The speaker for last week's assembly program was Miss Martha Sanders, who teaches music; private lessons in piano; in the local school. Miss Sanders told of receiving her education at the State School for the blind at Austin, Texas. She entered school there at the age of six and graduated from high school with a major in music twelve years later. For her college work she went to North Texas State College at Denton, Texas. She continued working in the field of music and received a bachelor of music degree. Miss Sanders was one of four blind students enrolled at Denton among about 1000 seeing students.

The students and faculty thoroughly enjoyed Miss Sanders' objective and charming discussion of her "ups and downs" through school and college. The story of Rusty, her Seeing-Eye Dog, was particularly interesting. Rusty was given three month's training by a professional trainer as all dogs are. Then when Miss Sanders went to California to get a log, she was studied for three days in order that she might secure a dog that was suited to her personality. She and Rusty then received 80 hours of training to be together before she was allowed to bring Rusty home with her.

Miss Sanders' talk was an inspiration to all who heard it. She has accomplished more than the average person does who is able to see. At the close of the program Miss Sanders played a few numbers on her accordin.

Eldon O'Neal Wins Third Place in District 4-H Cotton Production--300 Boys Compete

Eldon O'Neal, Briscoe County 4-H club boy from Silverton was awarded third place in the District Four Cotton Production Contest. Eldon was the Briscoe County winner and placed third in competition with some 300 club boys in the South Plains District. He weighed a total of 5,500 pounds of cotton on five acres. This was 2 1/5 pounds per acre or 2 1/5 bushels per acre. The winner of the contest, Roy Gregg of Plainview, weighed three bales per acre. This was the first time that this contest had been reached in 15 years the contest has been held.

Eldon is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eldon O'Neal of Silverton. He was awarded a check for \$85.00 from the Cooper Oil Mill of Lubbock at a banquet for the County winners.

This very high yield was made on Stormmaster variety cotton. Eldon fertilized with a mixed fertilizer and side dressed with anhydrous amonia. He sprayed his cotton a total of five times. His cotton was completely machine harvested. Eldon did pick up a small amount that the machine knocked down. This amount was about one percent of his total, according to County Agent Ledbetter.

This was the highest production ever for a Briscoe County youth. Other years high winners were Larry West and Bobby Crass.

Eldon was accompanied by his County Agent and wife Mrs. Ledbetter and Richard Whitfill another 4-H member that had a cotton demonstration this year.
