



CHICAGO-The nation's largest scholarship organization reports that a high percentage of the nation's most gifted high school students plan to make science and engineering their career.

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation conducted tests among 60,000 high school seniors to determine winners of \$3,000,000 worth of scholarships.

It said a survey among 5,078 semifinalists showed that 56 per cent of the boys and 16 per cent of the girls want to become engineers or scientists.

In addition, 36 per cent of the girls want to become teachers. Experts have been warning for some time that engineering and teaching are two fields in which the nation suffers from a shortage. The survey showed that the next most popular field is medicine and other health pursuits, favored by 10 per cent of both boys and girls.

Business careers were favored by 8 per cent. Law was most popular with 8 per cent of the boys and 5 per cent of the girls.


