Surveyor Ready To Go On Street Widening And Curbing Project

The first bale of cotton ginned in Silverton was processed by Tomlin-Fleming Gin Tuesday afternoon. The cotton was produced by Robert Isabell on the Fulton Gregg farm, 8 miles South and 4 miles West of Silverton.

The first bale was from irrigated cotton and the 1660 lbs. of seed cotton was gathered from seven acres. The bale of lint cotton weighed 455 lbs. and the seed 700 lbs. The cotton was of the Macha variety, which is considered a late producer, was planted on the seventh day of May.

Mr. Isabell reached the gin about 4:30 Tuesday afternoon. Shellie Tomlin at the gin stated that they were expecting several more bales within the next few days. He said there were several now gathering on dry land cotton. The boys at the gin were guessing the grade to be middlen 29-32 value.

The bale was ginned free at the Tomlin-Fleming Gin and \$130.00 was made up in premiums and presented for the First Bale.

Mrs. Miller died in October, 1948.

1952 Study Club Met With Mrs. Ray Teeple

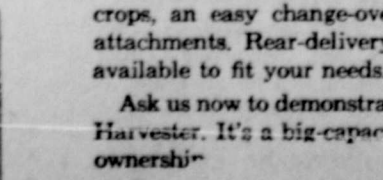

(Below is an interesting story of the daughter of a former Silverton Pastor. The story appeared in the Methodist Advocate and was submitted by Bailey Hill.)

If family background in church and college, her mother's first name, and her own record in high school and church work mean much at all, Linda Kay Adcock of Crowell should do all right in life. Linda's parents met and married in the Paint Creek community, which, strangely enough, has not a single Adcock name anymore. Her mother's first name is Hope, and from the days when as a pre-school toddler she used to accompany her parents to campus and sit ever so quietly looking at magazines and books, the library of the McMurry impressive in school work, church work and personal accomplishments.

While at Miami she was chosen Sweetheart, Harvest Queen, the sophomore cheer leader, FFA senior voted "Most Likely To Succeed" and "Best All-Round," represented Miami in the annual contest at Shamrock on St. Patrick's Day, and had the second highest average in her senior class.

In MYF work she has been a sub-district secretary, then treasurer and president, and also district secretary. She climaxed her achievements to date when elected conference MYF secretary at the summer assembly at McMurry college in June. She has attended senior camp, the Christian Witness Mission in Lubbock, and the Jurisdictional Youth Workshop at Mt. Sequoyal twice, 1953 and 1954. At Crowell she worked with Intermediates for a time and served as a counselor and assistant quest leader at the Childrens district intermediate camp Aug. 2-6. She likes to sew, and plays both the piano and the organ. And, reflecting her mother's first name again, she hopes to be able to serve on the summer camp staff at Ceta Canyon. When the tenth Adcock registers at McMurry the middle of September, she will not only be carrying on the family tradition, but will be bringing an impressive record of accomplishments in her own right.

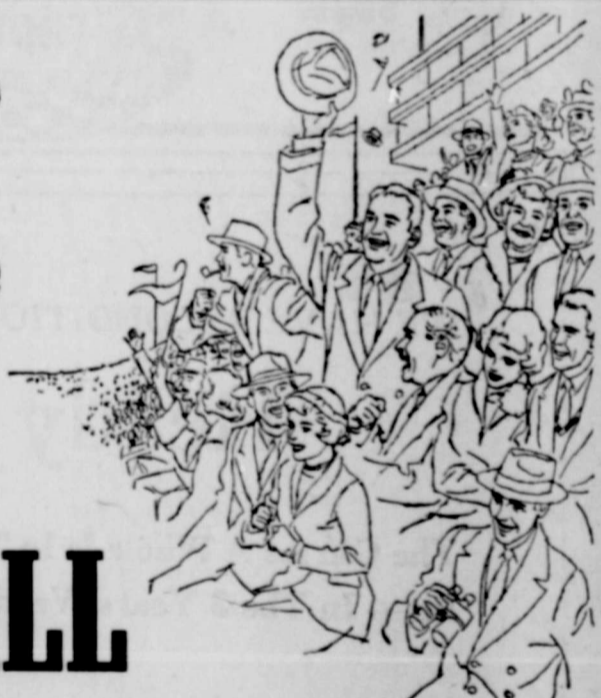
