Made Blood Donation

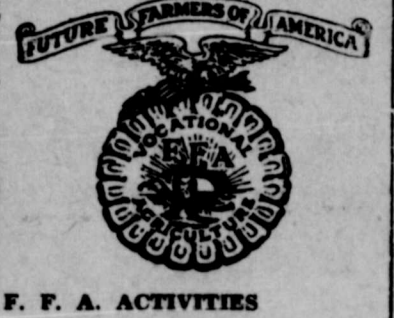

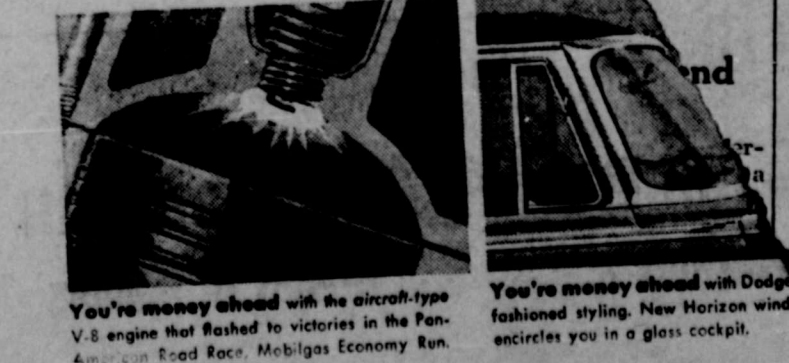

Social Security for 1955

January 1, 1955, a significant change will take place in the amount of the social security deduction for each worker and an equal amount for his employer. A self-employed individual may pay up to \$18 more each year. change will not be apparent in a check, since there is no change in the amount of the deduction. However, when a worker's salary is \$4200 or more, the employer will contribute until his share reaches \$4200. The

This broadening of the earnings base may mean increased contributions of up to \$12 per year for each worker and an equal amount for his employer. 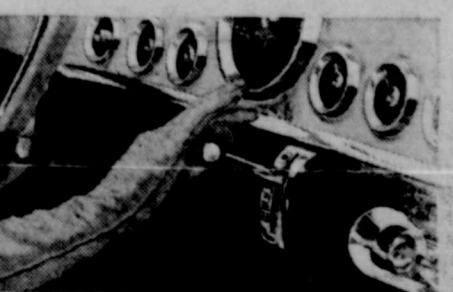
