At a meeting at Lakeview last week it was announced that there was a possibility that a huge dam will be constructed across Red River west of Memphis. Dr. Roy E. Barr of Childress, president of the Upper Red River Control and Irrigation District, presided at the meeting of the board of directors where future plans were outlined.

Attending a board meeting for the first time were Arville Setliff of Turkey and James G. Ellison of Quitaque. These two men were appointed recently by Gov. Allan Shivers to fill expired terms. Two other new board members, Carl Hill of Parnell and W. Coffey, Jr. of Silvertown, were unable to attend the meeting.

C. C. Broughton of Childress told the group "We know that this dam across Red River will ultimately be built, we know that it is needed today."

## Silvertown Gins Damaged By Fire

### Accident Fatal to Jim N. Hardin

Jim N. Hardin of Silvertown, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Hardin was killed instantly about 3 a. m. Monday on highway 86 six miles west of Silvertown. Accompanied by Ted Vardell and Willie Wade Reynolds, the group was returning to Silvertown from Lubbock when the car driven by Hardin went out of control and overturned and struck a high-line pole before it came to rest in the Alvie Mayfield pasture. Vardell and Reynolds were bruised and sore but were not hospitalized.

Hardin was born on February 25, 1933 in Silvertown. He graduated, along with his twin brother Gene Hardin, from Silvertown High School in 1950. Jim went into the Navy and Gene into the Marines. Gene was injured and later discharged. Jim served almost 4 years in the navy, receiving his discharge about two weeks ago. Gene is enrolled as a student at Texas Tech.

Funeral services were conducted at 3 p. m. Tuesday, December 13, at the First Baptist Church with Rev. G. A. Elrod assisted by Earl Cantwell officiating. Interment was in the Silvertown Cemetery.

Jim is survived by his twin brother, Gene; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Hardin; a brother, Buck Hardin of Silvertown; and a sister, Mrs. Joyce Cavett of Andrews; two nephews, Rodney and Barry Cavett, one grand mother, Mrs. Mable Hardin of Rotan; and a great grandmother, Mrs. Wash McCombs of Fort Worth, and a host of aunts and uncles, and other relatives.

Don Fleming accidentally shot himself in the foot Monday afternoon while killing birds in his father's shop with a 22 rifle. The injury was dressed by Dr. Mayfield and not thought to be serious.

Both of the Silvertown Gins were endangered by fire last Wednesday night when sparks from burr burners started fires at both plants. Winds of 50 to 60 mile velocity struck suddenly here just after dark Wednesday.

The Tomlin - Fleming Gin, owned by Shellie Tomlin and K. M. Fleming is located in the southeast part of Silvertown. The Lyle Gin is owned and managed by D. B. Lyle and is located in the northeast part of town.

The fire at the Tomlin-Fleming gin was brought under control after quick moving fireman and employees moved rapidly in fighting the fire and moving the trailers and ginned cotton from possible fire danger. Approximately sixty-five bales were in the yard at the time of the fire. Relatively small damage was done at the Tomlin-Fleming Gin.

Shortly after the first alarm was sounded, a fire was reported at the Lyle Gin.

About sixty-five or seventy bales were endangered at the Lyle Gin yard at the time that fire broke out there. Workmen

were able to move to safety most of the trailers and unginned cotton, and only about eight trailers were destroyed by the fires. Flying fire endangered the gin, and office, and other property adjoining the gin property for quite some time. Quitaque's Fire Department assisted the Silvertown Fire Department in combating the fast flying fire fanned by the strong wind. The following fire made quite a spectacle for the

hundreds of sightseers. Bulldozers were used in putting out the fires. Though the gin was out of danger by eleven o'clock, several men worked all night watching the trailer fires and cleaning up and making ready for resuming ginning operations the following day.

Both gins were able to begin early the following morning with their usual operations. The damages were covered by insurance.

## Hiram Sweeney Buried Here Saturday Afternoon

Hiram Sweeney who came to Briscoe County 65 years ago, at the age of five with his parents, was buried here Saturday afternoon. Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. in Boxwell Brothers Ivy Chapel, with Dr. H. Clyde Smith, pastor of San Jacinto Methodist Church, officiating.

Nathan Hiram Sweeney was born Nov. 15, 1885, at Gertrude, in Jack County, where his father, Pat Sweeney was engaged in the ranching business.

Throughout his entire 70 years he had been associated with the cattle business.

Hiram Sweeney attended his first school near his home in Briscoe County, and later attended Clarendon College.

Leaving school in 1903 Sweeney returned to the work he loved, and joined an outfit that was shipping cattle to a huge ranch in Saskatchewan, Canada. He was then 17 years old.

He related that the day he entered Canada he saw five trainloads of cattle frozen to death. He later became county brand inspector.

In 1908, Sweeney entered the cattle business in partnership with Jim Whittington, a brother-in-law, and they ran cattle from Briscoe County to Southwestern Kansas, branding thousands of calves each year.

Sweeney became an inspector for the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in 1920, being assigned to the Dalhart territory.

In 1925 he was assigned to Amarillo and remained there until his death.

Mr. Sweeney was married in 1911 to Miss Della Seaman of Briscoe County. Mrs. Sweeney died shortly after the birth of a daughter, who was reared by Mrs. Pat Sweeney, mother of Hiram.

Mr. Sweeney and Mrs. Hattie Simmons were married in 1945.

Surviving, besides his wife, are a daughter, Mrs. Howard L. Evans of Houston, and two stepsons, Lt. James O. Simmons of Amarillo Police Department and Elton H. Simmons Jr. who is in the U. S. Navy.

Interment was in the Silvertown Cemetery.

Mr. Sweeney's high esteem was shown by the goodly crowd of friends who came with the body from Amarillo and various other places and the many local friends who gathered at the Silvertown cemetery where Masonic grave side rites were held.

## Area Hospitals Received Ford Grants

The following feeders attended and were responsible for making the plans and program: Orvell Hamilton, Gabe Garrison, Robert Spilman, Wade Steele, O. Stark Jr. and County Agent Edbetter.

This group went on record for encouraging more cattle feeding on the farms of Briscoe County. This part of the State offers the best opportunities of

any place in the nation for feeding operations on the farm. Sources of cattle are abundant and feed is grown on every farm. The climate is the best anywhere for cattle feeding operations. Dry land farmers have one of the best opportunities of marketing their only sure crop, roughage, through feeding steers. The Spur Experiment Station has been demonstrating this method of feeding for years and it has constantly shown a profit. This operation has kept the Station at Spur going, for contrary to opinion, Experiment Stations have to pay their own way.

The group will assemble on the west side of the Courthouse promptly at 12:30 Saturday afternoon and will leave from there. Farms to be visited include Norvell Hamilton and E. J. Inexpensive lamp kit, put together at home, looks good and gives plenty of proper light for reading, sewing, studying and other close tasks.

Getting the correct lighting for reading, sewing or studying is easy with an attractive lamp kit which you can assemble at home and to suit your decorative tastes.

Many 4-H's have found fun in the project, and only recently Mrs. Harriet Brummett, County Home Demonstration Agent in Floyd County, Texas, assembled one of the kits in less than one afternoon. "My husband thinks it is the best reading lamp in the house," says the proud Mrs. Brummett, who adds, "the amazing part about this quality lamp is the low cost. The kit and the approved R-40 bulb cost only about \$4.00."

Your Home Demonstration Club, 4-H Club or other groups can set up a craft lamp-building project with the help of your County Extension Agent. It's not only fun, but the kits come in a variety of colors permitting the homemaker to choose lamps which harmonize with the motif of the home. The Floyd County Home Demonstration Clubs are already planning similar craft lamp projects for this winter.

Important is the fact that although the lamp is extremely attractive, it still entails the design

of good lighting. Good lamp lighting requirements call for a shade that is open at the top for upward reflection of light, sloping sides which direct a soft but adequate flow of light downward on the subject matter being seen. The shade may be opaque and lined in white for maximum light output, or translucent and light in color.

For proper "seeability" a lamp is actually only as good as the bulb used. In this lamp recommended usage calls for a 150 watt, 150 R/W white indirect bulb. This inside white bulb acts as its own diffusing reflector thus eliminating the use of a glass bowl for that purpose.

Again, the lamp is tall enough to cover a wide working area, and its base is large enough to prevent tipping.

Every home needs several good reading lamps, and here is your opportunity to have as many good reading lamps as you need at a cost you can well afford. With the school season in full swing, good lamps are an investment in good eyesight. Lamps can be replaced as styles change, but eyes are non-replaceable and should be given the proper light to see by.

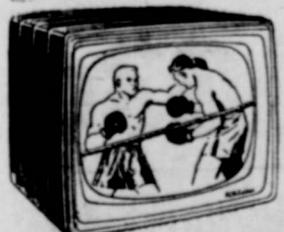

Blackwell, Commanding Officer of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District stated that during the week between November 6 and 12, the Texas Highway Patrol, using routine enforcement techniques, checked some 48,642 motorists on the rural highways in Texas to determine whether they had valid driver's licenses. As a result of the check, 1562 arrests for driver's license violations and other hazardous traffic violations were made. 95.9% of all Texas drivers contacted were found to have valid driver's licenses.

Captain Blackwell stated that in the Amarillo District 1370 motorists were checked with 47 arrests for driver's license violations and other hazardous traffic violations as a result of these contacts. 95.8% of Texas drivers contacted in the Amarillo District were found to have valid driver's licenses.
