BRISCOE-MEMPHIS ROAD TO BE PAVED EARLY IN 1954

Memphis, Nov. 1 (Special)—The unpaved gap in the highway between Memphis and Silvertown will be hard surfaced within a year. That was the assurance given a group from this area, when they met with the Texas Highway Commission at Austin last week.

The group also was told that the highway will be given a continuous number from the Oklahoma line to the New Mexico line. At present, the highway bears the numbers, US 62, State 256, State 86, and US 60.

The unpaved stretch is more than nine miles long. When completed, it will be part of an all-weather transcontinental highway, connecting Oklahoma City, Hollis, Okla., Memphis, the scenic Cap Rock Country, Silvertown, Tullia, Dimmitt, Bovina, and Clovis, New Mexico.

The unpaved gap is in Briscoe County, west of a new \$200,000 concrete bridge across the Prairie Dog Fork of Red River.

BRISCOE COUNTY MAN TO JOIN DA'S STAFF FRIDAY

Amarillo, Texas.—R. C. Hamilton of Quitaque and Clairmont, former county attorney for Kent County, will join the staff of the district attorney's office here this week, according to Dist. Atty. A. J. Robinson.

The appointment of the 27-year old Hamilton will fill one of two vacancies created when Deane C. Watson and Gib Howard, assistant district attorneys, left the office about a month ago. Robinson said yesterday he had not yet selected an assistant to fill the second vacancy.

In a long distance telephone conversation, Hamilton told The Daily News he hopes to be here Friday but may be delayed by a civil lawsuit in which he is engaged at Claremont. He said he has formally accepted the job here and resigned from the office of Kent County attorney.

Hamilton is the son of Mr. and Mrs. V. D. Hamilton of Quitaque. He attended Quitaque High School but quit at the age of 17 to join the Marine Corps. He served with the First Marine Regiment in the Pacific during World War II and participated in the Okinawa campaign.

After the war, Hamilton came home and completed his education, receiving his degree in law from Baylor University Law School in the Summer of 1950. He engaged in the practice of law in Briscoe County then moved to Clairmont in Kent County.

He was appointed Kent County attorney in 1951 and was elected to the office in 1952.

The arrival of the new district attorney here will bring together two marine veterans who had not been acquainted with each other until Hamilton formally applied for his new job.

Robinson, 33, is a former Marine who was taken prisoner by the Japanese when they overwhelmed Corregidor in the early days of the war.

He was appointed district attorney for the 47th Judicial District on Sept. 9 to serve the unexpired term of Herman C. Pipkin, who resigned to enter private law practice.

Watson and Howard resigned as assistant district attorneys about a month ago, after they received notices of dismissal. The notices were the result of dissonance between Robinson and the assistants with respect to the conduct of the district attorney's office.

POPPY DAY PREPARATIONS PUSHED BY AUXILIARY

Preparations for Poppy Day were occupying the women of the American Legion Auxiliary throughout the country this month as the organization got ready for its annual distribution of the little red flowers of memory to be worn in honor of America's war dead on Nov. 7, according to Mrs. Conrad Alexander, poppy Chairman of Unit of the Auxiliary here.

"We are all ready for Poppy Day here," Mrs. Alexander said. "Our Girl Scout Troop, 'Dusty Trailers' has responded splendidly to the call for volunteers to distribute the flowers on the streets. Teams have been organized and locations assigned. You will meet us bright and early on the morning of Nov. 7 with our bright red poppies which symbolize the lives sacrificed in defense of America.

"The poppies have been made for us by disabled veterans at Veterans Hospitals, working under the direction of the Texas Department of the American Legion Auxiliary. They are made of crepe paper, with wire stems, and resemble as closely as possible the wild poppies of France and Flanders which bloomed in such profusion on the battle fields and war cemeteries there. The work of making them has provided interesting and beneficial occupation for many disabled veterans through the winter and spring.

"When we offer our memorial poppies on Poppy Day, we will ask for contribution for war's living victims, the disabled veterans and needy children of veterans. Most of the money we receive will remain right here in Silvertown, filling our Unit rehabilitation and child welfare funds so that we will be able to extend emergency help to veterans and their families here during the coming year.

"We hope everyone will catch the spirit of Poppy Day, will wear a poppy proudly in honor of those who have given their lives for America, and contribute generously to help those to whom the three ars of the last 35 years have brought suffering and hardship."
