Q - I am drawing a VA pension, and have just received a legacy that will push my yearly income above the maximum allowed by the law. Am I supposed to inform the VA about

A - Yes. You should notify VA immediately, so that your pension payments can be stopped. Failure to inform VA of your added income will result in an overpayment of pension that you may have to pay back to the Government.

Q - Where may I obtain the forms required to apply for GI home loan?

A - You should be able to obtain the necessary forms from your lender. Lenders who do not have the forms may get them form their nearest VA Regional Office.


