

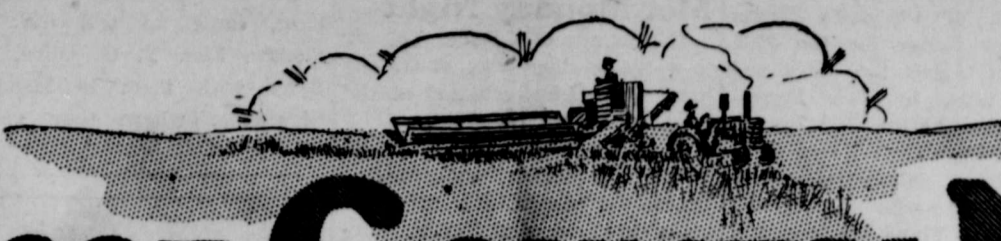

### Silvertown Owls Defeated Lakeview Eagles Friday Night

The Silvertown Owls defeated the Lakeview Eagles here last Friday night in the first conference game for the local team. The Owls scored at least two touchdowns in each quarter with a total of nine, and made seven extra points.

The scoring was started early in the first quarter when C. L. Dunn received a pitch out and raced across the goal line. The second marker was made when Marshall received a screen pass from Ledbetter. The attempted kick was to low. The first quarter ended 13-0.

In the second quarter Sid Marshall took off from the 15 yard line and carried the pig skin over for 6 points. Don Ledbetter carried the extra point over. The next T. D. was made soon after, when Deleath Peugh carried 33 yards for pay dirt. The third touchdown in the second quarter was the results of a screen pass. Sid Marshall was the receiver and gained 40 yards on the play for pay dirt. The score at the half was 34-0.

The first scoring after the half came as the results of a 25 yard run by Don Ledbetter. He was tagged on the 4 yard line but carried the ball over on the next play. James May kicked the extra point. At this point the Silvertown second team took over, and before long Sammy Turner ran 16 yards for 6 points. After this marker, Ledbetter tossed a pass to Donnie Stephens for the extra point, with the third quarter ending 48-0.

In the fourth quarter Ledbetter failed to find a pass receiver and decided to run the ball over for 6 points. May failed in his kick for the extra point. The last scoring was by Jimmy Don Wilson when he snagged a long pass and gained 25 yards and pay dirt. James May kicked the extra point. Five of the seven extra points made were kicked. The game ended 61-0.

### Tribute To T. J. Harrell Being Paid Today In Fort Worth, Local Men Are Attending

Several Briscoe County Ranchers were in Fort Worth today, where ranchers from over the state are paying tribute to T. J. Harrell. Ranchers of this section say that if it had not been for the integrity of this man they would have been forced out of the cattle business.

The story began in January of 1953, when livestock feed manufactured by Harrell's plant turned up with a substance that caused cattle to sicken and waste slowly away. Animals throughout a vast area including Briscoe County died in hundreds. The technical name of Hyperkeratosis was the name given by the cattle industry to the sickness.

The blow to the owners of the dead cattle was a cruel one, and Mr. Harrell understood. The customers had bought the feed in good faith, and he would keep that faith even though the manufacturer of the lubricant at fault would have to bare its share of the blame.

The business world said it would break him, and the Doctor said it would kill him, but he chose to see each man individually, asking them four questions. Did you buy this feed from me? Did you feed it to your cattle? Did your cattle die as a result of the feeding? And what is a fair estimate of the value of the cattle you lost?

Results, all the claims paid in full. One man who admitted he did not buy the feed that caused his animals to die, but had stolen it, was paid for his cattle. During this trying period Mr. Harrell lost 40 lbs. When asked how he endured it? He said: "I didn't alone". The Fort Worth Press described him as a man who lives his religion through the week, and his story as one that is written in the skies. The burden has been lifted and today orders continue to his company, and faith has been restored.

### Enumerators Needed For Agriculture Census In Briscoe

Applications for employment as enumerators for the 1954 Census of Agriculture in Briscoe County will be accepted beginning October 11, it was announced today by Field Supervisor Mr. Charles L. Joyner.

Persons interested should notify Mr. Paul C. Snodgrass, at Floydada, Texas, who is serving as crew leader for this area. Application form can be obtained also from the agriculture census

field office at Amarillo, Texas. Applicants for enumerators jobs must be citizens of the United States, have a high school education or furnish evidence of comparable experience, be in good physical health and of excellent character and be between the ages of 18 to 65. They must have sufficient financial resources to sustain themselves for approximately four or five weeks from the date of appointment until they receive their first salary check. Applicants with veteran preference who meet all requirements will be given priority over nonveteran applicants.

Enumerator job applicants must be licensed to operate and must provide a privately owned automobile in good condition. Pay rates will provide for the cost of operating cars on official Census business.

He reports, on October 4, to the census agriculture field office at Amarillo, Texas, for a week of training.

The crew leader is one of the key people in the field operations of the Census of Agriculture. It is his responsibility to train the enumerators and supervise their work; plan and allocate work assignments.

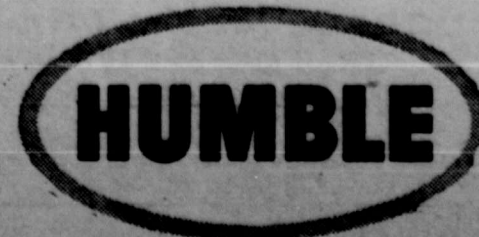

### Veterans Questions And Answers

Q — I am a World War II veteran training under the original GI Bill. Next month I expect to finish my course. Since I have some entitlement remaining, would I be allowed to enroll in another course in a different field?

A — No. Once you complete or discontinue a course under the World War II GI Bill, you generally are prohibited from taking another course, even though you do have additional entitlement.

Q — I enrolled in college under the Korean GI Bill for an AB

degree in English. Several weeks after class started, I changed my mind and decided I would rather go after a BS in business administration. Would this be considered my one and only change of course?

A — Not necessarily. You may change from one baccalaureate degree to another, without having it count as your one and only course change, so long as your new course won't take any longer to complete than the old.

Q — If I simply send an application for Korean GI term insurance to VA within the 120-day deadline, will I be able to get the insurance? I'd like to pay my first premium at a later date, if possible.

A — An application alone, submitted within the 120-day period, would not be enough to entitle you to Korean GI term insurance. You also must pay your first premium within 120 days.

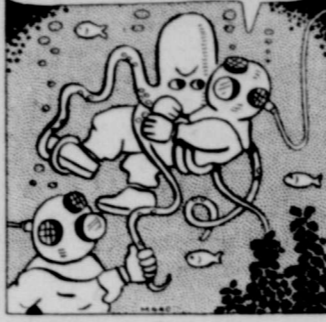

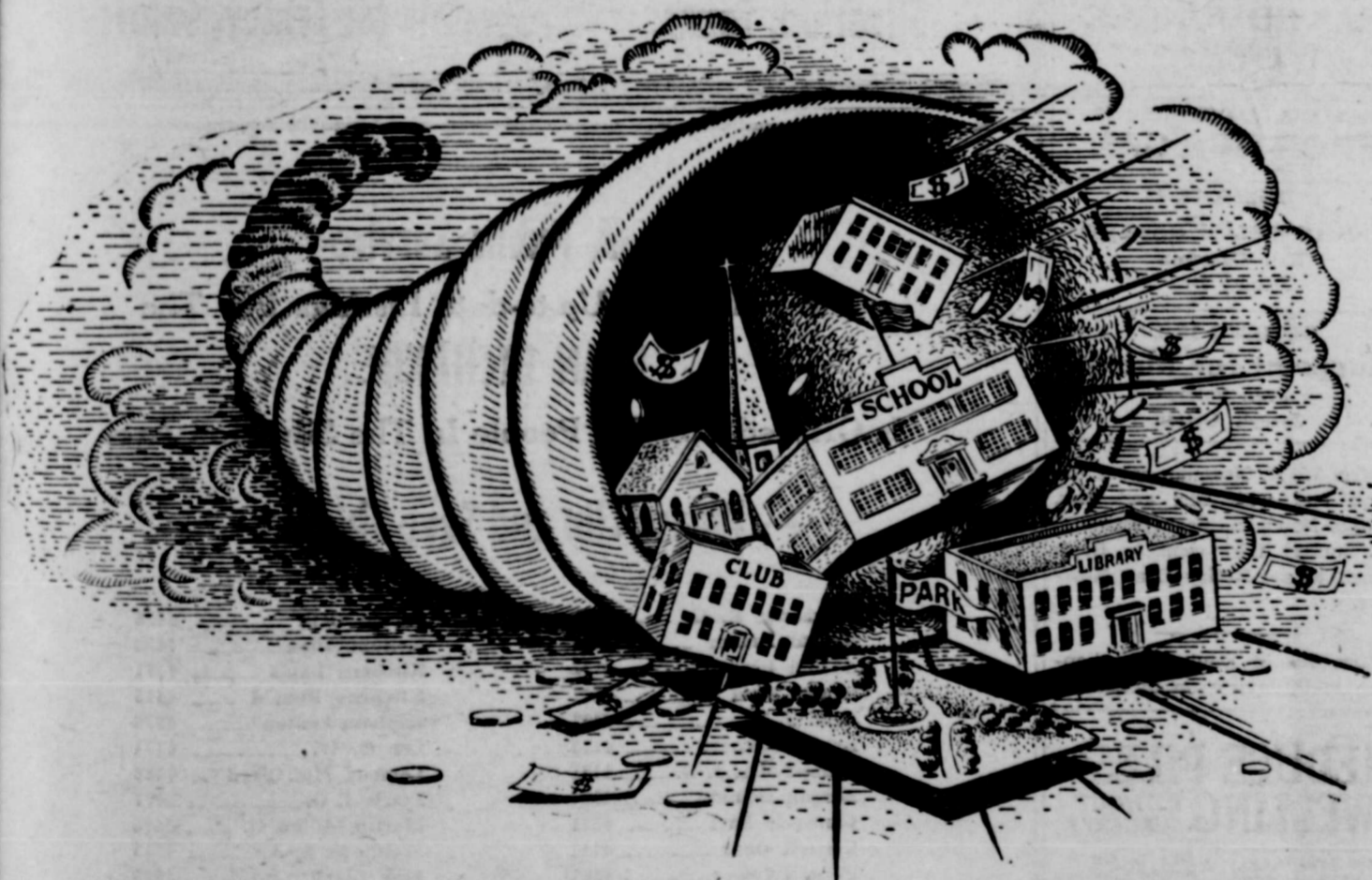


