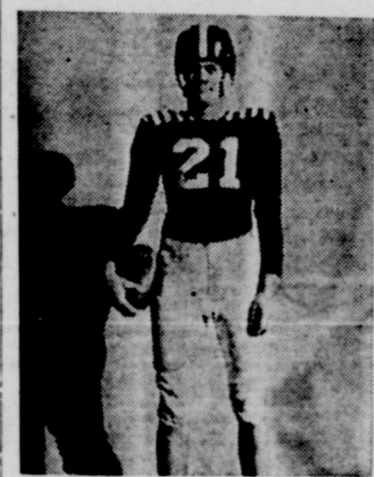
We also heard of a merchant locally who has extended his credit, and is paying interest on money, to extend credit to people some of which are sitting on their money. Is this fair?

The Silverton Owls toppled Lakeview by a decisive score of 32 to 7 Friday evening. The feathered foes fought on the Eagle field at Lakeview before a host of shivering fans.

The Owls scored five touchdowns and one safety during the game but were unable to add any of the extra point tries.

In the first few minutes of play W. D. Rowell carried the ball from the 20 yard line to score the first six points. W. D. also crossed the goal line twice in the second quarter to account for 12 points. Both the runs were for more than forty yards. Rowell who has been playing an end position of offense was shifted to the backfield last week and has proved himself as a worthy ball totter.

Whitfill and Marshall smothered a Lakeview back in the second quarter to account for a safety which added 2 points. The half ended with Silverton 20 and Lakeview 0.

In the third quarter Jimmy Scott Whitfill was the Owl that carried the pigskin for six points, making the touchdown trip from the Lakeview 20 yard line.

Perhaps the outstanding play of the night was a run of 65 yards made by Royce Thornton. Thornton is a freshman backfield. His mad rush for a six point counter was from Silverton's 35 yard line.

Lakeview's only touchdown came late in the fourth quarter. The Lakeview team converted the only extra point of the game, which left a total of Silverton 32 Lakeview 7.

Most all the Owls making the trip to Lakeview Friday night saw action, many for the first time, since this is their freshman year.

Faculty, Ladies Guests Of Lions Club Tonight

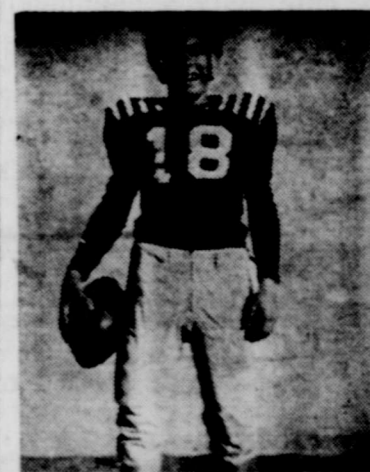

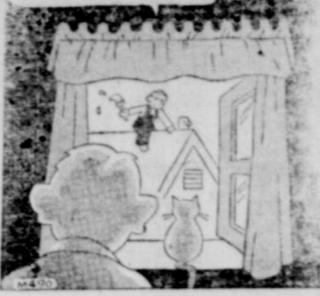

Safety For Passengers In 1956 Ford Models

Ford engineers have developed a "lifeguard design" in their 1956 models to prevent, or reduce the severity of, injuries due to automobile accidents.

The company is the first in the industry to adopt the safety concept of "packaging the passenger" as a means of limiting accidental injury. Research has included repeated full-scale crash tests of the new equipment on the Ford test track at Dearborn, Mich. The new injury-prevention study is a companion program, which includes development of better brakes, steering, and other mechanical improvements.

The new safety features are: A deep-center safety steering wheel (standard equipment) which will absorb the energy generated in a crash and distribute the force over the driver's chest, helping to prevent him from striking the steering column.

Safety door latches (standard equipment) designed to prevent doors from springing open under impact, thus protecting passengers from being thrown to the road;

Safety rear-view mirrors (standard equipment) with a special backing to keep the glass from falling out if broken;

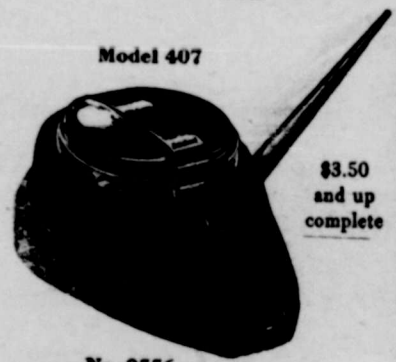
Seat belts (optional) structurally anchored to the car with a steel late, to retain occupants inside the vehicle and reduce the chance of being thrown forward;

Crash cushioning (optional) for instrument panels and sun visors, which is five times more shock absorbent than sponge rubber.

In addition, Ford has redesigned the mirror frame, and the front and back seat supports have been strengthened to reduce the possibility of seats coming loose in an accident.

Styling Advances In The Ford '56

Styling advances in the Ford for '56 include a new grille with oblong parking lights at the outer ends, set in frames which wrap around the fender sides. Body side molding is re-styled for Fairlane, Station Wagon and Customline models. Newly designed tail lamps and deck lid handles, a larger hood ornament, and a completely new instrument panel are offered in all models.

For safer driving, all instruments and clustered under a glare-preventing hood directly in front of the driver. All controls are directly lighted for night driving.

In V-8 Fairlane cars, dual exhaust ports emerge at the sides of re-designed rear bumpers. Ford stylists have introduced 13 exterior colors in the 1956 line - among them platinum grey and mandarin orange.

Upholstery and trim selections are matched to exterior colors, with as many as five different interior color combinations in Fairlane models. Up to 21 optional two-tone exterior color combinations are offered in the line, with choices varying according to model and series.

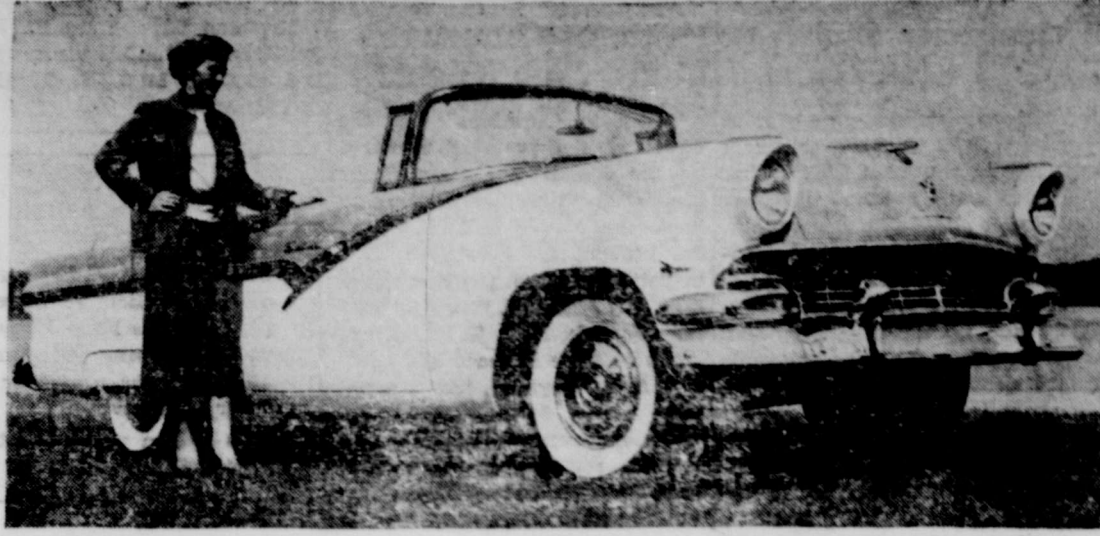

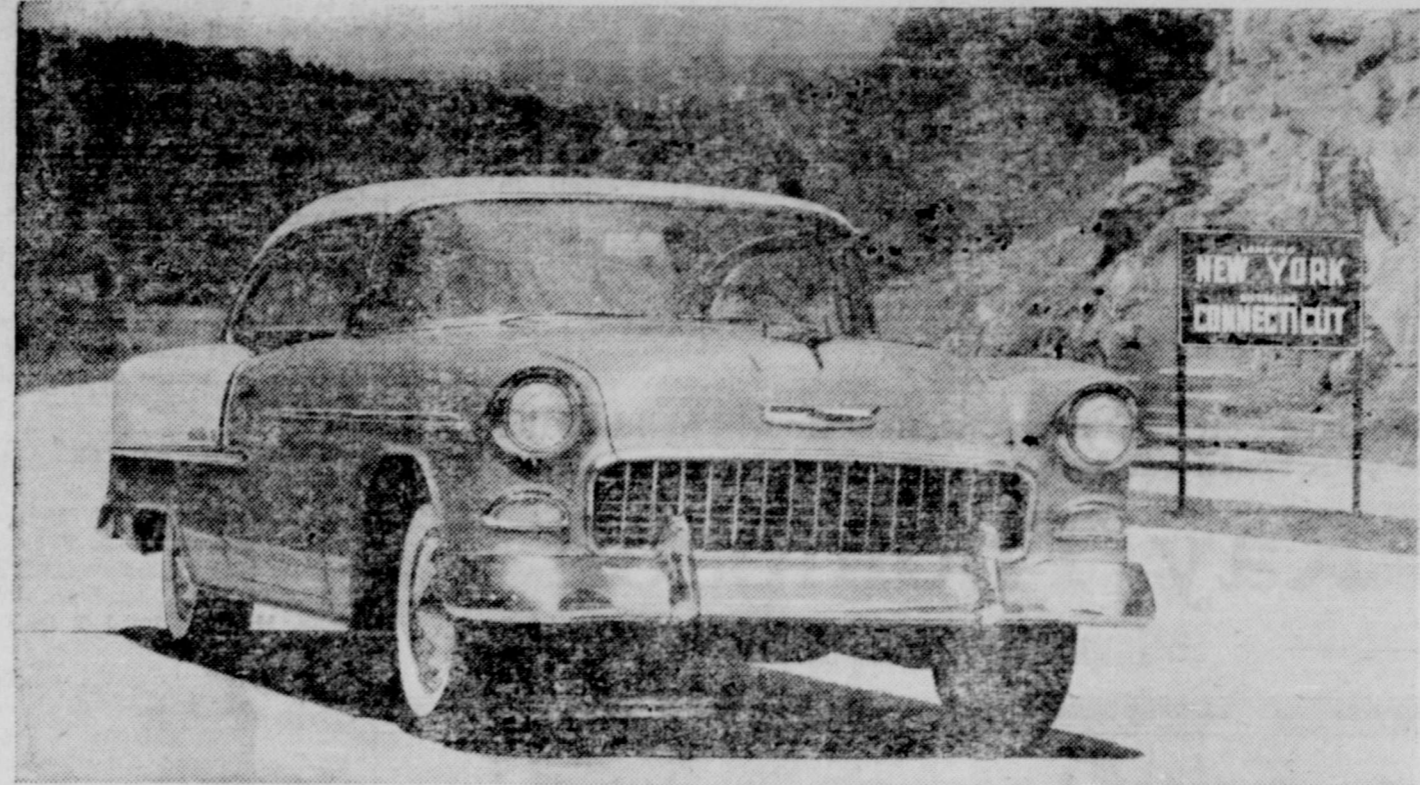
