Farm Bureau Outlines Recommendations For Drouth Area

Meeting Scheduled For May 10th

At a meeting Tuesday night in Hotel Lubbock, representatives from 12 counties of District II, Texas Farm Bureau, discussed ways and means of aiding farmers in drouth area.

The following recommendations were made and will be presented to congress at once: That it may aid farmers on 1954 crop.

1. Make emergency loans to farmers that are unable to get help from existing credit agencies.

2. It is recommended that this aid be made possible through F. H. A. production and subsistence loans.

3. That these loans be extended for a sufficient time to allow farmers to recover from drouth. Eight to ten years if necessary and interest rate not to exceed 2 percent.

4. It is recommended that F. H. A. repayments be held in a permanent fund instead of being turned back to Government each year and appropriations made.

H. L. (Hub) King, State Director of District 2, of Brownfield, Texas presided at the meeting. Counties present were Lynn, Lubbock, Crosby, Swisher, Motley, Dickens, Briscoe, Terry, Bailey, Castro, Parmer and Hockley.

Merle Montague, president of Briscoe County Farm Bureau, attended the meeting at Lubbock.

He pointed out that the local Farm Bureau would meet Monday night, May 10 at the First Methodist Church. This will be the regular monthly meeting. A business meeting and refreshments are scheduled at this time.

The wives are invited to attend this meeting.

H. V. Tull, Sr. Died Tuesday

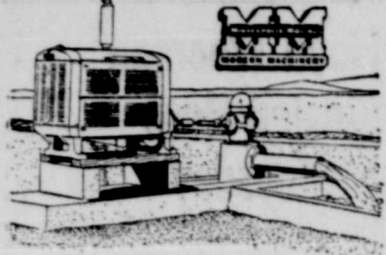
Mr. H. V. Tull, Sr. 82, died at his home in Plainview early Tuesday of last week.

Fastest Firing Automatic Gun Made By Pontiac

PONTIAC, MICH. - The fastest-firing automatic gun ever mass-produced is being built under Army Ordnance contract for the Air Force by Pontiac Motor Division of General Motors.

The Defense Department's lifting of secrecy on this amazing jet aircraft cannot be produced by the automobile manufacturer brought to light this week some of the amazing features of the revolutionary gun, officially the "Gun, Automatic, 20 MM, M 39". It was developed as the phenomenal increase in aircraft.

Robert M. Critchfield, General Manager of Pontiac and Vice-President of General Motors, said the security of the gun project has been guarded so closely that many employees at the main plant where the gun has been produced and fire-tested for over a year, are unaware of its nature.

Pontiac Motor is the only production source of this precision built cannon. The rate of fire of the weapon, not revealed, is acknowledged to be considerably greater than the firing rate of the latest caliber .50 machine gun, which fires 1,200 rounds of ammunition per minute.

The gun had been on drafting boards and in the experimental stage for about five years before it was decided to mass produce the gun, Ordnance officials say. Intricate mechanism required that thousands of man hours be applied to each redesign and modification to bring it to production line status. Some of the changes on the gun were suggested by actual use of the gun in Korean combat. Last year, for instance, Pontiac executed many engineering changes on the project as directed by Ordnance notices. Many engineering changes were for the purpose of lengthening the life of parts on the gun.

Along with delivery tremendous fire-power, the gun is relatively light weight, making it ideal for aerial use.

FARM HOME ADMINISTRATION ANNOUNCE MORE LOANS AVAILABLE

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson has announced that more loan making authority has been given to Farmers Home Administration officials to speed up emergency loans in the dust storm area. The added authority is effective in five States of Texas, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas. Loans up to \$25,000 may now be approved in the five States. Formerly all applications for loans for more than \$12,000 had to be sent to Washington for approval. The Department is taking every step necessary, Secretary Benson said, to make sure that farmers and ranchers in the dust storm area receive all the assistance the Department can supply. The emergency credit will be used to pay the cost of listing and chiseling land subject to wind erosion. Funds for family subject to wind erosion. Funds for family subsistence, planting of

new crops, temporary and permanent re seeding of pastures, and other necessary farm and ranch expenses can be included in the loans. The loans are made repayable on a schedule based on the applicant's ability to repay and bear 2 percent interest. In addition to the emergency loans, Secretary Benson has announced that drought relief funds are being made available on a reimbursable basis by the Department to States in the dust storm area for practices to help control wind erosion. The States are also helping to provide needed funds. The funds will be used by local government units in the States to list or chisel land subject to blowing, in cases where owners are financially unable to, or otherwise fail to take such action. Kitchen Units Suit All Rooms

Wood kitchen cabinets just won't stay in the kitchen. Imaginative home-owners, in fact, are using them in every room in the house.

Evidence of the versatility of wood cabinets comes from Ponderosa Pine Woodwork, a trade association. When prospective purchasers of cabinets were asked in what part of the house they intended to use them, more than two-thirds said they had some room other than the kitchen in mind.

Thirty-two percent did say they were buying kitchen cabinets for kitchen use. But "bedrooms" was a close second among the answers, with 27 percent of the total response.

Other rooms named by those taking part in the survey were bathroom, utility room, dining area, living room, den, and attic.

Among the non-kitchen uses to which the cabinets were to be put were wardrobe storage, storage space for linens, and "as room dividers." Several persons said they intended to use the wood cabinets to separate attic space into two rooms.

One of the reasons for the adaptability of wood cabinets to various purposes is that they can be installed by the homeowner himself if he wishes. Knocked-down cabinets are available for economical home assembly with ordinary household tools. Fully assembled cabinets can be obtained either painted or unfinished.

The variety of finishes to which wood is suited was given as a main reason for selecting wood kitchen cabinets for other rooms. Fifty-two percent said they preferred a natural finish. An enamel finish, in a color to fit into a room's overall decorative scheme, got 32.5 percent of the vote. Wood stain and varnish accounted for the 15.3 percent remaining. Home-owners said they liked the ease with which wood cabinets can be redecorated if the color scheme of a room is changed.

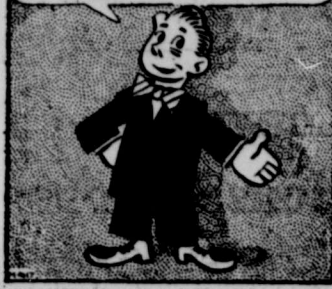
