Caution Should be Observed in Passing School Buses

Texas school superintendents, news editors, and other citizens have been requested to give statewide emphasis and interpretation to the oft-neglected Texas law which requires all vehicles to stop when approaching a school bus loading or unloading children. Three state agencies—The Texas Education Agency, the Texas Highway Department, and the Texas Department of Public Safety—joined in making the appeal.

Texas school buses were involved in 379 accidents in rural areas (outside city limits) during 1955. Three children and two adults were killed in these accidents.

"Even one preventable accident, as we all know, is one too many," said J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education. "A study of the various replies which have been made to the question of what drivers of other vehicles should do when they approach a school bus which is loading or unloading children reveals a startling lack of understanding and a great deal of misunderstanding concerning what the statutes require."

The law says in effect, that upon meeting or overtaking from either direction a school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging children, the driver shall stop immediately before passing, then proceed with due caution at a speed which is prudent and does not exceed ten miles per hour. The law does not apply within city limits.

Vehicles are not required to stop on highways with separate roadways when the bus is on a different roadway from that of a passing vehicle. Vehicles are not required to stop if the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is part of or adjacent to a controlled access highway and where pedestrians are not permitted to cross the roadway.

Edgar said motorists can identify a school bus easily because "School Bus" appears in large letters across the front and rear of each bus. "All public school buses are painted in a uniform yellow color and trimmed in black," he pointed out. "School buses are equipped with flasher lights front and rear and usually mounted high on the bus. Flashers are used only when the bus is in process of stopping or is stopped to receive or discharge children."

In conjunction with the educational program for drivers of all type vehicles, the State Department of Education is preparing a bus drivers' handbook for distribution to the 8,000 school bus drivers in Texas. The manual will include pertinent safety regulations affecting school bus drivers.

Edgar said information about the law would continue to be distributed in all parts of Texas "until every citizen has had an opportunity to understand the importance of this law." He suggested that superintendents might want to enlist the help of parents, students, and local service groups in spreading facts about the law to all Texas drivers.

Mr. Allard's appointment became effective July 30, 1956. The committee on which he will serve determines the eligibility of local farmers who apply for Farmers Home Administration loans. The new committeeman has been farming and carrying on a livestock program in the vicinity of Silverton for the past several years. At the present time is also operating the Allard Butane Company in Silverton. Mr. Allard succeeds Wade H. Steele of Silverton, whose term expired this year.

The other two members are George Martin, Silverton, and Bill Helms, Quitaque.

Each agricultural county in the country has a similar committee of three members who are responsible for determining loan applicants' eligibility, certifying the value of farms being purchased or improved through Farmers Home Administration loans, and making recommendations on loan approvals and loan servicing actions.

Each member is named for a 3-year term and one appointment expires each year. A member completing his 3-year term cannot succeed himself. At least two of the members must be farmers.

The committee works with the county supervisor in connection with all types of loans. These include farm operating loans and loans to buy, improve, or enlarge efficient family-type farms in this area. They also include loans to farmers or their nonprofit associations to establish and carry on approved soil and water conservation practices including improving permanent pastures, terracing, soil erosion measures, farmstead water systems, irrigation, drainage, and many other conservation practices.

Most of the soil and water conservation loans to buy or improve farms are made from funds advanced by private lenders and insured by the agency. Some of these loans, however, and all loans for operating farms, are from annually appropriated funds.

The agency makes emergency loans in areas designated for that purpose by the Secretary of Agriculture. Swisher and Briscoe Counties are designated for Great Plains Emergency Loans.

No loan of any type can be approved for an applicant whose credit needs can be handled adequately by other credit sources.

The regular office staff of the Farmers Home Administration serving Briscoe County consists of the county supervisor, Ralph E. Griffiths; Frank L. King, Emergency Loan Supervisor; Una Loard, county-office clerk, and Mrs. Lou Rose Cosby, assistant county office clerk for emergency loans. The office is located in the building with the ASC Office, SCS Office, and County Agent, and serves Swisher and Briscoe Counties. Office day for Briscoe County is Tuesday of each week.
