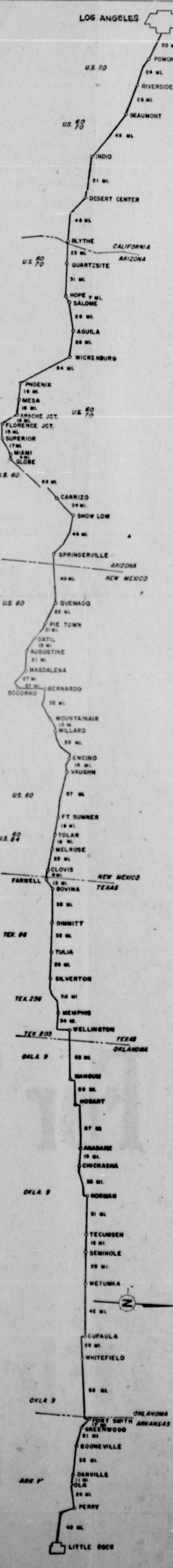

Old Ozark Trail Will Be Brought to Life Again

Horace Greely once said "Go West Young Man, Go West", which was all well and good for his day and age. And to go west many people of the East chose the Old Ozark Trail that once ran through here.

But time brings many changes. Today those of the West want to go East—and they are doing so by the thousands across Uncle Sam's spiderweb network of highways. Tourists, businessmen, and just plain travelers daily scan their roadmaps looking for the shortest distances between many points.

And this brings the Ozark Trail to life again. For along this road people in the Texas Panhandle have found their shortest route to Arkansas and the Southeast.

This route, which comes through Silverton, is known as Texas Highway 86. Since the early pioneers traveled laboriously and slow, they naturally chose the shortest route possible to their destination.

People who travel a great deal appreciate variations in scenery along the route. Texas Highway 86 traverses the Great Plains of Texas, going through the canyons which once held the old Goodnight Ranch. Just East of Silverton is one of the most beautiful drives to be found anywhere, and the road enters this scenic country from one of Texas' most fertile irrigated farming sections.

To popularize this route and to help let everyone know of its feasibility as the best highway to the East for people in the Great Southwest, the Dimmitt, Texas, Chamber of Commerce has inaugurated a campaign to get the route designated as a one-number Federal Highway.

Leading the campaign is Mr. T. A. Singer and Glen Youts, both of Dimmitt who have been working on the project for several months.

Lockney Rites For Crash Victim James Deavenport

Lockney, Nov. 19—Funeral services for James Wade Deavenport, 67, who died Sunday afternoon of injuries received in a wreck several days ago, was conducted at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday in the Main Street Church of Christ here.

Deavenport, a farmer in the South Plains Community northeast of here, died at a Lockney hospital where he was being treated for injuries suffered in a one-car collision Friday.

Deavenport had resided in the South Plains community for most of his life, moving there in 1899. He was a member of the Main Street Church of Christ.

Burial in Lockney. Survivors include two sons, Noel, Silverton, and Norman, South Plains; one daughter, Mrs. Herman Thornton, South Plains; two brothers, Lee, Silverton, and Alec, Boulder, Colorado; three sisters, Mrs. Maggie Wallace, Tucumcari, New Mexico; Mrs. Maude Marshal, Los Angeles; and Mrs. Mollie Kitchen, Silverton; and four grandchildren.

Burial was in the Lockney Cemetery beside the grave of Mrs. Deavenport, who died a year ago. The Carter Funeral Home directed arrangements.

The point didn't materialize, to leave the score after this touchdown 13-6. Brad's kick was returned to the 30 by Arnold (Deleath doing the tackling.) Then after Sammy Turner made a couple of good tackles, Arnold fumbled, Jimmy Don recovered on Turkey's 43. Silverton went to the 50 before having to let the ball go over on downs, then Turkey went to the 10 before having to send it back.

Silverton played the next series in vain, the ball went to Turkey on downs on Silverton's 10. Arnold took it about 8 yards to Silverton's 2, then went in for a touchdown on the next play to make the score 13-12. Their point try was no good. The ball game ended before the Owls had time to make their 13-12 win a larger one.

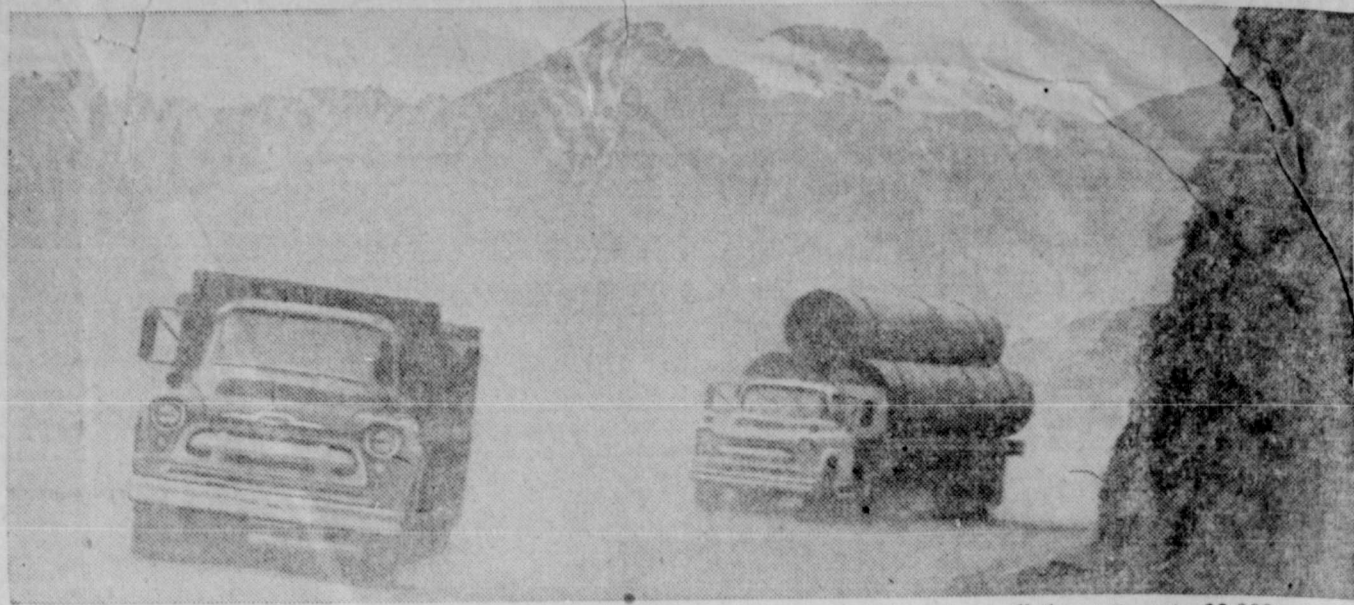

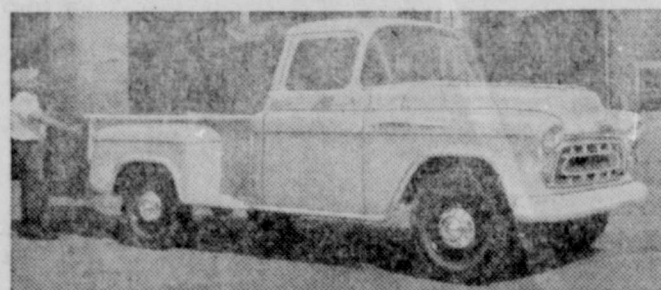

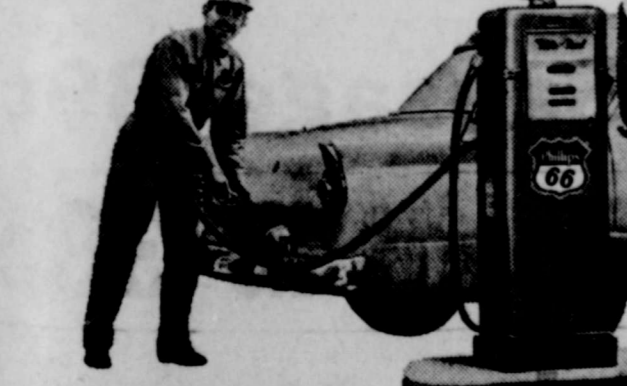
