most widely used devotional guide. It is believed that it will become a devotional shrine and point of interest for visitors of the Midsouth.

The picture shows W. D. Irving, of Irving and Casson, New York and Boston, who have produced wood carvings for some of America's greatest churches and cathedrals. The wood carving was done from a model created by Ernest Pelligrini.

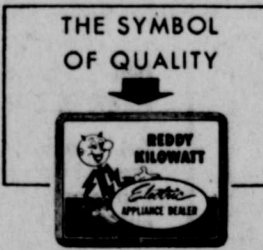

New Map Shows World Contrast And Conflicts

WASHINGTON—The tremendous contrasts of the world's greatest body of water, with its vast stretches of marine wilderness thousands of miles from any land and its equally great areas dotted with myriad islands, are dramatically illustrated in the National Geographic Society's new map, The Pacific Ocean.

The Pacific covers about a third of the earth's surface, and the events taking place today on its waters, shores, and islands can well affect the future of mankind.

The 29-by-37 1/2-inch ten-color map was distributed to the Society's more than 2,000,000 member families with the December issue of the National Geographic Magazine. Members may purchase additional copies by mail.

Alaska to Australia
The map covers an area extending from Cape Horn to Siberia, from Alaska to Australia. In addition, the most important of the 20,000 islands of the Pacific are shown in detail in 60 inserts.

Wake Island, for instance, gallantly defended by U.S. Marines and civilians against the Japanese in World War II, is dwarfed on the big map by the red star indicating an important airport. An inset, however, depicts the island's peculiar horseshoe shape, its lagoon, airport, and settlements.

In like manner Pitcairn Island is a tiny dot at the extreme eastern end of the Tuamotu Archipelago on the large map. The inset carries names familiar to readers of "Mutiny on the Bounty," such as Point Christian and Bounty Bay.

Atomic Ocean
The terrible realities of nuclear fission are a part of the Pacific. Charted are Hiroshima and Nagasaki, and on the other side of the ocean the U.S. Western Desert, wartime home of the bomb. Close together in the Marshalls are Bikini and Eniwetok, final U.S. bomb proving grounds. And within the map area on the Monte Bello Islands, 50 miles west of Australia, Britain's first atomic weapon was exploded in October.

Not only is the Pacific the world's widest ocean. It is the deepest. Between Guam and Yap in 1951 the British survey ship Challenger sounded the deepest water known to man, where the bottom is 35,640 feet down.
