

### SOCIAL SECURITY DUE FOR INCREASE JAN. 1

The social tax rate for perons whose work counts toward old-age and survivors insurance is scheduled to increase on the first of January, John R. Sanderon, manager of the Amarillo Social Securiey Office, reminded employers, employees, and selfemployed people today.

This scheduled increase in tax contribution is in accordance with the 1950 amendments to the social security law, and was enacted by Congress in anticipation of future obligations of the pro-

Employees in jobs covered by the law will have 2 percent instead of the present 11/2 percent deducted from their pay beginning with the first of January up to earnings of \$3600 a year; their employers will contribute an equal amount. The new rates will contribute an equal amount. The new rates will apply to all of the leopard to bring a taxable wages paid after Dec- whimsical touch to lingerie. taxable wages paid after December 31, 1953, regardless of when earned.

The social security tax for the self-employed is scheduled in increase from the present 24 percent to 3 percent, for the period commencing January 1, 1954. Since the self-employed whose work is covered by the law pay their tax once yearly at the time of filing their Federal income tax return, they will pay the present 24 percent social security tax on their 1953 income that counts toward social security. This will bedue not later than March 15, 1954. Their first payments at the increased rate of 3 percent will be due March 15, 1955, for the calendar year 1954.



### HOW TO LIVE WITH YOUR TEEN-AGER

too young to be a chicken. What am I? I guess a dead duck, that's all." Thus speaks one of the teen-agers Dr. Dorothy Baruch writes about in her recently published book HOW TO LIVE WITH YOUR TEEN-AGER.

Dr. Baruch, a leading consulting psycologist and a parent, says that no time in the life of parents brings as many puzzling questions as does that period when their children are in the teen years. "This is an age feelings are heightened and quickened," she tells us, "even though your adolescent may put on bravado or an I-don't-care

Dr. Baruch does not consider the teen-ager alone and apart, however. "After all," she says, "the teen-ager is a member of "the teen-ager is a member of society, and he must live in his family until he is old enough to take his own life into his own hands." Therefore, Dr. Baruch considers the parents' feelings as well as those of the teen-ager. "If parents try to go counter to their desires and impulses," she tells us, " as they have too often tried to do in order to be good parents, they only make themselves and their teen-agers edgy and tense." So to all parents and teachers her motif is: "Consider the teenager's feelings. Consider your own feelings. For only out of this dual sort of consideration can really sound guidance be achieved."

But he is struggling to-move, as he must, to a new place in the universe where we his family are no longer the center. He must find a new center composed of himself and a partner, who together create a new family and a new world. He has a long trek to travel from early adolescence to reach this new world, and parents can help their teenagers do this more than they re-alize, as Dorothy Baruch points out in her book.

Dr. Baruch is the author of a number of other books for parents, among them NEW WAYS IN DISCIPLINE and ONE LITTLE BOY; several books for children; and many popular magazine articles and professional research reports.



OVERDUE BABIES by Science Features

Expectant mothers often worry when the baby is not born on the date predicted by the family doe tor. Is the baby getting too large for a normal delivery? Will labor be more severe? Is there something wrong with the baby?

The answer to all these questions is no, according to a survey con-

Only nine of the overdue babies were considered to be large (weighing nine pounds or more). All but two of these were delivered spontaneously. The rest were "normal" in every sense of the word.

Dr. Lartz concludes that postmaturity—an overdue baby—"is not a dangerous complication, does not produce excessively large babies, does not lead to an increase in the average length of labor, and is not an indication for a Caesarean section."

So it seems that the best thing an expectant mother can do when her child is late in arriving is to wait with confidence and as much patience as she can muster.
