Briscoe County Uranium Company Formed Recently

July Rainfall Total 2.79

The total rainfall for July was 2.79 inches. On July 13 we received .23; on July 14, .28; on July 19, .49; on July 23, .02; on July 24, .03; and on July 27, 1.64.

July's rainfall brings the total for Silvertown thus far to 14.85 inches. The total for 1954 amounted to 12.70. The average yearly rainfall totals 23 inches. Rain out from town has amounted to a great deal more, and in places probably already pushes the normal yearly total.

The crops are looking well, and some milo is beginning to head. The weeds are making a pretty good headway, but with a few days of dry weather, maybe this can be remedied.

Briscoe County Ahead On Saving Bonds Quota

More than \$101 million worth of United States Savings Bonds were purchased by Texans during the first half of this year, it was reported by Nathan Adams and Ed Gossett, Co-Chairmen of the Savings Bonds Advisory Committee for the state recently.

At the half-year mark 50 per cent of the state's 1955 Savings Bonds goal of \$210.9 million was attained. Briscoe county is 75.7 per cent ahead of quota. The district is 75 per cent ahead, Swisher county is 76 per cent, Hale 80 per cent and Floyd 77.9 per cent ahead of quota for the half-year mark.

The co-chairmen are urging that everyone increase Bond-a-Month Payroll Savings Plan deduction during the remaining months of this year. Perry Whittemore is Briscoe County Savings Bond chairman.

A company to be known as the Briscoe County Uranium Company has been formed by Doyle and Clyde Saul, Jack Dixon and Dick Carter of Plainview and Al Wilson of Silvertown. Some weeks ago it was announced that uranium had been found on the 5,500 acre ranch of Doyle and Clyde Saul which is located 12 miles southeast of Silvertown.

It is reported that heavy equipment has been moved to the scene, and that operations will likely begin in the near future. A prospectors permit was issued recently to Trans-National Uranium and Oil Company on the Dean Hawn place, which is close to Schott Cap, known as the Smiley Tract.

A Lubbock television station carried a news reel about two weeks ago of the uranium find on the Dick and Alvie Mayfield land. Arnold and Roy H. Brown of Silvertown and Fred and Harold V. Brown of Floydada, leased uranium rights on approximately 1,000 acres on the Mayfield land around the first of May.

Social Security Representative Will Be Here Sept. 7

You can earn more money in 1955 and still keep your social security checks under the liberalized retirement test, according to John R. Sanderson, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security District Office.

"You can earn as much as \$1200 during 1955, either in wages or in net earnings from a business, without losing any benefit payments. If you make more than \$1200, you will lose a month's payment for each \$80 over \$1200, but you will not lose a check for any month in which you earn less than \$80 in wages or don't operate your business he added.

"Beginning in 1955, the retirement test will apply to all wages or business earnings, whether subject to social security or not," cautioned Sanderson.

"Placing the retirement test on an annual basis will be particularly helpful to seasonal workers. If, for instance, you were to work each year for the four months of June through September at \$300 a month, you would have your social security benefits suspended for those months under the former restrictions, but under those coming into effect, you would not lose any monthly payments," he concluded.

Mr. Sanderson added that Floyd B. Ellington or Nat Houston will be able to answer any questions you may have regarding the Retirement Test on Sept. 7, at 10:00 a. m. when he is in Silvertown, at Commissioners Court Room.

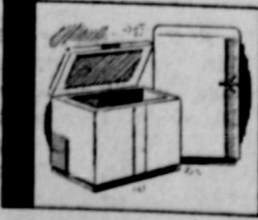

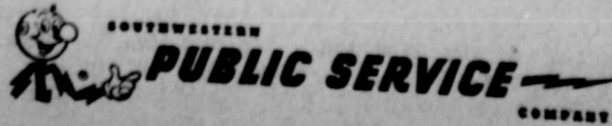

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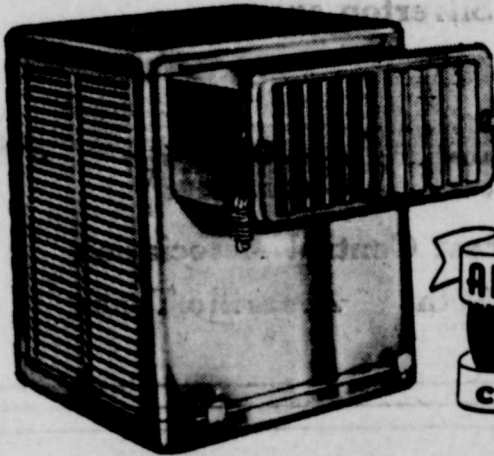

Veterans Questions And Answers

Q — I bought a house with a GI loan, and now I am planning to sell it. I was considering having the buyer take over my loan. Must I get VA's permission to do this?

A — No. VA's permission is not required. However, you should remember you remain liable for the GI loan, even though you sell your house to another person. You can relieve yourself of all liability by insisting that the buyer refinance the house.

Q — I am the widow of a World War I veteran, and I have a 16-year-old daughter. I applied for death pension payments, and I was told I need evidence of the birth of my daughter. I am unable to obtain a copy of her birth certificate. The only evidence I have is our family Bible which lists the date of her birth. Would that be acceptable to VA?

A — Yes. — A copy of the family Bible record, certified to by a notary public, would be satisfactory. The notary public should state in what year the Bible was printed, whether the record bears any erasures, and whether he believes the entry actually was written at the time of your daughter's birth.

Q — I am in the Reserves and I also am drawing disability compensation payments from VA. Will my disability pay continue for the periods of which I am on Reserve training duty?

A — No. Your compensation payments must be waived during your training duty. But they may be resumed the day following your release from such duty.

Q — I am buying a house with a GI loan. The builder has given me an estimate when the house will be completed. Based on this estimate, would it be wise for me to give notice to the apartment where I now am living?

A — Generally it is better to wait until you have a firm settlement date before giving notice that you are going to move. Many unpredictable factors, such as inclement weather, can serve to delay completion beyond the date estimated by the builder.
