

Few people question the value of weatherproofing the soil in the long run, but some ask if it will pay off next year.

The answer, points out Thorn ton, comes from records kept by extension service demonstrators in all sections of the state. Corn tollowing fertilized legumes produced 36 bushels an acre against 18 bushels where corn did not follow fertilized legumes. This ame method of farming showed the following year a per acre inrease of 71 percent for cotton, 63 percent for grain sorghum, 56 percent for wheat, 65 percent for ats and 129 percent for sweet potatoes.

Thornton suggests you see your ounty agricultural agent about weatherproofing the soil. He can help select the right winter cover crop and proper fertilizer for weaving a blanket of green on your farm.


