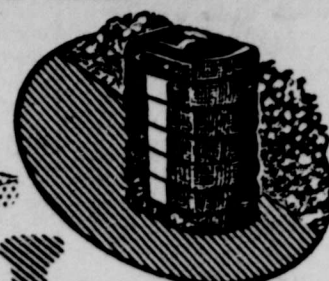

We have learned from reliable sources that it cost a business firm from \$1.00 to \$3.00 per charge customer to have a customer say make a ticket please.

As an example, if a firm has 100 customers that charge regularly, it will cost him the equivalent to one employee, plus office supplies and equipment at a cost of from two to three hundred dollars in cash. From 3c to 8c out of each dollar he may never collect, depending on the type of business. Doctors who have office practice and who do not employ collectors collect about \$70.00 out of every \$100.00.

We appreciate the report of Doc Minyard last week on the advantages of Silverton as a home for new business. We would challenge him for proof on one statement. He stated, and we quote "Silverton enjoys lower taxation than neighboring towns." We would like to see the basis of your figures on that Doc. We will agree with you on the other points.

Crop Harvesting Gets Underway

Clear skies with brisk autumn mornings and sunny days have started a chain of crop gathering activities in the Silverton area this week. Nervous farmers are taking advantage of the opportunity to start combines and pullers in their fields.

Silverton's three grain elevators, Harvest Queen Grain Company, Silverton Co-op Elevator, and Wilson Grain Company, are very busy these days taking care of the approximate 100 carloads of milo which to date have been brought in for storage. Already several cars have been shipped to other points, and some elevators report that it is already necessary to begin dumping on the ground until boxcars are available. Much of the grain is grading No. 2 though this area's grain is discolored to some extent, it is not as bad as reported in other sections where more rain fell.

The two cotton gins are beginning operations too. Tomlin-Fleming Gin Company and Lyle Gin Company up until early Wednesday morning had ginned 66 bales of cotton. Cotton pickers are here and have gone to work.

The happy grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Brooks, and Mr. and Mrs. Roy Mayfield, were in Canyon.

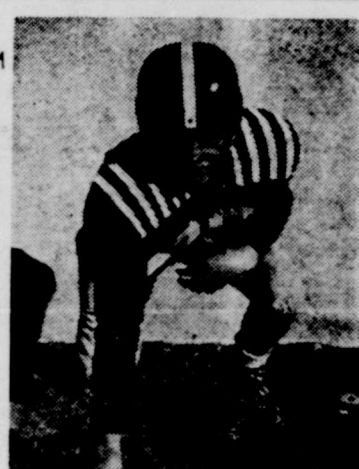

Silverton To Meet Kress In Friday's Football Game

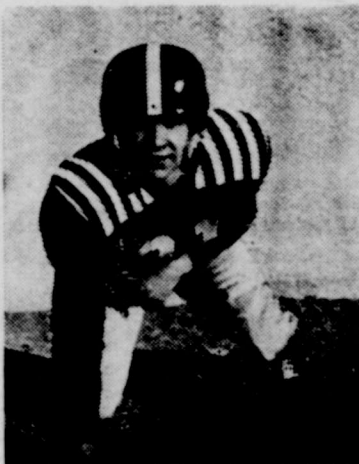
The crippled Owls will go to battle here Friday night with the Kress Kangaroos.

Oil Progress Week Observed

A former Soviet geologist who escaped to freedom and is now working in the United States reported recently that in Russia it's a criminal offense for an oil well to fail to strike oil. Under Soviet law, a geologist who locates a well and brings in a dry hole can be — and sometimes is packed off to forced labor in Siberia.

The fact that such a law is on the books in the Soviet Union emphasizes the difference between developing national resources the Russian way and the American way. For contrast, there's a fellow in Texas named Morris K. Womack who has drilled 196 dry holes in succession. No Texas Ranger has a warrant for his arrest; as a matter of fact, he keeps right on drilling. He has faith in the future. What's more, he has the incentive of a fair profit for success, rather than the threat of Siberia for failure, to spur him on.

As for results, the United States produces almost half of all the world's oil — 46.3 per cent — while Russia and all its satellites produce only 11.5 per cent. American oil men, who risk only their money and not their freedom when they drill dry holes, produce just under six and a half million barrels of crude oil daily to Russia's one million barrels.

But this doesn't mean that American oil companies can rest on their laurels, sure of maintaining a long lead over the Soviet Union in petroleum reserves. For the USSR has another way of spending its people's freedoms to buy more oil. It deprives its citizens of all but a fraction of the fuels, plastics, nylon, synthetic rubber, medicines, and hundreds of other petroleum products that enrich our lives in America. The oil that Russia stockpiles this way is earmarked for depriving citizens of other countries of their freedoms some day.

To report to the public on how a free industry is helping to keep us a free people, America's 42,000 separate oil companies have set aside one week in October as Oil Progress Week. Our future will be secure as long as those companies can report that men like Mr. Womack are still free to take their chances, as Americans have been doing since the oil industry was no bigger than since the United States was no a shack in Pennsylvania, and bigger than a meeting hall in Philadelphia.

Bike Riding Or Walking Be Bright

"Bike riding or walking, be bright at night."

Mr. E. C. McFadden, Dallas, President of exas Safety Association, Inc., gave this advice today to Texas walkers and cyclists as he warned of the hazards of night traffic.

"I mean 'be bright' in two ways," Mr. McFadden explained. "First of all be bright literally. For pedestrians this means illuminate yourself with white, light colored or reflectorized clothing or carry a flashlight or a piece of reflectorized material. For cyclists it means illuminating both bicycle and rider. The bike should have a good head light and tail light and should also be trimmed with white or reflectorized material."

The second way in which both pedestrians and cyclists must be said. He warned that many pedestrians and bicycle riders meet their deaths in night traffic accidents because of carelessness.

"To stay safe, obey all traffic laws and always assume that the driver can't see you," Mr. McFadden said. "Never cross a street or highway unless you are absolutely certain you have ample time to reach the other side in complete safety."

Mr. McFadden said the proper place for walkers is on the sidewalk. When there are no sidewalks, he said, pedestrians should read facing traffic. Cyclists, he said, would ride on the right side of the road, with traffic.

People over 65, because their reactions are usually slow and their eyesight or hearing may be

impaired are particularly vulnerable in night traffic, Mr. McFadden said.

"If you're an older, don't venture out in traffic alone at night," he advised "Remember, darkness hides danger, play it safe!"

HOW TO MINIMIZE RISKS

It's The Law In Texas

Whenever you are asked to sign something, your signature should be a warning signal that in some way you may become legally obligated by what you sign.

Usually you are asked to sign something as a result of a business transaction, such as a contract, a receipt, an order, a release, an option, a mortgage or a deed. For your own protection, you should clearly understand what you sign, why you are signing it, and what the consequences may be. It is rarely possible for a person who has signed a document to avoid its legal effects.

You can decrease your legal risks by always taking these precautions before you sign anything:

Know what you are signing and what the document contains. Understand clearly what it means. Don't be confused by its title — a "statement" may be a release of all your claims, or a "contract" may be a negotiable promissory note. "Co-signing" a note may result in your having to pay it.

Read Everything in any document. Clauses in fine print may be important. Remember, too, that oral promises not included in writing may be unenforceable. Take nothing for granted. Check and verify the document. Be sure the dates, prices, names and conditions filled in are correct. You are bound by what it says, not by what you thought it said.

Ask questions. Inquire about conditions and items of importance to you. Don't sign unless you understand what it means. Language clearly stating what you want can be inserted. If large sums are involved, consult with your attorney.

Retain a copy. Be sure the proper persons sign. Request and retain a copy. Record it, if necessary, with the proper public official.

Like your fingerprint, your signature is unique. No one else has one exactly like it. Only you can sign it, and affixing it may set into motion events of great legal consequence. Treat it with the importance it deserves, and do not bestow it carelessly. If in doubt, seek information and advice.

Veterans Questions And Answers

Q - I am a disabled World War II veteran, and I have just come home after several years in a VA hospital. I want to take Public Law 16 training, but I understand I will have to complete it by July, 1956, less than a year from now. Could an exception be made in my case, since I wasn't able to begin training before this time?

A - You possibly could have until July, 1960, to complete your training. The law allows disabled veterans an additional four years, if they were not able to start on time because of their disabilities.

Q - I have just been discharged from service, and I intend to apply to VA for disability compensation. Will I be required to take a VA physical examination?

A - Not necessarily. If you file a claim within six months from the date of your separation, it may be rated initially based on the records of the service department, unless it appears that an error might result from such a rating.

Q - I am a disabled Korean veteran. What is my deadline for the special GI insurance available to disabled Korean veterans?

A - You must apply and pay your first premium within one year from the date that VA has determined your disability to be service-connected.

Q - Are VA's special "wheelchair housing" grants available only to disabled World War II and Korean veterans?

A - No. Veterans of all wars, as well as those with peacetime service only, may qualify, so long as they meet the eligibility requirements of the law.

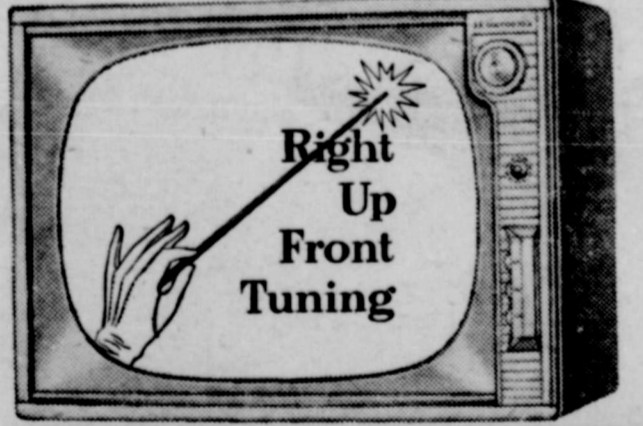

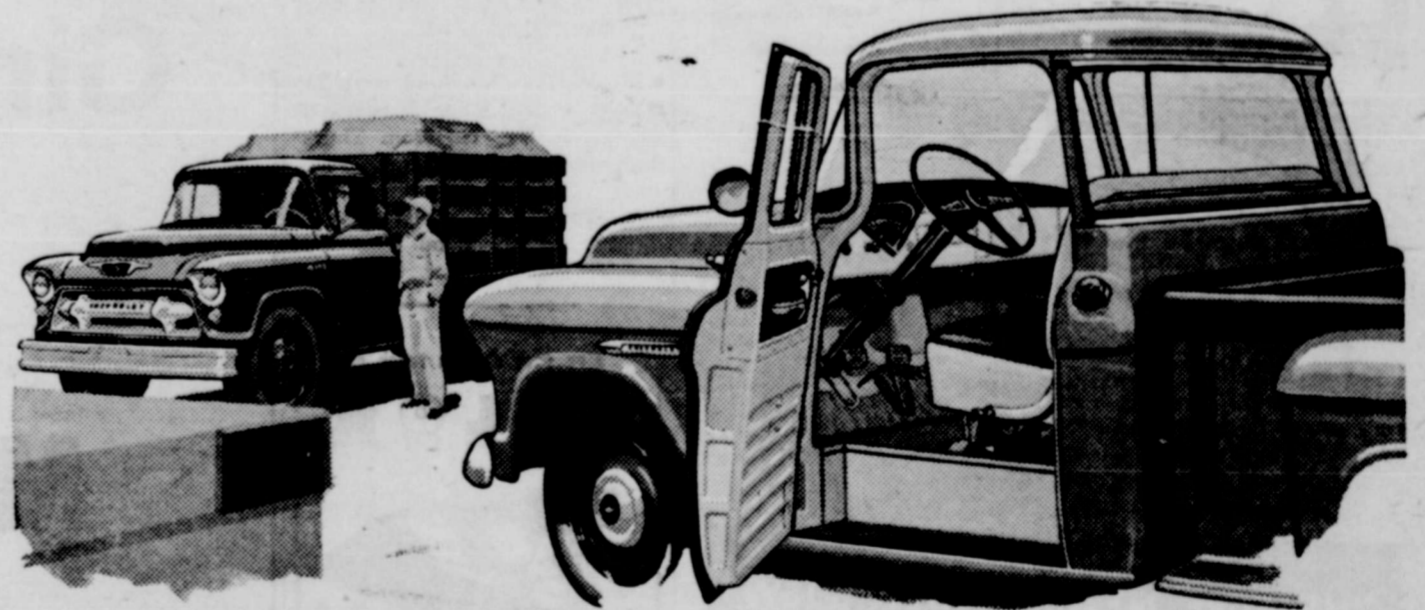

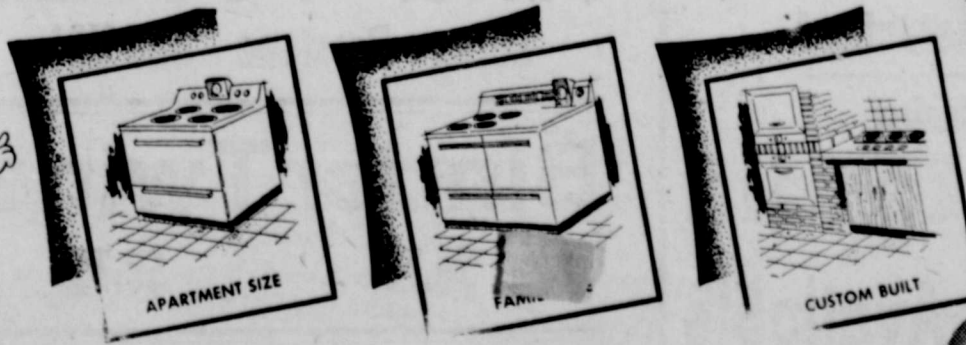
