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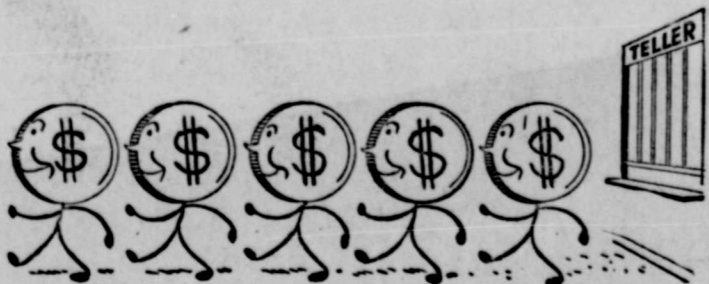

HOW TO LIVE WITH YOUR TEEN-AGER

"I'm too old to be a squab and too young to be a chicken. What am I? I guess a dead duck, that's all." Thus speaks one of the teen-agers Dr. Dorothy Baruch writes about in her recently published book HOW TO LIVE WITH YOUR TEEN-AGER.

Dr. Baruch, a leading consulting psychologist and a parent, says that no time in the life of parents brings as many puzzling questions as does that period when their children are in the teen years. "This is an age when feelings are heightened and quickened," she tells us, "even though your adolescent may put on bravado or an I-don't-care manner."

Dr. Baruch does not consider the teen-ager alone and apart, however. "After all," she says, "the teen-ager is a member of society, and he must live in his family until he is old enough to take his own life into his own hands." Therefore, Dr. Baruch considers the parents' feelings as well as those of the teen-ager. "If parents try to go counter to their desires and impulses," she tells us, "as they have too often tried to do in order to be good parents, they only make themselves and their teen-agers edgy and tense."

So to all parents and teachers her motto is: "Consider the teen-ager's feelings. Consider your own feelings. For only out of this dual sort of consideration can really sound guidance be achieved."

from saying, "Unless you learn to make your bed as you should, you won't know how to take care of your own home properly when you get married." In the former, you are admitting that it's for you you're asking, and you're not putting on an act that it's for your child. And basically your child will love and respect you far more for being honest than he will if he senses any sham.

Our teen-ager still wants love, and our love is still essential to him. But he is struggling to move, as he must, to a new place in the universe where his family are no longer the center. He must find a new center composed of himself and a partner, who together create a new family and a new world. He has a long trek to travel from early adolescence to reach this new world, and parents can help their teen-agers do this more than they realize, as Dorothy Baruch points out in her book.

Dr. Baruch is the author of a number of other books for parents, among them NEW WAYS IN DISCIPLINE and ONE LITTLE BOY; several books for children; and many popular magazine articles and professional research reports.

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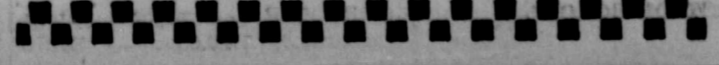

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Questions And Answers

Q — I'm a disabled Korean veteran taking vocational training under Public Law 16. The way I've figured it, I'll have some entitlement left for Korean GI Bill training, after I'm rehabilitated. But when that time comes, my cut-off date for starting will have passed. Will that deprive me of Korean GI training benefits?

A — Not necessarily. You may be permitted to take Korean GI Bill training if the course is a normal progression from the Public Law 16 training you will have completed.

Q — I understand the Korean GI Bill bars dancing courses for veterans. I'm taking physical education in college and one of the courses I'm required to take is dancing. Will I have to skip this course somehow, or will I be able to take it?

A — You will be permitted to take your dancing course. In your case, it does not come within the restrictions of the law, since it is an integral part of your cover-all training program.

Q — Premiums on my National Service Life Insurance policy are under waiver, since I've been totally and permanently disabled for many months. I have a term policy, but I'd like to convert it to a permanent plan. May I do this?

A — You may convert your term insurance to a permanent plan if the conversion is made within the time period allowed by the law.

A — Yes. You may convert your term policy to any permanent plan other than endowment. And you won't be required to take a medical examination.

Q — I want to reinstate my GI term insurance policy, which has been lapsed for more than three months, and I understand I'll have to take a physical examination. Could this examination be given by an osteopath?

A — Yes. The examination may be given by a licensed osteopath who graduated from a recognized college of osteopathy and who is listed in the current directory of the American Osteopathic Association.

Q — I plan to start training under the Korean GI Bill. Can you tell me what evidence I'll have to furnish the VA to establish dependency of my wife and child, so that I can get a higher rate of allowance?

A — You must submit a certified copy of the public or church record of your marriage, and a certificate copy of the public record of birth or record of baptism of your child. If either you or your wife have been married before, additional documents will be required.

Q — I am a World War II veteran with a \$5,000 National Service Life Insurance policy. Would it be possible for me to obtain \$5,000 more of GI insurance?

A — No. The law prohibits the insurance of new policies to World War II veterans who did not return to active service after the Korean hostilities started.

Q — I was training under the World War II GI Bill at the time I was called back to active military duty. I've just been separated. May I resume my GI studies?

A — Yes. You may resume your training under the World War II GI Bill, so long as you go back into training within a reasonable period after your separation.

SCIENCE and your Health

OVERDUE BABIES by Science Features

Expectant mothers often worry when the baby is not born on the date predicted by the family doctor. Is the baby getting too large for a normal delivery? Will labor be more severe? Is there something wrong with the baby? The answer to all these questions is no, according to a survey conducted by Dr. Robert E. Lartz of the Sharon, Pa., General Hospital. Dr. Lartz studied 71 overdue babies — several of which were as much as 45 days late in arriving. Here is what he found:

Only nine of the overdue babies were considered to be large (weighing nine pounds or more). All but two of these were delivered spontaneously. The rest were "normal" in every sense of the word.

Dr. Lartz concludes that post-maturity — an overdue baby — "is not a dangerous complication, does not produce excessively large babies, does not lead to an increase in the average length of labor, and is not an indication for a Caesarean section."

So it seems that the best thing an expectant mother can do when her child is late in arriving is to wait with confidence and as much patience as she can muster.
