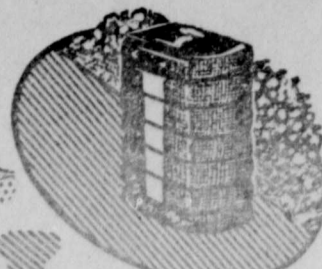
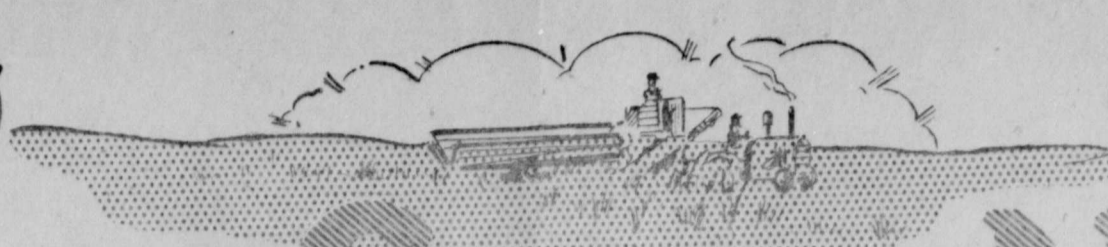

## Flower Show School To Be Held Here on September 20-22

Mrs. Conrad Alexander, local Garden Club chairman, has announced that the flower show school course one is to be held here September 20-22, with Mrs. J. A. Kendall of Arlington, Texas, and Mrs. Jason Robberson of Amarillo, as instructors.

The school which is sponsored by the Silverton Garden Club will be held at the First Baptist Church. Registration will begin at 8:30 a. m. and lectures will start promptly at 9 a. m. each morning. Saturday, September 22, written examinations will be held for the students taking the course for credit. Time 9 a. m.

The first day, Thursday, Mrs. Robberson will lecture and demonstrate flower arrangement. The lecture will cover the history and background of flower arrangement, the main types of arrangements, the mechanics, containers, and the preservation of plant material. Following the lecture, she will demonstrate each type of arrangement. Demonstration of judging, with student participation will conclude the days work.

Mrs. Robberson is an active member of the Amarillo Garden Club and a life member of the garden group of the Amarillo Junior League. She also is a member of the local judging group (Northern zone of District One) and The Dallas Founders Group of National Accredited Judges.

Fort the past ten years, Flower arrangement has been her number one hobby. She has lectured and conducted workshops in her own clubs and throughout the Texas Panhandle. She was the featured speaker, on color in F. Arr. at the district convention of Texas Garden Clubs, this spring.

Mrs. Robberson has had instruction in the many phases of flower arrangement, color, and design, church arrangements, table settings, dried arr. etc) under Margaret Cochran Cole of New York, Mrs. Emma Cyphers, and Ruth Emerson Kistner of New Jersey, and private lessons from Georgy Con way of California. She recently attended lectures in Tulsa, Okla., and Kansas City by two of the nations foremost arrangers.

Since 1952, Mrs. Robberson has engaged in teaching flower show schools during which time she has become well known for her successful schools in Oklahoma and New Mexico as well as in Texas.

## Silverton Owls Win First Game of Season From Dimmitt Team

Silverton, of Conference 2B, opened the 1956 football season before some 1,500 fans with a narrow 25 to 24 victory over Dimmitt of class 1AA.

In the first quarter, Silverton kicked to Dimmitt and Troy Chitty recovered a fumble on the 30 yard line. Silverton lost the ball on down on the 15 yard line, but Dimmitt couldn't gain and kicked out. On the fourth down C. L. Dunn's pass to Bill Stephens was good for 30 yards to the 10 yard line. From the 6, C. L. circled right end for a touchdown.

Bobby Stafford with Jerry McWilliams holding, kicked the extra point which proved all important. Lowe, of the Bobcats, returned kick off to the 50 and on the second play, the big Dimmitt full-back boozed went 45 yards for a touchdown. No extra point was made.

The second quarter began with the score 7 to 6. Dunn quick-kicked on the second play and Dimmitt with the wind in their favor, passed on the first down.

C. L. Dunn pilfered the ball on the thirty-second, and by following some fine blocking went 68 yards for a touchdown.

After exchanging five fumbles, Dimmitt was about to score when Jimmie Marshall ended the first half by recovering a fumble on the five yard line.

The third quarter began with Dimmitt mounting a steady drive from the kick-off. The halfback, Gilbreath, scored from the one yard line. Point failed, leaving the score 13 to 12.

Robert Hill almost got away on the ensuing kickoff, but stumbled over one of his own men. From the Dimmitt 44 C. L. Dunn passed to Wing back Bill Stephens for a touchdown. The point failed and the quarter ended 19 to 12.

In the fourth quarter, Silverton scored early on a series of hard runs by Dealeath Peugh scored from the second to make the score 25 to 12.

Leading 25 to 12, Silverton began playing a safe game to run out the time but the Bobcat center, Tate, recovered a fumble on the 36. After two quick first downs touchstone ran from the eight yard line to make the score 25 to 18.

With four minutes to play Dimmitt scored on a series of plays set up by another Silverton fumble. Lowe passed 36 yards to end, Cleaver, to make the score 25 to 24.

It appeared that the Owls would lose the ball on downs, but Bill Stephens made a long run around left end and a first down just as time ran out.

On Friday, the 14th the Owls invade Ralls in the second game of the season.

The Owl line was tough all the way. Such boys as James Alexander, Jim Marshall, Sammy Turner, Troy Chitty, Norman Chitty and Jimmy Scott Whitfill made it possible for the Owls backs to make good gains.

Dyrl Maples and J. E. Patton proved that they were capable and are making the first string line hustle for their positions.

## Caprock District Tour Set for Monday, September 17

Edwin Crass, chairman of the board of supervisors of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District, announced the date for the annual field tour, which will be Monday, September 17.

The group will assemble on the east side of the courthouse in Silverton and be prepared to leave at 1:00 p. m.

The highlight of the tour, which is to be the first stop, will be a trip to the Experiment plots at the east side of the city limits of Tulia.

The work at these plots is supervised by the Lubbock Experiment Station. Ernest Thaxton, Irrigation Engineer from the station will be on hand to discuss the following: Comparison of different varieties of cotton and grain sorghum; results of eight different tests of fertilizer on cotton and grain sorghum; and results of different amounts of irrigation water applied at different rates and times.

On returning from Tulia, the group will stop at the Robert Spill man farm to see some land leveling for irrigation.

The next stop will be at the Edwin Crass farm to see a stubble mulch demonstration on wheat-land.

The group will then proceed to view a lake pump setup on the Garland Francis farm.

The next and final stop will be at the Joe Mercer place. Here will be seen a novel plan for using wheat and blackeyed peas for grazing and harvest.

Everyone is invited to attend this tour; however, it should be of special interest to irrigation farmers.

## Farmers Home Administration Credit Service Expanded

Recent changes in the laws governing Farmers Home Administration will enable the agency to meet the credit needs of a larger number of farm families, Walter McKay, state director, said today.

The expanded credit services are the best yet devised to help our farmers and ranchers through the worst drought in Texas history, McKay stated.

The new law provides broader authority to assist family-type farmers with loans to improve and operate their farms. It also authorizes, as a part of the Rural Development program, loans for planting and developing farms where the farmer has part time employment off the farm. Included in the broader authority are refinancing existing debts and an increase in the maximum amount that can be advanced for operating loans.

Types of loans which can now be made include:  
1. Operating loans to full time farmers. Initial operating loans may be made in amounts up to \$25,000 to one borrower, with subsequent loans authorized as needed up to the total amount of indebtedness does not exceed \$20,000.

Operating loans are used for purchase of equipment, livestock, or to refinance debts owed on equipment and livestock, and fertilizer, seed and other farm home operating expenses needed to carry out efficient farm operations on family type

farms. Interest is at the rate of five percent, and these loans are repayable over periods up to seven years. The new law increased from \$7,000 to \$10,000 the amount of the initial loan; from \$10,000 to \$20,000 the limitation on indebtedness; and increased from 7 to 10 years the period during which additional credit can be extended in hardship cases when the inability of the borrower to repay his indebtedness within 7 years was due to causes beyond his control. Under the former law no new credit could be extended to borrowers who have been indebted continuously for 7 years.

2. Farm Ownership loans. These loans are made for the purchase, enlargement, or development of family type farms, and to refinance existing debts for farmers who have adequate real estate security but who are unable to meet present credit obligations and need credit on more favorable terms. Payments are scheduled according to the ability of the borrower to repay, up to 40 years. Insured loans are made from funds provided by private lenders. The loans bear 3 1/2 percent interest, plus a one percent insurance charge. In the past, the agency has only refinanced existing real estate debts, and then only when the refinancing was incidental to the making of a real estate loan for purchase or improvement of family type farms.

3. Farm Housing loans. These are made for the construction and repair of farm houses and other farm buildings, including farmstead water supplies. Interest is four percent on the outstanding principal, and repayments may be scheduled over periods up to 33 years, with the loan secured by a deed of trust on the borrower's

farm. This loan program was re-activated in May of this year.

4. Soil and Water Conservation loans. Made to carry out measures for soil conservation, water development, conservation and use, and farm drainage. Individuals can borrow up to \$25,000 for these purposes. Interest and insurance charges are 4 1/2 percent with repayments scheduled according to the borrower's ability to pay, up to 20 years.

5. Loans to part time farmers. These are designated to help farmers in areas designated for the Rural Development program, who are unable to obtain enough land resources to develop full time farms. Loans may be made for operating and developing less than family type farms, if the applicants are established bona fide farmers who have historically resided on farms and depend on farm income for their livelihood, and who are conducting substantial farming operations and spending a major portion of their time farming. Such operations must have dependable sources of outside income. When such loans are made for operating expense, they bear interest at five percent and are repayable over periods up to seven years. Loans for real estate development bear interest of 4 1/2 percent and are repayable over periods of up to forty years.

6. Special Livestock loans. Initial loans of this type will be available until July 14, 1957, and loans to indebted borrowers can be made until July 14, 1959. Such loans are made to help establish producers of cattle, sheep and goats maintain their normal operations. Loans are made for replacement livestock and for purchase and production of feed and for other operating expense. Interest is five percent and loans are repayable in one to three years. They are not made to pay existing debts.

7. Emergency loans. These are made to enable farmers to continue normal operations but not to refinance existing indebtedness. They bear interest at the rate of three percent. Ordinarily loans secured by liens on chattel property are scheduled for repayment within one to five years. Loans for crop production are due when the crop is harvested.

8. Great Plains loans. These

loans are available only in the 57 West Texas designated counties under the Great Plains Special Credit Program. They are made in the same manner and for all purposes authorized for the making of Operating loans, except that under these loans the operator may be conducting farming operations on larger than a family type farm. Swisher and Briscoe Counties are included in the Great Plains area.

Eligibility for all types of loan assistance available is determined by a three man county Farmers Home Administration committee. Farmers Home Administration credit supplements but does not replace other sources of credit. Loans are made only when the applicant is unable to obtain credit from private or cooperative sources of credit. While Farmers Home Administration requires less security than is usually required

by other lenders, no loan is made unless it appears that the loan can be repaid.
