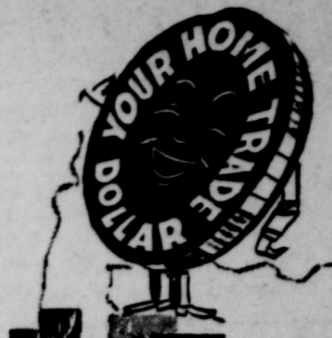

4-H Livestock Team Placed 2nd. At Plainview

A Livestock Judging Team from Briscoe County 4-H Clubs placed 2nd in the 4-H Division at the Plainview Fat Stock Show.

This team composed of Clayton Elkins, Kieth Whitfield, Robert Hill and John Schott also was the 2nd highest team in the whole contest scoring 1121 points. They were just nudged by a team from Hale County by 4 points.

Whitfield and Elkins tied for 4th high individual honors in the contest. The team was 1st in Beef Cattle, 1st in Hog Judging and "close to bottom" in sheep judging.

4-H Livestock Judging Teams judged beef cattle, swine, sheep and quarter horses. The team is coached by County Agent Robert M. Ledbetter.

Briscoe County 4-H Club boys entered 11 pigs and 3 steers at the Plainview Fat Stock Show last week. John Howard Burson placed his steers 5th and 10th and James Roy Brown placed 12. These steers brought 39 cents, 33 cents and 36 cents per pound respectively.

Boys showing hogs were Jerry Reynolds, Jimmy Smith, Jerry and Wayne Stephens, John Mercer and Joe Kitchens. The top placing on a fat barrow was Jerry Reynolds with 5th place. Hogs sold from 17 cents to 29 cents per pound. Jimmy Smith's two barrows brought slightly over \$100. Briscoe County 4-H boys are still making fair returns from hogs.

This was the 6th show, club boys have exhibited in this year. Boys have sold over \$6,000.00 worth of "club" livestock this spring.

4-H Club work is a part of the work carried on by the County Extension Service and the County Agent.

Spur Experimental Station To Hold Field Day

Briscoe County Farmers and Ranchers are urged to attend the Field Day at the Spur Experimental Station Tuesday April 5. 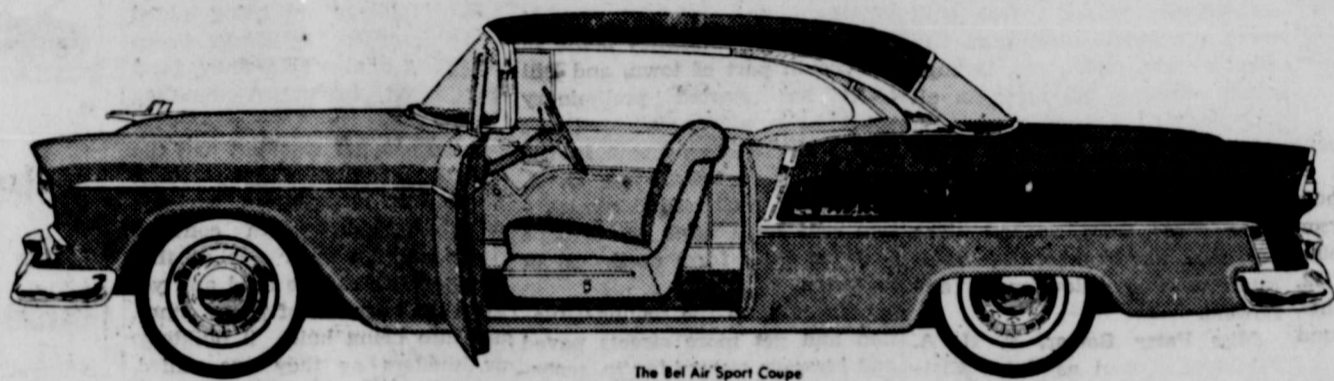
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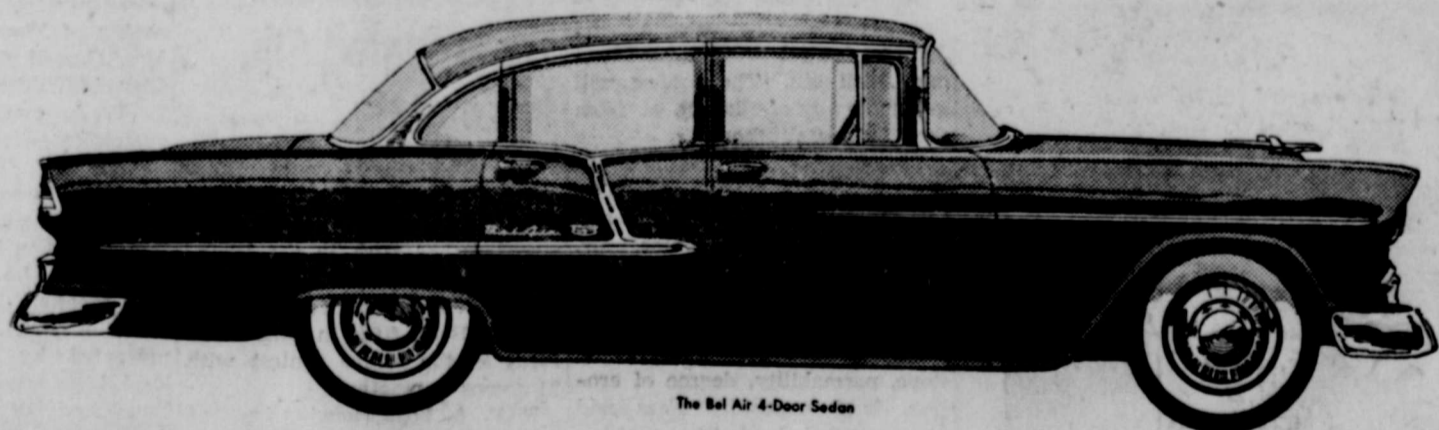
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How To Treat Home Lawns

COLLEGE STATION, MARCH - Home lawns receive an added "punch" if treated in the spring with a complete fertilizer.

Use a fertilizer of a 2-1-1 or 1-1-1 ratio at rates to supply two pounds of actual nitrogen for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area, advises E. M. Trew, extension pasture specialist.

Another pound of nitrogen applied at 30 to 40 days intervals will keep lawns green throughout the summer, says Trew. Supply water as needed.

Water only when the yard shows a definite need. Soak the soil to a depth of at least six inches when the grass takes on a sheer or wilt.

Light frequent sprinkling produces shallow roots and encourage weeds. Shallow roots also are unable to utilize available moisture and plant food.

Improper mowing is responsible for the deterioration of many lawns, says the specialist, who advises against clipping more than one-half inch of growth at any single mowing. Keep the grass at a height of one and one-half to two inches, depending upon the turf thickness.

Finally, Trew says a sharp, well-adjusted mower that clips

of, not crushes off, the tips will give lawns a final "well-groomed" look.

Veterans Questions And Answers

Q - I have had to take a physical examination to reinstate my GI insurance policy, which had lapsed. Is there any time limit for submitting the examination report to VA?

A - The report, along with your reinstatement application, should be sent to VA as soon as possible. If you delay submitting them from five to 31 days after the examination, you must also include a statement to the effect that you are in as good health as you were at the time of the examination.

Q - I am going to school under the Korean GI Bill. As a member of the organized reserves, I am called to active training duty for brief periods of time. Will my GI allowance stop when I interrupt my schooling for training duty?

A - Your allowance will not be discontinued, so long as it is the practice of your school to grant exemptions for these periods without requiring formal interruption of your training.

Q - A friend of mine, paralyzed during Korean military service, is eligible for a "wheelchair housing" grant from VA. If he gets this grant, will he also be entitled to a GI home loan to finance the remainder of the cost?

A - Yes. His "wheelchair housing" grant will not deprive him of his right to apply for a GI loan to finance as much of the remainder of the cost as can be financed in that manner.

A - I understand a veteran needs at least 90 days of active

service to qualify for a GI loan. I entered service January 3, 1955, and therefore I wasn't able to build up 90 days by the January 31, 1955 deadline date for building up entitlement to wartime benefits. Am I out of luck, so far as a loan is concerned?

A - Not necessarily. Generally you need at least 90 days total service to qualify for a GI loan, but not all 90 days need be before January 31, 1955. So long as at least part of your 90 days comes before January 31, you may be eligible, after your discharge.

Q - Is it possible to convert Korean GI term insurance to permanent plans? I understand this could be done with World War II GI insurance. I am not a disabled veteran.

A - Under the law, Korean GI term insurance may not be converted to permanent plans of insurance. It is possible, however, for disabled Korea veterans to obtain permanent GI insurance policies under certain circumstances.

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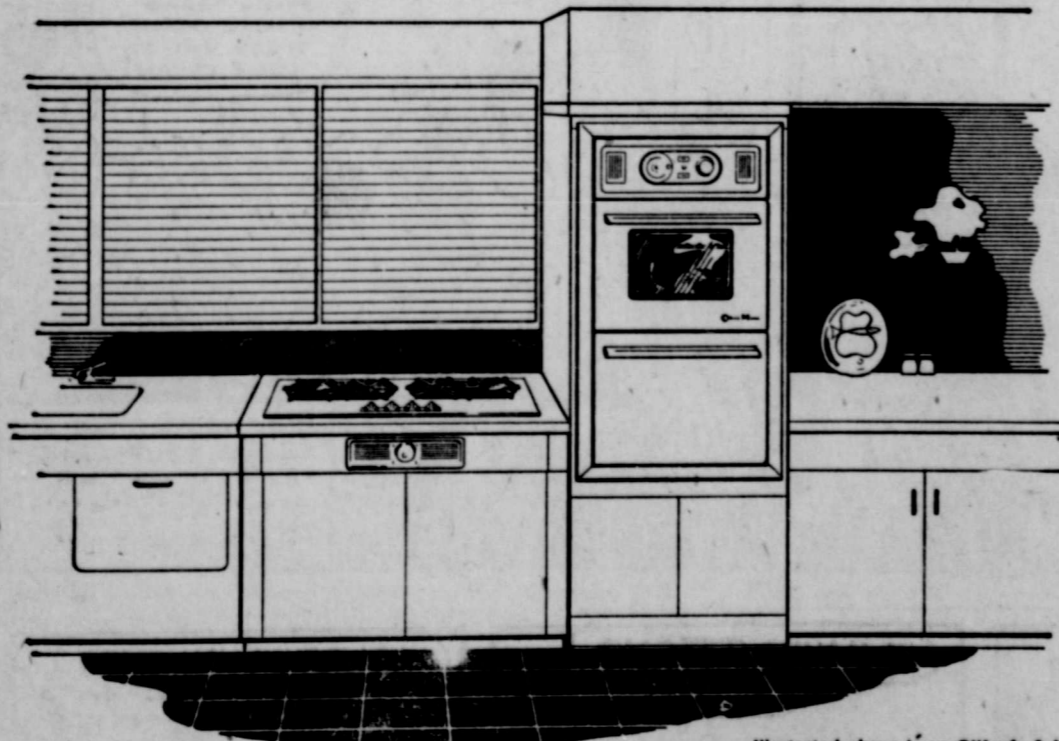

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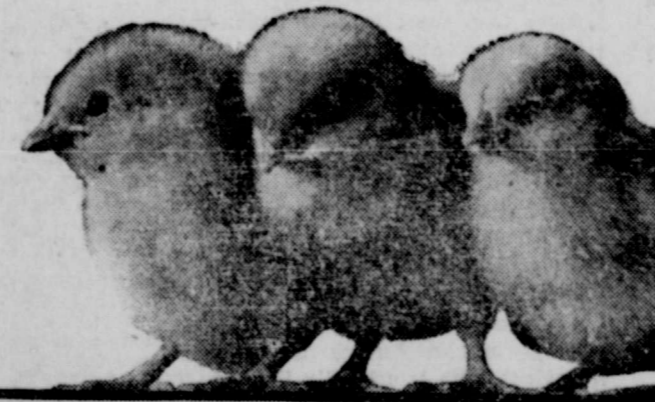
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Presbyterian Church To Observe Palm Sunday

Veterans Questions And Answers

Q — I have been out of military service for a year and a half. If I apply for disability compensation, is there any chance that my payments could be made retroactive to the date of my discharge?

A — No. For veterans who wait longer than one year to apply, compensation payments may be made retroactive only to the date of the application. For those who file within one year's time, it is possible for the payments to become effective as of the day after discharge from service.

Q — My three-year starting deadline for Korean GI training is coming close. I want to apply for a correspondence course. What does VA consider as the starting date of the course?

A — The starting date of your correspondence course is the date the school sends you your first lesson.

Q — I am a disabled World War II veteran. May I still apply for Public Law 16 training, or is it too late?

A — You still may apply for training under Public Law 16. However under the law you may train only in a course that you can complete by July 25, 1956.

Q — I understand I have 120 days from discharge to obtain Korean GI term insurance. During that period, I am covered by the free indemnity I had while in service. If I apply early, will I lose out on my 120-day free coverage?

A — You will not lose out on your 120-day free coverage if you apply for GI term insurance before the time runs out. At your request, VA will apply your initial payment to the first premium due after the 120-day period expires.

Q — I am attending a three-year trade school course under the Korean GI Bill. I am allowed up to 30 days absence a year. If I'm not absent at all the first year, can I carry over the 30 days to my second year?

A — No. Unused absences may not be carried over from one year to the next.

Q — I entered the armed forces after January 31, 1955, the end of the period for building up wartime benefits. Will I, as a peacetime veteran, be entitled to GI insurance even though I didn't serve during the wartime benefits period?

A — You may be entitled to GI insurance after separation from service. This benefit was not affected by the proclamation establishing January 31 as the cut-off for wartime benefits.

Q — I am a disabled World War II veteran. I could have entered Public Law 16 training earlier than this, but I never got around to it. If I apply now, would I be able to get four years of training?

A — No. Under the law, you would be permitted to take a course that you could complete by July 25, 1956, the end of the Public Law 16 program as the law now stands.





Applications Needed For Our National Resource Conference

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Armed Force Reserve officers may now apply to attend the National Resources Conference to be held in Austin May 15-27. Colonel Truman E. O'Quinn, Conference Administrator, announced today.

The conference is a condensation of the 10-month course attended by officers of the Armed Forces at the Industrial College of the Armed Forces. In this advanced study course the related military and economic problems including manpower and material resources for national security are presented. The Austin conference will be conducted four hours daily Monday through Friday during the two-week period. No advance preparation is required of the conferees.

Officers of the Armed Forces must meet the following qualifications to be eligible for selection for active duty training during the conference period:

1. Mature field grade officers who have not reached their fiftieth birthday.
2. Have outstanding service records and be individuals whose probable future assignments will be at the policy making level.
3. Not having previously attended the National Resources Conference or the Field Economic Mobilization Course.

Officers not meeting the established prerequisites may elect to attend the conference in a non-pay status but will receive retirement point credit for each day of attendance.

It's The Law In Texas

"Fore!" yelled Glen Gibb as he sized up the fairway in front of him. "Better wait," cautioned another member of his foursome. "Those people aren't out of range yet."

"Well, they're too slow," growled Glen. "I'll just crack one over their heads — that'll speed 'em up a little."

There was a resounding crack as Glen drove, and the golf ball shot out low and hard along the right side of the fairway. As the fine shot, the ball began to ward the two men and two women the players watched, admiring the curve to the left, hooking to men in the fairway. "Fore," Glenn yelled frantically, and one of the women moved desperately to one side, ducking her head. The ball struck her on the arm.

WARNING NECESSARY

In all of his conduct which might result in harm to another player, or to a caddy, the golfer must exercise reasonable and ordinary care, according to the circumstances. It is well known that driven balls do not always travel in the straight course intended, but the player must reasonably foresee the likelihood of injury to others from his driven ball, and use the care necessary to prevent such injury.

One duty of a golfer is to give timely warning of an intended drive if the other player is not aware of such intention, but in some cases a mere warning is necessarily an insurer of the safety of others with reference to the balls he drives, nor is he guilty of negligence merely because the ball deflects from its intended course, but he must have in mind the possibilities of dangers to others.

ORDINARY CARE NEEDED

In the case above, Glen was at fault. The players were obviously in a danger zone, and the mere shouted warning was not sufficient to protect them, especi-

ally since their backs were to Glen, and they were proceeding ahead of him, in a place where, under the rules of the game, they had a right to be.

On the golf course, remember, use just ordinary reasonable care to see that other players are protected. Be sure they know when you are going to drive, if they are in a danger zone, and don't deliberately drive into the people ahead of you.

Eastern Part Of Briscoe County Due Erosion Help

An application by farmers of a four-county area around Quitaque for federal assistance in preventing soil erosion under provisions of Public Law 566 is one of 16 in by the State Soil Conservation Texas which has been approved Board.

Official confirmation of the board's action was received in a letter to Gerald Smith, chairman of the Caprock Soil Conservation Board.

The letter said that the Kent Creek portion of the Upper Pease approved and the application for Headwater Watershed had been awarded to Washington to await priority.

The rich farming area around breakoff of the high plains, where Quitaque lies just below the within six miles there is a drop in elevation of more than 700 feet. The greatest threat to production in the area, exceeding even that of drought, is erosion and loss of topsoil by washing and flooding from rains which fall in the hills and upper headwater regions.

For years farmers have fought erosion losses with terraces, contour farming, diversion structures and other conservation methods, with much of the work done at private expense. Washes from have done extensive damage to the upper headquarters frequently the conservation projects.

100,000 acres in Briscoe, Hall, Motley and Floyd Counties will receive special attention under provisions of this law.

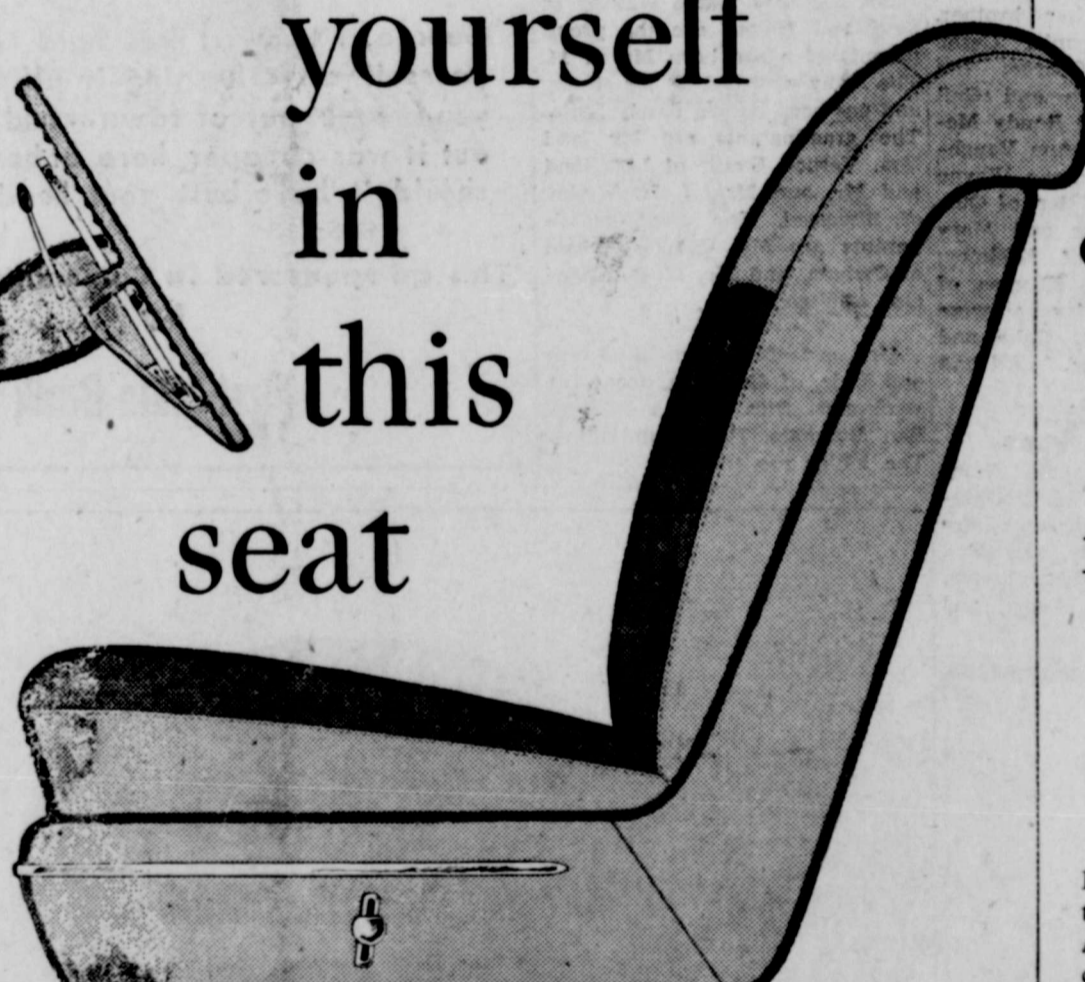
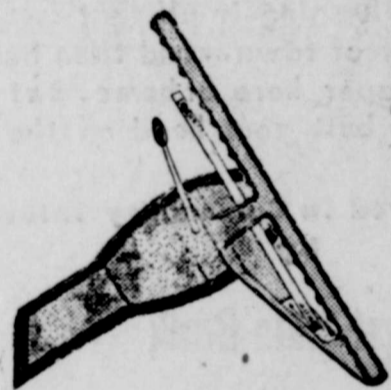

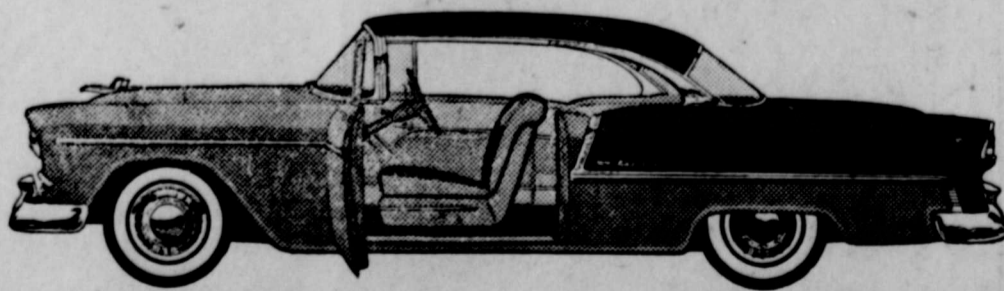

Driver Education Sponsored By Women's Club

The Texas Federation of Women's Clubs are seeking to obtain public support for legislation which will provide permanent support for a sound driver education program in all public high schools in the State of Texas.

A driver education bill has been introduced in the House of Representatives by Rep. H. B. 278, and referred to the committee on Appropriations. If the bill is passed, the schools would be permitted units to

at the cost of teaching driver education, the standards set by the Texas Education Agency. It has been recommended that, according to such standards, in order for a High School to qualify a teacher must have had at least 60 hours in Safety Education of which must have

at least 30 of which must have been in Driver Education. Driver Education would be a semester course and would include a minimum of 30 clock hours for classroom instruction plus an average of 6 clock hours per week for actual driving experience.

According to available statistics, automobile accidents are being reported at least 50 per cent among those who have had courses in Driver Education. According to the Texas Insurance Commission, considering giving a new license to students who complete driver training course.
