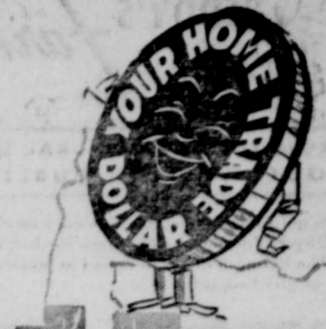

Mrs. Dan Montague and Mrs. J. E. Henderson, Silerton, are the grandparents.

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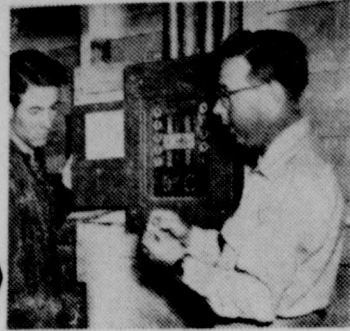
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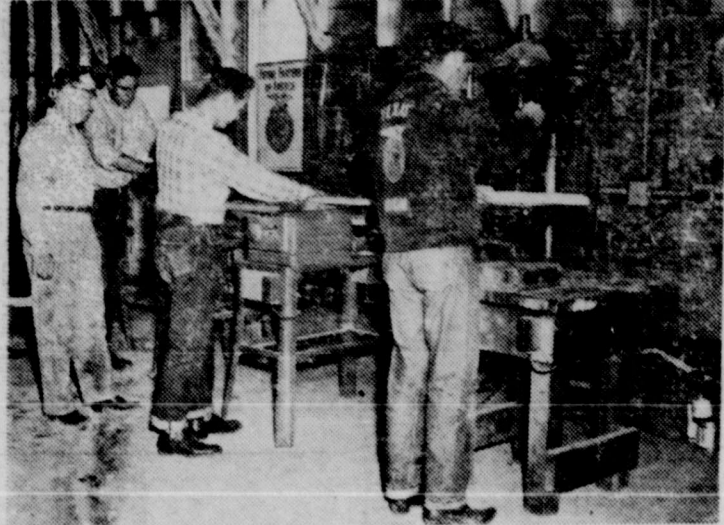
REDDY'S Farm Report

How to get safe, dependable, trouble-free electrical protection is being explained by John Dwyer, Vocational Agriculture teacher, to Donald Mansel. The various fuses may look alike but each one is designed to protect either an electrical circuit or an electric motor of given capacity.

using the new three-prong plugs. (See accompanying photos).

While your electrician is installing your grounding system, ask him to check overload protection for your motors. Electric motors, while relatively inexpensive, do cost money and they should also have their share of protection from overloading.

A good example of a farm workshop which provides both operator and motor protection is the Farm Shop of the Vocational Agriculture Department, Groom High School, Groom, Texas. Under the guidance of John Dwyer, the instructor, this shop has been adequately wired, the electrical powered tools have the proper overload protection, and proper grounding convenience outlets are used. All wiring is in metal conduit.

These and other safe practices mean that this shop is a safe place for the students of Vocational Agriculture to work and learn how to use the tools that make farming more profitable. Your farm shop can be just as safe.

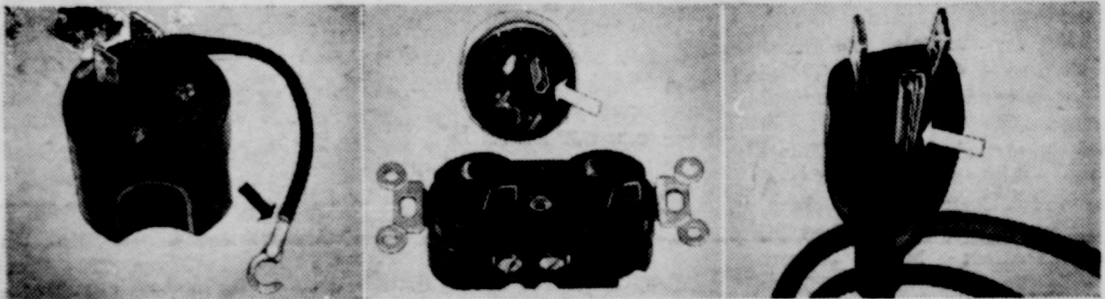
Farm power tools such as electric saws, drills, grinders, and sanding machines, both portable and stationary, are coming equipped these days with a grounding plug. The plug has three prongs, and, at first glance, one would think that he had received a three-wire, 220 volt plug. Actually, this is not the case. The plug is simply an ordinary 110-volt plug, but with this difference: the third prong is for a grounding connection. Some power plugs instead of having a third prong, will have a green wire protruding.

With this third connection, the This terminal, usually a green covered wire that protrudes from the plug, is another type of ground used on some electric equipment. This ground should be connected to a water pipe or the conduit of the wiring system, if it is properly grounded.

operator of the power tool is completely safe in the event of insulation becoming worn or broken and the bare wire touching the frame of the motor. Current which might ordinarily energize the equipment will, instead, travel along the safety "ground" and be dispelled without harm. This will be so even if the ground or floor on which the operator is standing should be wet. If your present farm power tools do not have the third wire for grounding, call in your electrician and have him run a grounding wire for you so that tools may be plugged in

Below is plug and outlet available for installing a grounding wire on your existing 115 volt single phase electric powered tools. The third terminal carries the electricity to ground, if the equipment should become energized due to worn insulation on wires.

This type of electrical plug is found on the new "Electric Farm Power Tools". The third terminal is for the grounding wire that connects the motor to the ground in the wiring system.

Weeping Love Grass New Crop For Briscoe County

Offering what sounds like a good proposition to us, is C. A. Robinson of Plainview, who has been contacting local farmers and ranchers with the hope of getting enough interested parties to plant quite a sizeable acreage in Briscoe County in Weeping Love Grass. At the present time he is planting this seed on an 80 acre plot for C. T. Northcutt. If you are interested in discussing this with Mr. Robinson, you may contact him at his home in Plainview or leave word at the office.

It is stated that this grass is a native of Africa, and is able to stand heat, drought and sand-dust and helps hold soil against wind and water erosion. It is a soil conditioner.

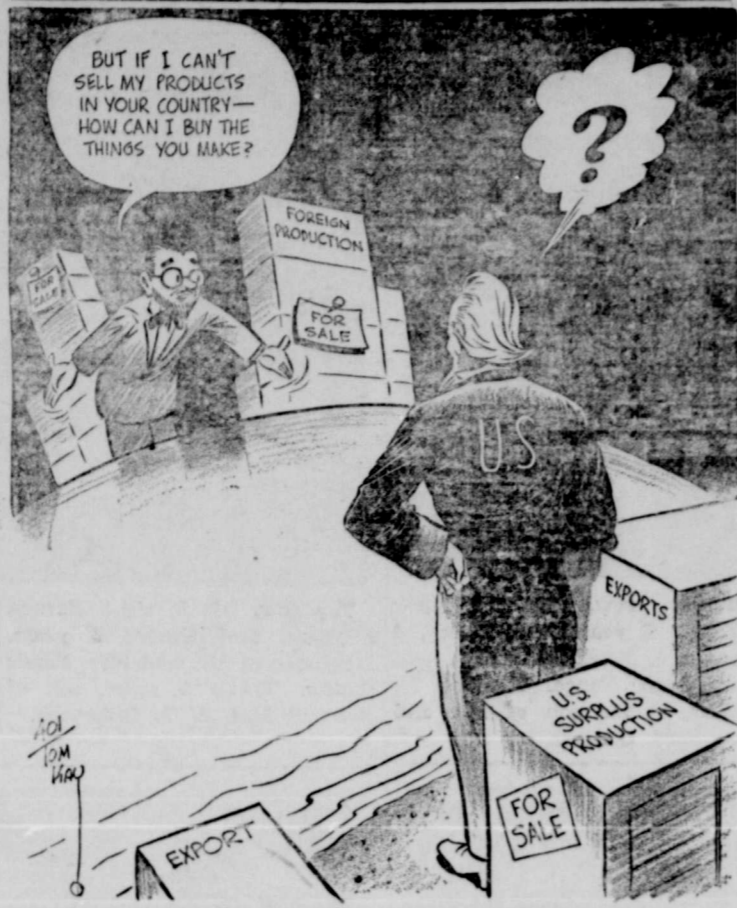
It produces the seed and harvests it. And it will produce a yield with ten or less inches of moisture a year. He estimates that it would produce anywhere from twenty-five to one hundred pounds per acre. There is a market for the seed for approximately \$1.50 per bushel. It can be grazed in winter and early spring. It grows waist high or better and heads out, and can be combined. He stated that the seed "wasn't useful for polio vaccine or feed", but nevertheless is a mighty good crop to have on your farm.

General Telephone Have New Billing Equipment In Use

A different, new type telephone bill reached telephone subscribers in Silverton this month, according to E. I. Jenkins, district manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

The new bill comes through subscriber telephone billing by mechanical equipment which will eventually be put into operation in all 242 Company exchanges.

In describing the bills, Jenkins stated they are about the weight of a postcard, compared with the paper bills of the past. They are 7 and three quarter inches long by 3 and one-fourth inches high and are not folded as were the former bills. General's new insignia appears on the new bills, which are printed in green.

The manager added that the new bills, like the old ones, have a stub. This stub must be returned with the payment, he continued, and must not be bent or mutilated by the subscriber since a mutilated stub cannot be returned through the machine for accounting purposes. He stressed that the more stubs returned with the bill payments, the more efficient and economical will be the Company's operation.

Subscriber billing by mechanical accounting equipment is described by the district manager as "another milestone of progress by General Telephone Company." "This new billing method is the result of many months of study and will enable us to prepare bills more efficiently and more economically," he stated.

He concluded by inviting subscribers with questions about their new bills to call the local business office of the telephone company.

Home for Large Family



For the large family with modest income, American Builder magazine suggests the split-level house, in which "economical construction and architectural ingenuity combine to provide maximum livable space at minimum cost." As a good example of split-level design, this Plan No. AB206N is offered by American Builder, 79 West Monroe St., Chicago 3.

The 10-room house has four levels. It has been built on Long Island for \$22,590, including a quarter-acre lot.

The lowest level has a utility room and a 15 by 20-foot recreation room. Up a half-flight of stairs is the living room-dining

room-kitchen level. The next higher level contains two bedrooms and a bathroom, while two more bedrooms, a second bath, and a study or playroom are on the highest level. (Highest and lowest levels are not illustrated here.)

Architects Rudolph Matern and Herman York specify fire-resistant asphalt shingles for the roof. Sidewalls are shingled, with a horizontal band of brick below the large front bow window. (Detailed building plans are available from American Builder Home Plan Service, 79 West Monroe St., Chicago 3, Ill. Refer to Plan No. AB206N.)

Veterans Questions And Answers

— I obtained a loan on my permanent GI insurance policy. Could I apply my regular dividend toward repayment of the loan?

A — Yes. Well in advance of the date your dividend is due, you should ask VA to take necessary action to apply it toward repayment of your loan.

Q — I am considered totally disabled for insurance purposes, and yet I have been given only a 30 percent disability rating for compensation. Why the difference?

A — For insurance purposes, you may have other non-service-connected disabilities which, when combined with your 30 percent rated service-connected disability, produce total disability. Moreover, the criteria for determining total disability are not identical for insurance and compensation purposes.

Q — Must a veteran's blindness be service-connected, in order for him to receive some of the special aids for the blind, furnished by the AV?

A — Not necessarily. However, a blinded veteran must be entitled to compensation for a service-connected disability, in order to qualify for the special aids for the blind. Blindness itself need not be service-connected.

Q — I entered military service a few days before January 31, 1955, the date of the termination of eligibility accumulation for GI wartime benefits. I understand I need at least 90 days of active duty to qualify for a GI loan after my discharge. Must all 90 days be before January 31, 1955?

A — No. Some part of the 90 day period — but not all of it — must be on or before January 31, 1955. Furthermore, the 90-day period is waived for veterans discharged sooner for disabilities incurred in line of duty.

Q — I am planning to take a correspondence course under the Korean GI Bill. For purposes of my GI allowance payments, what does VA consider as the beginning and ending dates of the course?

A — The beginning date of your course is the date on which the school furnishes you with your first lesson. The ending date is the date the school services your final lesson.

Q — I hold a permanent GI insurance policy. Since it has been in force for more than one year, I have the right to borrow money on it. How much can I borrow?

A — You may borrow an amount that does not exceed 94 percent of the reserve of your permanent GI policy.

Q — I am drawing a VA pension, and have just received a legacy that will push my yearly income above the maximum allowed by the law. Am I supposed to inform the VA about it?

A — Yes. You should notify VA immediately, so that your pension payments can be stopped. Failure to inform VA of your added income will result in an overpayment of pension that you may have to pay back to the Government.

Q — Where may I obtain the forms required to apply for a GI home loan?

A — You should be able to obtain the necessary forms from your lender. Lenders who do not have the forms may get them from their nearest VA Regional Office.

First Quarter Activity In Business Exceeds Any Previously

Austin — January-March Texas business activity exceeded, by a substantial margin, any previous quarter in the state's business history, the University of Texas Bureau Research reports. The Bureau's index averaged 163 per cent of the 1947-49 base, which was 8 percent above the 1954 average and 12 percent higher than the index for the first quarter of 1954. During the past seven months, the level of Texas business has registered a 16 percent increase, one of the sharpest upward spurts since the index of business activity has been compiled.

"The general vigor of consumer demand and the expectation that it will continue at the present high levels have undoubtedly been leading factors in the optimistic views held by businessmen," Dr. Stockton points out. "In general, consumers appear to be willing to buy practically all kinds of goods, and businessmen are planning to continue expanding capacity to handle an increasing volume of business."

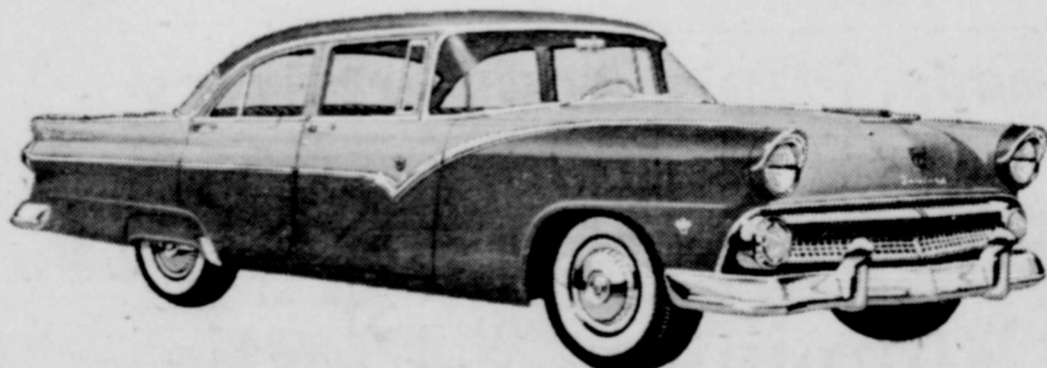
