

If he is also an employer and expects to pay at least \$100 cash wages to an employee during the ployer's identification number" as well as his own social security number. He gets the employer's number from his district director of Internal Revenue and gets his social security number from the social security office. These two numbers are entirely diffefrent and separate. Any post office has application blanks.

Sanderson said that several farm owners in the 65 or older age group have contacted the rep resentative when they were in town to learn whether they can qualify to receive old-age payments. Those who are actually operating their ownfarms can qualify after they have been under social security for only two years after 1954.


